The Obama Timeline - Part II

The Doomed Presidency

April 2014

On April 1 the Associated Press reports, "Beating expectations, ... Obama's health care overhaul was on track to sign up more than 7 million Americans for health insurance on deadline day Monday [March 31], government officials told The Associated Press. The 7 million target, thought to be out of reach by most experts, was in sight on a day that saw surging consumer interest as well as vexing computer glitches that slowed sign-ups on the HealthCare.gov website... Seven million was the original target set by the Congressional Budget Office for enrollment in taxpayer-subsidized private health insurance through new online markets created under Obama's signature legislation." (Even if seven million individuals *did* enroll in ObamaCare—and that number is likely wildly inflated because it includes duplicate enrollments of applicants who had so much trouble with Healthcare.gov that they enrolled one or more additional times just to "play it safe"—it is unclear why that should be considered a success when Obama himself has claimed there are as many as 47 million uninsured Americans. Enrolling seven million still leaves 40 million uninsured, without even addressing the question of the cost of ObamaCare. If the Affordable Care Act costs the federal government an estimated \$1.8 trillion over 10 years, or \$180 billion per year, each of the seven million ObamaCare enrollees is costing the taxpayers \$25,714. Nevertheless, even if Republicans take control of the Senate and win the presidency in 2016, unless they repeal ObamaCare the nation will likely be stuck with it forever. Once millions of Americans—regardless of political party—get used to someone else subsidizing their health care premiums, they will not vote to end those hand-outs. Senators Rand Paul (R-KY), Mike Lee (R-UT), and Ted Cruz (R-TX) know that, but the GOP establishment seems not to know—or not to care.) [57008, 57010, 57034]

Obama brags that 7.1 million Americans have enrolled in ObamaCare. (He does not define the word "enrolled," say how many have actually paid for coverage, state how many of those 7 million had insurance until the Affordable Care Act caused the loss of their prior policies, or report on how many of the 7.1 million will have their premiums subsidized by the taxpayers.) Speaking from the White House Rose Garden Obama states, "No, the Affordable Care Act hasn't fixed our long broken health care system, but this law has made our broken system a lot better." (Millions of Americans have been led to believe that the legislation would, in fact, "fix" the health care system—and voted for Obama because of that promise. Now he says that his law—which will cost the taxpayers more than \$2 trillion over 10 years—will *not* fix it. He does not say how much more he would need to spend to "really" fix it.) Obama states, "The debate over repealing this law is over, the Affordable Care Act is here to stay," and slams the law's opponents with a typical straw man argument: "I've got to admit, I don't get it. Why are folks working so hard for people not to have health

insurance? Why are they so mad about the idea of folks having health insurance?" (As usual, Obama intentionally mischaracterizes the arguments of his opponents. Opponents of ObamaCare do not want people not to have health insurance, but they generally want individuals and families to buy their own insurance—rather than have it subsidized in part or in full by the taxpayers.) "Many of the tall tales that have been told about this law have been debunked," claims Obama. "There are still no death panels. Armageddon has not arrived." (There *is* a "death panel; it is called the Independent Payment Advisory Board, an unelected panel that has the power to tell physicians and hospitals what treatment is appropriate—all in the interests of saving money, rather than lives. As far as the arrival of Armageddon, that is debatable. Six million Americans who have seen their health insurance policies canceled because of ObamaCare might argue that Armageddon has already arrived.) [57019, 57024, 57032, 57059, 57077, 57078, 57259]

Obama "plays the race card," saying, "Regardless of your politics or your feelings about me, or your feelings about this law, [increasing health-care coverage is] something that's good for our economy, and it's good for our country." (Interestingly, Obama is animated and energetic during his comments, as he alternately gloats about his accomplishment and criticizes the GOP. This is a complete reversal of his appearance during his recent trip overseas, where it was obvious he cared not one whit about foreign policy, was in over his head with Russia, Crimea, and Ukraine, and wished the problems would all just go away. But a return to his home turf and imposing absurd and expensive "big government" to domestic problems seems to reinvigorate him.) Obama's announcement comes during the day—because the major television networks refuse his request for free air time during the prime time evening hours. Interestingly, Obama thanks Vice President Joe Biden, House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi (D-CA), Senator Dick Durbin (D-IL), and others for their Affordable Care Act efforts, but neglects to note Secretary of Health and Human Services Kathleen Sebelius—who is seated directly in front of him. Obama also releases a statement that reads in part, "[T]his afternoon, we announced that 7.1 million Americans have now signed up for private insurance plans through the new Health Insurance Marketplaces. 7.1 million. That doesn't count the more than 3 million young adults who have gained insurance under this law by staying on their families' plans. It doesn't count the millions more who have gotten covered through the expansion of Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program. It doesn't include the more than 100 million folks who now have better care—who are receiving additional benefits, like mammograms and contraceptive care, at no extra cost." (Obama's "at no extra cost" claim is a lie. No insurance company can provide additional, mandated benefits without increasing premiums to pay for them. No benefits are "free," just as a product that is sold with "free delivery" merely has the delivery cost built into the sales price.) "Now, millions of our fellow Americans have the comfort and peace of mind that comes with knowing they're no longer leaving their health and well-being to chance." (ObamaCare does not change the odds of becoming sick or injured. That is still dependent on "chance.")

"And while our long-broken health care system may not be completely fixed," continues the statement, "it's without question a lot better. That's something to be proud of—and there's no good reason to go back." (The system may be "fixed" for those Americans who now have the luxury of taxpayers footing the bill for some or all of their health insurance premiums, but it is by no means "fixed" for those who are not entitled to subsidies and who face higher premiums and taxes.) "Regardless of your politics, or your feelings about the Affordable Care Act, millions more Americans with health coverage is something that's good for our economy and our country." (Whether millions more Americans have health care is disputable—and depends on who it was who enrolled in ObamaCare.) "At the end of the day, that is what this law—and the other reforms we're fighting for, from a 21st-century immigration system to a fairer wage for every American who's willing to work for it—are all about: Making sure our country lives up to our highest ideals." (To Obama, the "highest ideals" includes amnesty for illegal immigrants and a job-killing increase in the minimum wage.)

The increasingly delusional House Minority Leader, Nancy Pelosi (D-CA), tells reporters, "It is really so heart-warming for those of us who worked so hard [to ensure that many more people in our country would have access to healthcare. There are those critics, bumps in the road, but they've only been turbulence. They have not been an obstacle to the American people having healthier life that our that our founders wanted for them. [They wanted] "life—a healthier life—liberty and the freedom to pursue their happiness, not [be] job-locked, but having benefits that having health-care policies that are portable [sic], they could be self-employed, be a photographer—they could start their own business, they could change jobs, they could reach their aspirations. And isn't that a wonderful thing for a society and for an economy?" (The likelihood that Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, George Washington, and their fellow lovers of liberty wanted government-mandated health care for Americans so they could pursue their dreams of becoming taxpayer-subsidized photographers is zero.) Having a greater grasp of reality than Pelosi, House Speaker John Boehner (R-OH) states that ObamaCare "continues to wreak havoc on American families, small businesses, and our economy, and as I've said many times, the problem was never just about the website, it's the whole law." Pelosi is asked by a reporter, "[I]sn't the real measure of success, not the raw number who signed up [for ObamaCare], but how many of those who signed up were not insured before?" Pelosi responds, "No, that's not—the measure is twofold. The message is how many people have access to health care—quality, affordable health care and insurance. The real reason to do the Affordable Care Act... was the cost of health care in our country was unsustainable—unsustainable to individuals, to small businesses, to corporate America, the competitive issue internationally, and also to state and local and certainly the federal budget. So what this legislation has done is it will save a trillion dollars over the lifetime of the bill, and it will—it will reduce costs for people. And even if they pay a little more in some cases, they're getting much better care. So this is about quality and affordability, and the affordability, that's why it has that name. So that is what I think is the measure." (ObamaCare will not "save a trillion dollars." It will cost as

much as \$2 trillion over 10 years—in federal spending alone. In addition, it will make health insurance more expensive, not less expensive.) [57084]

While Obama runs his ObamaCare "mission accomplished" victory lap, Reuters reports that "insurers are already anticipating the need to raise prices for 2015 and fear that it will put them at the center of the political blame game over ... Obama's healthcare law. ...[I]nsurers have already said that the first group of new enrollees under Obamacare, as the law is widely known, represent a higher rate of older and costlier members than hoped. To keep their health plans from losing money in the coming years, many expect monthly premium rates to rise by double-digit percentages in some parts of the country. That could set the stage for a public outcry ahead of congressional elections this year, giving ammunition to Republicans and creating new friction with the White House that could endure into the 2016 presidential election. 'I do think that it's likely premium rate shocks are coming. I think they begin to make themselves at least partially known in 2015 and fully known in 2016,' said Chet Burrell, chief executive officer of CareFirst BlueCross BlueShield. 'That will be different in different parts of the country. I don't think it will be uniformly the same.'" [57177, 57178]

WashingtonTimes.com reports, "Before the Obama administration gave an inaccurate narrative on national television that the Benghazi attacks grew from an anti-American protest, the CIA's station chief in Libya pointedly told his superiors in Washington that no such demonstration occurred, documents and interviews with current and former intelligence officials show. The attack was 'not an escalation of protests,' the station chief wrote to then-Deputy CIA Director Michael J. Morell in an email dated Sept. 15, 2012—a full day before the White House sent Susan E. Rice to several Sunday talk shows to disseminate talking points claiming that the Benghazi attack began as a protest over an anti-Islam video. That the talking points used by Mrs. Rice, who was then U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, were written by a CIA that ignored the assessment by its own station chief inside Libya, has emerged as one of the major bones of contention in the nearly two years of political fireworks and congressional investigations into the Benghazi attack. What has never been made public is whether Mr. Morell and others at the CIA explicitly shared the station chief's assessment with the White House or State Department. Two former intelligence officials have told The Washington Times that this question likely will be answered at a Wednesday hearing of the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence during which Mr. Morell is scheduled to give his public testimony. One former intelligence official close to Mr. Morell told The Times on the condition of anonymity that 'the whole question of communication with the station chief will be addressed in his testimony.' 'We're confident that it will clarify the situation in the minds of many who are asking,' the former official said. Another former intelligence official told The Times that Mr. Morell did tell the White House and the State Department that the CIA station chief in Libya had concluded that there was no protest but senior Obama administration and CIA officials in Washington ignored the assessment." At the White House, Obama greets the Boston Red Sox. A player named David Ortiz takes a photo of himself with Obama using his cell phone. (The photo is then promoted by Samsung, with the caption, "This photo was taken with a #GalaxyNote3." How much Ortiz was paid by Samsung is not known; he signed a product endorsement contract with the company one day earlier.) [57127, 57170]

On the floor of the Senate, Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-NV) criticizes Senator Tom Coburn (R-OK) for "getting in the weeds" with the details of ObamaCare, rather than "look[ing] at the overall context of this bill [the Affordable Care Act]." (Coburn is being treated for prostate cancer, and lost his preferred doctor because of ObamaCare. Reid apparently believes that complaining about losing one's cancer specialist is "getting in the weeds" and unimportant.) [57055]

HuffingtonPost.com reports, "The Obama administration has conducted warrantless searches of Americans' communications as part of the National Security Agency's surveillance operations that target foreigners located outside of the U.S., the administration's top intelligence official confirmed in a letter to Congress disclosed Tuesday. These searches were authorized by a secret surveillance court in 2011, but it was unclear until Tuesday whether any such searches on Americans had been conducted. Senators Ron Wyden (D-OR) and Mark Udall (D-CO) state, "Senior officials have sometimes suggested that government agencies do not deliberately read Americans' emails, monitor their online activity or listen to their phone calls without a warrant. However, the facts show that those suggestions were misleading, and that intelligence agencies have indeed conducted warrantless searches for Americans' communications." [57134]

Congressman Paul Ryan (R-WI), chairman of the House Budget Committee, releases a budget proposal that repeals ObamaCare and allegedly reduces anticipated increases in federal spending by \$5.1 trillion over 10 years and would supposedly lead to a balanced budget. Townhall.com political editor Guy Benson observes, "It has zero chance of becoming law, but its very existence makes clear that Ryan and his colleagues take their responsibilities—and the law—seriously. The GOP proposal offers a number of object lessons in political priorities, especially when contrasted with Democrats' alternatives, or lack thereof." (Ryan's proposal does *not* cut spending; it merely reduces the amount of projected growth in spending. Nevertheless, the Democrat-controlled Senate—which has produced a budget in only four of the last five years—will never allow it to become law.) Former Bill Clinton political strategist Dick Morris suggests that House Republicans reject Ryan's proposal: "Why should the Republican Party give the Democrats ammunition for the next five elections. Morris has a valid point. At the University of Michigan, Obama tells an audience of 1,400 that if Ryan's budget proposal were sold at the nearby Zingerman's Deli, "They'd have to call it the "stinkburger," or, or, or, or the, or the "meanwich." The remark may be

childish, but he sends a clear message: "The Democrats will keep the gravy train going." Whether Obama said that Ryan's mother "wears combat boots" is not reported. (Columnist George Will later writes, "Try to imagine Franklin Roosevelt or Dwight Eisenhower or John Kennedy or Ronald Reagan talking like that. It is unimaginable that those grown-ups would resort to japes that fourth-graders would not consider sufficiently clever for use on a playground.") Former Alaska governor and vice-presidential candidate Sarah Palin writes, "The latest Ryan... Budget is not an April Fool's joke. But it really IS a joke because it is STILL not seeing the problem; it STILL is not proposing reining in wasteful government overspending TODAY, instead of speculating years out that some future Congress and White House may possibly, hopefully, eh-who-knows, take responsibility for today's budgetary selfishness and shortsightedness to do so. THIS is the definition of insanity. Do we still not understand how dangerous it is to allow government to grow unchecked as we shackle ourselves with massive debt—a good portion of which is held by foreign nations who don't necessarily like us? If we can't balance the budget today, what on earth makes us think it will happen at some future date? The solution is staring us in the face. With Democrats opposing a repeal of ObamaCare and campaigning on a "let's just fix the problems with it" mantra, NBC's Chuck Todd asks Congresswoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz (D-FL), head of the Democrat National Committee, what fixes she supports. She responds, 'Well, there's no specific bill right now actually that I would, uh... because it's... you know, I think there are issues that are gonna [sic] be issues that arise around the margins that, if we just have a chance to sit down with Republicans... we could, we could we could hammer out, uh, problems that arise... No, [there is] nothing glaring that, that, I'm not saying there are not problems but, you know, there are, there are always gonna [sic] be, you know, tics in a law that arise and what we should be doing is sitting down and working those out." (Some might expect many Democrats to spend the next six months evading the issue as does Wasserman Schultz—albeit in a possibly less inelegant manner. On Fox News, Townhall.com's Katie Pavlich comments, "The enrollment period, ending technically today but really being extended out until people can get through that line, isn't going to change anything for Democrats. ... Democrats on the campaign trail aren't out there saying 'this is working great for all of you.' They're saying, 'we really need to fix this.' But they're not offering any specific solutions on how to do that." At HotAir.com Erika Johnsen writes, "Oh, now you want to 'sit down' and hammer out problems with Republicans? Maybe you should have thought of that before you rammed through Obama's crowning legislative achievement without a single Republican vote.") [57039, 57041, 57079]

Meanwhile, *The Washington Post* gives Wasserman Schultz "two Pinocchios" for her claim that "60 percent [of women] use [birth control] for something other than family planning." She claims she was 'misquoted by a "conservative newspaper," but, according

to BizPacReview.com, a recording of her statement proves otherwise. (Although many women use birth control solely for treatment of medical conditions—such as acne, cramps, or menstrual pain—the percentage is closer to 14 than 60. Wasserman Schultz exaggerated the percentage to argue that the Supreme Court should decide against Hobby Lobby. But she is wrong on that issue as well. That company's employee insurance policies already cover contraceptives—either solely for birth control or for medical reasons. Hobby Lobby objects only to providing abortion-inducing drugs—none of which are used for other medical reasons. The Hobby Lobby court case is about abortion, not birth control. At HotAir.com Duane Patterson writes, "If the Court rules against Hobby Lobby... there's no limit to what the government can mandate closely-held corporations have to do, including providing for the termination of life.") Senator John Cornyn (R-TX) calls ObamaCare a "botched law that has caused millions of Americans to lose their health insurance." He tells Newsmax.com, "It has forced individuals to sign up for more expensive health insurance or face a penalty. It has resulted in cancer patients losing access to their doctors—and it is slashing full-time jobs across the country. At 1600 Pennsylvania, that's cause for a celebration. On Main Street, it's a tragedy." Congressman Louie Gohmert (R-TX) calls Obama's gloating "the ultimate April Fools' Day joke." [57063]

FoxNews.com reports, "The FBI is searching for a recent Army recruit believed to be planning a 'Fort Hood-inspired jihad against U.S. soldiers.' ... The alert, whose legitimacy was confirmed by military and law enforcement officials, stated that a man identified as Booker had told friends of his 'intention to commit jihad.' Booker, who is also known as Muhammad Abdullah Hassan, was recruited by the U.S. Army in Kansas City, Mo., in February 2014 and was scheduled to report for basic training on April 7. But he was discharged last week, apparently after law enforcement authorities learned of his alleged plan." [57113]

Senator Richard Blumenthal (D-CT) suggests that owners of 1.5 million General Motors vehicles that are being recalled due to possibly faulty ignition switches stop driving those cars immediately. (The vehicles include the Chevy Cobalt, which Obama encouraged people to buy during a 2009 address related to the taxpayer bailout of GM. At a Chevrolet factory in Lordstown, Ohio, Obama said, "the Chevy Cobalt that you build here was one of GM's most sought-after cars under that [cash-for-clunkers] program. Dealers across the country started running out of it and needed you to build more." In 2010 Blumenthal used his support for the GM bailout in one of his campaign ads.) [57042, 57043, 57044, 57203]

The House of Representatives votes 378–34 to approve legislation providing economic assistance to Ukraine and placing additional sanctions on Russia.

At ThePostEmail.com, editor Sharon Rondeau interviews constitutional scholar Mitch Van Biljon, who reaffirms what *The Obama Timeline* and many others have consistently argued: that the term "natural born citizen" means born on U.S. soil to two U.S. citizen

parents. Van Biljon cites four U.S. Supreme Court cases that address the term and support the argument. Breitbart.com reports, "Chelsea Clinton's mother-in-law, former Rep. Marjorie Margolies-Mezvinsky (D-PA), is under fire for reportedly enriching herself from her taxpayer-funded charity—years after she left Congress. Margolies, who is attempting to regain her PA-13 seat and is the frontrunner in the May 20 Democratic primary, established the nonprofit Women's Campaign International (WCI) 'in 1998 with the goal of helping women get elected to office in foreign countries' and paid herself a '\$1,000-aweek salary to start.' That changed, though, when the charity secured a \$600,000 grant from the Clinton Administration's U.S. Agency for International Development, according to reports, and she was facing a myriad of personal problems. Her then-husband, former Rep. Ed Mezvinsky (D-IA), was 'indicted for fraud and bound for prison,' and she had to file for bankruptcy protection. The Huffington Post reported that Margolies then decided to double 'her own salary as head of a small, largely taxpayer-funded charity into the six figures, attempted to have the charity renovate and lease a mansion in which she would live, billed the charity for her automobile lease and other expenses, and required charity staff to assist with her other responsibilities as a faculty member at a local university." On *Special Report*, moderator Brett Baier comments on the Obama administration's claim that 7.1 million people have enrolled in ObamaCare: "You know, when all the questions were about the health care plans that people lost because they were told that their plans didn't match up, it was about 6 million or more, and the administration at that time said that is a 'small sliver.' 'It is only 5 percent of the population.' But now, at 7 million, it is this 'bring out the balloons and cheer in the Rose Garden.' But that 6.2 was a sliver." Columnist Charles Krauthammer responds, "I understand. It's a sliver if it hurts you, and it's gigantic if it helps you. Look, and it's also—look, this is a phony number and it's wonderfully precise. You know, these guys [in the Obama administration] without any idea what the numbers are, and all of a sudden it's to a decimal point. ...But of course it's meaningless because... we don't know how many of them have paid... but the more important [question] is how many were previously uninsured." is done and they're not gonna [sic] revisit how many have actually paid, how many were previously uninsured, and of course how many are young and healthy." (*If* there were 47 million uninsured Americans, as Obama has claimed, then ObamaCare is arguably a colossal failure. If that number was highly inflated, then it is absurd to spend \$200 billion per year to help a mere 7.1 million people. The government could just as easily send them each a check for \$10,000 every year with a note that reads, "Here. Go buy yourself an insurance policy." On *The Tonight Show*, host Jimmy Fallon says, "The White House says it has surpassed its goal for people enrolled in ObamaCare. It's just a beautiful thing. You make everyone do it. If you still haven't enrolled, you might have to pay a penalty called the 'Individual Shared Responsibility Payment,' which is one percent of your salary. On April 2 Todd B. Jones, director of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF), is grilled by a House committee about the agency's questionable tactics in running undercover arms sales operations. Townhall.com's Katie Pavlich writes, "The tactics, first exposed by the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel, include everything from teaching people how to illegally saw off shotguns, using brain damaged and mentally disabled teenagers for stings, asking mentally disable teenagers to get a giant squid tattooed on their neck, losing fully-automatic machine guns, damaging private property, exposing the names of undercover agents and more. Chairman of the House Oversight Committee Darrell Issa [R-CA] issued a subpoena to Jones in March after he failed to produce documentation surrounding six different ATF storefront operations around the country. Jones still hasn't complied with that subpoena..." [57054]

The ATF's Jones is questioned by Congressman Jim Jordan (R-OH) about ATF agent visits to the home of Catherine Engelbrecht after she applied for tax-exempt status for her conservative organization, True the Vote. Jones notes that Engelbrecht has had a federal firearms license for 12 years, and says, "And suddenly she applies for tax exempt status, and you're knocking on her door twice in 13 months. ... She gets the full weight of the federal government coming down on her and her family and her business, and all she's trying to do is get a tax-exempt status [in a process] that had been routine for 50 years, and suddenly now the federal government [is] saying, no, no, no, you're not going to get that tax-exempt status, and we're going to send four federal agencies out to harass you..." CNSNews.com points out, "In February, Engelbrecht testified that in nearly two decades of running their small business, 'my husband and I never dealt with any government agency, outside of filing our annual tax returns. We had never been audited, we had never been investigated, but all that changed upon submitting applications for the nonprofit statuses of True the Vote and King Street Patriots.' She says she was audited by the IRS, visited by [Congressman] Elijah Cummings (D-MD), and received more than

one inspection visit from ATF and OSHA. 'I found myself a target of this federal government,' she told the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee in February." Jones tells Jordan, "Well, it's unfortunate that you and Miss Engelbrecht think it's harassment. From our perspective, it's part of a regulatory function." Jones' responses to Jordan include, "Not to my knowledge," "I have no idea..." and "I don't know." [57145, 57383]

As noted previously in this *Timeline*, B. Todd Jones is an old friend and confidant of Attorney General Eric Holder. They worked together under then-Attorney General Janet Reno during the Waco, Texas raid that resulted in the deaths of dozens—including children—at the hands of the federal government. Jeff Knox, director of The Firearms Coalition, has called Jones the "fox" appointed by Obama and Holder to guard the ATF "henhouse." Jones is likely aware of some of the background of the disastrous Operation Fast and Furious. Jones has been criticized by issuing a warning to ATF employees that they should keep quiet rather than be "whistleblowers." In a video message to all employees Jones said, "If you make poor choices, that if you don't abide by the rules, that if you don't respect the chain of command, if you don't find the appropriate way to raise your concerns to your leadership, there will be consequences…" [25324, 34532]

Former deputy CIA director Michael Morell, questioned by the House Intelligence Committee, says the mistaken Benghazi talking points were not caused by White House politics. Morell claims, "I took out the word 'Islamic' in front of 'extremist.' Um, and I took it out for two reasons. Um, most importantly I took it out because, uh, we were dealing with protests and demonstrations across much of the Muslim world as a result of the video [that virtually no one had or has seen]. And the last thing I wanted to do was to, uh, do anything to further inflame those passions." (Morell is lying, and shamelessly expects Americans to believe that his removal of references to Islamic terrorism and al-Qaeda had *nothing* to do with politics.) According to DailyCaller.com, Morell "blam[ed] the fake talking points on CIA analysts' over-reliance on media reports and communication intercepts instead of eyewitness accounts from Libya. ...[R]eports earlier this week indicated that the CIA station chief in Libya unequivocally told him that the death of four Americans was caused by a terrorist attack, not a spontaneous demonstration. That eyewitness information was received by Morrell—then the acting head of the CIA—a full day before then-U.N. Ambassador Susan Rice told the nation the attack resulted from a protest against an anti-Islamic YouTube video. Republican lawmakers demanded that Morrell explain why this information and other on-the-ground accounts were not reflected in the talking points, and why Morrell removed references to al-Qaida. The ex-CIA chief blamed his intelligence analysts again and again for the mixup, arguing that the CIA researchers tasked with discovering the truth relied largely on communication intercepts and media reports." Congresswoman Michele Bachmann tells Morell, "We spoke with him [the CIA station chief in Benghazi] yesterday behind closed doors. He was adamant from the very beginning that this was not a spontaneous protest. We heard from him directly yesterday

that at no time did he believe it was based upon the video." It isn't just him. ... It's the chief of base. It's those who came from the annex. It's the political officers. All of them agreed. You take that versus some press reports and one signal—the weight and balance aren't even equal. It isn't even equal. The evidence overwhelmingly pointed to an attack, an attack that was al-Qaida or jihadist related." Morell insists on defending the Obama administration, despite evidence to the contrary: "The narrative that the attack evolved spontaneously from a protest was a narrative that intelligence community analysts believed. There is no politics there whatsoever." Morell also makes the outlandish claim that references to CIA warnings of possible al Qaeda terrorist attacks that were issued before the attack in Benghazi were removed from the talking points because he "saw the language as self-serving and defensive on the agency's part. Here was a tragic event, and we were saying, 'We told you so.' This was wrong, in my view, and would have been seen as an attempt to make the CIA look good and shift any possible blame for failing to see the risk of an attack from the agency to the State Department." (In other words, "We omitted the truth because we did not want the State Department—that is, Hillary Clinton and Obama—to look bad." It is worth noting that Morell (who more than a few observers will claim was lying under oath) now works as a consultant to Beacon Global Strategies—which former CBS reporter Sharyl Attkisson notes is "a communications firm operated primarily by former Obama administration and Hillary Clinton officials. On *Justice with Jeanine*, Judge Jeanine Pirro later says of Morell, "Mr. CIA, you didn't just sell your agency to the politics of the Obama re-election campaign and the cover-up for the Hillary 2016 campaign, you sold your soul—and you perjured yourself for money." General Motors' CEO, Mary Barra, is questioned by the House Energy and Commerce Committee about an ignition switch design flaw that has resulted in the deaths of at least 13 drivers over several years. Barra says, "I cannot tell you why it took years for a safety defect to be announced. I can tell you that we will find out." According to WashingtonPost.com, "GM has recalled 2.6 million Chevrolet Cobalts and other small vehicles because of the faulty switches. Lawmakers said GM could have fixed the defective switch for as little as 57 cents per vehicle. Still, the automaker waited more than a decade to issue a recall, despite mounting evidence of a problem, including 133 complaints to dealers and numerous legal settlements paid to families of people who perished in related accidents." Reuters notes that Barra "stopped short of promising to reveal the company's entire internal [investigative] report, instead saying she would release what GM considered 'appropriate.'" (Barra, who was named CEO in mid-January 2014, was a guest of Obama at his State of the Union address, in which he said, "Our success should depend not on accident of birth, but the strength of our work ethic and the scope of our dreams. That's what drew our forebears here. It's how the daughter of a factory worker [Barra] is CEO of America's largest automaker.") The committee does not question Steve Rattner, Obama's former "car czar" during the GM bailout. (Taxpayers might be interested in knowing whether Rattner knew of the problems GM

had with the faulty part, which it had known of since 2001.) [57066, 57067, 57068, 57069]

According to DetroitNews.com, the budget for the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration is about \$800 million per year, yet its defect investigations unit has a budget of only \$10.1 million and 51 employees. (Some might also wonder why the government could find hundreds of millions of dollars to spend on developing Healthcare.gov but could not find a few million more to investigate fatal crashes resulting from faulty ignition switches that shut off airbags at the moment they are needed.) WashingtonPost.com reports, "The Obama administration is engaged in a broad push to make more home loans available to people with weaker credit, an effort that officials say will help power the economic recovery but that skeptics say could open the door to the risky lending that caused the housing crash in the first place. ...[A]dministration officials say they are working to get banks to lend to a wider range of borrowers by taking advantage of taxpayer-backed programs—including those offered by the Federal Housing Administration—that insure home loans against default. Housing officials are urging the Justice Department to provide assurances to banks, which have become increasingly cautious, that they will not face legal or financial recriminations if they make loans to riskier borrowers who meet government standards but later default." (In other words, the Obama administration wants banks to make risky loans to people who may not be able to pay them back, but rather than put the banks at risk the taxpayers would be out at risk. This is a recipe for another housing bubble to inflate—and then burst. At LewRockwell.com Dan Sanchez later writes, "This is all very ominous, because it is this kind of moral hazard that helped precipitate the last housing bubble and crash, which in turn inaugurated the financial crisis we are still suffering through. ... Money-printing, 'American Dream' policies and rhetoric, government-lowered lending standards, and moral hazard; this is a nightmare we've had before.") [60863, 60864]

Attorney Dr. Orly Taitz is slightly injured when a truck strikes her car from behind. (Taitz has filed several lawsuits challenging Obama's eligibility to serve as president.) [57204]

In *The Wall Street Journal*, Charles Koch—chairman and CEO of Koch Industries and one of the Koch brothers the political left so loves to hate—writes, "I have devoted most of my life to understanding the principles that enable people to improve their lives. Unfortunately, the fundamental concepts of dignity, respect, equality before the law and personal freedom are under attack by the nation's own government. FreeBeacon.com points out, "According to campaign finance records, former Koch Industries lobbyist Robert P. Hall III donated \$500 to Reid's campaign in 2003." Senator Charles Schumer (D-NY) has also eagerly received contributions from KochPAC, a Koch political action committee. Since 2000, Senator May Landrieu (D-LA) has received \$55,000 from KochPAC—yet has a campaign ad criticizing the Koch brothers. In fact, the list of Democrats in the House and the Senate who have accepted Koch campaign contributions between 2006 and 2014 is quite lengthy, and includes Obama, Joe Biden, Hillary Clinton, and Senator Dianne Feinstein (D-CA).) Roughly 80 to 85 percent of people who selected a Blues plan through the exchanges went on to pay their first month's premium, a BCBSA spokeswoman said Wednesday. The new statistics, particularly from such a large carrier, help define how many people are actually getting covered under the Affordable Care Act. The Blues' experience is in line with anecdotal estimates from other insurance executives, who indicated earlier in the enrollment process that they received payments from about 80 percent of people who selected their plans. . . . If the nationwide payment rate, across all carriers, remains at 80 to 85 percent, the 7.1 million sign-ups Obama announced Tuesday would translate into somewhere between 5.7 and 6 million people who are actually covered." TimesUnion.com reports, "Two Capital Region health insurers lost tens of millions of dollars last year and blamed their poor performances to costs linked to the Affordable Care Act and other new regulations. Albany-based Capital District Physicians' Health Plan lost \$43.9 million. MVP Health Care of Schenectady lost \$13.6 million. ... CDPHP lost \$43.9 million on revenues of \$2 billion last year, despite a 9 percent increase in members." [57153]

Newman Regional Health hospital in Emporia, Kansas, announces it is laying off 15 employees because of ObamaCare. [57198, 57199]

In a 5–4 decision in *McCutcheon, et al v. Federal Election Commission*, the U.S. Supreme Court strikes down limits on total contributions to candidates and political parties. According to ABC, "This ruling does not change the rules which limit what an individual can spend on one particular candidate [\$2,600 per election], only the rules limiting what people can spend in total. ...In particular, Wednesday's decision voided the overall federal limit on individuals' contributions—\$123,200 in 2013 and 2014, broken down as \$48,600 to all candidates combined and \$74,600 to all party committees and political action committees in total. Limitations on the amounts a donor may give an individual candidate or committee remain in effect." The Court states that the overall limits "intrude without justification on a citizen's ability to exercise 'the most fundamental First Amendment activities." Writing for the majority, Chief Justice John Roberts states, "Contributing money to a candidate is an exercise of an individual's right to participate in the electoral process

through both political expression and political association. A restriction on how many candidates and committees an individual may support is hardly a 'modest Restraint' on those rights. The Government may no more restrict how many candidates or causes a donor may support than it may tell a newspaper how many candidates it may endorse." Writing for the minority, Justice Stephen Breyer states that campaign contribution limits are compatible with the First Amendment, which "advances not only the individual's right to engage in political speech, but also the public's interest in preserving a democratic order in which collective speech matters." (In other words, individual rights must be sacrificed for "the collective.") House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) whines that the decision "only serves to widen the floodgates of special interest spending"—as if an individual U.S. citizen does not have the right to act to support more than one candidate who supports his interests. Obama tells an audience of students at the University of Michigan, "I'm determined to do my part to lift wages, improve take-home pay any way I can. Here's the problem. Now, first of all, I think it's pretty good to help young people. You know, I, I don't know what's wrong with helping young people. You know, the folks who say that probably...[the] next thing you know, they'll say, get off my lawn!" (As usual, Obama misstates the arguments of Republicans. They argue not that raising the minimum wage is bad because it "helps young people;" they argue that it hurts young people because it makes it more difficult for them to find a job.) At DailyCaller.com the Cato Institute's Trevor Burrus comments on the Supreme Court's decision: "[T]he decision is a principled interpretation of the First Amendment that would have garnered wide support from many on the left just 30 years ago. What is truly frightening about the decision is that the four dissenting justices are promoting a vision of the First Amendment that is absolutely incompatible with limited government and free speech. ... Imagine a park where people went to hand out political pamphlets. Due to the amount of paper, littering becomes a problem, and in order to combat littering the government outlaws all political pamphleteering in the park. Such a law would be struck down as unconstitutional because it addressed a narrow and compelling problem, littering, with a legal sledgehammer that prohibits legitimate and important political speech. The First Amendment requires a scalpel, not a sledgehammer. This goes double for political speech. ... Writing in dissent, Justice Stephen Breyer, joined by Justices [Elena] Kagan, [Sonia] Sotomayor, and [Ruth Bader] Ginsburg, argued that a new version of 'corruption,' that is, the corruption of the marketplace of ideas, should become part of the Court's jurisprudence. In that version of corruption, the government is affirmatively in charge of making sure 'a few large donations' don't 'drown out the voice of the many.' While this may sound initially attractive, a moment's thought makes it clear that this view is untenable. Elected officials cannot be trusted to fairly regulate the process upon which their jobs depend and the government could have no meaningful principle to determine how loud someone should be allowed to speak or even what the

'voice of the many' is saying. The frightening thing about McCutcheon is that a nearmajority of the Court holds this view that turns the First Amendment on its head. If we don't limit the doctrine of corruption to actual candidates, if we empower the government to regulate a 'corrupt' marketplace of ideas, then there is no reason to limit it to elections. The subscription base of the *New York Times* is certainly too large, perhaps we should limit how many copies can be printed? And, Oprah, well she is certainly too influential, so while we'll allow her to speak privately, we'll make it illegal for her to use her network for political speech. Campaign finance law may be complex, but what's at stake is simple. It is too bad that four justices don't seem to understand this." [57128]

According to a Quinnipiac poll, Obama's approval/disapproval ratings are 42/50 percent, while ObamaCare's are 41/55. On health care in particular, Obama is 39/58. On foreign policy he is also underwater: 39/55. [57073, 57074, 57100, 57806]

CNSNews.com reports that the Obama administration has issued "a budget request for international organizations that is 33 percent bigger than last year's, including a 43 percent hike in U.S. contributions to peacekeeping missions. The administration's fiscal year 2015 budget request for the U.N. and other organizations is \$4.036 billion, up from \$3.031 billion in FY2014. For contributions to peacekeeping missions, it is asking for \$2.518 billion, up from \$1.765 last year. The \$2.518 billion for peacekeeping amounts to 28.36 percent of the U.N.'s total peacekeeping budget. The U.S. also provides 22 percent of the separate U.N. operating budget. The U.N. has 193 member states." [57083]

In Nevada, a class action lawsuit is filed against the state's ObamaCare exchange by residents who signed up for coverage but state they have yet to receive coverage. According to CBS, "Law firm Callister & Associates filed the lawsuit on behalf of Larry Basich, who signed up for state health insurance and paid premiums as far back as November, but then was not covered following a Jan. 3 triple bypass procedure that saw his \$400,000 in medical expenses passed between the wrong insurance companies, the Las Vegas Review-Journal reports. The lawsuit filed in U.S. District Court of Nevada on Tuesday alleges gross negligence and failure to do due diligence against the state of Nevada, the Silver State Health Insurance Exchange (which runs Nevada Health Link), and the company that won the contract to build the exchange, Xerox." FreeBeacon.com reports that ObamaCare "will cost large companies between \$4,800 and \$5,900 more per employee and add hundreds of millions to their overhead, according to a new survey. The American Health Policy Institute conducted a confidential survey of 100 large employers—those with 10,000 or more employees—asking what costs they expect to incur from Obamacare over the next decade. Factoring in the health care law's added mandates, fees, and regulatory burdens, employers anticipate cost hikes between \$163 million and \$200 million in 2016, a 4.3 percent increase. By 2023, employers will be paying 8.4 percent more than 'what they would otherwise be spending' for their employees' health care." (Unlike the federal government, businesses cannot print money. The cost of increased health care expenses will likely be compensated for with a

combination of increased prices and lower wage and salary increases—and employees paying a greater percentage of the insurance premiums.) [57090]

According to WesternJournalism.com, "Either it is the biggest conspiracy in U.S. history since the JFK assassination, or an elaborate hoax has been perpetrated on the world. It would measure just about .45 of an inch in diameter. 'Wow. That looks like a bullet hole,' said Janoski. U.S. Army Lt. Col. David Hause, an experienced deputy medical examiner, took a look. 'Sure enough,' he remembers saying. 'It looks like a gunshot wound to me, too.' Their concerns were ignored. Under pressure from the White House, authorities would not call in the FBI, nor ask the Brown family to permit an autopsy, nor take the opportunity to look for an exit wound or test for gunshot residue. On that same day, Croatian authorities reported that Niko Jerkuic, the man responsible for the airport's aviation systems, had fatally shot himself in the chest. Brown had been on his way to Dubrovnik "to broker a sweetheart deal between the Enron Corporation and the neo-fascists who ran Croatia. The Enron execs took their own plane. ... The review searched databases in 27 other states and 101 million voter records for information such as matching names, dates of birth, and Social Security numbers. The review found that 35,570 North Carolina voters from 2012

shared the same first names, last names, and dates of birth with individuals who voted in other states. Another 765 Tar Heel State residents who voted in 2012 had the same names, birthdays, and final four digits of a Social Security number as voters elsewhere. Meanwhile, the election board's executive director, Kim Westbrook Strach, told lawmakers that 81 deceased North Carolinians apparently voted in 2012 as well." GE spokesman Rick Kennedy said the Treasury had approved the company's application to service 18 engines sold to Iran in the late 1970s. ... He said GE officials would meet with officials from Iran flag carrier Iranair and MTU in Istanbul next week to discuss Iran's needs." (Whether Clinton's support of singers who were arrested for desecrating a Christian church will cause her to lose votes in 2016 remains to be seen. But it is almost a certainty that she will be the first presidential candidate every to have publicly used the words "Pussy Riot.") [57251]

WeeklyStandard.com reports, "In late March, ...Obama took a week-long trip through Europe which included a stop of less than 24 hours in Brussels, Belgium for meetings with the European Union and NATO. [Obama] stayed at The Hotel, a twenty-seven story

hotel in the center of the city. The estimated cost for [his stay, including about two weeks for an advance team, was \$1,522,646.36." [57186]

In *The Wall Street Journal*, Peggy Noonan calls ObamaCare "a catastrophe like no other. ...[S]tep back and view the thing at a distance. About 200,000 new mothers and kids will be cut off from programs to help them get healthy food. Schools across the country will lose funding that supports 21,000 special education teachers." (Of course, the GOP proposal does suggest "cut[ting" everything evenly." First, it does not even suggest cuts; it only suggests reductions in increases. Secondly, it is absurd for Obama to argue that reducing total spending increases by X percent means that every single federal program will be impacted equally. Some programs can be allowed to grow more, while others can be stripped to the bone. Obama shamefully suggests the GOP wants to starve children. When listening to an Obama speech, some no doubt recall what political observer philosopher Kenneth Minogue once called an antagonist: "a pyromaniac in a field of straw men.") [57222]

Both may improve lives, but only one method unfairly comes at someone else's expense.) While Bush calls illegal immigration "an act of love," Obama's Secretary of Education, Arne Duncan, has called stories of pregnant women who cross the border illegally in order to give birth in the United States "inspiring." Pro-Russian demonstrators pro-Russian demonstrators seize control of government buildings three cities in eastern Ukraine. (It is assumed that many of the demonstrators are paid by Russia, in an effort to "prove" that Ukrainians, like the Crimeans, want to be annexed to Russia. It can also be assumed that some type of violence will eventually take place in which some Russian-speaking Ukrainians are killed, thereby giving Russian President Vladimir Putin an excuse to send troops into Ukraine to "preserve the peace." Putin likely believes Obama will respond with nothing more than a statement of protest—and no significant action.) [57319]

The Affordable Care Act—the federal law that mandates everyone have insurance—effectively killed FamilyCare Advantage, a low-cost option for kids in New Jersey created six years ago for parents who earned too much to qualify for Medicaid and other subsidized programs but too little to buy on a policy on their own. The state program was the first of its kind in the nation. Horizon Blue Cross Blue Shield of New Jersey was the only insurance carrier that agreed to offer the FamilyCare Advantage plan. which covered most medical, dental and vision needs for the relative bargain of \$144 a month per child. But it didn't offer mental health treatment and several other services Obamacare requires, and that was the fatal flaw, said Sen. Joseph Vitale (D-Middlesex), who sponsored the law creating the program. Vitale said he tried for several months to broker a deal between Horizon and the U.S. Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, but neither side could agree on how to make it affordable and legal. On April 7 Cato Institute tax expert Daniel J. Mitchell asks at Townhall.com, "[W]hat's so impressive about getting some people to sign up for [ObamaCare] plans when they can get something that's subsidized by taxpayers or other consumers? ...People are being both coerced and bribed to sign up for Obamacare, in many cases after the law forced the cancellation of plans that they liked. Italy's il Faro summarizes journalist Seymour Hersh's investigation of the chemical weapons attacks in Syria: "The bottom line: Turkey was almost certainly the party responsible for the attack, hoping it would force Obama to honour his threatened 'red line' if Assad used chemical weapons. Was the Assad regime to be brought down by a US military campaign, Turkey assumed it would be able to turn Syria into a client state. ...Obama's sudden climb-down on his threatened military strike against Assad was in part forced on him by a chemical analysis of samples of the sarin used in Ghouta, which showed that its signature did not match that of the stockpiles held by the Assad regime. Despite US claims, the White House knew that the Syrian rebels had developed chemical weapons production facilities. UN investigators thought the Syrian opposition were the most likely culprits behind earlier chemical weapons attacks, in April and May 2013. ...The military strike being prepared by the White House after the Ghouta attack was, far from small-scale, as secretary of state John Kerry intimated, modeled on the shock and awe campaign against Saddam Hussein. Under White House pressure, the US attack plan evolved into 'a monster strike': two wings of B-52 bombers were shifted to airbases close to Syria, and navy submarines and ships equipped with Tomahawk missiles were deployed. 'Every day the target list was getting longer,' the former intelligence official told me. ... The new target list was meant to 'completely eradicate any military capabilities Assad had', the former intelligence official said. The core targets included electric power grids, oil and gas depots, all known logistic and weapons depots, all known command and control facilities, and all known military and intelligence buildings. The US developed a back channel of weapons-smuggling to the Syrian rebels, known as the rat line, in cooperation with Turkey, Saudi Arabia and Qatar, using the 'liberated' arsenals from Libya following the west's ousting of [Moammar] Gaddafi." "The rat line, authorised in early 2012, was used to funnel weapons and ammunition from Libya via southern Turkey and across the Syrian border to the opposition. Many of those in Syria who ultimately received the weapons were jihadists, some of them affiliated with al-Qaida. ... By the terms of the agreement, funding came from Turkey, as well as Saudi Arabia and Qatar; the CIA, with the support of MI6, was responsible for getting arms from Gaddafi's arsenals into Syria. ... The operation was run by David Petraeus, the CIA director who would soon resign when it became known he was having an affair with his biographer. The job of the US consulate in Libya—the one where ambassador Christopher Stevens was killed—was to provide logistical assistance with the rat line. That was the reason the consulate was attacked. The consulate's only mission was to provide cover for the moving of arms,' the former intelligence official, who has read the annex, said. 'It had no real political role.' ... Washington abruptly ended the CIA's role in the transfer of arms from Libya after the attack on the consulate, but the rat line kept going. ... By late 2012 the US had assessed that the rebels were losing the civil war, and started to downgrade their involvement in the rat line. That left Turkey's [Prime Minister] Recep Erdogan the main loser. The American decision to end CIA support of the weapons shipments into Syria left Erdogan exposed politically and militarily." Pamela Geller comments on the Hersh report: "Obama was avid to get into war in Syria—so avid that he lied repeatedly to justify a U.S. intervention. But now the truth is coming out: it was Turkey all along, not [Syrian President Bashar al-] Assad, who launched the sarin attack. Turkey—Obama's close friend Recep Tayyip Erdogan. And now the United States is supplying the Syrian jihadists with weapons. The Obama Administration is one of the most shameful periods in American history." This new authoritarianism—forcing people to bow the knee to a new orthodoxy or they be punished—is very chilling. ... When people say things like gay rights trump religious rights, what they are saying is the government can force people to believe a certain way—and that is something that in a free society should not be tolerated. ... We are now going to see more situations where people are going to be forced to choose between what they believe about marriage—and their job or their business. What

concerns me is there will be an effort to expand these types of hunting down people with wrong opinions. I don't know how far this can go." (Interestingly, the name Huguenin may remind some of the Huguenots—members of the Protestant Reformed Church of France who were persecuted for their religious beliefs in the 16th and 17th centuries.) It is worth noting that in order for a case to be heard before the Supreme Court, at least four of the nine Justices must agree that it is worth considering. Therefore, there were fewer than four willing to hear the Huguenin appeal—meaning that six or more of the nine Justices have little or no regard for the rights of business owners who choose to follow their religious beliefs every day and not just on special occasions.) Led by Senator Ted Cruz (R-TX), the Senate votes by acclamation to pass legislation allowing the Obama administration to more easily block the granting of a travel visa to Iran's new ambassador to the United Nations, Hamid Aboutalebi. HotAir.com's Ed Morrissey writes, "The State Department should tell Iran that it refuses to credential anyone who participated in the violation of diplomatic immunity in the past—and that they can send Aboutalebi, but he should bring his lawyer and prepare to face criminal charges over what happened in Tehran 35 years ago." According to a Morgan Stanley survey of 148 insurance brokers, the average increase in health insurance premiums is 12 percent in the small group market and 11 percent in the individual market. The increases are the largest in three years and are due mostly to the Affordable Care Act. (In Delaware, the average premium increase is a full 100 percent. In New Hampshire it is 94 percent.) Senator Marco Rubio (R-FL) calls on Secretary of State John Kerry to provide Congress with an assessment of the crisis in Venezuela. In a letter to Kerry, Rubio writes, "To date, the government's barbaric repression has resulted in 39 deaths, more than 2,200 detentions, and at least 50 documented cases of torture. There is evidence that several of these atrocities are being committed by uniformed members of the Venezuelan National Guard, a component of the Venezuelan Armed Forces, as well as paramilitary elements of the so-called 'People's Guard' that is closely affiliated with the National Guard. We have additional reports of radical leftist armed groups as well as Cuban regime intelligence officials and operatives working on behalf of the Maduro government to intimidate opposition members and, at times, carry out attacks against protesters. As you would agree, it is more important than ever for the American public and lawmakers to clearly understand the nature of the situation in Venezuela and its repercussions for American interests and those of the broader Western Hemisphere." [57306]

HotAir.com reports that National Labor Relations Board's general counsel Richard Griffin "wants to force employers to consult with a union when it comes to relocation decisions. This is a massive change to the current way that economic decisions are made, and would cause the cost of doing business everywhere to skyrocket. ... Unions already are favored in the status quo, and this would be an unnecessary step to empower them further. This would also fly in the face of the way that the Supreme Court has interpreted the union-employer relationship, and that the proposal would make unions incredibly powerful when it came to collective bargaining. ... Obama's NLRB, as we've seen, is composed of people who are dedicated to reversing the shrinking power base of unions. This proposal to force employers to get the approval of labor unions for relocation decisions would hurt the American economy for the benefit for a major Democratic party constituency." [57302]

The Senate votes 59–38 to once again extend unemployment benefits, with no reasonable provision in the legislation to cover the \$10 billion cost. The five-month extension now goes to the House, where Republicans will either have to cave in and also approve the extension, or face six months of Democrat campaign ads claiming they want the unemployed to suffer and starve to death. Obama states, "Today the Senate acted in a bipartisan way to reinstate emergency unemployment insurance for 2.3 million Americans who depend on it as they search for work. As I've said time and again, Washington needs to put politics aside and help these hard-working, responsible Americans make ends meet and support their families as they look for a job. Each week Congress fails to act on this crucial issue, roughly 70,000 long-term unemployed Americans lose their vital economic lifeline. I urge House Republicans to stop blocking a bipartisan compromise that would stem this tide, take up the bill without delay, and send it to my desk. Let's remove this needless drag on our economy and focus on expanding opportunity for all Americans." (Obama does not explain why paying people not to work would be a "drag on the economy.") At PJMedia.com Bridget Johnson notes that "House leadership is, for now, holding to its demands that any extension of the unemployment insurance include job-creating measures such as approval of the Keystone XL pipeline or Obamacare fixes." House Minority Leader calls GOP opposition to a "clean" bill "immoral" and "unconscionable." (Neither Obama nor any other Democrat provides a date beyond which they would *not* extend unemployment benefits—but it is a safe bet that it would likely be after the November 2016 election.) Preparing for an onslaught of "Republican war on women" attacks from the White House and Democrat candidates, Betsey Stevenson, a member of the White House Council of Economic Advisers, tells reporters that women are "stuck at 77 cents on the dollar, and that gender wage gap is seen very persistently across the income distribution, within occupations, across occupations, and we see it when men and women are working side by side doing identical work." WashingtonExaminer.com writes, "That sounds awfully specific. Stevenson certainly sounds like she's saying men and women doing the exact same job are earning very different pay. ... Except, as soon as Stevenson was actually questioned about the statistic by McClatchy reporter Lindsay Wise, the White House adviser crumbled, admitting her earlier comments were inaccurate. 'If I said 77 cents was equal pay for equal work, then I completely misspoke,' Stevenson said. 'So let me just

apologize and say that I certainly wouldn't have meant to say that.' '... Seventy-seven cents captures the [average] annual earnings of full-time, full-year women divided by the [average] annual earnings of full-time, full-year men,' Stevenson clarified. 'There are a lot of things that go into that 77-cents figure, there are a lot of things that contribute and no one's trying to say that it's all about discrimination, but I don't think there's a better figure.' No one's trying to blame discrimination? Isn't that what the entire Paycheck Fairness Act and Equal Pay Day are based on?" According to JSOnline.com's Christian Schneider, Stevenson later tells MSNBC, "I agree that the 77 cents on the dollar is not all due to discrimination. No one is trying to say that it is. But you have to point to some number in order for people to understand the facts." (In other words, "You have to lie for political purposes.") Schneider observes, "[M]iraculously, women seem to make a lot less money during election years in which Democrats are on the ropes.") [57299, 57300, 57347, 57371, 57372, 57512, 57557, 57568, 57570]

At the daily press briefing, Obama's press secretary Jay Carney is asked why women working in the White House earn on average only 88 cents for every dollar men earn. Carney makes the remarkable statement that the pay difference in the White House is not as great as it is in the overall economy—which sounds remarkably like, "Well, yes, we discriminate against women—but not as much as everybody else." Carney then defends the difference by pointing to reasonable factors (such as experience and the type of work performed)—factors that Obama and his fellow Democrats seem to ignore when discussing national statistics. Jennifer Palmieri, who Michelle Malkin refers to as "Obama's communications flack and chief social media gender warrior," tweets, "Love all these guys, but note that 6 of 7 news orgs in front row sent men to ask ...abt [about] the problem of gender pay inequity." Fox News' Ed Henry tweets back, "WH sent man [Jay Carney] to podium, right?" (Palmieri, notes Malkin, helped defend Bill Clinton against "bimbo eruptions," and then "served as spokeswoman for adulterous crapweasel John Edwards.") [57324, 57333, 57334, 57335]

On *The Kelly File*, House Speaker John Boehner (R-OH) tells host Megyn Kelly, "When someone asked me the question, 'Well, who should be fired [over the IRS targeting of conservative groups]?' I said I don't know. I don't care who is going to be fired. I want to know who is going to jail. The fact is that the IRS—there are specific laws that protect taxpayers and force the IRS to comply with the law. Somebody at the IRS violated the law. Whether it was Lois Lerner or not, we'll find out." Boehner states that legislators will press Attorney General Eric Holder to consider a criminal case against ex-IRS official Lerner for "misleading the Congress," and that the House would hold her in contempt if she does not soon cooperate. (Boehner would be wise not to hold his breath while he waits for Holder to take action.) [57267, 57305]

On April 8 Attorney General Eric Holder appears before the House Judiciary Committee, and engages in a heated exchange with Congressman Louis Gohmert (R-TX). Gohmert

addresses Holder's continued failure to provide requested documents, and says, "I realize that [the] contempt [of Congress charge against you] is not a big deal to our attorney general, but it is important that we have proper oversight." Holder: "You don't want to go there, buddy. You don't want to go there, okay?" Gohmert: "I don't want to go there?" Holder; "No." Gohmert: "About the contempt?" Holder, pointing his finger at Gohmert: "You should not assume that, uh, that is not a big deal to me. I think that it [the charge] was inappropriate and it was unjust, but never think that that was not a big deal to me. Don't ever think that." Gohmert: "Well, uh, I'm just looking for evidence, and normally we're known by our fruits, and there have been no indications that it was a big deal because your department has still not been forthcoming in producing the documents that were the subject of the contempt—" Holder: "The documents that we were prepared to make available then we're prepared to make available now—that would have obviated the whole need. This was all about the gun lobby, and a desire to have—"Gohmert: "So, we've been trying to get to the bottom of [Operation] Fast and Furious, where people died, where at least a couple hundred Mexicans died, and we can't get the information to get to the bottom of that? So I don't need lectures from you about contempt—" Holder: "And I don't need lectures from you either." Gohmert: "...and it is very difficult to deal with asking questions, and as a former judge I'd never have asked questions of someone who's been held in contempt." [57278, 57292, 57304, 57312, 57336, 57337, 57341, 57362, 57369]

Holder also tells the committee that he and Obama have a "vast amount" of discretion when enforcing laws, "but that discretion has to be used in an appropriate way so that you're acting consistent with the aims of the statute but at the same time making sure that you are acting in a way that is consistent with our values, consistent with the Constitution and protecting the American people. Committee chairman Bob Goodlatte (R-VA) responds, "The Justice Department's decision not to enforce the Controlled Substances Act in states whose laws violate federal law is not a valid exercise of prosecutorial discretion, but a formal department-wide policy of selective non-enforcement of an Act of Congress. ... The attorney general's directive [to not prosecute some drug crimes], along with contradicting an act of Congress, puts his own front-line prosecutors in the unenviable position of either defying their boss or violating their oath of candor to the court." (Holder has advised prosecutors to withhold information from courts—such as the amount of drugs found in an arrest—in order to prompt reduced sentences. The issue relates to mandatory minimum sentencing. For example, if possession of a certain amount of a particular drug requires a prison sentence of 10 years, not telling the court how much was found on the drug user or dealer during the arrest could lead the judge to impose a much lighter sentence. Withholding that information is Holder's way of getting around mandatory minimum sentencing laws that he believes unfairly target "his people.") [57343, 57344, 57351, 57501]

When Congressman Blake Farenthold (R-TX) is offered time by the committee to ask Holder questions, he responds, "I'm committed to maintaining the constitutional balance of power and the authority this branch, this legislative branch, has, and I just don't think it's appropriate that Mr. Holder be here. If an American citizen had not complied with one of the Justice Department subpoenas, they would be in jail, not testifying, but I

realize there are questions to be asked, and I'll yield the remainder of my time to [Congressman] Trey Gowdy [R-SC]." (Interestingly, it is Gohmert's exchange with Holder that gets the most media attention, and not Farenthold's remark—probably because the mainstream media would rather show Holder as combative than deserving of prison clothing.) According to an April 5–6 Rasmussen poll, "just 23% of Likely U.S. Voters view Obamacare as a success so far. Twice as many (46%) describe the health care law as a failure. For 29%, it's somewhere in between the two. ...Given the problems with the new law, a plurality (44%) of voters still believes Congress and [Obama] should repeal it and start over again. Nearly as many (39%) think they should go through the law piece by piece to improve it. Just 15% say they should leave the law as it is." [57279, 57280]

Politico reports, "Amid heavy pressure from insurers, lawmaker and advocates, the Obama administration has backed off proposed cuts to Medicare Advantage for the second year in a row. They'll rise by 0.4 percent in 2015 instead of undergoing the originally proposed 1.9 percent cut." (Senate Democrats, who voted for the Affordable Care Act in 2010, are now less than enthusiastic about actually implementing the \$300+billion in Medicare cuts that were intended to help pay for ObamaCare. The result, of course, is that ObamaCare will lead to even greater deficits than originally believed—despite the fact that Obama and his fellow Democrats claimed it would end up reducing federal spending.) Obama signs an executive order banning federal contractors "from retaliating against employees who discuss their compensation." According to USAToday.com, "will also sign a ...memorandum instructing Labor Secretary Tom Perez to establish new regulations requiring federal contractors to submit to the Department of Labor summary data on compensation paid to their employees, including data by sex and race. The Department of Labor will use the data to encourage voluntary compliance with equal pay laws and allowing more targeted enforcement by focusing efforts where there are discrepancies, according to the White House." Obama also repeats the flawed "77 cents on the dollar" argument—and even whines that women's clothing usually costs more to have dry-cleaned than men's clothing. (Women typically pay more than men to get their hair styled as well, but that is not because of "discrimination;" it is because of complexity and time factors. Rush Limbaugh quips, "One way to reduce dry cleaning expenses for women is to stay away from Bill Clinton.") Townhall.com political editor Guy Benson observes, "...Democrats are hoping to replicate their successful 2012 playbook by shifting voters' focus onto ancillary issues, and away from the political fundamentals. This week they're trotting out equal pay for women in an effort to underscore their 'Republican war on women' meme." Meanwhile, the Senate debates the "Paycheck Fairness Act"—which does not actually ensure paycheck fairness, but is drafted in such a way as to ensure GOP opposition, thereby giving Democrats something to argue about during their campaigns. (The Washington Post gives Obama two "Pinocchios" for his "77 cents on the dollar" claim.) [57285, 57349, 57363, 57372, 57429, 57557, 57570]

WashingtonTimes.com comments that Obama's "unilateral move... to try to close the pay gap between the sexes will force federal contractors to tell the government what their employees earn, broken down by race and sex, giving the administration extraordinary new powers to pursue discrimination cases. One legal analyst said the two orders Mr. Obama issued would drive up the costs of federal contracts, leaving taxpayers stuck with higher bills. Businesses feared the orders would lay ground for the government to take legal action against them. 'Equal treatment is an admirable goal, but smaller companies who already have difficulties competing with larger firms for federal contracts are now going to need to consider a new set of issues: reporting compliance, the ability to award merit pay or the possibility of wage data being used as grounds for discrimination lawsuits,' said Simon Brody, a spokesman for the National Association of Government Contractors, which represents firms doing business with the federal government."

The Heritage Foundation's James Sherk explains that the Paycheck Fairness Act "allows employees to sue businesses that pay different workers different wages—even if those differences have nothing to do with the employees' sex [italics added]. These lawsuits can be brought for unlimited damages, giving a windfall to trial lawyers." Essentially, the law would make it almost impossible to pay one worker more than another because he or she performs better than his or her co-workers, because unrewarded employees would file a lawsuit as soon as they learn their co-worker was given a raise. Everyone with the same job title would end up receiving the same salary, regardless of their worth to the company. That, of course, is a good way to lower the overall performance of a company's workforce: "Why work harder than anyone else if I won't get rewarded with a raise as a reward?" It is also a good way to ensure that salary increases are fewer and farther between. Sherk continues, "Companies should be allowed to reward good performance without risking a lawsuit. Punishing companies that do not adopt uniform pay scales would cut the wages of both men and women." At NYDailyNews.com, S. E. Cupp adds, '[T]he Democrats' Paycheck Fairness Act... may actually have an adverse effect on quality of work life for every employee, male or female. By tightly regulating how employers can pay their employees, it will become far harder to pay more for better work quality, productivity and experience, something both employers and employees should want. Further, with decreased flexibility, working mothers will have fewer options, not more. Lastly, this bill just makes it easier to file lawsuits over pay discrimination (illegal since 1963), once again benefiting that singularly oppressed class of workers—trial lawyers." (Arguably, the "Paycheck Fairness Act" could more accurately be called the "Guaranteed Employment for Trial Lawyers Act.") [57286, 57287, 57321, 57359, 57372]

A law that makes it easier for women to sue an employer may actually work against women because some employers will simply go out of their way to hire men—who are less likely to file lawsuits. As mentioned previously in this *Timeline*, when a business hires an individual it must also consider the potential cost of *firing* that person. If a business finds it necessary to fire a young white male who turns out not to be a good employee, it will likely never see him again. On the other hand, if a business fires a black or Hispanic woman who is overweight and over 50, it may see her in court if she files a discrimination lawsuit. The cost of fighting such lawsuits is enough to encourage some

employers to avoid hiring such individuals in the first place. Similarly, if the Paycheck Fairness Act were to pass and if it leads to many frivolous lawsuits, employers will do their best to avoid such hassles—by hiring as few women and minority workers as possible, and by going out of their way to never do anything that could possibly be construed as unfair. The end result could very likely be employees treated less generously. For example, a business might not give the better employees merit raises because it fears a lawsuit from other employees who claim they also deserve such raises. Another business might deny one worker a requested day off to deal with a family issue, fearing that other employees might file lawsuits demanded "equal treatment." Legislation that seeks to force the "equal treatment of everyone" can have significant unintended consequences. Prohibiting an employer from paying some employees less also results in no other employees being paid more—even if they deserve it.

As noted previously in this *Timeline*, since the Equal Pay Act of 1963 it has been a violation of federal law to pay a woman less than a man for doing the same work, assuming all other factors are equal. That women, on average, earn less than men is largely meaningless because the difference is based mostly on career choices, rather than employer discrimination. That a female kindergarten teacher is paid less than many male electrical engineers is no more "proof" of gender discrimination than the fact that a male worker on a General Motors assembly line is paid less than the corporation's female CEO, Mary Barra. If the average salary of all workers named Jones is greater than the average salary of all workers named Smith, that does not mean everyone named Smith is a victim of discrimination. The Census Bureau comparisons do not compare wages and salaries of men and women in the same job—or even the same profession. They absurdly compare average wages and salaries of all professions lumped together—which tells one almost nothing. Yes, female bus drivers may earn less than male psychiatrists, but that is not the important question. The important question is, "Does a male bus driver in school district X earn more than a female bus driver in school district X who has the same seniority?" [57371]

It is worth noting that men tend to enter more dangerous professions than women. In fact, 92 percent of all workplace deaths in 2012 were to men. It is illogical not to expect that someone in an occupation that entails a greater risk of death would command a higher rate of pay than someone who is a sales clerk at a shopping mall. But no one is demanding that there should be more deaths of working women in order to "make things equal." The Census Bureau statistics also show that unmarried young women earn, on average, more than unmarried young men—yet Obama is not calling that proof that there is "discrimination" against young men. Economist Thomas Sowell writes, "Women lawyers who are pregnant, or who have young children, may have good reasons to prefer a 9 to 5 job in a government agency to working 60 hours a week in a high-powered law firm. But there is no point comparing male lawyers as a group with female lawyers as a group, if you don't look any deeper than job titles. Unless, of course, you are not looking for the truth, but for political talking points to excite the gullible. ...Although comparing women and men who are in fact comparable is not easy to do, when you look at women and men who are similar on multiple factors, the sex differential in pay shrinks drastically

and gets close to the vanishing point. In some categories, women earn more than men with the same range of characteristics." [57371, 57577, 57560]

Even the left-leaning Daily Beast has called out Obama for his intentional misrepresentations of the gender pay statistics, writing two months ago, "... Obama repeated the spurious gender wage gap statistic in his State of the Union address. 'Today,' he said, 'women make up about half our workforce. But they still make 77 cents for every dollar a man earns. That is wrong, and in 2014, it's an embarrassment.' What is wrong and embarrassing is [Obama] reciting a massively discredited factoid. The 23-cent gender pay gap is simply the difference between the average earnings of all men and women working full-time. [It is also from a decades-old survey.] It does not account for differences in occupations, positions, education, job tenure, or hours worked per week. When all these relevant factors are taken into consideration, the wage gap narrows to about five cents. And no one knows if the five cents is a result of discrimination or some other subtle, hard-to-measure difference between male and female workers. In its factchecking column on the State of the Union, the Washington Post included [Obama's] mention of the wage gap in its list of dubious claims. 'There is clearly a wage gap, but differences in the life choices of men and women... make it difficult to make simple comparisons." [57301]

The Wilderness.me comments on the forced resignation of Mozilla CEO Brendan for holding the same gay marriage views in 2008 as did Obama: "This is about Barack Obama and his culture of activism. This is about advancing progressivism ideology and no person, regardless of their contribution to the planet can be left standing if the perception exists that they stand in the way of that agenda. This is why [Obama] has remained silent in the wake of [the] recent rash of progressive mob tactics. Barack Obama is a soldier of silence when a mob he ideologically agrees with speaks for him. Brendan Eich's head has been placed on a pike at the gates to serve as a warning to anyone with any measure of personal or professional capital at stake to rethink their personal beliefs, and challenge Barack Obama. By purging Eich and satisfying the liberal mob, Mozilla has stated they themselves are no longer a company driven by innovation, technology and source coding. They are a company driven by the ideological segregation of political beliefs; the idea that an individual is not welcome, no matter their education, expertise or accomplishments unless they fall in line with a certain set of ideological attributes. ... Mozilla as a company, does not exist without Brendan Eich as he was also the co-founder of the company and it's foundation. And this is, meaningless to progressives. ... The very same employees that owe their career to Brendan Eich were demanding he step down. Brendan Eich's contributions to the world and their lives do not matter. His \$1000 contribution to a political campaign 8 years ago does." [57386]

"...The progressive liberal mob is in the process of resegregating society and 'otherizing' anyone that does not agree with them and they are being led by [Obama, who] is not only encouraging it, but who has given them the blueprint for their tactics. The question then becomes who isn't a target? ...This country has always inherited the traits of our leaders and the culture is guided by it. When Lois Lerner can use the taxing authority of the IRS to target private citizens by either leaking their information to opposition groups, or stopping them from participating altogether, free of legal consequences and aided by the hyper-partisan motivations of the chief executive, progressive scalp hunting on a massive scale will be allowed. It will be encouraged, and it will continue." [57386]

HotAir.com comments on the possibility that Jeb Bush will seek the GOP nomination in 2016: "Let me paint you a picture. Bush announces he's running. Soon after, [Senator Marco] Rubio [R-FL] announces that he isn't, having concluded that too many of his potential advisors and fundraisers will gravitate towards Jeb. [Congressman] Paul Ryan [R-WI] likewise decides he'll pass, figuring his best bet at influence is as the next Ways and Means [Committee] chairman. Bush hits the trail, talking up education reform and ticking off a few well-chosen points of disagreement with his brother's foreign policy. Meanwhile, [New Jersey Governor Chris] Christie, his main rival for establishment support, is too damaged by Bridgegate and never gathers much momentum. Neither does [Louisiana Governor Bobby] Jindal, who's overshadowed by bigger-name candidates both to his left (Bush) and his right ([Senator] Rand Paul [R-KY] and [Senator] Ted Cruz [R-TX]) and can't quite find a niche. Bush, now largely unchallenged in the center and center-right, consolidates their support." [57297]

"Over on the right, Rand Paul and Ted Cruz bash each other's brains in on foreign policy and the NSA until one of them emerges as the conservative choice. That's when Bush's backers launch a ferocious campaign attacking Cruz/Paul as fringe material—government shutdowns! a disarmed military!—who'll never stand a chance against Hillary [Clinton]. It works and Jeb sweeps to the nomination, only to lose badly in the general when voters are forced to decide whether they want to return to 'the Clinton era' or 'the Bush era.' (The Obama Timeline believes the GOP cannot succeed if it nominates a "Democrat-lite" candidate. The voters will support the Democrat who offers "more free stuff" over the Republican who offers "some, but less free stuff." Clinton will choose someone as her running mate who will both add "gravitas" to the ticket and make it appear less extreme. The Weekly Standard's Bill Kristol suggests her choice may be General David Petraeus—despite her having voted against a September 2007 Senate resolution condemning the "General Betray Us" ad run by MoveOn.org campaign director Nita Chaudary. Then-Senator Obama snuck out of the Senate chamber to avoid having to vote on the issue. Chaudary's husband Jesse Lee worked for Nancy Pelosi and then in Obama's White House as his "Minister of Truth Czar," the director of "Progressive Media and Online Response," responsible for "rapid responses" to criticism of the administration.) At a Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearing, Senator Jim Risch (R-ID) addresses Secretary of State John Kerry: "Mr. Secretary, I do not envy the position you're in here today. This is supposed to be a budget hearing where the American people find out what they are getting for their money, and after the discussion we've had here today, I think anybody who would come in here would have the impression after we looked at the issues of Russia, Iran, North Korea, Afghanistan, Pakistan, China, the peace process, and all the difficulties with every one of these, I appreciate your view that there are some things happening which are positive, but I tell you, you can't help but get the impression our foreign policy is just spinning out of control. And we are losing control in virtually every area we are trying to do something in. Probably, we've got some limited time here to talk about all these problems, but probably what I want to talk about briefly are a couple of them. One of the best examples is the one that's on the front pages today and that is the Russian issue. This administration said they were going to hit the reset button. I can't help think somebody hit the wrong button because things have not gone well during this administration. The Russians today are misbehaving worse than they have in decades and nothing seems to change that. When you look at what they did in Georgia and still remain occupying part of Georgia when they even agreed not to. What they've done in the Ukraine. What they've done in Syria and are continuing to do in Syria, plus we all know about the cheating that's going on [with] the treaties that have been entered into.

I'm very disappointed in what's going on. You can't help but be discouraged about it." [57313, 57356, 57358]

"I'm interested to hear your thoughts about this meeting coming up next week. You know, you talked about what happened in Syria and you had a very similar meeting in Syria where you sat down with [Russian Foreign Minister Sergey] Lavrov and supposedly forged a road forward, and that road forward has been a disaster. You heard the people talk about how many tens of thousands of people have been killed since then. The dismantling of the chemical weapons has slowed down. What makes you think you're going to be able to make better progress on the Ukraine? We've seen this movie over and over again with the Russians. They misbehave, then we sit down at the table, we make some kind of agreement and they misbehave even worse after the agreement. Maybe you could give us a little taste of what you're going to tell Lavrov when you meet with him next week." Kerry begins his response by blaming former President George W. Bush: "Let me give you what I consider a taste of reality about our foreign policy and the realities of the world. Georgia happened under George Bush. Georgia happened under George Bush, and he didn't even bring a sanction. ... Obama has brought sanctions. And it's having an impact." (The rest of Kerry's response is longwinded claptrap, such as, "We're living with a far more, almost 19th century, 18th century diplomatic playing field, where interests and, you know, some cases mercantilist interests, in other cases just security interests or territorial interests, other kinds of things are raising their head in ways that they didn't during the Cold War, because they were suppressed," and "This is not the bipolar, straightforward choice of the Cold War. We're living in an incredibly challenging time where some of the things that the East-West order took for granted most of my life, are suddenly finding a world in which American engagement is more critical.") At PJMedia.com Bridget Johnson notes that Kerry was "visibly irritated" by the questioning. Senator John McCain (R-AZ) tells Kerry, "...On the issue of Ukraine, my hero, Teddy Roosevelt, used to say talk softly, but carry a big stick. What you're doing is talking strongly and carrying a very small stick—in fact, a twig." No doubt influenced by the Senate's unanimous vote, the Obama administration states it has told Iran it will not provide a travel visa to its new ambassador to the United Nations, Hamid Aboutalebi. [57485]

Jim Angle reports at FoxNews.com, "There is yet another ObamaCare surprise waiting for consumers: from now until the next open enrollment at the end of this year, most people will simply not be able to buy any health insurance at all, even outside the exchanges. 'It's all closed down. You cannot buy a policy that is a qualified policy for the purpose of the ACA (the Affordable Care Act) until next year on January 1,' says John DiVito, president of Flexbenefit which has 2,500 brokers. John Goodman of the National Center for Policy Analysis in Dallas adds, 'People are not going to be able to buy individual and family policies, and that's part of ObamaCare. And what makes it so surprising is the whole point of ObamaCare was to encourage people to get insurance, and now the market has been completely closed down for the next seven months.' ThePostEmail.com reports that document expert Douglas Vogt has filed "a Motion to Disqualify Supreme Court Justices Elena Kagan and Sonia Sotomayor upon the grounds that their appointment to the Supreme Court was an act Barack Hussein Obama was not authorized to make because he is not a legitimate President." Vogt also argues that Obama had no legal authority to sign any legislation into law, including the Affordable

In fact, per that [Rand] table, there are actually more people who had insurance through work last year and now have no insurance at all (2.1 million) than there are people who had no insurance last year and now have it through the exchanges (1.4 million). On April 9 the *Daily Mail* reports, "More than 200 armed federal agents and snipers were deployed on Tuesday to forcibly remove the cattle of a Nevada rancher—signaling a dangerous escalation in the two-decade long constitutional land dispute over an endangered tortoise. [The desert tortoise is *not* on the endangered species list. It is classified only as a "threatened" species.] Cliven Bundy, the last rancher in Clark County, Nevada, has been battling the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) since 1993 when he refused to pay for the right to graze on the 600,000-acre Gold Butte land he says his family have owned since the 1870s. Claiming that the government has 'brought everything but tanks and rocket launchers,' Bundy said his livelihood is being taken away from him by agents carrying, 'automatic weapons, sniper rifles, top communication, top surveillance.' 'The battle's been going on for 20 years,' Bundy told the Washington Free Beacon from his ranch 75 miles outside of Las Vegas. 'What's happened the last two weeks, the United States government, the bureaus are getting this army together and they're going to get their job done and they're going to prove two things. They're going to prove they can do it, and they're gonna prove that they have unlimited power, and that they control the policing power over this public land. That's what they're trying to prove.' Eight helicopters are routinely circling the land and as of Wednesday, federal officials have seized 234 of Bundy's 908 cattle. It is estimated that impounding them will

cost upwards of \$3 million. The BLM says Bundy's cattle have been trespassing on U.S. land without required grazing permits for over 25 years. However, Bundy said he doesn't recognize federal authority on land that he says belongs to the state of Nevada." (The land used by Bundy is needed for the turtles that will be displaced by the solar plant. Thus, Reid needs the cattle removed.) ENN has contributed \$40,650 to Reid's campaigns. The head of the Bureau of Land Management is Neil Kornze—a former senior advisor to Harry Reid who had few, if any, qualifications for the job. (Kornze was approved for his position on April 8, after which he immediately went after Cliven Bundy.) Until the furor over the Bundy ranch dispute, the BLM web site included a document that read, "Non-Governmental Organizations have expressed concern that the regional mitigation strategy for the Dry Lake Solar Energy Zone utilizes Gold Butte as the location for offsite mitigation for impacts from solar development, and that those restoration activities are not durable with the presence of trespass cattle." (In other words, "The cattle must go so that the Chinese can build a solar power plant.") By April 11 government officials and agents had rounded up and confiscated many of Bundy's cattle, tasered and arrested the son of the ranch owner for daring to photograph the scene, knocked down a 57 year old woman, used dogs to attack a pregnant woman, surrounded the house with attack helicopters and as many as 200 agents, and threatened protestors with snipers. Additionally, Clark County Commissioner Tom Collins reportedly called supporters of Bundy "inbred bastards" who had "better have funeral plans. The BLM has frequently used the tactics of endangered species to garner public support. It should be known that the desert tortoise reserve near Las Vegas has recently been closed, according to the BLM, due to lack of funding to support the tortoises. Many have been euthanized as they are considered un-adoptable. However, that same agency without funding for the tortoises has spent millions, I would guess, building a militarized compound outside the Bundy ranch, scrambling BLM personnel from neighboring states, and hiring outside contractors to rustle Mr. Bundy's cattle and corral them. They also hauled heavy equipment onto his property and broke up water lines and cisterns that the Bundy's had paid for themselves to water the cattle. These water supplies are also used by the wild animals that enjoy the same range land." [57558]

According to WND.com, the list of investors in Nevada solar and wind projects reads like "a who's who of Democratic insiders, including major Obama campaign bundlers, billionaire investor Paul Tudor Jones, Al Gore, Ted Turner and Goldman Sachs. First Solar's CEO is Michael Ahearn, former fundraiser for both Obama and Harry Reid." Additionally, K Road Power, LLC, a New York City-based energy company, lists as it business development manager "none other than Jonathan Magaziner. Magaziner was formerly an associate at the Clinton Climate Initiative of the William J. Clinton Foundation. He is also the son of Ira Magaziner, former senior policy adviser for President Bill Clinton. The elder Magaziner now works for the Clinton Foundation on health and environment issues." A 16-year-old high school student in Pennsylvania stabs 21 fellow students and a security guard before being tackled by an assistant principal. (Whether the Obama administration will call for a ban on knives—and excoriate Republicans for not agreeing—remains to be seen.) Chairman of the House Oversight Committee Darrell Issa [R-CA], along with five Subcommittee Chairmen are demanding Cummings provide an explanation for the staff inquiries to the IRS about True the Vote and for his denial that his staff ever contacted the IRS about the group. ... The first contact between the IRS and Cummings' staffers about True the Vote happened in August 2012. In January 2013, staff asked for more information from the IRS about the group. Former head of tax exempt groups at the IRS Lois Lerner went out of her way to try and get information to Cummings' office. The information Cummings received was not shared with Majority Members on the Committee. On January 28, three days after staffers requested more information, Lerner wrote an email to her deputy Holly Paz, who has since been put on administrative leave, asking, 'Did we find anything?' Paz responded immediately by saying information had not been found yet, to which Lerner replied, 'Thanks, check tomorrow please.' On January 31, Paz sent True the Vote's 990 forms to Cumming's staff. ... Engelbrecht filed an ethics complaint against Cummings for his targeting and intimidation of her organization." (Lerner and her staff leaked confidential information about conservative organizations to Cummings. Cummings lied and claimed he had no such contact.) Pavlich also reports, "The House Ways and Means Committee has voted to 23–14 along party lines to refer former head of tax exempt groups at the IRS Lois Lerner to the Justice Department for prosecution. Although the details about exactly what charges will be have not yet been released, lawmakers are arguing Lerner has not been truthful with Congress or the IRS inspector general and leaked confidential tax information. ...Last summer ... Obama called the targeting 'outrageous' and promised to hold people responsible and accountable for what happened. Tomorrow the House Oversight Committee will vote on whether to hold Lerner in contempt of Congress." Darrell Issa (R-CA)." The House Democratic Steering Committee then recommended Cummings for the position "leapfrogging" Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney (D-NY), "the senior Democrat on the committee." (In other words, Pelosi wanted an obstructionist in the position, not someone who would "play nice" with Issa. HotAir.com writes, "Imagine having taken a bullet to the head from [Nidal Malik] Hasan's gun and being told that [Obama] doesn't have time to meet with you but *does* have time for a fundraiser at a rich liberal's house nearby." Lerner and the tea party targeting scandal, a government watchdog said Wednesday it's pursuing cases against three other tax agency employees and offices suspected of illegal political activity in support of ...Obama and fellow Democrats. In one case the Office of Special

Counsel, which investigates federal employees who conduct politics on government time, said it was 'commonplace' in a Dallas IRS office for employees to have pro-Obama screensavers on their computers, and to have campaign-style buttons and stickers at their office. In another case, a worker at the tax agency's customer help line urged taxpayers 'to re-elect ... Obama in 2012 by repeatedly reciting a chant based on the spelling of his last name,' the Office of Special Counsel said in a statement. OSC said it is seeking 'significant disciplinary action' against that employee. Another IRS employee in Kentucky has agreed to serve a 14-day suspension for blasting Republicans in a conversation with a taxpayer. 'They're going to take women back 40 years,' the IRS employee said in a conversation that was recorded. The employee also said that 'if you vote for a Republican, the rich are going to get richer and the poor are going to get poorer.'" According to a 'former intelligence official' cited heavily by Hersh, the classified annex [to a Senate Select Committee in Intelligence report on Benghazi] revealed that the Special Mission Compound where Ambassador Christopher Stevens was murdered was nothing more than a front for negotiating the weapons transfers from Libya to Syria through Turkey. ... If [House Speaker John] Boehner had classified information about weapons being shipped to Syria from Libya, via Turkey as far back as January of last year, how long before that did he know about it? Despite a majority of House Republicans (185—38) who are calling for a Select

Committee to investigate what happened in Benghazi, Boehner continues to refuse to appoint one. It stands to reason that if Boehner knew what was going on in Benghazi *prior* to the attacks, he wouldn't want the truth about Benghazi to come out now." (It is worth noting that Congressman Mike Rogers (R-MI), chairman of the House Intelligence Committee, has announced his retirement. *The Obama Timeline* suspects that neither Boehner nor Rogers want the truth about Benghazi revealed.) What is newsworthy is that the NSA has admitted this, and those admissions have far-reaching consequences. Since the Snowden revelations first came to light last June, the NSA has steadfastly denied them. Clapper has denied them. The recently retired head of the NSA, Gen. Keith Alexander, has denied them. Even ... Obama has stated repeatedly words to the effect that 'no one is reading your emails or listening to your phone calls.' ... This was all done in secret—so secret that [Obama] would lie about it; so secret that Congress, which supposedly authorized it, was unaware of it; and so secret that the FISA court judges themselves do not have access to their own court records (only the NSA does). It was to further this public façade that Clapper lied to the Senate Intelligence Committee last year when he replied to a question from Wyden about whether the NSA was collecting massive amounts of data on hundreds of millions of Americans by saying, 'No' and then adding, 'Not wittingly." In demanding answers and holding a powerful government official accountable for her failure to meet her legal obligations, this Committee did its job. If the House takes up and passes the resolution, the matter will be referred to the U.S. Attorney for the District of Columbia, which statute requires he take to a grand jury." Democrats on the committee predictably protest, repeatedly charging Republicans with "McCarthyism." (In the 1950s, Senator Joseph McCarthy (R-WI) claimed there were communists, spies, and sympathizers in the U.S. government. He was censured by the Senate for his tactics, and the term "McCarthyism" came to be used to criticize anyone believed to be making unsubstantiated claims. Of course, the average person is unaware that many years after his death McCarthy was proven right. After the fall of the Soviet Union, the release of documents known as the "Venona Papers" indicated that the Soviets did indeed have spies in the U.S. government, primarily in the State Department.) Two days after McCain scolded Kerry over his refusal to 'recognize reality' and give up on the Israeli-Palestinian peace process, al-Arabiya reports that the US has kickstarted the effort back to life—by trading Pollard to Israel in exchange for a new Palestinian prisoner release and a moratorium on settlement expansion. ... The intelligence community won't be pleased, if this turns out to be true, but Pollard has probably outlived his usefulness in prison. If the US can get something substantive for his release, then after twenty-seven years, it would be a good

call. This probably just buys Kerry a little face-saving time rather than anything substantive, though. If talks collapse later, the US will have traded its hole card for nothing. And nothing in the current talks suggest that we're moving toward any resolution of the conflict between the Israelis and Palestinians, because the Palestinians still want the right to live in Israel while the Israelis want Israel to remain a Jewish state.") In July 1995, Burwell (then Sylvia Mathews) was one of several key aides questioned by the Senate Whitewater Committee regarding the death of deputy White House counsel Vince Foster. Foster's death was officially ruled a suicide. The Clinton White House eventually admitted to misleading investigators about how senior officials had seized and disposed of files relating to the first couple's controversial investments in the Whitewater Development Corporation, a failed real estate venture. ... Under questioning, Sylvia Mathews and her colleagues denied impeding a police investigation into Foster's death after his body was found in a northern Virginia park. According to the *New York Times*, Mathews testified 'in laborious detail about what she had found in Mr. Foster's garbage on the night he died.' That experience may come in handy as she prepares to oversee the implementation of Obamacare." (One can assume that her task was to find and destroy anything that might make the Clintons look bad. On July 26, 1995 *The New York Times* reported that Matthews "had also managed to retrieve a special bag of garbage containing classified and sensitive papers that was usually destroyed by the Secret Service. The opening photograph in the article shows Shipman in her kitchen with her two children. On the wall behind them are two Soviet propaganda posters. (Carney and Shipman met in Russia in the 1990s.) In another photo, with Shipman and Carney posing in front of bookshelves, there are multiple copies of the same books—suggesting either that the image was altered. (In fact, one of Carney's son's fingers covers part of a book, and that same finger miraculously appears in front of the same book two shelves to the right.) One of the Carney books is titled *Soviet Architecture*, and on one of the bookshelves is what looks like a small bust of former Soviet Premier Mikhail Gorbachev. (Whether any reporter will ask Carney about his posters and Gorbachev bust is not known.) Carney's children attend the incredibly expensive private school, Sidwell Friends, along with Obama's children. [57463, 57464, 57472, 57475, 57498, 57499, 57862]

After a tense week-long battle the BLM pulled out, saying it feared for the safety of employees and members of the public. Men carrying AK-47s and handguns had been pictured at the camp in southern Nevada that was set up in protest at the bureau's attempt to confiscate cattle from Bundy, whose family has been working the land for centuries. ... The dispute that triggered the roundup dates to 1993, when the BLM cited concern for the federally protected tortoise. [Ironically, BLM vehicles caved in several tortoise dens during the stand-off. In addition, the Bundy family found "a pit—about fifty feet long, thirty feet wide, and ten feet deep. About a third of it was full of something. We know there were [cattle] body parts sticking out of it."] The agency later revoked grazing rights for Bundy, who is the last rancher in Clark County. BLM director Neil Kornze said on Saturday however: 'Based on information about conditions on the ground, and in consultation with law enforcement, we have made a decision to conclude the cattle gather because of our serious concern about the safety of employees and members of the public." (Bundy may have won a battle but he is unlikely to win any war with the federal government. The BLM's retreat was likely meant to do nothing but prompt protesters to leave the area in the belief that the standoff was over. Once armed protesters are gone, the BLM will arrest Bundy and charge him with something.) 'I have no contract with the United States government. I was paying grazing fees for management and that's what BLM was supposed to be, land managers and they were managing my ranch out of business, so I refused to pay,' the rancher told ABC News. Supporters for Bundy said about 300 protesters had arrived to help campaign on the rancher's behalf. The BLM put the number at 100." (One eyewitness claims, "There were THOUSANDS of people here.") Bundy claims he has paid appropriate fees to the state of Nevada, which he says is the rightful owner of the land—not the U.S. government. (Whether Russian President Vladimir Putin—who took Crimea while Obama could not take a ranch—is amused is

not known. Whether the hundreds of cattle taken by the government will be safely returned to Bundt is also not known. If calves in the herd are separated from their mothers they will die unless they are nursed—which the BLM is perhaps unlikely to do.) On *State of the Union*, host Candy Crowley does Bob Schieffer one better, asking Congressman Steve Israel D-NY), "Do you think your Republican colleagues are racist?" Israel replies, "Not all of them, no, of course not." (The Democrat campaign theme for 2014 has clearly been established: "Republicans hate blacks and women"—and the mainstream media will eagerly assist with the portrayal.) [57350, 57540, 57588]

On *This Week*, U.S. ambassador to the United Nations Samantha Power tells George Stephanopoulos, "You both have the devastating, heartbreaking, systematic targeting now of the Muslim population [in the Central African Republic]. You also have retaliatory attacks against Christians. That is just so painful to see these people suffer, to see parents who have had their children literally killed before their very eyes." CNSNews.com notes, "The United Nations Security Council last week voted unanimously to send 12,000 peacekeepers to the Christian-majority Central African Republic, where Muslims and Christians are slaughtering each other, and where the government and its institutions have broken down." (Power misstates the situation, suggesting that it is the Muslims who are doing the retaliating. In fact, Christians are the most persecuted people on earth, and it is they who are now on occasion retaliating. The Obama administration suddenly shows interest when Christians kill Muslims in the Central African Republic, yet it has been remarkably silent about the tremendous amount of Muslim attacks on Christians in the rest of Africa, most notably Nigeria.) On Fox News Sunday, veteran journalist Bob Woodward says of the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee's investigation of Lois Lerner and the IRS scandal: "Well, there's obviously something here, and the question is, 'Does this committee know how to investigate,' and they're worried about this one person who has invoked her Fifth Amendment rights not to answer questions, and you have Congressmen on the committee going on [television] and saying, 'We have evidence she's involved in criminal activity.' I don't think you should cross that line. The second thing is, uh, there's always one person who's not gonna talk, and, uh, when you conduct an investigation like this... you need to find people who will talk, and there are always people who will do this." Discussion panel member Brit Hume says of Attorney General Eric Holder's whining about mistreatment, "[T]his strikes me as kind of crybaby stuff from Holder. My sense of this is that both Eric Holder and Barack Obama have benefited politically enormously from the fact that they are African-American and the first to hold the jobs that they hold. ...Race has been both a shield and a sword that they have used effectively to defend themselves and to attack others." Police said the man, who was not from Kansas, used a shotgun in the slayings at the Jewish Community Center. He also had a handgun when he was arrested. 'We are investigating it as a hate crime,' said Overland Park Police Chief [John Douglass], but investigators are not sure of the motive. ... Two of the victims were a 14year-old boy and his grandfather who attend the United Methodist Church of the Resurrection in Leawood..." Although Miller may have been targeting elderly Jews, all three of his victims are Christians. Upon his arrest, 73-year-old Frazier Glenn Miller, also known as Frazier Glenn Cross, shouts "Heil Hitler." Miller, a former "Grand Dragon of the Carolina Knights of the Ku Klux Klan," has unsuccessfully run for office as both a Democrat and as a Republican. Obama issues a statement: "Michelle and I offer our thoughts and prayers to the families and friends who lost a loved one and everyone affected by this tragedy. While we do not know all of the details surrounding today's

shooting, the initial reports are heartbreaking. I want to offer my condolences to all the families trying to make sense of this difficult situation and pledge the full support from the federal government as we heal and cope during this trying time." [57505, 57506, 57517, 57534, 57887, 57896]

On Media Buzz, former CBS investigative journalist Sharyl Attkisson tells host Howard Kurtz, "Now there have always been tensions, there have always been calls from the White House under any administration I assume, when they don't like a particular story. But it is particularly aggressive under the Obama administration and I think it's a campaign that's very well organized, that's designed to have sort of a chilling effect and to some degree has been somewhat successful in getting broadcast producers who don't really want to deal with the headache of it. Why put on these controversial stories that we're going to have to fight people on, when we can fill the broadcast with other perfectly decent stories that don't ruffle the same feathers? ... Even, really the last year or so, when I would write an article online—which would be sort of the fallback position when something couldn't get on television but was still a great story that could be circulated, I'd publish it online—they [CBS executives] would even call about those, or they would call about the headline of the online article." According to Attkisson, a typical story critical of Obama or his administration "never runs, or it dies the death of a thousand cuts, as some of us say. The Media Research Center reports, "Over the last seven days, three major revelations have emerged surrounding the IRS' targeting of Tea Party groups. Despite the new stories, on Sunday April 13, three of the four Sunday interview shows on the broadcast networks—NBC's Meet the Press, CBS's Face the Nation and ABC's This Week—all ignored them, whereas Fox News Sunday was the only broadcast network program to mention the IRS at all. ... WashingtonPost.com reports, "On a trip to Moscow early in her tenure as secretary of state, Hillary Rodham Clinton played the role of international saleswoman, pressing Russian government officials to sign a multibillion-dollar deal to buy dozens of aircraft from Boeing. A month later, Clinton was in China, where she jubilantly announced that the aerospace giant would be writing a generous check to help resuscitate floundering

U.S. efforts to host a pavilion at the upcoming World's Fair. Boeing, she said, 'has just agreed to double its contribution to \$2 million.' Clinton did not point out that, to secure the donation, the State Department had set aside ethics guidelines that first prohibited solicitations of Boeing and then later permitted only a \$1 million gift from the company. Boeing had been included on a list of firms to be avoided because of its frequent reliance on the government for help negotiating overseas business and concern that a donation could be seen as an attempt to curry favor with U.S. officials. ...In 2010, two months after Boeing won its \$3.7 billion Russia deal, the company announced a \$900,000 contribution to the William J. Clinton Foundation... The foundation, which Hillary Clinton now helps lead with her husband and daughter, has become a popular charity for major corporations. The company's ties came into play again this month when its inhouse lobbyist, former Bill Clinton aide Tim Keating, co-hosted a fundraiser for Ready for Hillary, the super PAC backing her potential presidential run." HotAir.com's Ed Morrissey later comments on the *Post* report, "The jet deal took place in November 2009. Notably, this was several months after the 'reset button' fiasco with Sergei Lavrov that all but shrugged off efforts by the previous administration to get tough with Moscow after the invasion of Georgia in the summer of 2008. ... What *isn't* mentioned in this piece was the cancellation of the US missile shield program with Poland and the Czech Republic two months earlier than the Boeing sale. Russia had long opposed the missile-shield program in eastern Europe, pushed by the Bush administration as a response to Iranian development of both its missile and nuclear-weapons programs. At the time, no one could quite figure out what we got in trade for this retreat. Now it appears all we got was a sale of some commercial airliners to Aeroflot. ... DailyCaller.com reports, "Neurosurgeon Ben Carson says the White House wanted him to apologize for 'offending' ... Obama after he famously delivered a conservative message at the National Prayer Breakfast last year." Tents popped up across the landscape and vehicles became temporary bunks as the Bundy ranch, about 80 miles northeast of Las Vegas, turned into a gathering place for traveling pilgrims from across the nation." Kennedy's assassination, Nelson Mandela's death, the birthday of Obama's Chief of Staff, Denis McDonough, the 71st anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor, Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day, and the death of Neil Armstrong. A bomb attack by the Muslim extremist group Boko Haram kills 71 and wounds 124 at a bus station in Abuja, Nigeria. USAToday.com notes, "Boko Haram's campaign to make Nigeria an Islamic state with Sharia, or Islamic law, enforced throughout the country poses the greatest threat to its cohesion and security and threatens nearby countries where the fighters have gone to train and fight. ... Former Congressman Ron Paul comments on the Bundy cattle grazing issue, writing, "I worry about whether or not this is all over because you have the sort of on-again, offagain situation like that of Waco which, of course, ended in violence. I'm hoping that the federal officials don't come back determined to use violence to remove this family from this house and this land. This is a typical example of when everyone owns a piece of land and no one does all at the same time. They sort of have an agreement—a lease—where they have been raising cattle on this land for 130 years then all of sudden the rules change. This type of problem wouldn't happen in Texas because all the land is owned privately. Its makes the point that no one really knows who is in charge. It makes the point that state and private ownership would have prevented this type of problem. There's [sic] two things that come out of this: one, when the American people speak out, their voices can be heard and can effect what government is doing. Two, it empathizes the value of private property and ownership rather than having collective ownership by a government. As much as I'd like to see this as a victory for the people, I'm afraid the government has more guns, more power and more determination to express their authoritarianism. They will be back and that means a confrontation between the people and those in our government undermining our liberties—the confrontation will continue." (The federal government owns about 84 percent of all land in Nevada; in no other state does it have a high a percentage. The federal government does control a small amount of land in Texas, less than two percent, such as Big Bend National Park.) [57573, 57574, 57575, 57585, 57702]

On *The Kelly File*, documentary filmmaker Dennis Michael discusses his visit to the Bundy ranch area with Megyn Kelly. Michael says, "I've never experienced anything like this. I've looked at [a Mexican drug] cartel in the face [but] this was different. ... These people [the Bundy family and their supporters] were willing to die on Saturday. I heard it in their voices; I saw it in their eyes." (That may be why the Bureau of Land Management backed down—it understood that the people they came to persecute and prosecute would not give up without a fight.) [57583]

On April 15, as millions of Americans file their income tax forms, The Heritage Foundation reports on where their 2013 tax dollars were spent: Medicare, Medicaid and other health care consumed 25 percent of federal spending; Social Security took up 24 percent; another 20 percent went to "income security and other benefits" (federal employee pensions, disability, unemployment, welfare, etc.); national defense took 18 percent of the budget; interest on the national debt ate up 6 percent of all spending; transportation, 3 percent; K-12 education, 1 percent; all other spending, 3 percent. IRS Commissioner John Koskinen whines that the agency is not getting enough money to do a proper job, especially with the added burden of ObamaCare functions: "If we keep going at this level, with the increased responsibilities, at some point we risk crippling the agency, and that won't be good for the government and it won't be good for taxpayers." Although the chances of being audited have been reduced, Koskinen warns, "I wouldn't encourage anybody to depend upon us not auditing them. As I've told people, the roulette wheel is spinning." CNSNews.com reports, "Inflation-adjusted federal tax revenues hit a record \$1,320,793,000,000 in the first half of fiscal 2014 [October 2013 through March 2014], but the federal government still ran a \$413,264,000,000 deficit during that time, according to the Monthly Treasury Statement for March." [57668]

Among the new ObamaCare taxes is a reduction in the amount that can be deducted for medical expenses. (Previously, taxpayers could deduct that cost of medical expenses that exceeded 7.5 percent of gross income; that number is now 10 percent.) The Medicare tax is increased by 0.9 percent for individuals earning over \$200,000 or married couples earning \$250,000, and a new investment income tax of 3.8 percent tax now applies to individuals, estates, and trusts worth more \$200,000 or \$250,000 for joint filers. [57616]

According to a Gallup poll, 52 percent of taxpayers say their federal income taxes are too high, 42 percent say they are "about right," and 3 percent say they are too low. (About 47 percent of Americans pay no income taxes at all.) CNSNews.com notes, "Taxpayers earning \$100,000 or more a year pay 71.6% of the nation's share in individual federal income taxes... In 2011, according to the IRS, there were 145,370,240 individual income tax returns filed. Among those returns, 125,914,418 or 86.6%, belonged to taxpayers earning a salary less than \$100,000. The remaining 19,455,822 returns belonged to those taxpayers earning more than \$100,000, or 13.4% of the total. While those top earners, earning six figures or more, represented only 13.4% of the total number of individual income tax returns reported to the IRS, they contributed nearly three-fourths of the total amount of federal tax revenue from individual filers reported for that year." (In 1996, the six-figure earners paid 51 percent of all taxes. The tax burden on the wealthier Americans has increased—despite repeated claims to the contrary by those who call for them to pay "their fair share." They have been paying more than their fair share for years.) [57597, 57598, 57602]

Others argue that the "marginal tax rates" on Americans who are just above or below the poverty line are even higher than those imposed on the wealthy—if one considers the loss

of welfare benefits and credits a "tax." The Heritage Foundation notes that if a single parent with one child "does not work at all, he receives \$19,300 in government benefits [including the Earned Income Tax Credit]. If he instead earns a salary of \$30,000—which is full-time work at \$15 per hour—he has disposable income of \$28,000. This means that he is working full-time for only \$8,700 per year more than if he did not work at all [\$28,000 minus \$19,300], making his effective take home wage \$4.35 per hour (\$8,700/2,000 hours per year). Is it rational to expect someone to work hard for such a low wage?" [57629, 57630, 57815]

Josh Romney, one of Mitt Romney's sons, tweets a photograph of his father in line at the Post Office to mail his tax return, with the text, "Hey Senator Reid here's a shot of MittRomney paying taxes. Does it every year. It's how you get your paycheck." (The quip is a reference to Reid's false claims during the 2012 campaign season, on behalf of Obama, that Mitt Romney had not paid taxes in 10 years.) [57652]

WashingtonExaminer.com reports that former Congressman Ron Paul's nonprofit Campaign for Liberty organization "will fight the Internal Revenue Service's demand that it reveal its donor list to the agency, despite having already been fined for refusing to do so. 'There is no legitimate reason for the IRS to know who donates to Campaign for Liberty,' Megan Stiles, the communications director at Campaign for Liberty, told the Washington Examiner in an email on Tuesday. 'We believe the First Amendment is on our side as evidenced by cases such as NAACP v. Alabama and International Union UAW v. National Right to Work. Many 501(c)(4) organizations protect the privacy of their donors in the very same way as Campaign for Liberty. For some reason the IRS has now chosen to single out Campaign for Liberty for special attention. We plan to fight this all the way.' Ron Paul suggested that the group will refuse to pay the IRS fine in an fundraising email to supporters about the agency's request for information. 'Paying this outrageous extortionist fine—just to exercise our rights as American citizens to petition our government—may even be cheaper in the short run,' he wrote. 'But it'll just embolden an alphabet soup of other federal agencies to come after us.' Paul's email said that the rule requiring that 501(c)(4)s list their donors is 'rarely enforced.'" According to the Congressional Budget Office, the fiscal year 2014 deficit will be \$492 billion—still more than the largest deficit under President George W. Bush. According to The Heritage Foundation, the \$492 billion estimate "is arguably misleading to the extent that the operations of mortgage giants, Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac... are improperly accounted for in the budget. Without that distortion, both spending and the deficit in 2014 would be higher by about \$85 billion." [57572]

April 15 is also the deadline for registering weapons under New York's "SAFE Act." (As was the case with Connecticut's new gun registration law, a substantial number of New York residents will likely refuse to comply with the law. According to the National Rifle Association, "Over the last year, the vast majority of county legislatures across New York have adopted resolutions condemning the SAFE Act, and many sheriffs have gone

on record in opposition to the law, saying they refuse to enforce it. The State Police have failed to disclose how many people have complied with the law's registration requirement to date. The speculation is that their failure to release this information is directly correlated to the embarrassing figures that such a revelation would reveal." [57745, 57746, 57853]

The New York Times reports that the Census Bureau "is changing its annual survey so thoroughly that it will be difficult to measure the effects of ...Obama's health care law in the next report, due this fall, census officials said. ...An internal Census Bureau document said that the new questionnaire included a 'total revision to health insurance questions' and, in a test last year, produced lower estimates of the uninsured. Thus, officials said, it will be difficult to say how much of any change is attributable to the Affordable Care Act and how much to the use of a new survey instrument. 'We are expecting much lower numbers just because of the questions and how they are asked,' said Brett J. O'Hara, chief of the health statistics branch at the Census Bureau." (As an example of how statistics can be misused for political purposes, Obama's frequent claim that 47 million Americans are uninsured counts individuals who were without coverage for even one week, such as when the were in between jobs. ObamaCare was sold on the argument that tens of millions of Americans were uninsured, but the numbers given have always been an exaggeration—especially when illegal immigrants are counted in the estimates.) Hot Air.com observes, "[T]he change the Bureau is making all but guarantees that the number of uninsured next year, post-ObamaCare, will be lower than the number last year, pre-ObamaCare." White House official Jesse Lee tweets, "Republicans freaking out on ACA & Census data—and those they're trying to spin..." Disgustingly, he also tweets, "Republicans clamoring for information on how many people have gotten newly-covered so they'll know how many people they plan to uninsure [sic]." At Mediaite.com, Noah Rothman reminds readers, "In 2009, in the earliest weeks of ...Obama's administration, the White House made the controversial decision to take the unprecedented step of moving the Census Bureau from control of the commerce secretary over to the White House ahead of the decennial 2010 census. Conservatives sounded alarm bells. 'It takes something that is supposedly apolitical like the census, and gives it to a guy who is infamously political,' said Rep. Rob Bishop (R-UT) of then White House Chief of Staff Rahm Emanuel. ...[T]he fears of some that the Census Bureau could be corrupted by the imperatives of the political operatives in the White House was today proven accurate." At BloombergView.com Megan McArdle writes, "For several months now, whenever the topic of enrollment in the Affordable Care Act came up, I've been saying that it was too soon to tell its ultimate effects. We don't know how many people have paid for their new insurance policies, or how many of those who bought policies were previously uninsured. For that, I said, we will have to wait for Census Bureau data, which offer the best assessment of the insurance status of the whole population. Other surveys are available, but the samples are smaller, so they're not as good; the census is the gold standard.

Unfortunately, as I invariably noted, these data won't be available until 2015. I stand corrected: These data won't be available at all. Ever. No, I'm not kidding. I wish I was. The New York Times reports that the Barack Obama administration has changed the survey so that we cannot directly compare the numbers on the uninsured over time. ... I'm speechless. Shocked. Stunned. Horrified. Befuddled. Aghast, appalled, thunderstruck, perplexed, baffled, bewildered and dumbfounded. It's not that I am opposed to the changes: Everyone understands that the census reports probably overstate the true number of the uninsured, because the number they report is supposed to be 'people who lacked insurance for the entire previous year,' but people tend to answer with their insurance status right now. But why, dear God, oh, why, would you change it in the one year in the entire history of the republic that it is most important for policy makers, researchers and voters to be able to compare the number of uninsured to those in prior years? Delusional NBC News' senior political editor Mark Murray tweets, "Why Obamacare's (un)popularity is probably going to continue: ACA [Affordable Care Act] opponents have sole control over the airwaves..." (Murray has apparently never heard of CBS, ABC, CNN, MSNBC—or even the network that employs him.) [57564, 57565, 57655]

The Tea Party Patriots organization files a lawsuit against the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) in which it demands agency documents about its targeting of conservative groups, including its own. According to DailyCaller.com, "The Tea Party Patriots first requested these documents through a Freedom of Information Act request in December. The group said it has not been granted any documents yet. The suit also is filed against the Treasury Department." (Meanwhile, former IRS official Lois Lerner enjoys her taxpayer-funded retirement in her \$2.4 million home in Bethesda, Maryland.) [57576, 57578]

The Republican National Committee (RNC) also files a lawsuit against the IRS for failing to provide documents relating to conservative non-profit groups that it had requested under the Freedom of Information Act. RNC Chairman Reince Priebus states, "We're filing this suit because the Obama administration has a responsibility to be transparent and accountable to the American people. The IRS has a legal obligation to answer our inquiry for these records. On Tax Day especially Americans deserve to know whether they can trust the agency to which they're sending their taxes." [57601, 57649]

Congressman Blake Farenthold (R-TX) introduces legislation calling for the suspension of pay for any federal official found in contempt of Congress. (The legislation would impact Attorney General Eric Holder if it passes the House and the Senate and if it is signed into law by Obama—which certainly will not happen.) [57666, 57704]

At the leftist Slate.com, Jamelle Bouie makes a pathetic attempt to inject race into the Cliven Bundy cattle ranch issue, writing, "I can't help but wonder how conservatives

would react if these were black farmers—or black anyone—defending 'their' land against federal officials. Would Fox News applaud black militiamen aiming their guns at white bureaucrats?" [57758]

Time.com reports, "The White House says it supports the offensive against separatists in [Ukraine's] eastern provinces, which began Tuesday 25 miles north of Slovyansk and could expand to 10 cities throughout the region." White House press secretary Jay Carney says, "The Ukrainian government has repeatedly sought to negotiate with the armed groups that have seized public buildings and established unauthorized roadblocks in Eastern Ukrainian in an effort to resolve the situation peacefully through dialogue. That said, the Ukrainian government has a responsibility to provide law and order, and these provocations in Eastern Ukraine are creating a situation in which the government has to respond." (Obama offers words, but no military aid to Ukraine. Russian President Vladimir Putin is no doubt pleased. At PJMedia.com Richard Fernandez writes, "[Obama] once again declares he stands ready to support his allies to the limit of his teleprompter.") [57671, 57672]

At NationalReview.com Kevin D. Williamson writes, "A great deal of the discussion about the Cliven Bundy standoff in Nevada has focused on the legal questions... Of course the law is against Cliven Bundy. How could it be otherwise? The law was against Mohandas Gandhi, too, when he was tried for sedition; Mr. Gandhi himself habitually was among the first to acknowledge that fact, refusing to offer a defense in his sedition case and arguing that the judge had no choice but to resign, in protest of the perfectly legal injustice unfolding in his courtroom, or to sentence him to the harshest sentence possible, there being no extenuating circumstances for Mr. Gandhi's intentional violation of the law. Henry David Thoreau was happy to spend his time in jail, knowing that the law was against him, whatever side justice was on. ... But not all dissidents are content to submit to what we, in the Age of Obama, still insist on quaintly calling 'the rule of law.' And there is a price to pay for that, too: King George not only would have been well within his legal rights to hang every one of this nation's seditious Founding Fathers, he would have been duty-bound to do so, the keeping of the civil peace being the first responsibility of the civil authority. ... Perhaps with an understanding that while Mr. Bundy's stand should not be construed as a general template for civic action, it is nonetheless the case that, in measured doses, a little sedition is an excellent thing." In a KSTP-TV poll of registered voters in Minnesota, Obama's approval/disapproval ratings are a dismal 36/54 percent. Although Obama will not be on the ballot in November, ObamaCare-supporting Senator Al Franken (D-MN) will be—and Franken won in 2008 by a mere few hundred votes. (Many believe he stole the election with the help of the improper counting of thousands of absentee ballots. On election night, Franken trailed incumbent Republican Senator Norm Coleman by 725 votes. Throughout a recount, lawyers for the Democrats managed to force the counting of additional votes for Franken, while challenging votes for Coleman. In Florida's 13th Congressional District, Democrat Alex Sink states she will not challenge Congressman David Jolly in November 2014. (Jolly defeated Sink by less than two percentage points in a March special election prompted by the death of veteran Congressman Bill Young. By mid-May, Democrat candidate Ed Jany dropped out of the race but could not be replaced because the May 2 filing deadline had already passed.) [57604, 58703]

At WND.com Jerome Corsi reports that Abongo Malik Obama, Obama's Kenyan half-brother, "will return Friday to the U.S., not to visit the White House as he has done before, but to begin a partnership with a cult leader in Texas who has been compared to David Koresh and Jim Jones. Malik will be in Abilene, Texas, to attend the Peaceful Solution Character Education Convention hosted by known polygamist Yisrayl Hawkins, head of a group called the House of Yahweh, reports Arabic-speaking Islam researcher Walid Shoebat. Among his various predictions as a self-proclaimed prophet, Hawkins has

proclaimed that a 'nuclear baby' born in 2007 will grow up to cause a nuclear holocaust in which one-third of the earth's population will be annihilated. In 2008, Hawkins was prosecuted in Baird, Texas, after being charged with performing polygamous weddings and forcing children as young as 11 to work at his 44-acre compound, the Associated Press reported at the time. ... Shoebat pointed out in a report that Malik has described Hawkins' group as a 'partner organization' in a posting titled 'Impacting people everywhere for meaningful change' on his Barack H. Obama Foundation website." (Although the IRS has done its best to delay or withhold the granting of tax-exempt status to Tea Party organizations, former IRS official Lois Lerner saw to it that Malik Obama's foundation quickly received approval—by conveniently backdating his application. Malik Obama's application was approved for tax-exempt status on June 26, 2011, a Sunday, and was dated retroactive to April 30, 2008.) [356, 360, 628, 831, 1282, 1377, 1679, 1680, 1681, 2197, 2467, 2505, 3528, 5476, 14196, 14766, 15550, 15551, 17282, 22205, 56078, 57615]

NYPost.com reports that the New York City Police Department (NYPD) "has abandoned its controversial and secretive surveillance program that sent plainclothes police officers into Muslim neighborhoods for the purposes of gathering information on possible terrorist plots, officials said. Marking a dramatic change of course for the department, Police Commissioner Bill Bratton agreed to disband the largely inactive Demographics Unit, which was started in 2003 in response to the 9/11 terror attacks. The unit was intended to root out threats by identifying pockets of Islamic radicalization and locations where potential terrorists might gather." Communist mayor Bill de Blasio (previously known as Warren Wilhelm, Jr.) states, "Our administration has promised the people of New York a police force that keeps our city safe, but that is also respectful and fair." (Before the mayoral election, Pamela Geller warned that ending the program would be one of de Blasio's actions. One of her ads read, "He'll endanger New Yorkers by stopping counter-terror surveillance programs." She was right.) [57617, 57618]

The Associated Press reports, "The attorney for the wife of the dead Boston Marathon bombing suspect says a federal grand jury asked her for items that belonged to one of the victims in a triple slaying in a Boston suburb nearly three years ago. Federal prosecutors in Boston revealed in court documents that a friend of bombing suspect Tamerlan Tsarnaev told authorities he and Tsarnaev participated in the killings in the city of Waltham. Tsarnaev was killed in a shootout with police after the bombing. The attorney for Tsarnaev's widow, Katherine Russell ["Karima" Tsarnaev], says a grand jury asked her for items that belonged to Brendan Mess, one of the three people killed in the Waltham triple slaying and a friend of Tsarnaev's. Attorney Amato DeLuca says Russell doesn't have anything that belongs to Mess." (Mess and two other Jews had their throats slit on September 11, 2011. Pamela Geller writes, "Had Obama not scrubbed counterterror materials of all mention of jihad, perhaps Boston law enforcement would have pursued this triple slaying properly. Instead, the case was cold until after the jihad murderers set off coordinated bombings at the Boston Marathon and evidence tied them to the slaughter. If Boston law enforcement had been educated in jihad and had intel agencies followed up on the warnings on the Muslim terrorist Tsarnaevs, the Boston bombing could have been averted." Why Russell has not been charged as an accomplice

in the bombings is not known. It is impossible to believe that she was not aware of his bomb-making activities in their small apartment. Geller notes, "She called her husband, the Boston bomber, just days after the bombing, after seeing the brothers identified on television, and warned him that he was being hunted. Bomb-making residue was found in her kitchen sink, bathtub, and on the kitchen table. The first issue of the al Qaeda online magazine Inspire, which included an article titled 'How to Make a Bomb in the Kitchen of Your Mom,' was found on her computer. And she has made it clear to law enforcement that she will not cooperate.") [56719]

Meanwhile, *The New York Times* whines that the jailed surviving Boston bomber, Dzhokhar Tsarnaev, "cannot mingle, speak or pray with other prisoners. His only visitors are his legal team, a mental health consultant and his immediate family, who apparently have seen him only rarely." Jonathan Zimmerman, a professor of education and history at New York University, argues at Salon.com that Tsarnaev should not get the death penalty, despite having killed three people and injuring more than 250 with his bomb. Zimmerman writes that we "need to guard against our own emotions in sentencing Dzhokhar Tsarnaev. ...[I]f we single him out for death, we will have let our present-day politics get the best of us. While passions of a crowd can be hard to resist, nobody can really know who is evil enough to deserve the ultimate penalty. And that's ultimately why nobody should receive it." [57620, 57621, 57622]

Obama states, "A year ago, tragedy struck at the 117th Boston Marathon. Four innocent people were killed that week, and hundreds more were wounded. Today, we remember Krystle Campbell, Lingzi Lu, Martin Richard, and Sean Collier. And we send our thoughts and prayers to those still struggling to recover. We also know that the most vivid images from that day were not of smoke and chaos, but of compassion, kindness and strength: A man in a cowboy hat helping a wounded stranger out of harm's way; runners embracing loved ones, and each other; an EMT carrying a spectator to safety. Today, we recognize the incredible courage and leadership of so many Bostonians in the wake of unspeakable tragedy. And we offer our deepest gratitude to the courageous firefighters, police officers, medical professionals, runners and spectators who, in an instant, displayed the spirit Boston was built on—perseverance, freedom and love. One year later, we also stand in awe of the men and women who continue to inspire us—learning to stand, walk, dance and run again. With each new step our country is moved by the resilience of a community and a city. And when the sun rises over Boylston Street next Monday—Patriot's Day—hundreds of thousands will come together to show the world the meaning of Boston Strong as a city chooses to run again." (BizPacReview.com notes that Obama's statement "failed to mention the words, 'terror' or 'terrorist,' 'attack' or 'bombing.' Nor did he mention that Islamic extremists carried out the attack leading to four deaths and 26 injured.") [57609, 57623]

Vice President Joe Biden tells a Boston audience, "Let me say, uh, to, uh, to those... survivors [who spoke before Biden], my God, you have survived, you have soared. It was worth, it was worth it. I mean this sincerely, just to hear each of you speak. You are truly, truly inspiring." (Regardless of how well the survivors of the Boston Marathon bombing

survived and coped, it is absurd to suggest that "it was worth it." What Biden thought he was trying to say is not clear—although perhaps even he did not know.) He also says, "We are America, we own the finish line." (What Biden means by that is also not clear. It was the finish line where the bombing took place.) "You have inspired, in this great city, and even though I am not a Boston fan, I love you guys, man. What, what an incredible city. It really is. You are an incredible, Incredible city, and I know politicians are not supposed to say that, that you are not a Red Sox fan, and where I come from if you are Red Sox fan you get the hell kicked out of you. While Biden speaks in Boston, Obama meets with "faith leaders" in the Oval Office "to discuss the importance of taking action to pass commonsense immigration reform." [57670]

Pamela Geller writes, "One year after devout Muslims bombed the Boston Marathon and killed women and children and wounded hundreds, Boston 'paid solemn tribute' today to the victims of the Boston bombing. At Breitbart.com Wynton Hall reports, "A New York woman suffering from a neurological disease that has required four brain surgeries has been dropped by all of her doctors and denied medications due to her Obamacare plan. According to a Fox News poll, "About six in ten American voters think Barack Obama lies to the country on important matters some or most of the time... Thirty-seven percent

think Obama lies 'most of the time,' while another 24 percent say he lies 'some of the time.' Twenty percent of voters say 'only now and then' and 15 percent 'never.' ... The number of voters saying Obama lies 'most of the time' includes 13 percent of Democrats. It also includes 12 percent of blacks, 16 percent of liberals, 31 percent of unmarried women and 34 percent of those under age 30—all key Obama constituencies." [57686, 57687, 57711]

Obama issues a statement criticizing Republicans for "seemingly preferring the status quo of a broken immigration system over meaningful reform." (The statement is a typical, flawed Obama. He presents a false choice of his position, or his distorted description of the other side's position—knowing full well that ill-informed Americans will fall for the ploy.) A few hours later Obama telephones House Majority Leader Eric Cantor (R-VA) to discuss the issue. Cantor later states, "After five years, ... Obama still has not learned how to effectively work with Congress to get things done. You do not attack the very people you hope to engage in a serious dialogue. ...[Obama] called me hours after he issued a partisan statement which attacked me and my fellow House Republicans and which indicated no sincere desire to work together." DailyCaller.com reports, "Cantor reiterated Wednesday that House Republicans do not support the Senate immigration bill that passed last year and other 'amnesty efforts.' 'It will not be considered in the House,' Cantor said of the Democratic plan. 'I also reiterated to [Obama] there are other issues where we can find common ground, build trust and get America working again,' he said. 'I hope [Obama] can stop his partisan messaging, and begin to seriously work with Congress to address the issues facing working middle class Americans that are struggling to make ends meet in this economy." (Cantor's protestations may be nothing more than a "look tough" political performance. He and other establishment Republicans in the House may not support the Senate bill, but they are certainly willing to pass something—and that something will almost certainly outrage conservatives. After the primary elections are over, the GOP establishment may move to pass immigration reform—after it is too late to challenge them.) [57716, 57720, 57794, 57975]

In Oakdale, Pennsylvania, Obama delivers a speech about job skills training. An unconvincing Obama says, "We've spent the past five-and-a-half years fighting back from the worst economic crisis in our lifetimes [and] the good news is our economy is growing again, our businesses are creating jobs." DailyCaller.com later reports that Obama "tried to engage an audience that was cold to him. The 15 community college students who were picked to stand immediately behind [Obama], and in view of the TV cameras, mostly stood stone-faced through his speech. At the end, when [Obama] walked back from the podium to smile and wave at the roughly 60 people in the bleachers 20 feet behind him, he faced a unfriendly wall of faces. The White House video of the bleacher's front rank shows three men with their hands crossed, one with his hands stuck in his pockets and one who let his arms fall by his sides. ...Some of Obama's applause lines fell so flat that no one is heard to respond, not even among the main audience, which was padded with his political supporters. ...At the end, the very loud Bruce Springsteen exit song hid the lack of applause. The clapping was so sparse that the White House's video shows hardly any applause by his supporters and appointees in front of his podium [sic;

lectern]. The video shows how Obama ended his speech quickly, without the emotional buildup that he usually delivers to his younger supporters, and then turned around to face the bleachers that were behind him." (Obama has traditionally counted on high school and college audiences for strong support and clips of cheering students for the evening news broadcasts. That strategy may have worn out its welcome.) At Townhall.com Katie Pavlich writes, "Last week, just thirty miles away in Murrysville, a student went on a mass stabbing rampage at Franklin Regional High School. Twenty people were severely injured in the incident, making it one of the worst mass stabbing events in U.S. history. But despite being close to the scene of the tragic and horrifying event, Obama failed to mention the incident during his nearly 30 minute long remarks. I have a feeling if there had been a recent tragedy that involved a gun at a school near the location of an Obama speech, we'd be hearing all about it. Apparently, 20 people being stabbed isn't politically expedient enough for the White House." [57710, 57775, 57776]

Roy Beck, executive director of NumbersUSA, an anti-amnesty immigration reform group, tells DailyCaller.com, "[Obama] is advocating major new spending for schools and businesses to train Americans for real jobs... but at the same time, he is insisting on passing legislation to immediately and massively increase the number of foreign workers at all skill levels competing for U.S. jobs through lifetime work permits. This push for training appears to be more about giving 2014 voters some sign of interest in jobs [than actually providing any]." Mark Krikorian, the director of the anti-amnesty immigration reform group Center for Immigration Studies, states, "Why would business undertake training for Americans if they're able to just import people who work cheaper instead? I don't doubt that [Obama] believes his malarky about how his own immigration policies will create jobs for the poor... but a lot of people who sell snake oil think it works." [57803]

Despite the new White House ban on "selfies," Vice President Joe Biden tweets a cellphone photo he took of himself and Obama—each with wide grins. (Whether the smiles are the result of April 15 tax receipts cannot be verified.) [57706, 57706]

DailyCaller.com reports, "Tea party groups are fighting back against Comcast's attempted merger with Time Warner Cable, making the tea party one of the only political elements questioning the well-funded lobbying campaign to approve the MSNBC parent company's potential monopoly. 'We urge you to carefully scrutinize the proposed \$45.2 billion merger between Comcast and Time Warner Cable. The proposed merger of our nation's largest and second largest cable providers raises a number of serious public policy questions that must be addressed,' reads a letter sent to the Senate Judiciary Committee... The merger must be approved by the Senate, where Democratic Minnesota Sen. Al Franken is one of the only members fighting against approval. ... 'The politicization of the Justice Department by Attorney General Eric Holder and the Obama Administration is well-documented. And Comcast and Time Warner Cable's enormous lobbying influence and massive political contributions to ... Obama and Democrats are

well-known,' the letter reads. The dominance of a market by a single entity is in most cases contrary to the public's interest because it typically leads to fewer choices, less innovation, and higher costs,' according to the letter. '...The Obama Justice Department previously fast-tracked approval for Comcast's controversial acquisition of NBC Universal (which owns the liberal MSNBC network). What impact will a bigger Comcast have on the diversity of viewpoints in our media?'" [57717]

CNSNews.com reports, "The average price for a kilowatt-hour (KWH) of electricity hit a March record of 13.5 cents, according data released yesterday by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. That was up about 5.5 percent from 12.8 cents per KWH in March 2013. ...If the prevailing trend holds, the average price of a KWH would hit a new record this summer." (The Obama administration's "war on coal" is no doubt partly responsible for the increase. As coal-burning power plants are forced to close, the electricity they had been producing must be generated by plants that are more expensive to operate.) [57718]

AtNationalJournal.com CBS White House correspondent Major Garrett suggests there may be a method to Obama's madness of making obviously false statements: "Allow me to explain. The questioning of Obama's use of a Census Bureau statistic that the median wages of working women in America are 77 percent of median wages earned by men lasted almost all week. The story revved into mini-overdrive when the White House defensively swatted away criticism that salaries on Obama's watch—for which the American Enterprise Institute used the same median wages metric applied by the Census Bureau—showed that women in the president's employ earned 88 cents for every dollar earned by men. All to the delight of a White House desperate to inject the issue into the political bloodstream and amplify otherwise doomed Senate Democratic efforts to make it easier for women to sue and win damages for workplace pay differences. The controversy that played out on front pages, social media, TV, and radio did just that. This is the White House theory of 'Stray Voltage.' It is the brainchild of former White House Senior Adviser David Plouffe, whose methods loom large long after his departure. The theory goes like this: Controversy sparks attention, attention provokes conversation, and conversation embeds previously unknown or marginalized ideas in the public consciousness. This happens, Plouffe theorizes, even when—and sometimes especially when—the White House appears defensive, besieged, or off-guard. I first discovered and wrote about this in July of 2012. It is the political equivalent of 'there is no such thing as bad publicity' or the quote attributed to Mae West (and others):

'I don't care what the newspapers say about me as long as they spell my name right.' The tactic represents one more step in the embrace of cynicism that has characterized ...Obama's journey in office. ...Facts, schmacts. As long as people are talking about an issue where my party has an advantage with voters, it's good. So, the theory goes, if I'm a Republican candidate, I benefit from conversations about budget deficits and spending restraint because voters trust Republicans more on the issue of the budget and spending restraint, and it excites Republican voters who care about those issues. Democrats have several reasons to keep stories about equal-pay equity in the news. It excites their voters, attracts female voters, and crowds out whatever the Republicans wanted to talk about (these days, Obamacare). ...Even if I've overstated the issue, more voters will hear that Democrats are fighting to pay women equally than will hear that the problem is overstated. Even if [The Washington Post's] Ruth Marcus labels the effort 'revolting demagoguery,' it doesn't matter. In fact, equal-pay stories that create more controversy cycles about stories rooted in equal pay are just more opportunities for people to hear the words equal pay. See that? Equal pay." On The O'Reilly Factor, retired Lieutenant Colonel Ralph Peters says, "[T]he problem for the Ukrainian government is they don't want to fire on their own people. So, the special operators, paratroopers, GRU [Russia's intelligence agency, Glavnoye Razvedyvatel'noye Upravleniye] agents that Putin sent in have surrounded themselves with local thugs, a ring of local thugs, and then with a ring of people who are, you know, civilians but sympathize with Russia. The demonstration numbers are small, but these Ukrainian soldiers, young soldiers, don't want to fire on their own people. But, the Russians are perfectly happy to fire on the Ukrainians. The Ukrainians are damned if they do and damned if they don't. If they do open fire that gives Putin an excuse to go in. If they don't open fire, Putin has already got what he wants. I mean, he is—we've watched him as Obama pleads—'Please, Mr. Putin, please talk, let's talk, let's negotiate.' Putin has first taken over administrative buildings in three cities. Now he is up to 11 cities in major towns. He has thugs all over the place and we're pretending that somehow negotiations are going to get Putin out. Well they didn't get him out in Crimea. I think ...Obama really believes... Obama believes you can negotiate with cancer tumors. He is a fool and a weakling and sanctions could have hurt. *Real* sanctions." [57728]

On April 17, NBC *Today* program co-hosts do their best to promote a Clinton political dynasty, saying of Chelsea Clinton, "She is a very, very impressive woman." "She is." "And she'll do whatever she wants to do in life." "There's gotta be a lot of pressure, though, I would imagine, you know, with that sort of legacy that for, you know, children of political figures." "She's lived such a wonderful life and a responsible life, giving to others. I bet that she's gotten used to the pressure." "I think she really wants to help and give back. And I think that's what she wants to do." "Yeah, and it's proof in her actions that's what she's doing." [57783]

Heritage.org describes the absurdity of the Export-Import Bank, through which U.S. taxpayer money is loaned to other countries for the purchase of American-made goods: "Yes, that's right. Let's say Air China wants to purchase some Boeing jets. To encourage

that purchase, America's Export-Import Bank could loan Air China the money. If Air China were to default on the loan, U.S. taxpayers would be left on the hook. Put simply, taxpayers should not be financing this kind of 'bank'—which is 'little more than a fund for corporate welfare,' as candidate Barack Obama described it in 2008. The Ex-Im Bank, as it is called, is scheduled to expire in September—giving Congress an opportunity to end this program and focus on issues that matter to Americans, like lowering taxes and reducing burdens on businesses here at home." Senator Mike Lee (R-UT) states, "Most of the benefits go to large corporations that are perfectly capable of securing private financing anywhere in the world. That is to say, Congress allows Ex-Im Bank to risk taxpayer money unnecessarily to subsidize well-connected private companies. The argument that the Ex-Im loan process "creates American jobs" is faulty. As explained in this author's book, What You Don't Know About Economics Can Hurt You, "Forgotten is the fact that the tax money used for this purpose must first be taken away from the taxpayers. If \$5 billion is given to the nation of Sri Lanka in order that it might buy widgets from a company in New Jersey, that \$5 billion is not being spent by the American consumer on something else. The New Jersey company surely gains (as does the New Jersey Senator who sponsored the foreign aid bill), but the taxpayers are \$5 billion poorer, and other companies throughout the United States lose the \$5 billion in sales they would have enjoyed had the legislation never been passed and the taxes never been collected in the first place. [More people are making widgets, but fewer people are making what would have been bought with that \$5 billion had it not been taken from the taxpayers.] To make matters worse, the \$5 billion loan to Sri Lanka may very likely never be paid back. In other words, the whole plan is in reality a \$5 billion gift from the taxpayers to the employees of the New Jersey widget factory. The widgets could have been dumped in the ocean without affecting the equation. Or the employees could just as easily have been given the \$5 billion directly and told to stay home, eliminating the need to make the widgets in the first place and saving the raw materials and energy consumed in the production process." In Geneva, Switzerland, Secretary of State John Kerry states that Russia has agreed to a preliminary document outlining steps to be taken in Ukraine to possibly de-escalate the situation: "We wanted to find concrete steps, not just words, but concrete steps that could be acted on immediate in order to defuse the situation. All of this, we are convinced, represents a good day's work, but on the other hand, this day's work has produced principles, and it has produced commitments and it has produced words on paper. And we are the first to understand and agree that words on paper will only mean what the actions taken as a result of those words produce." According to ForeignPolicy.com, "The agreement doesn't require Russia to withdraw any of the 80,000 troops it has massed along the Ukrainian border, which have sparked fears of a potential Russian invasion." Kerry "warned that if Moscow doesn't comply with the agreement in the next few days 'we will have no choice but to impose further costs on Russia." (There is no reason for Vladimir Putin not to agree to the document because it demands almost nothing from Russia.) [57780]

While Kerry and Obama may believe Russia can be persuaded to leave Crimea and not also take Ukraine, China sees the situation differently. ChinaTopix.com reports, "China intends to invest in massive projects in Crimea less than a month after the former Ukrainian province was annexed by the Russian Federation. Vladimir Chizhov, Russia's ambassador to the European Union, said Russia is partnering with China in two major Crimean projects: the 'Power of Siberia' gas pipeline and a 25 meter deep Crimean deep water port. These projects will continue despite the ongoing crisis in the Ukraine, Chizhov said. Chizhov described the 'Power of Siberia' gas pipeline as a mega-project that will pump 60 billion cubic meters of gas annually from the Kovykta and Tchayandinskoe gas fields to Russia's far east, where a branch line will deliver 38 billion cubic meters a year to China. ... Chizhov said Russia and China... will continue with plans for Chinese firms to build a 25 meter deep port in Crimea as part of a new transport corridor from Asia to Europe called 'The Economic Belt of the Great Silk Route.'"

Obama takes another ObamaCare victory lap, claiming the number of ObamaCare enrollees has climbed to eight million: "Eight million people, thirty-five percent of people who enroll through the federal market place are under the age of 35. All told, independent experts now estimate that millions of Americans who were uninsured have gained coverage this year. ... [W]e have been having a political fight about this for five years. We need to move on with something else. That is what the people are interested in. I think Democrats should forcefully defend and be proud of the fact that millions of people like the woman I just described who I saw in Pennsylvania yesterday, we are helping, because of something we did. I do not think we should apologize for it. We should not be defensive about it. I think it is a strong, good, right story to tell." Obama's 35 percent figure includes children, who are merely on the policies of their parents and are of course not paying premiums of their own to keep costs down. Only 28 percent of enrollees are ages 18–34, the people Obama needs to help finance the scheme, and how many of those 28 percent are healthy is not known. It has already been reported that ObamaCare enrollees are more likely than others to use expensive specialty drugs. According to a report by pharmacy benefit manager Express Scripts, "More than six in every 1,000 prescriptions in the Exchange plans were for a medication to treat HIV. This proportion is nearly four times higher in Exchange plans than in commercial health plans. ...Obamacare users received 35 percent more pain medication, 27 percent more medication to control seizures, and 14 percent more antidepressants than the privately insured. A sycophantic Politico reporter eagerly throws Obama a bone: "Given all that you were just saying about the Affordable Care Act, do you think it's time for Democrats to start campaigning loudly and positively on the benefits of Obamacare? House Majority Whip Kevin McCarthy (R-CA) responds to Obama's press conference statements, "[Obama] says that Republicans have not accepted ObamaCare as settled law. He is right. Not only will ObamaCare still leave millions uninsured while disrupting health care coverage for millions more, it harms jobs, cuts hours, and limits the individual liberty of each and every American." WeeklyStandard.com reports that widows of retired Madison County, Alabama employees lost their health insurance in January because of ObamaCare. According to WHNT, "The widows who were dropped in January had always been covered under the county's old self-insured health care plan. But officials tell us the program had to be abandoned when they were informed that new regulations in Obamacare would amount to an extra \$25 million dollars per year, money that [county] chairman Dale Strong says the county simply didn't have." In *The Wall Street Journal*, Swedish professor Per Bylund provides some information about his country's socialized health care system—one which a fair number of American leftists point to as a success. Bylund writes, "Sweden's problem is access to care. According to the Euro Health Consumer Index 2013, Swedish patients suffer from inordinately long wait times to get an appointment with a doctor, specialist treatment or even emergency care. For example, Sweden's National Board of Health and Welfare reports that as of 2013, the average wait time (from referral to start of treatment) for 'intermediary and high risk' prostate cancer is 220 days. In the case of lung cancer, the

wait between an appointment with a specialist and a treatment decision is 37 days. This waiting is what economists call rationing—the delay or even failure to provide care due to government budgetary decisions. So the number of people seeking care far outweighs the capabilities of providers, translating into insurance in name but not in practice. This is likely to be a result of ObamaCare as well. Free markets allow companies and entrepreneurs to respond to demand by offering people what they want and need at a better price. The Affordable Care Act does the opposite by centralizing health care, minimizing or prohibiting differentiation in pricing and offerings, and mandating consumers to purchase insurance. It effectively overrides the market and the signals it sends about supply and demand. Stories of people in Sweden suffering stroke, heart failure and other serious medical conditions who were denied or unable to receive urgent care are frequently reported in Swedish media. Recent examples include a one-month-old infant with cerebral hemorrhage for whom no ambulance was made available, and an 80-year-old woman with suspected stroke who had to wait four hours for an ambulance."

NBCChicago.com reports, "An Illinois House committee has advanced a plan to devote \$100 million in state funds to help bring ... Obama's presidential museum and library to Chicago. The committee voted unanimously Thursday following a hearing in Chicago. Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel was among several officials who spoke in favor of the funding. He says the money would return dividends 'well beyond' \$100 million. Emanuel also says the funding would be a fitting way to welcome Obama back to his hometown." But, according to WBEZ.org, "Nine representatives were recorded as voting for the bill, even though there were [only] five lawmakers in attendance at the hearing. That is because Rep. Bob Rita (D-Blue Island), who chairs the Executive Committee, employed a procedural move. Rita used the attendance record from a previous hearing that occurred Wednesday as the vote for the presidential library cash. ... No Republicans attended Thursday's hearing on the presidential library. Rep. Ed Sullivan (R-Mundelein) was marked as voting yes on the measure, even though he did not attend Thursday's hearing and was working at his non-legislative job. He had attended Wednesday's hearing on gambling expansion. Sullivan said he was under the impression Thursday's hearing was only to hear testimony about the presidential library, and no votes would be taken. 'They've broken the trust and I think they've done something illegal,' Sullivan said of the procedural move. 'The legacy of a potential Obama library shouldn't start out as a result of an illegal act. ... It galls me. It literally galls me. I guess it shouldn't gall me. They seem to try and do anything that they want to do in a very sneakily [sic] way." (Emanuel may be right that an Obama library would bring substantial tourism business to Chicago—but that does not justify grabbing an additional \$100 million from the city's already overtaxed residents. Most of those taxpayers, of course, will *not* be the recipients of any revenue a library might attract. If the hotels and restaurants want the library to increase their business, they should put up the \$100 million.) The Clinton and Bush libraries were funded entirely through private donations. Clinton's library cost \$165 million. Obama staffers expect to \$500 million to be spent honoring the community activist. [57837, 57838, 57839, 57850, 57851]

Those views are mostly unchanged since last year." [57738]

"Pundit From Another Planet" posts a satirical story claiming "the FBI announced today that it has uncovered a plot by members of al-Qaeda to sit back and enjoy themselves while the United States collapses of its own accord. 'We vow that we will not cease sitting around and laughing it up until America is reduced to rubble.' Multiple intelligence agencies confirmed that the militant Islamist organization and its numerous affiliates intend to carry out a massive, coordinated plan to stand aside and watch America's increasingly rapid decline, with terrorist operatives across the globe reportedly mobilizing to take it easy, relax, and savor the spectacle as it unfolds. 'We have intercepted electronic communication indicating that al-Qaeda members are actively plotting to stay out of the way while America as we know it gradually crumbles under the weight of its own self-inflicted debt and disrepair,' FBI Deputy Director Mark F. Giuliano told the assembled press corps. 'If this plan succeeds, it will leave behind a nation with a completely dysfunctional economy, collapsing infrastructure, and a catastrophic health crisis afflicting millions across the nation. Also according to the Fox News poll, Hillary Clinton's favorable/unfavorable ratings have fallen to 49/45. Dawn.com reports, "Jamia Hafsa, a religious school for women in the Pakistani capital Islamabad connected to the notorious Lal Masjid has renamed its library in honour of slain al Qaeda leader Osama bin Laden. The seminary is run by controversial hardline cleric Maulana Abdul Aziz, the imam of the city's Lal Masjid (Red Mosque), once infamous as a hideout for hardliners with alleged militant links." (Despite such anti-American sentiments in Pakistan, the country continues to receive financial aid from the United States. Pamela Geller says Pakistan is "One of the top three recipients of US foreign aid" and calls for "Less aid, more drone strikes.") [57747, 57748]

Reuters reports that "Online videos show Syrian rebels using what appear to be U.S. antitank rockets, weapons experts say, the first significant American-built armaments in the country's civil war." (Whether the weapons went to Syria via Benghazi, Libya is not known.) [57749]

CNBC.com reports, "A hotel executive and Democratic fundraiser has pleaded guilty in New York to witness tampering and conspiracy to evade campaign finance laws. Chatwal, whose firm runs hotels around the world, had raised at least \$100,000 for Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton's 2008 presidential campaign against Barack Obama. ... Nguyen said the newly insured patients checked the physicians' lists they were provided and were told they weren't accepting new patients or they did not participate in the plan. And Nguyen says [that] while the free clinic isn't technically supposed to be treating former patents they signed up for insurance, they can't in good faith turn them away. Dr. Kevin Grumbach of UCSF called the phenomenon 'medical homelessness,' where patients are caught adrift in a system woefully short of primary care doctors. 'Insurance coverage is a necessary but not a sufficient condition to assure that people get access to care when they need it,' Grumbach said." At PJMedia.com Rick Moran writes, "Ms. Nguyen has discovered the secret of Big Government. Obamacare is a Potemkin Village, all pretty and enticing on the outside, but look behind it and you find nothing except high deductibles, bad coverage, and bewildering requirements.") [57891, 57892]

Breitbart.com's Mike Flynn reports that the Obama administration is proposing a rule that would "effectively ban" fixed indemnity plans. "Fixed indemnity plans, which pay insured customers a set amount towards medical expenses and are often cost-effective relative to more comprehensive health insurance, are popular forms of coverage, and potentially becoming more popular in the wake of Obamacare. Health insurance industry representatives say that fixed indemnity plans have been attracting more interest as many Americans look for a way to mitigate against the high deductibles applicable to many insurance policies available on the Obamacare exchanges (fixed indemnity plans are not Obamacare-compliant, but they are seen by some consumers as pairing nicely with Obamacare-compliant insurance). But the HHS rule would effectively ban them, overriding regulation that has up until now been the preserve of state governments. The rule would state that these plans can only be sold to consumers where that consumer also purchases Obamacare-compliant insurance." [57903, 58068, 58069]

HotAir.com's Ed Morrissey later writes that if HSS succeeds in outlawing the plans, "That's going to create yet another wave of consumers who will find out the hard way that the Lie of the Year for 2013 ["If you like your plan you can keep your plan"] just keeps on chugging along... The Obama administration wants to keep fixed-benefit plans

available, but not eligible to meet the individual mandate as primary coverage. That would mean that people who have and like these plans now would have to pay premiums for *both*, which is perhaps an implicit admission that deductibles have made health insurance a bad bet for nearly everyone. The kind of consumers most likely to have fixed-benefit plans now, though, are the ones who were least likely to be able to afford the comprehensive insurance now required through ObamaCare. In fact, the insurers tell Vox [Vox.com] that enrollments in such plans have increased *because* of the escalating deductibles in ObamaCare plans, as well as the escalating premium prices. The number of people in these plans are at least in the six figures, if not in the millions, which means yet another major disruption for Americans—probably one that will hit lower-income earners disproportionately." "...Under the proposal, consumers who can afford only fixed indemnity insurance may wind up carrying no insurance at all and simply paying the Obamacare penalty. Consumers could face higher risks of medical cost-related bankruptcy, while a lower number of consumers- especially younger consumers, who may be able to afford fixed indemnity but not an Obamacare-compliant policy-reject entering the insurance marketplace full stop, thus risking driving up insurance costs for existing insured consumers. It could also mean that hospitals and other health care providers have a harder time recouping costs for treatment, as more patients go 'naked,' lacking even the basic coverage that fixed indemnity plans offer, and cause further inflation in health care costs as providers seek to recoup losses from those who can and will pay." (A fixed indemnity plan has no deductible, but it has a fixed payout limit. For example, the premium might be less than \$100 per month but it might have a \$1,000 per year limit for outpatient treatment and a \$2,000 per year limit for hospitalization. Such a plan would be good in combination with a low-premium, high-deductible insurance plan, or as a stand-alone plan if the customer does not expect to incur major expenses. The Obama administration is apparently eager to outlaw the latter choice. Obama does not have the authority to do so under the Affordable Care Act—but he will likely not allow that detail to stand in his way.) [57903]

At NationalReview.com Mark Krikorian warns that plans are afoot to include in the next National Defense Authorization Act language to provide U.S. citizenship to illegal immigrants who join the military. "The number of people who would benefit from such an amnesty is miniscule (and there's already a statutory means of allowing them to enlist), so why," asks Krikorian, "would [Obama] take time out to summon the head of the [American] Legion [to discuss] a tiny, redundant immigration provision? ...Because it's a Trojan Horse—if it's included in the must-pass defense authorization bill when it's sent to the Senate, [Majority Leader] Harry Reid [D-NV] can expand it into a larger amnesty confident in the knowledge that it would have to be passed. I've been told by a Republican House member that the Democrat (and, presumably, 'hellbent' House leadership) plan is to add the entire DREAM Act to the defense bill once it gets to the Senate." HotAir.com comments, "First, the concern of a Trojan Horse here is real, so we'll need to find out if the GOP is smart enough to not allow that door to be cracked open on the NDAA. And second—whether it happens here or in some stand-alone legislation—we'll find out just how far the House is willing to go down this road in the

name of getting their names on *something* with the word immigration on it. But it's going to start yet another revolt among the conservative base if something like the DREAM Act makes it's way through, and this one may start a fire too big for [House Speaker John] Boehner to put out." (Establishment/"RINO" leaders in the House seem eager to pass immigration legislation, either in the mistaken belief that Hispanic voters will magically convert from Democrats to Republicans, or because big business—which funds many of their campaigns—wants an influx of cheap labor from Mexico. Obama signs into law a bill prohibiting U.S. entry by Iran's new ambassador to the United Nations—a member of the group that held Americans hostage for 444 days in 1979–1980. (Unanimous or not, Obama states he will consider the legislation only "advisory" and not the law of the land. Whether he is seeking a confrontation with Congress or is trying to appease "outraged" Iranian leaders is not known, but the latter is more likely, considering Obama's foreign policy history.) LifeNews.com reports, "Pro-life leader James Dobson is the latest to win a victory against the Obama HHS mandate, that forces companies and organizations to pay for birth control and abortion-causing drugs for their employees. Alliance Defending Freedom, the pro-life legal group, helped Dobson and hailed the federal court's order blocking enforcement of the Obama administration's abortion pill mandate against Dr. James Dobson and his 'Family Talk' radio show and ministry in Dobson v. Sebelius." Dobson states, "[I]f we hadn't prevailed, fines amounting to \$800,000 per year would have kicked in. We would have closed our doors." (That may be exactly what supporters of the mandate want: the closing of faith-based institutions that dare to defy "progressivism.") Dobson has stated, "I believe in the rule of law, and it has been my practice since I was in college to respect and honor those in authority over us. It is my desire to do so now. However, this assault on the sanctity of human life takes me where I cannot go. I WILL NOT pay the surcharge for abortion services. The amount of the surcharge is irrelevant. To pay one cent for the killing of babies is egregious to me, and I will do all I can to correct a government that lies to me about its intentions and then tries to coerce my acquiescence with extortion. CNN.com reports that over the last few years "the U.S. State Department has launched social media efforts to engage jihadists and their sympathizers online, contesting their claims with the intention of dissuading potential converts to Islamic extremism." Alberto Fernandez, coordinator of the State Department's Center for Strategic Counterterrorism Communications, states, "We are actually giving al Qaeda the benefit of the doubt

because we are answering their arguments. The way I see it is we are participating in the marketplace of ideas." According to CNN, "A typical exchange occurred recently when a pro-jihadist Twitter user admiringly posted an image of a desecrated Buddha of Bamiyan, one of the monumental statues in Afghanistan destroyed by the Taliban in 2001. The CSCC account tweeted in response: 'Destroying ancient culture out of hatred and backwardness are a feature of al Qaeda's ideology." (The ridiculous project costs taxpayers \$50 million per year for a staff of 50 people, who apparently waste time trolling terrorists and terrorist sympathizers on the Internet, trying to persuade them to give up jihad by calling them "backward." Pamela Geller calls the program's architects "Delusional blowhards who know nothing are driving the bus—right off the cliff. Oh yes, I am sure al Qaeda is impressed with the State Department's knowledge and repartee. The State Department better put down that hookah pipe or whatever it is they're smoking. The CBS affiliate in Las Vegas, Nevada reports, "a woman has been arrested on two felony charges for allegedly using a false identity to register to vote and casting ballots in two elections. ... A complaint filed by the attorney general's office says [Ortencia] Segura registered to vote in Washoe County in August 2008 and provided identification with the name of Marisela Reyna. Authorities confirmed she voted in the 2008 and 2010 elections. Authorities say information from the Justice Department show Segura was arrested in 2012 and deported for filing a false statement on a passport application. They say she also had a false Nevada driver's license, prompting the investigation. ...Segura was arrested Thursday for entering the country illegally." (The Obama administration continues to claim that vote fraud is not a problem and continues to fight state photo ID regulations.) [57867, 57868]

On April 19 Obama's propaganda arm Organizing for Action—which has been blasting Republicans for an alleged "war on women"—sends a Twitter message featuring an image of the late Senator Edward Kennedy. (Whether OFA employees are too young or too ignorant to know that a married and drunken Kennedy's drove off a bridge at Chappaquiddick Island, Massachusetts in July 1969, killing 28-year-old campaign worker Mary Jo Kopechne, is not known.) Businesses offer creditors secured debt when they are struggling to maintain their operations. The assurance that they will get paid back first and in whole if the business declares bankruptcy is what makes lenders more [likely] to make such a risky loan." [57874]

"...For businesses and investors, the process was highly disconcerting. Both need to know that the rule of law will be upheld consistently. It is the only way they can be certain that contracts and agreements mean anything. When they aren't sure the law will recognize their rights, they reduce their activities until certainty returns. When bankruptcy law is undermined, it's particularly troubling. Investing in financially challenged companies is especially risky. Investors need to know how much they stand to lose if the investment does go belly up. By undermining bankruptcy law, the Obama administration made it difficult for investors to gauge whether or not they can absorb such high-risk investments. Five years on, it is clear the uncertainty is not only slowing investments in companies that could go bankrupt. Investors are providing financing to help businesses replace worn-out equipment and conduct other routine functions. But they have not returned to taking on other types of riskier investments needed to restore economic growth to where it should be." Obama's repeated illegal changes to ObamaCare sends a signal "to businesses and investors that ... Obama won't hesitate to overturn the law again whenever it suits his interests. This has perpetuated the uncertainty originally created by the Chrysler bankruptcy, and there is no sign that it will abate any time soon." [57874]

On *Cashin' In*, panel member Wayne Rogers—an actor turned investor—says Obama is "held in high esteem because the media doesn't expose him, that's why. Hoping for a ceremony that focuses on the graduates, not the speaker, high school senior Taylor Gifford began an online petition asking the School Board to reconsider its plans to have Obama speak, according to media reports. ... Obama reportedly plans to talk about the 60th anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court's landmark decision in Brown v. Board of Education that found segregation unconstitutional. ... Students and parents believe that the graduation ceremony should celebrate the graduates, not the Supreme Court." [57826, 57827, 57848, 57859, 57878, 57923, 57963]

To accommodate Mrs. Obama, the school district is consolidating five ceremonies into one. That gives her a bigger audience for fawning news reports, but it actually reduces the number of tickets available for the families of students. Parents—who probably don't want to sit though five times as many names being called to the stage—are understandably crying foul. Tina Hernandez, parent of graduate Dauby Knight, says,

"I'm a single mother who has raised him for 18 years by myself. I've told him education is the only way out. This is one of the biggest days of their lives. They've taken the glory and shine from the children and put it on Mrs. Obama. She doesn't know our kids." (Whether the parents will be more annoyed by having to sit through a Michelle Obama speech or having to sit through the calling of the names of graduates of *five* high schools is subject to dispute.) Kansas is not exactly Democrat territory. Obama lost the state to Mitt Romney in 2012 by 60–38 percent. The Board of Education in the 1954 court case was in Topeka, however—and the White House no doubt wants to mark the anniversary by reminding everyone that Obama and his wife are black and his political opponents are all racists. BizPacReview.com also reports, "A petition calling for the deportation of Canadian pop star Justin Bieber quickly reached the 100,000-signature threshold that requires a reply from the Obama administration. But the White House still declined to address the issue, saying it wanted 'to avoid the appearance of improper influence,' according to its 'We the People' website." Instead of deporting the law-breaking, spoiled teen-ager, the White House responds to the petition by pushing "comprehensive immigration reform": "We're glad you care about immigration issues. Because our current system is broken. Too many employers game the system by hiring undocumented workers, and 11 million people are living in the shadows. That status quo isn't good for our economy or our country. We need common-sense immigration reform to make sure everyone plays by the same set of rules. ...Thanks for your petition. While we weren't able to address your direct concerns about Mr. Bieber, we hope you believe your We the People experience was a positive one." (It is likely that most of the 100,000+ petition signers are not amused by the response.) [57829]

Obama delivers a radio/Internet Easter message: "For me, and for countless other Christians, Holy Week and Easter are times for reflection and renewal. We remember the grace of an awesome God, who loves us so deeply that He gave us his only Son, so that we might live through Him. The common thread of humanity that connects us all—not just Christians and Jews, but Muslims and Hindus and Sikhs—is our shared commitment to love our neighbors as we love ourselves." (Why Obama believes it is necessary to mention other religions on Easter is not clear. When he issues greetings on Jewish and Muslim holidays he does not mention Christianity. Why he believes members of all religions feel they have a "shared commitment to love our neighbors as we love ourselves" is also not clear. That may be a part of Christianity, but Islam instructs Muslims to convert, tax, or kill their non-Muslim neighbors—not treat them as they treat themselves. In fact, the Qur'an states, "O you who believe! do not take the Jews and the Christians for friends; they are friends of each other; and whoever amongst you takes them for a friend, then surely he is one of them; surely Allah does not guide the unjust people.") According to *The Wall Street Journal*, "The U.S. and Saudi Arabia have supplied Syrian rebel groups with a small number of advanced American antitank missiles for the first time in a pilot program that could lead to larger flows of sophisticated weaponry, people

This shift is seen as a test of whether the U.S. can find a trustworthy rebel partner able to keep sophisticated weapons out of the hands of extremists, Saudi and Syrian opposition figures said. The U.S. has long feared that if it does supply advanced arms, the weapons will wind up with radical groups—some tied to al Qaeda—which have set up bases in opposition-held territory. The White House would neither confirm nor deny it had provided the TOW armor-piercing antitank systems, the first significant supply of sophisticated U.S. weapons systems to rebels. But U.S. officials did say they are working to bolster the rebels' ability to fight the regime." (Pamela Geller comments, "Advanced weapons to these devout Muslims waging jihad—nuts, I tell ya. The only people we should be arming are the religious minorities in Syria. The Kurds have established an independent state. Arm them. Protect them." Geller asks the key question: "What is Obama's objective in arming al Qaeda/Muslim Brotherhood opposition in Syria?" If the rebels succeed in overthrowing President Bashar al-Assad, which is unlikely, who or what will replace him? Will a brutal thug simply be followed by more brutal thugs who hate the United States even more?) [57840]

On April 20—probably to the surprise of almost no one—Organizing for Action tweets a Happy Easter message with a photograph of... Obama. [57846, 57847]

Obama and his family make a rare appearance in church, attending an Easter service at the Nineteenth Street Baptist Church in Washington, D.C. According to the White House press pool report, "First family arrived at church through tented entrance at 10:05 am, and sat in second pew in mostly, but not completely filled church. POOL estimates about 250 people celebrating Easter here. [Obama], wearing a light khaki suit, is rocking his head back and forth to the fabulous choir and chewing something. Malia is wearing spring yellow dress, and Sasha, her hand to her chin, appears to be in pale gray or pale blue. ...Pastor Dr. Derrick Harkins ...prompted standing applause in welcoming [Obama]. After calling on everyone to stand, turn and welcome their neighbors—but remain in place—Harkins watched with amusement some collective disobedience. The Obamas greeted each other, and [Obama] turned to shake hands behind him with one of a collection of Secret Service agents in the pews. Then 5 minutes of crowd crush took place in which every smart phone, iPad and baby came forth. [Obama] and Mrs. Obama greeted everyone they could. Obama high-fived a baby boy, hugged and kissed women, and Michelle blew kisses from inside their pew. Pastor Harkins got everyone back in their seats with 'Amens' and... 'Isn't our first family gracious?'" [57869]

"...At 11:05 am, an older gentleman stood up from his seat some distance from [Obama] and raised his arm and yelled, 'God Bless ...Obama!' The worshippers applauded loudly. [Obama] smiled. Pastor Harkins' urged everyone to join in prayer and offered thanks to God for providing comfort to those in need, including the sick and struggling. He asked that God give Obama 'every measure of encouragement' and 'wisdom,' and 'tend to his spirit' under the weight of criticism. Loud 'yes' responses from worshippers after each sentence. [Whether Obama would have more wisdom if he attended church more than once each year cannot be known for certain.] Harkins also offered prayers for Malia and Sasha and the first lady. ...[A]t 11:35, Pastor Harkins moved into his Easter sermon.

Dressed in a striking red robe with black accents, the pastor talked about supporting people 'living in the shadows and the margins,' including 'LGBT' people [and illegal immigrants]. ...[Obama] listened attentively from his seat, with his chin propped on his left hand at times, and his fingers entwined together as the sermon shifted toward a rousing finale. He joined in applause at the end." [57869]

On *Meet the Press*, Congresswoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz (D-FL), chairman of the Democrat National Committee, somehow manages to keep a straight face as she insists politics had *nothing* to do with Obama's latest delay of a decision on the Keystone XL pipeline. It's not the oil that's dirty, it's the politics. Once again, the administration is making a political calculation instead of doing what is right for the country. This certainly is no example of profiles in courage. It's clear the administration needs to grow a set of antlers, or perhaps take a lesson from Popeye and eat some spinach.") Some argue that Obama wants to reject the pipeline but is delaying a decision until after the election in order to help Senate Democrat candidates, but that is nonsensical. The endangered Democrats are in states that voted for Mitt Romney in 2012 and whose voters support the pipeline. Obama's delay arguably works against those Senators, such as Mary Landrieu (D-LA), whose constituents can ask, "If you couldn't even persuade Obama to approve the pipeline, what good are you?" The anti-pipeline Democrats are generally in safe seats, and they would win reelection even if Obama had the courage to make a decision—regardless of what that decision may be. The only remaining logical theory is that Obama wants \$100 million or more in Democrat campaign donations from hedge fund billionaire Tom Stever, who opposes the pipeline and who might not cough up the cash if the project is approved. And let's face it, Obama, whether deservedly or not, does have a—I'll say it crudely—but a manhood problem in the Middle East: Is he tough enough to stand up to somebody like [Syrian President Bashar

The problem is not manhood, or lack thereof, but Obama's naiveté with regard to foreign policy—and even basic human nature. He believes nations should no longer have conflicts simply because it is the 21st century, as if the reasons for those conflicts should miraculously disappear because, in his opinion, he thinks mankind should have outgrown them. He thinks the mere utterance of a few words by him about "red lines" or what is in "Russia's best interests" are sufficient to resolve difficult issues. Obama has led a life in which he was catered to, provided for, and surrounded by people who, by and large, always agreed with him and praised him. He has never learned how to deal with conflict in any manner other than political bullying. He enjoys the applause one receives from being on the "world stage," but has not learned that the job involves more than reading lines.) [57864, 57876, 57893]

Newsmax.com reports, "A proposed federal ban on ivory trading could outlaw the resale of many common objects—including pianos—and is unlikely to reduce the illegal ivory trade, according to a report from the Hoover Institution. 'With all guns blazing, the White House report steps up enforcement at all stages of production and distribution, without once mentioning the competing interests of current property owners of ivory: piano keys, chess sets, ivory pegs and bridges for fancy guitars, dice, tea sets, and thousands of other decorative uses are all caught up in the downwind,' report author Richard A. At NYTimes.com, Peter Baker writes, "The more hawkish faction[s] in the State and Defense departments has grown increasingly frustrated, privately worrying that Mr. Obama has come across as weak and unintentionally sent the message that he has written off Crimea after Russia's annexation. They have pressed for faster and more expansive sanctions, only to wait while memos sit in the White House without action. Mr. Obama has not even imposed sanctions on a list of Russian human-rights violators waiting for approval since last winter." [57930]

WorldTribune.com reports, "The United States is said to have disclosed that Saudi King Abdullah was dying. Diplomatic sources said the [Obama] administration... relayed a photograph that showed Abdullah with a breathing tube, Middle East Newsline reported. The sources said the photograph was taken by White House personnel during Obama's meeting with the Saudi king outside Riyad on March 28. 'The Saudis specifically did not want any photograph that showed Abdullah with the tube,' a source said. 'But there was a

White House photographer that took the picture for what he said was history.' The photograph was said to have been relayed to members of the White House press corps. Within a day, an image of the Saudi king with the breathing tube was sent to the Saudi opposition. 'The photograph was a message by the White House that Abdullah is going down and so is the rest of the family,' the source said." [57861]

At FT.com Edward Luce reviews the worsening relations of the Obama administration with the "BRICS" nations (Brazil, Russia, India, China, and South Africa). Luce notes, "Next month India is likely to elect as its new leader Narendra Modi, who says he has 'no interest in visiting America other than to attend the UN in New York.' As the world's largest democracy, and America's most natural ally among the emerging powers, India's is a troubling weathervane. How on earth did Mr Obama lose the Brics? ... Each of these deteriorating relationships has specific narratives. But there are two larger themes linking them together. First, the world is adjusting to declining US power. ... Second, the US public is tiring of its country's global responsibilities. Mr Obama's real pivot is not to Asia but to America. In this he is only taking his cue from domestic sentiment. Yet his pivot to home is not going too well either. As Lawrence Summers, the former US Treasury secretary, recently observed, the US has two parties, one of which, the Democrats, refuses to endorse any kind of trade deal; the other of which, the Republicans, appears to detest all international institutions. Neither of the two parties listens to what Mr Obama wants. If you believe the television ratings, the US public long ago tuned out from what he says. Little surprise, then, that the Brics are getting into the habit of talking among themselves." [57863]

The economy is so bad that not are people in their 20s moving back in with their parents; so are people in their 50s. According to LATimes.com, "older people are quietly moving in with their parents at twice the rate of their younger counterparts. For seven years through 2012, the number of Californians aged 50 to 64 who live in their parents' homes swelled 67.6% to about 194,000, according to the UCLA Center for Health Policy Research and the Insight Center for Community Economic Development. The jump is almost exclusively the result of financial hardship caused by the recession rather than for other reasons, such as the need to care for aging parents, said Steven P. Wallace, a UCLA professor of public health who crunched the data. ...Long-term unemployment is especially acute for older people. The number of Americans 55 and older who have been out of work for a year or more was 617,000 at the end of December, a fivefold jump from the end of 2007 when the recession hit, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics." In addition to older Americans moving back in with their parents, increasing numbers of them are finding only part-time employment. NBCNews.com reports, "With full-time work hard to find, these workers have built temping into a de facto career, minus vacation, sick days or insurance. The assignments might be temporary—a few months here, a year there—but labor economists warn that companies' growing hunger for a workforce they can switch on and off could do permanent damage to these workers' career trajectories and retirement plans. ... Economists say it's typical for temporary

hiring to rise initially as the economy recovers, before businesses are ready to commit to hiring full-time employees. But Susan Houseman, senior economist at Upjohn Institute for Employment Research, said the current pattern doesn't fit historic norms. 'Right now we're seeing something interesting,' she said. 'We've seen it surpass its previous highs, so it looks like there could be a structural shift going on, too. There's a reason to believe we might see some increase in the use of temporary help in general.'" (Surprisingly, the article does not mention the names Affordable Care Act or ObamaCare, even though the health care legislation is clearly a factor in the increased use of temporary workers—because health insurance does not have to be provided to part-time workers who work fewer than 30 hours per week.) They used to work with me on stories and tried to help me produce my stories... And I was certainly friendly with them as anybody, good information can come from any source. But when I persisted with [Operation] Fast and Furious and some of the green energy stories I was doing, I clearly at some point became a target, that they—you know, I don't know if someone paid them to do it or if they took it on their own." (In response to Attkisson's charges, CBS issues a statement claiming it "maintains the highest journalistic standards in what it chooses to put on the air. Those standards are applied without fear or favor." "Aside from the Bundy family, all other ranchers will likely be punished by the feds via enhanced regulatory interventions in response to the actions on display in Nevada. This is common fare as a mechanism to teach the public to not mimic others who are standing up for themselves. USFS and BLM staff will be told at the headquarters level to crack down on ranchers in general and to give no quarter when dealing with 'grazing permits' and 'grazing fees.' He's a veteran at cleaning up ethics messes for politicians, most notably Bill Clinton, whom he aided during the Whitewater probes and the Monica Lewinsky affair, double entendre intended. But that's not nearly all. He represented Rahm Emanuel during the scandal surrounding former Illinois Gov. Rod Blagojevich, as well as Sen. Kent Conrad (D-ND) and George W. Under the law, Sebelius and her family may be eligible to continue these FEHB benefits. To qualify for this, federal workers must retire from the federal government at the age of 55 or older and have served at least five consecutive years in the federal government." (This revelation also explains why Obama probably did not fire Sebelius. They likely agreed to a termination date just after the five-year point. Sebelius should have been fired as soon as it was obvious Healthcare.gov was a disaster. Obama is therefore responsible for shamelessly wasting tens of thousands of taxpayer dollars by protecting her until the magic five-year point.) [57924]

The use of Obamacare navigators and the Healthcare.gov web site should come with consumer warnings. The Obama administration's illegal secrecy about these Obamacare navigators should make Americans very nervous." Pavlich: "It has also been documented that people formerly part of ACORN, a group that was stripped of its federal funding in 2009 for alleged illegal activity like promoting underage prostitution and tax fraud, have been brought in to run Obamacare navigator programs. Further, government officials on both sides of the political aisle have learned about the potential for fraud and criminal activity in the navigator program." [57917]

Obama's "red line"—and statements that "Assad must go"—notwithstanding, Secretary of State John Kerry claims the Syrian regime has launched two chemical weapons attacks. Great Britain, France, and Israel support the claim. [57918, 57919, 57971]

For an unknown reason the White House releases a photograph of Obama and someone dressed in an Easter Bunny costume looking at the Washington Monument. [57920]

Obama begins a week-long "pivot to Asia" trip, visiting Japan, South Korea, Malaysia, and the Philippines. (China is not on the agenda.) *The Economist* writes, "It is [Obama's] chance to reassert America's military and economic commitment to three treaty allies, one prospective 'strategic partner' (Malaysia) and to the region as a whole, as it struggles with the implications of China's rapid rise. That reassurance is needed all the more after America's failure to intervene in Syria and, especially, its failure to contain Russian expansionism in Ukraine. Both episodes feed into a perception of a declining American appetite for keeping the peace, and of a declining ability to do so. Countries such as Japan and the Philippines, facing an assertive Chinese approach to disputed territory, are naturally concerned. If America will do so little for Ukraine, will it risk lives and treasure for uninhabited rocks in the East or South China Sea?" (Obama's stop in Malaysia will include a trip to the Masjid Negara mosque; he will honor Islam by visiting a mosque built on the site of a Christian church that was appropriated by the Malaysian government. [57929, 57941, 58042]

The *Daily Mail* points out that Obama is beginning his overseas jaunt on "Earth Day," "with a carbon-emitting extravaganza, spending more than 15 hours on Air Force One and 15 minutes aboard the Marine One helicopter. Not including his motorcades in Oso, Washington, the site of a recent devastating mudslide, his trip will consume an estimated 35,565 gallons of fuel. According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, the statistics arm of the Department of Energy, burning each gallon emits 21.1 pounds of carbon dioxide, bringing [Obama's] Earth Day carbon footprint to more than 375.7 tons. The White House did not respond to a question about any measures it might be taking—planting trees, for instance—to offset those emissions." [57942]

In a 6–2 ruling the Supreme Court upholds a voter-approved Michigan constitutional amendment banning race-based (or gender-based) preferences in public education, hiring, and contracting decisions. (Justice Elena Kagan recused herself from the decision because she dealt with the lawsuit as Obama's Solicitor General.) In Schuette v. Coalition to Defend Affirmative Action, Justice Anthony M. Kennedy writes, "This case is not about how the debate about racial preferences should be resolved. It is about who may resolve it. There is no authority in the Constitution of the United States or in this Court's precedents for the Judiciary to set aside Michigan laws that commit this policy determination to the voters." Justices Sonia "La Raza" Sotomayor and Ruth Bader Ginsberg are the dissenting votes. Sotomayor states that the ruling "eviscerates an important strand of our equal protection jurisprudence." (Sotomayor apparently does not understand what "equal protection" means. It certainly does not mean giving preferential treatment to someone because of his or her race.) In his concurring opinion, Justice Antonin Scalia calls it "doubly shameful to equate 'the majority' behind [the constitutional amendment] with 'the majority' responsible for Jim Crow." (This is a rebuke of Sotomayor, who claimed that Michigan voters who supported the amendment were motivated by racism—as if that is the only explanation for opposing affirmative action.) Leftists, unable to comprehend that ending discrimination can be achieved only by actually *ending* discrimination, go ballistic over the court ruling. On Twitter, Justice Clarence is predictably labeled an "Uncle Tom" by liberal racists. One calls him "the worst negro in history." [57932, 57943, 57946, 57952, 57953, 57968, 57970]

Sotomayor essentially argues that no race preference legislation should ever be rescinded. She ignores the fact members of minorities other than blacks and Hispanics, such as Asian-Americans, are harmed by the racial preferences she supports. Qualified Asian-American students with excellent grades and high test scores are, for example, often denied admission to a universities because the institutions are forced to "fill seats" with blacks and Hispanics—even if their grades and test scores are lower. Sotomayor states, "[T]he Michigan amendment at issue in this case changed the rules of the political process to the disadvantage of minority members of our society." She should be asked why treating people equally is a "disadvantage" to members of minorities. Does she mean that blacks and Hispanics cannot compete effectively when they are treated equally? If that is not her argument and not the case, then they are not at a disadvantage. The words "race matters" are peppered throughout Sotomayor's opinion, which, to many, might seem like an odd way to argue that one's race should not matter. (Someone should remind Sotomayor that if race did not matter she would probably not be a Supreme Court Justice.) [57962, 57966, 57984]

NationalReview.com writes, "There's a reason they call it 'progressivism'—for years, the main legal question contested in affirmative-action cases, from [court cases] *Bakke* to *Grutter*, was whether the state should be allowed to engage in racial discrimination. In the Michigan affirmative-action case decided today, *Schuette v. Coalition to Defend Affirmative Action*, the question was whether the state should be required to engage in racial discrimination. The progress, then, has followed the Left's familiar ratchet-effect model, inching its way from 'not forbidden' to 'compulsory.' ... The Court came to the correct conclusion, but both Justice Anthony Kennedy's opinion and Justice Sonia

Sotomayor's dissent suggest very strongly that there is trouble afoot on our highest bench. In a perfectly Orwellian dissenting opinion, which she read dramatically from the bench, Justice Sotomayor argued that the decision of the people of Michigan to end racial discrimination is itself an instance of racial discrimination and that the only way to mitigate such racial discrimination is through the mandatory maintenance of racial discrimination. In this opinion she was joined by Justice Ginsburg, with Justice Kagan recusing herself from the case. Justice Sotomayor argued that Michigan's Proposal 2, which mandates race-neutral state policies, is the sort of legislation used to 'oppress minority groups.' By outlawing racial discrimination, she argued, 'a majority of the Michigan electorate changed the basic rules of the political process in that State in a manner that uniquely disadvantaged racial minorities.' Justice Sotomayor is here arguing in effect that if a constitutional referendum doesn't go the NAACP's way, then its effects are invalid. ... Her opinion is legally illiterate and logically indefensible, and the stillyoung career of this self-described 'wise Latina' on the Supreme Court already offers a case study in the moral and legal corrosion that inevitably results from elevating ethnicidentity politics over the law. Justice Sotomayor has revealed herself as a naked and bareknuckled political activist with barely even a pretense of attending to the law, and the years she has left to subvert the law will be a generation-long reminder of the violence the Obama administration has done to our constitutional order. ... The Court came to the right decision, but its fractured conclusions and the rigorous political activism of its left wing are alarming." [58014, 58015]

In Kiev, Ukraine, Vice President Joe Biden says, "Ukraine is and must remain one country. No nation has the right to simply grab land from another nation. CNSNews.com reports, "Tens of thousands of immigrants who are in the U.S. illegally but don't have serious criminal records could be shielded from deportation under a policy change being weighed by Homeland Security Secretary Jeh Johnson. The change, if adopted following a review ordered by ...Obama, could limit removals of people who have little or no criminal record but have committed repeat immigration violations such as re-entering the country illegally after having been deported, or failing to comply with a deportation order." The Associated Press reports, "The Internal Revenue Service has paid more than \$2.8 million in bonuses to employees with recent disciplinary problems, including \$1 million to workers who owed back taxes, a government investigator said Tuesday. More than 2,800 workers got bonuses despite facing a disciplinary action in the previous year, including 1,150 who owed back taxes, said a report by J. Russell George, the Treasury inspector general for tax administration. The bonuses were awarded from October 2010 through December 2012." [57945, 57960, 57967]

At Breitbart.com John Flynn writes, "A new Fox News poll goes a long way to explaining the growing anxiety among Democrats about the upcoming midterm elections.

Not only is support for Obama and his signature Obamacare law underwater, both are more unpopular than they were at this point ahead of the mid-term elections in 2010. Support for the Democrats and Obamacare, in fact, is less than it was on the eve of the 2010 election, when Republicans routed Democrats up and down the ballot. Today, just 42% of voters approve of the job Obama is doing... while 51% disapprove. Among Independents, Obama fares worse, with just 32% approving of his performance and 62% disapproving. In late April, 2010, however, voter approval of Obama was split, 46-46. Obama's approval ratings today almost match those in late October 2010 when 41% of voters approved and 50% disapproved. In this latest poll, Republicans lead the generic Congressional ballot by 3 points, 44-41. This is roughly were the party stood in April 2010, with the GOP leading Democrats 42-38. In fact, the Republican party is more popular today than it was four years ago. Today, voters split on approval of the GOP, 45-45. In April, 2010, however, only 40% of voters approved of the GOP against 50% who disapproved. This represents a 10-point swing towards the Republican party. Among Independents, the Republicans enjoy an 8-point advantage over Democrats." The poll also shows that independent voters, by 54-to-29 percent, prefer the candidate who opposes ObamaCare if that is the only difference between the candidates. [57977, 57983]

FoxNews.com reports, "Texas officials are raising alarm that the Bureau of Land Management, on the heels of its dust-up with Nevada rancher Cliven Bundy, might be eyeing a massive land grab in northern Texas. The under-the-radar issue has caught the attention of Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott, who fired off a letter on Tuesday to BLM Director Neil Kornze saying the agency 'appears to be threatening' the private property rights of 'hard-working Texans.' 'Decisions of this magnitude must not be made inside a bureaucratic black box,' wrote Abbott, also a Republican gubernatorial candidate. At issue are thousands of acres of land on the Texas side of the Red River, along the border between Texas and Oklahoma. Officials recently have raised concern that the BLM might be looking at claiming 90,000 acres of land as part of the public domain." [57947, 57948]

The *Daily Mail* reports, "The Citizens Commission on Benghazi, a self-selected group of former top military officers, CIA insiders and think-tankers, declared Tuesday in Washington that a seven-month review of the deadly 2012 terrorist attack has determined that it could have been prevented—if the U.S. hadn't been helping to arm al-Qaeda militias throughout Libya a year earlier. 'The United States switched sides in the war on terror with what we did in Libya, knowingly facilitating the provision of weapons to known al-Qaeda militias and figures,' Clare Lopez, a member of the commission and a former CIA officer, told MailOnline. She blamed the Obama administration for failing to stop half of a \$1 billion United Arab Emirates arms shipment from reaching al-Qaeda-linked militants. 'Remember, these weapons that came into Benghazi were permitted to enter by our armed forces who were blockading the approaches from air and sea,' Lopez claimed. 'They were permitted to come in. ...[They] knew these weapons were coming in, and that was allowed... The intelligence community was part of that, the Department of State was part of that, and certainly that means that the top leadership of the United States, our national security leadership, and potentially Congress—if they were briefed

on this—also knew about this.' The weapons were intended for Gaddafi but allowed by the U.S. to flow to his Islamist opposition." [57949, 57950, 57951]

At PJMedia.com Bryan Preston adds, "The commission also says that Islamists attacked the US facility in Benghazi on September 11, 2012, not intending to kill US Ambassador Christopher Steven, but to kidnap him. The attackers intended to grab him and use him to bargain for the release of 'Blind Sheikh' Omar Abdul Rahman, the mastermind of the 1993 attack on the World Trade Center in New York. There is evidence to back up that claim. In the days prior to the attack in Benghazi, unrest rose up in Cairo, Egypt. While the US embassy in Cairo blamed the uprising on a YouTube movie, the real driver behind it was a coalition of Islamist groups. Those groups were not protesting a movie at all. According to the warning they published in Egyptian media, they had a specific demand: 'The group, which consists of many members from al-Qaeda ...threatened to burn the U.S. Embassy in Cairo with those in it, and taking hostage those who remain [alive], unless the Blind Sheikh is immediately released.' ... The Obama administration insists that no US forces could have responded to the assault in Benghazi in time to save the Americans there. The commission says that that is untrue. [Commission member, Admiral James] Lyons also said U.S. claims that it lacked the resources to mount a counterattack in time to save lives is false. 'I'm going to tell you that's not true,' he said. 'We had a 130-man unit of forces at Sigonella [AFB in Italy]. They were ready to go. The flight time from Sigonella to Benghazi is roughly an hour.' Perhaps most explosively, the commission alleges that the Obama administration's attempt to blame the attack on a YouTube movie was coordinated with the Muslim Brotherhood, which was coordinating Islamist action in Egypt and Libya. The commission wants a congressional select committee appointed to investigate the Benghazi attack." [57949, 57950, 57951, 57994]

The Department of Defense announces it is sending 600 U.S. troops to Poland, Estonia, Lithuania, and Latvia for bilateral military exercises. Navy Rear Admiral John Kirby states, "Any time you put troops on the ground and doing exercises, in this case for a month at a time, it's more than symbology [sic; symbolism]. ... The kind of work that we're going to be doing is real infantry training—and that's not insignificant. ... Since Russia's aggression in Ukraine, we have been constantly looking at ways to reassure our allies and partners. These exercises were conceived and added on to the... exercise regimen as a result of what's going on in Ukraine. ... If there's a message to Moscow, it is the same exact message: that we take our obligations very, very seriously on the continent of Europe." According to CNSNews.com, "The troops are from the U.S. Army's 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team, based in Italy." [57974, 57976]

On *Special Report*, columnist Charles Krauthammer says of the Supreme Court decision in *Schuette v. Coalition to Defend Affirmative Action*, "The left is trying to institutionalize affirmative action, to make it impossible for any legislature or any referendum ever to abolish it, ever in the history of the country. Essentially to say that it's an intrinsic part of the Constitution, racial preferences are here forever—an outrageous proposition that was rejected by the court. And it said, 'We're not going to rule that it's

intrinsically in the Constitution, just as 11 years ago we didn't want to rule that it's not allowed. We leave the decision of affirmative action up to the people,' which is exactly the way you want to do it in a diverse democracy with a troubled history. Let each region, let each state decide on its own, exactly as what was happening with abortion until the Court stepped in and prevented the evolution. What happened today on affirmative action is a towering decision that will allow now a stable settlement, as the country—very complex and diverse—works it out state by state. Exactly as you want to do it in a democracy." Panelist Stephen Hayes comments on Justice Sonia Sotomayor's dissent: "This was a decision written by somebody who was writing about emotion. It was ...Obama's 'empathy standard'—that's what he was looking for when he nominated her, that's what I think he got. But in terms of what she argued, it was intellectual hogwash." On April 23 NBCNews.com reports, "Police armed with truncheons, shields and a fire hose clashed with more than 100 left-wing activists who rallied at the U.S. Embassy in Manila on Wednesday to oppose a visit by ... Obama and an expected security pact that would increase the American military presence in the Philippines. Some of the protesters carried paper U.S. flags with the message: 'Obama not welcome.' Obama, who landed in Japan on Wednesday, is due to visit South Korea, Malaysia and the Philippines over the next five days as part of a wider attempt to 'rebalance' and 'pivot' toward Asia." [57973]

The liberal behemoth Media Matters is also a tax-exempt 501(c)(3) organization. It claims on its website to be a 'progressive research and information center dedicated to comprehensively monitoring, analyzing, and correcting conservative misinformation in the U.S. media.' Media Matters operates freely as a tax-exempt organization without any apparent interference from the IRS, while its website has literally thousands of highly partisan political articles on public display, virtually all of them advocating extremely liberal positions. The IRS said it revoked Patrick Henry's tax-exempt status because it 'has shown a pattern of deliberate and consistent intervention in political campaigns' and made 'repeated statements supporting or opposing various candidates by expressing its opinion of the respective candidate's character and qualifications.' However, even a cursory review reveals that Media Matters has for years published countless articles that blatantly attempt 'intervention in political campaigns' and support or oppose candidates. ... WND discovered Media Matters apparently in bed with the Obama administration in its efforts to deceive Americans about Obamacare. In November 2013, Media Matters funded the group that reportedly crafted ... Obama's false claim that Americans can maintain their 'choice' of doctors and insurance plans. The little-known Herndon Alliance has been behind the marketing of Obamacare since the inception of the legislation." [57991]

WND.com also repots that Obama is a sending a three-person delegation of abortion supporters to the Vatican to represent the United States during canonization ceremonies for Pope John Paul XXIII and Pope John Paul II. [57992]

The terrorist group Hamas, which controls the Gaza Strip, and Fatah, the Palestinian political party of the West Bank, come together and announce they will form a unity government. According to FreeBeacon.com, ports, "A top Hamas official said that the newly announced Palestinian unity government 'will not recognize 'Israel' and will not give up the resistance,' throwing into jeopardy the new ruling government's access to U.S. assistance and other measures. ... The move tossed another wrench into the fledgling peace talks between Israel and the Palestinians and prompted sharp responses from U.S. officials. Events took another surprising turn this afternoon when top Hamas official Hassan Yousef announced that the terror group would not renounce its commitment to violence and the destruction of Israel, according to Palestinian groups monitoring the situation. ... Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu reacted to the news with skepticism. 'The Palestinian Authority, which just yesterday spoke about its dissolution, is now talking about reconciling with Hamas,' Netanyahu was quoted as saying. 'They should decide what they want—dissolution to reconciliation? They should let us know when they want peace, because we want a true peace. ... Does he [Palestinian Authority president Mahmoud Abbas] want peace with Hamas or peace with Israel? You can have one but not the other. I hope he chooses peace, so far he hasn't done so." [58043, 58044, 58072]

State Department spokesman Jennifer Psaki tells reporters, "A great deal of effort has gone into building Palestinian institutions by Palestinians as well as the international

community, and it would certainly not be in the interests of the Palestinian people for all of that to be lost. ... The United States has put millions of dollars into this effort. It would obviously have very serious implications for our relationship, including our assistance going forward." (In other words, "Secretary of State John Kerry is not going to get a Nobel Peace Prize and Obama will still not have earned his.") Congresswoman Ileana Ros-Lehtinen (R-FL) states, "The administration must halt aid to the Palestinian Authority... U.S. law is clear on the prohibition of U.S. assistance to a unity Palestinian government that includes Hamas, a designated Foreign Terrorist Organization, and ... Obama must not allow one cent of American taxpayer money to help fund this terrorist group." [58043, 58044, 58072]

Meanwhile, Muslims attack Jewish visitors at Jerusalem's Temple Mount, hurling objects at them and terrifying children. According to IsraelNationalNews.com, "The Temple Movement blamed police for failing to disperse the Muslim attackers. 'It's a miracle no one was hurt,' said a movement statement. Despite its importance as Judaism's holiest site, Jews are forbidden from praying on the Temple Mount in order not to 'provoke' Muslim worshippers at the Al Aqsa Mosque Islamic complex, which is built on top of the ruins of the ancient Jewish Temples. Those Jews who break the rules against praying are often arrested and banned from visiting. But as in this case, even Jewish visitors who are not praying are sometimes subjected to abuse, threats and violence at the hands of Muslim worshippers." [58045, 58046]

Breitbart.com's Tony Lee reports, "Conservative Oklahoma Senate candidate T.W. (Tahrohon Wayne) Shannon has opened up a 10-point lead after trailing Rep. James Lankford (R-OK) by 35 points just two months ago in the race to replace retiring Sen. Tom Coburn (R-OK). That represents a net swing of 45 points in Shannon's favor. After former Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin endorsed Shannon, he closed that 35-point deficit to single digits in a poll taken four days later. Since then, prominent conservatives like Sens. Mike Lee (R-UT) and Ted Cruz (R-TX), along with the Senate Conservatives Fund and conservative talk radio host Mark Levin, have endorsed him. Palin will headline a rally along with Cruz and Lee for Shannon on April 24 in Tulsa, Oklahoma. The poll found that Shannon leads Lankford 42% to 32%, and 63% of Oklahomans view Shannon, arguably the most conservative Speaker in the history of the nation's reddest state, favorably, as opposed to 6% that view him unfavorably. In February, 30% of Oklahomans viewed Shannon favorably while 4% did not." (Shannon happens to be black. If he is elected, the GOP will have two black Senators—Shannon and Tim Scott of South Carolina. The Democrats have one: Cory Booker of New Jersey.) [58025, 58037, 58124]

DailyCaller.com reports, "General Electric is telling its investors that Obamacare is to blame for recent losses in the company's health care division... 'Hospitals and clinics appear to be delaying purchases and responses to the ACA [Affordable Care Act],' stated GE senior vice president and CFO Jeffrey S. Bornstein in the company's first-quarter earnings call. ... The company's health care unit, which produces medical and

biopharmaceutical technologies and which grew in 2013, showed losses in revenues, segment profits, margins and orders in the first quarter of 2014." [58011]

This means the next time you visit the website, you'll need to create a new password. We strongly recommend you create a unique password—not one that you've already used on other websites."

While many liberals continue to claim that vote fraud hardly exists, Watchdog.org reports, "A crosscheck of voter rolls in Virginia and Maryland turned up 44,000 people registered in both states, a vote-integrity group reported Wednesday. And that's just the beginning. 'The Virginia Voters Alliance [VVA] is investigating how to identify voters who are registered and vote in Virginia but live in the states that surround us,' Alliance President Reagan George told the State Board of Elections [SBE]. George acknowledged that the number of voters who actually cast multiple ballots is relatively small. In the case of Maryland and Virginia, he revealed that 164 people voted in both states during the 2012 election. But George said his group will expand their search for duplicate voters in the District of Columbia, Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, North Carolina, Tennessee, West Virginia and Georgia. ... VVA [also] identified 31,000 dead voters via the Social Security Administration's Death Master File. Subsequent processing by SBE found 40,000 to 60,000 dead voter registrations. 'Dead voter registrations are prime targets for voter fraud which generate few complaints,' George noted." [57997, 58089]

On *Special Report* columnist Charles Krauthammer comments on Obama's disregard for the law: "It's not just his negligence in executing his job, he's being unconstitutional. And if it becomes a habit—which it's becoming, and that's the problem—it's going to establish a principle that a Republican will come into office and he'll say, 'I campaigned against capital gains taxes, so I'm going to order the FBI [sic; IRS] not to collect it.' That's not how you—if that were to happen, you could be sure that the liberals would be screaming... but that's the point. One of the doctors has been identified as Dr. Jerry Umanos, who practiced pediatric medicine at Lawndale Christian Health Center in Chicago, officials from the center said. Dalil said an American nurse also was wounded in the attack. ... The alleged attacker was a member of the Afghan Public Protection Force assigned to guard the hospital, according to District Police Chief Hafiz Khan. He said the man's motive was not yet clear." (It has become increasingly dangerous for American civilians in Afghanistan as U.S. troop presence on the battlefield is diminished in preparation for their withdrawal. With fewer Americans to kill on the battlefield, the radical Islamists target poorly-protected American civilians. That is partly the result of Obama having publicly announced a withdrawal date.) CNN's Jake Tapper reports, "For the sixth year in a row, ... Obama has broken his promise to the Armenian community, made when seeking their votes as a senator and a presidential candidate, to use the word 'genocide' to describe the massacre of an estimated 1.5 million Armenians [as well as 750,000 Assyrians and 500,000 Greeks] at the hands of the Ottoman Empire a century ago. He did this in deference to the government of Turkey, which—historical revisionism aside—the Obama administration regards as a more crucial ally. 'It's a sad spectacle to see [Obama], who came into office having promised to recognize the Armenian Genocide, reduced to enforcing a foreign government's gag-rule on what our country can say about a genocide so very thoroughly documented in our own nation's archives,' Armenian National Committee of America executive director Aram Hamparian said in a statement. 'I have consistently stated my own view of what occurred in 1915, and my view has not changed,' Obama said in a statement that avoided use of the 'g' word. ... 'The facts are undeniable,' Obama said [in 2006], though today he denied them." (Obama, who is not afraid to say there has been "genocide against the Palestinian people by [the] Israelis," is afraid to say Turkish Muslims were guilty of the mass murder of Christians in 1915. Similarly, in 2008 the vote-seeking Obama said, "I will make ending the genocide in Darfur a priority from day one." He did not. In 1994, Bill Clinton did nothing to prevent the Rwanda genocide partly because of the reluctance of advisor Susan Rice, who also thwarted offers of Sudan to turn over Osama bin Laden. Obama has done little but refer to the genocide as the "terrible events of 1915" and call the innocent victims nothing more than casualties of war.) While taking the action Thursday, commissioners said they were horrified and disgusted to learn that Covanta Marion was burning abortion waste to generate electricity. Commissioners Sam Brentano and Janet Carlson made the decision at an emergency hearing." (The AP adds, "Both strongly oppose abortion rights"—as if incinerating a fetus is not in and of itself something to which civilized people might object.) [58001, 58002, 58389]

A Quinnipiac poll of registered voters in Colorado shows Senator Mark Udall (D-CO) and Congressman Cory Gardner (R-CO), who is challenging Udall for his Senate seat, in a dead heat—with Udall ahead by a mere one percentage point, 45–44. For those polled, the economy, jobs, and health care as the most important issues. Colorado voters oppose ObamaCare (which Udall voted for) 59–37 percent. Udall leads among women, 52–35 percent, which means he will probably be pounding the "GOP is anti-woman" theme as much as he can. Only 40 percent of those polled believe Udall should be reelected; 46 percent believe he should not. Obama's approval/disapproval ratings in Colorado are 38/57 percent. Internal e-mails obtained by CNN show that top management at the VA hospital in Arizona knew about the practice and even defended it. Dr. Sam Foote just retired after spending 24 years with the VA system in Phoenix. The veteran doctor told CNN in an exclusive interview that the Phoenix VA works off two lists for patient appointments: There's an 'official' list that's shared with officials in Washington and shows the VA has been providing timely appointments, which Foote calls a sham list. And then there's the real list that's hidden from outsiders, where wait times can last more than a year." Veterans' names would be kept on a secret list, and as appointments became available some names would be added to the "official" list—as if the veteran had just walked in and requested to be seen by a physician. The scam process made it appear as though veterans did not wait more than 14 days—when in fact they may have waited months to be added to the official list. "Foote estimates right now the number of veterans waiting on the 'secret list' to see a primary care physician is somewhere between 1,400 and 1,600. 'I feel very sorry for the people who work at the Phoenix VA,' said Foote. 'They're all frustrated. They're all upset. They all wish they could leave 'cause they know what they're doing is wrong. But they have families, they have mortgages and if they speak out or say anything to anybody about it, they will be fired and they know that." [58006, 58049]

DailyCaller.com reports, "Climate scientists skeptical of claims that man-made greenhouse gas emissions are warming the planet gathered in Germany this month for a major, now sold-out climate conference, which the [mainstream] media has opted not to cover. In early April, the European Institute for Climate and Energy (EIKE) hosted its seventh Climate Conference in Mannheim, Germany. The two-day conference featured prominent climate scientists including Dr. Richard Lindzen of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, physicist Nir Shaviv of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and physicist Henrik Svensmark of the Danish National Space Institute. The large conference room where the event took place was big enough to hold 100 people, according to EIKE, but 130 climate experts from various fields packed the room full. EIKE reports that none of the three local German media outlets it invited to the event bothered to show up, and chances are that major U.S. media outlets were too busy covering the release of the United Nations' major climate report to report on this gathering of skeptics." AFP reports, "Russia ordered new military exercises on the border of Ukraine Thursday and warned of 'consequences' after Kiev launched a deadly assault against pro-Kremlin rebels occupying the flashpoint town of Slavyansk, in an escalation of the crisis. But Ukraine's president vowed to see through the military operation, telling Russia to 'stop interfering' in the former Soviet republic, and declaring that Kiev would not yield to 'the terrorist threat.' The rocketing tensions sent oil prices up, as ... Obama, who has deployed troops to boost NATO's defences in eastern European states, accused Russia of reneging on an agreement to defuse the crisis. Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov in turn attacked the United States and the European Union of 'trying to use Ukraine as a pawn in a geopolitical game.'" At least five people are killed in the confrontations—which Russia my use as an excuse to send troop into Ukraine to "preserve the peace." [58012, 58013]

State Department spokeswoman Jennifer Psaki tweets, "The world stands #UnitedforUkraine. Let's hope that the #Kremlin & @mfa_russia will live by the promise of hashtag." (Her tweet is immediately and mercilessly ridiculed. Senator Ted Cruz (R-TX) tweets, "Note to the State Department: 'The promise of a hashtag' isn't going to make Putin pull out of Ukraine." Others tweet, "Putin has a bigger hashtag" "The power of the #hashtag is legendary. 'Speak softly & carry a big #hashtag "" "He Still Has His Phone and His Pen" "when will the adults take over again? cringeworthy" "And people wonder why the Russians pay no heed to this administration" and "It's nice to know our state dept uses the same social media tactics as high school age girls.") Nevada rancher Cliven Bundy quickly loses substantial support from the public and various politicians after he makes several arguably racist remarks to the news media. (On April 19 Bundy told a *New York Times* reporter, "I want to tell you one more thing I know about the Negro. ...[I]n front of that government [-subsidized] house the door was usually open and the older people and the kids—and there is always at least a half a dozen people sitting on the porch—they didn't have nothing to do. They didn't have nothing for their kids to do. And

because they were basically on government subsidy, so now what do they do? They abort their young children, they put their young men in jail, because they never learned how to pick cotton. And I've often wondered, are they better off as slaves, picking cotton and having a family life and doing things, or are they better off under government subsidy? They didn't get no more freedom. They got less freedom." (A case can be made, of course, that living on welfare in a government ghetto, where the public schools are atrocious, and where there are few opportunities to escape that life and succeed is not exactly the American dream, it is certainly also not the equivalent of 19th-century slavery. Further, of course, it is reportedly a fact that Bundy has not paid federal grazing fees since 1993. He is certainly not a model citizen. But that does not justify sending 200 armed BLM agents to his ranch over a dispute that should be peaceably dealt with in civil courts. Bundy's racist statements aside, it remains valid to ask, "Why does the federal government own more than 80 percent of Nevada land?") HotAir.com's Ed Morrissey writes, "Bundy doesn't have a legal case. And it looks like sympathy just ran out for him, too." (The Obama Timeline assumes it will not be long before Armed Bureau of Land Management agents return to the Bundy ranch—in even greater numbers than their previous visit.) Bundy's son Ammon blames the new controversy on selective editing by the media: "They took what they wanted. They knew when they were there his comments were not racist. He wasn't able to completely articulate. That's just my dad. He is a very principled person. ... I was there standing right beside my father when he made those comments. He was reaching out to the black community. ... He desires the black community to have freedom. ...Growing up around him, and being beside him, I never once heard him say anything negative about any race. I wish I could say that about everyone else I've been around. The black community, the white community, they joke back and forth. My father's never lowered himself." Cliven Bundy later tries to explain his earlier comments: "I said I'm wondering if they're [blacks are] better off under government subsidy, and their young women are having the abortions and their young men are in jail, and their older women and their children are standing, sitting out on the cement porch without nothing to do, you know, I'm wondering: Are they happier now under this government subsidy system than they were when they were slaves, and they was able to have their family structure together, and the chickens and garden, and the people had something to do? And so, in my mind I'm wondering, are they better off being slaves, in that sense, or better off being slaves to the United States government, in the sense of the subsidies. I'm wondering. That's what. And the statement was right. I am wondering." (Whether Bundy's clarification made the situation better or worse is debatable.) [58030]

The mainstream media failed to report everything Cliven Bundy stated, including (grammar left uncorrected), "I was in the Watts riot. I seen the beginning fire, and I seen that last fire. What I seen is civil disturbance. People are not happy. People are thinkin' they don't have their freedoms. They don't have these things . And they didn't have 'em. We progressed quite a bit since the night they, until now. And we sure don't want to go back. We sure don't want the colored people to go back to that point. We sure don't want these Mexican people to go back to that point. And we could make a difference right now, by taking care of some of these bureaucracies, and do it in a peaceful way." Of

ghetto life for blacks, Bundy says, "That's all government. That's not freedom. Now let me talk about the Spanish people. You know, I understand that they come over here against our Constitution and cross our border. But they're here, and they're people. And I've worked side beside a lot of 'em. Don't tell me they don't work. And don't tell me they don't pay taxes. And don't tell me they don't have better family structures than most of us white people. When you see those Mexican families, they're together, they picnic together, they're spending their time together, and I'll tell you, in my way of thinking they're awful nice people. And we need to have those people join us and be with us, not, not come into our [political] party." (Another famous Nevadan, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, once called Obama a "light-skinned" African-American "with no Negro dialect, unless he wanted to have one." Whether Obama artificially turning a phony dialect off and on to win votes is less racist than Bundy arguing that blacks have been treated horribly disservice by the federal government is a subject the mainstream media is unlikely to encourage.) Former presidential candidate and U.N. ambassador Alan Keyes—who happens to be black and the person Obama defeated to become U.S. Senator from Illinois in 2004—says Bundy "wasn't talking so much about black folks, but about the harm and damage that the leftist socialism has done to blacks. ... I find it appalling that we basically have a history of the leftist liberalism that wants to extinguish black people by abortion [and] destroying the family structure. All of these things, if you just look at the effects, you would say this was planned by some racist madman to destroy the black community. Joining Keyes in defending Bundy is a U.S. Marine friend of his, who happens to be black, and who writes, "The media distorts information to the point of social division. This is a photo of myself and the resilient, often charismatic, and maybe not so tactful Cliven Bundy. He's a cowboy and a helluva family man, not an orator. One thing he definitely isn't—a racist. I found his comments to not only be NOT racist, but his own view of his experiences. Who the heck are we to determine another man's perspective on the world around him?! Just because Picasso's view of the world was abstract, does it negate the fact that his art was genuine? Furthermore, if you take the time to do your own research, you'll find that his statements about some black Americans actually hold weight. He posed a hypothetical question. He said, 'I wonder IF' ... Hell, I'm black and I often wonder about the same about the decline of the black family. Bottom line is that we are all slaves in this waning republic, no matter our skin color. Mr. Bundy could have used any racial demographic as an example: Native Americans on reservations, whites in trailer parks, etc. He noticed the crippling effects of receiving government 'assistance' and the long term result of accepting handouts. It's not progress at all. I challenge Sean Hannity, Rand Paul, and others to read my comment and reconsider their position in this matter. Individual liberties are at stake here, yours and mine. THAT is the issue. Don't let the liberal media and ignoramuses like Glenn Beck and that weasel Harry Reid make you lose sight of the real issue here: The federal government is a burgeoning behemoth and a

While Americans argue about whether Cliven Bundy is a racist, members of a pro-Hamas group called "Students for Justice in Palestine" slide "eviction notices" under the doors of Jewish students in a dormitory at New York University. The notices state, "We regret to inform you that your suite is scheduled for demolition in three days. If you do not vacate the premise [sic; premises] by midnight April 25, 2014 we reserve the right to destroy all remaining belongings. We cannot be held responsible for property or persons remaining inside the premises. Charges for demolition will be applied to your student accounts." (The notices are meant to intimidate Jewish students, of course, and bring attention to the group's opposition to the building of homes and apartments for Jews on Israeli land wanted by the Palestinians.) The Obama administration has no comment, and there is no indication that Obama plans to schedule a White House "beer summit" for Jewish and Muslim students of NYU. Pamela Geller writes, "Muslim thugs, like Hitler's nazi youth, are targeting and tormenting Jewish students in greater number across US college campuses. Under the guise of BDS ["Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions," a boycott Israel campaign], or 'Israel Apartheid' or other vicious blood libels, these savages are out for Jewish blood. Every Jewish parent in America who has been ignoring this growing trend or who thinks this doesn't affect them is gravely mistaken. And they will learn the hard way—through their children. Leftwing Jews will have much to answer for. We have seen this happen before. We know what comes next." The accessible land totals 50.4 million acres, or 71.7 percent of Nevada, which spans 70.3 million acres. ...BLM spokesman Craig Leff said there is 'no connection' between the impoundment of Bundy's cattle and solar energy development in Nevada." Obama visits Japan's National Museum of Emerging Science and Innovation, where he is greeted by a robot that demonstrates its skills by kicking a soccer ball and hopping on one foot. Obama later says, "I have to say the robots were a little scary. They were too lifelike." (Compared to a typical Obama-supporting "Obot" in the United States, the electromechanical version might, in fact, have more personality and intelligence.) [58021]

At a joint press conference with the Japanese prime minister, Obama says, "Our shared Democratic values mean that we have to work together in multilateral settings to deal with regional hotspots around the globe, but also to try to make sure that we are creating a strong set of rules that govern the international order." Secretary of State John Kerry says, "Every day since we left Geneva, every day, even up to today, when Russia sent armored battalions right up to the Luhansk Oblast border, the world has witnessed a tale of two countries, two countries [Russia and Ukraine] with vastly different understandings of what it means to uphold an international agreement. ... So following today's threatening movement of Russian troops right up to Ukraine's border, let me be clear: If Russia continues in this direction, it will not just be a grave mistake, it will be an expensive mistake. Already, the international response to the choices made by Russia's leaders is taking its toll on Russia's economy. ... The window to change course is closing. President [Vladimir] Putin and Russia face a choice. If Russia chooses the path of de-escalation, the international community, all of us, will welcome it. If Russia does not, the world will make sure that the costs for Russia will only grow. And as ... Obama reiterated earlier today, we are ready to act." ("Ready t o act" means implementing a few additional relatively meaningless sanctions against Russia.) [58071]

CNSNews.com reports, "The Obama administration on Wednesday criticized Iran's election to the U.N.'s Commission on the Status of Women (CSW)—but neither the U.S. nor any other delegation objected when given the opportunity to do so, thus allowing Iran to get the seat 'by acclamation.' ... U.S. Ambassador to the U.N. Samantha Power took to Twitter to express her views: 'Yet again Iran unopposed & was 'elected' to Commission on Status of Women. Given record on women's & human rights, this is an outrage.' But Richard Grenell, who served as spokesman for four U.S. ambassadors to the U.N. during the George W. Bush administration and is a close observer of the world body, was unimpressed with her reaction. 'Ambassador Power can tweet her outrage after the fact all she wants,' he said. 'She should have been in the room for the vote and demanded a secret ballot rather than allow an automatic acclamation by her silence.'" (Although it is understandable, the U.N. action is not at all surprising. It has a history of allowing on commissions and committees the nations that are committing the atrocities allegedly being placed under scrutiny.) [58023]

\$81,600 to the Democratic National Committee and \$5,000 to ...Obama's reelection campaign. ...Chahal has visited the White House twice, on Nov. 30, 2011 to see [Obama], and on Dec. 14, 2012, to see [Obama and his wife], according to White House visitor logs. Chahal also greeted Obama at a dinner in San Francisco in 2012." (According to the Daily Mail, "[As] the court case proceeded, a judge ruled the video inadmissible [because] the San Francisco Police Department had obtained it without a warrant. Chahal's girlfriend also withdrew her testimony and refused to cooperate.") Chahal is reportedly fired by RadiumOne's board of directors on April 27. [58026, 58027, 58065, 58100]

Michelle Obama's handlers cave in and agree to have her speak only at a May 16 "senior recognition day" event in Topeka, Kansas, rather than at a combined five-school graduation ceremony. According to the Associated Press, "the five schools will hold separate graduation exercises instead. The compromise... pleased Topeka students and parents who were concerned about being limited to six tickets for family members and the first lady's remarks taking away from the occasion. ...[N]ow that Mrs. Obama will no longer speak at a graduation, seating won't need to be limited due to concerns over her security during graduation events." Attorney General Eric Holder cancels an appearance at the graduation ceremony of Oklahoma City Police Department cadets. A Justice Department spokesman denied that the trip was canceled because of the possibility of a hostile reception. ... Holder's scheduled visit to Oklahoma City drew the criticism of several conservative lawmakers who planned the protest in anticipation of his arrival, including Republican state Rep. Paul Wesselhoft, who has said he believes that Mr. Holder should be impeached. 'Our protest has turned into a victory celebration because we frankly didn't want him here—and we succeeded,' Mr. Wesselhoft said in an interview. 'This man has used his position to advance his own political agenda and that's not right. He swore to uphold the U.S. Constitution and defend it for all of us — not some of us.' Carla Russell, one of the about 100 activists who came out for the rally, held a sign that read: 'Holder is a Terrorist.' 'He's not coming because he's a chicken,' Mrs. Russell told the Red Dirt Report, a local news website. 'And he doesn't want to be recorded with people protesting against him with signs like mine." 'We need passionate people like you on our national parks,' the first lady told Poehler's character, prompting vigorous nodding. 'Are you nodding because you agree with me?' the first lady asked. 'Yes, I do agree with you,' came the star-struck response. 'I agree with you on all things throughout history until the end of times forever.'" [58086, 58087]

On April 25 the Associated Press reports, "Ecuador has ordered all 20 Defense Department employees in the U.S. Embassy's military group to leave the country by month's end... The group was ordered to halt operations in Ecuador in a letter dated April 7, said embassy spokesman Jeffrey Weinshenker. The AP was first alerted to the expulsions by a senior Ecuadorean official who refused to be identified by name due to the information's sensitive nature. President Rafael Correa had publicly complained in January that Washington had too many military officers in Ecuador, claiming there were 50, and said they had been 'infiltrated in all sectors.' At the time, he said he planned to order some to leave. ...U.S. relations with Ecuador have been strained in recent years,

even before Correa provided asylum in 2012 to WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange, whose organization published troves of leaked U.S. military documents and diplomatic cables highly embarrassing to Washington. ...In November, Correa's government said it was asking the U.S. Agency for International Development to end operations in the country, accusing it of backing the opposition." Once this happens, the officer will 'build the stop' by seeking a pretext to search the vehicle for evidence of violations that can lead to an arrest of the driver, or seizure of the vehicle and its contents. Cliven Bundy, among others, can testify that Regime-oriented journalism operates in a very similar fashion: Have a reporter from the New York Times shadow a 67-year-old Mormon rancher from southeastern Nevada long enough, and eventually the subject will say something that offends current sensibilities about race. To be specific, Bundy used retrograde racial terminology in musing aloud about the damage done to the black family by the Welfare State—which he suggested might be as evil, in some ways, as the odious institution of chattel slavery. Mr. Bundy is unusually mediasavvy for a rancher, but he doesn't speak in sound-bites. The military move, he said, is in response to ongoing NATO training exercises in Poland and the death of at least two pro-Russia insurgents in eastern Ukraine. Army Col. Steve Warren, a Pentagon spokesman, told reporters Friday that Mr. Hagel has been trying to communicate with Russian officials but has yet to hear back from Mr. Shoigu or anyone else. Pentagon officials have reached out to Russia on Mr. Hagel's behalf within the past 24 hours, according to Col. Warren. 'We have made it clear to the Russians that Secretary Hagel is available for a phone call at any time,' he said. 'We have reached out to them and made it very to them that he is willing to speak to his counterpart there at any time.'" [58074]

While the media is up in arms about Sterling, few—including Obama—made a fuss in 2010 when entertainer Jay-Z, also known as Shawn Carter and then a part-owner of the Brooklyn Nets basketball team, hosted a lavish party for reporters and music industry executives and ordered bouncers to refuse entry to white people.) Obama visits the Masjid Negara mosque in Kuala Lumpur—a mosque that was built on the site of what was once a church. According to CNSNews.com, "...Obama was asked by the institution's imam to end oppression against Muslims worldwide, Malaysia's national press agency Bernama reported. 'Pray for me,' Obama replied, according to Grand Imam Ismail Muhammad, who took him on a 25-minute tour of the mosque... 'Obama also said that every day when he wakes up he always does his best to put an end to oppression and conflicts affecting communities,' Bernama quoted Ismail as saying." (Obama also frequently said, "InsyAllah," Malay for "Insha'Allah," meaning "if Allah wills.") Abdullah Muhammad Zin, religious advisor to the Malaysian prime minister, states, "There can be no better way for Obama to honor Islam than by visiting Masjid Negara." [58138, 58152, 58153]

During his trip to Malaysia, Obama addresses a group of students and criticizes their country's palm oil industry. He says, "[W]hat you've seen is huge portions of tropical forests... just being shredded because of primarily the palm oil industry... there are large business interests behind that industry. Blinken also appears on *Face the Nation*, where he says the Obama administration is ready to impose additional sanctions on Russia: "We will be looking to designate people who are in [Vladimir Putin's] inner circle, who have a significant impact on the Russian economy. We'll be looking to designate companies that they and other inner-circle people control. We'll be looking at taking steps as well with regard to high-technology exports to their defense industry. All of this together is going to have an impact." [58106, 58107]

On *Meet the Press*, the panel gushes over a video clip of Obama saying, "I regret not having spent more time with my mother. Because she died early. She got cancer and right around when she was my age actually—she was just a year older than I am now—she died. It happened very fast, in about six months." Host David Gregory says, "What a tender moment, and a great life lesson in that, right?" Neera Tanden, president of the far left Center for American Progress, says, "And I have to say, as a mom, I can't think of a better message myself... I know [Obama's] mother did die at an early age. And he actually talked a lot about her when he was talking about health care, because she didn't have some of the health care protection." (Tanden is repeating Obama's claim, which has been thoroughly debunked, that she had to fight insurance companies to pay for her hospital and doctor bills. In September 2007 Obama said, "I remember in the last month of [my mother's] life, she wasn't thinking about how to get well, she wasn't thinking about coming to terms with her own mortality, she was thinking about whether or not insurance was going to cover the medical bills and whether our family would be bankrupt as a consequence." In January 2008 Obama said, "She was in her hospital room looking at insurance forms because the insurance company said that maybe she had a pre-existing condition and maybe they wouldn't have to reimburse her for her medical bills." In fact, a review of Stanley Ann Dunham's records shows that the hospital sent her medical bills directly to her health insurer and they were paid without argument. The "fight" was over Dunham's attempt to get her employer's disability insurance to cover routine living expenses—and remaining bills after her health insurer had paid what was required under her policy. Obama's story was a lie. His mother's medical bills were not being denied, but her request for disability benefits was denied.) [22344, 22345, 22473, 22483, 22601, 581791

On *This Week*, Secretary of Homeland Security Jeh Johnson says, "Immigration laws or any other law needs to comport with American values. One of those American values is respect for human dignity. I also believe one of those American values is respect for the sanctity of the family unit. ... None of what I can do, however, is a substitute for action by Congress. We have an immigration system in this country that is not working. Comprehensive immigration reform would fix it. This is something we need to do. I'm confident that it will happen." (If a foreigner enters the United States illegally, leaving his family behind, it is that individual who has disrupted his family—not "American values" or laws. Additionally, the existing immigration system is "not working" only because current laws are not being enforced by the government. Passing new laws that will also not be enforced is a waste of time and money.) Johnson insists, "We are enforcing the law every day." He is lying. [58139]

At TheDailyBeast.com Josh Rogin reports, "The secretary of state said that if Israel doesn't make peace soon, it could become 'an apartheid state,' like the old South Africa. Jewish leaders are fuming over the comparison. If there's no two-state solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict soon, Israel risks becoming 'an apartheid state,' Secretary of State John Kerry told a room of influential world leaders in a closed-door meeting Friday. Senior American officials have rarely, if ever, used the term 'apartheid' in reference to Israel, and ... Obama has previously rejected the idea that the word should apply to the Jewish state. Kerry's use of the loaded term is already rankling Jewish leaders in America—and it could attract unwanted attention in Israel, as well. It wasn't the only controversial comment on the Middle East that Kerry made during his remarks to the Trilateral Commission, a recording of which was obtained by The Daily Beast. Kerry also repeated his warning that a failure of Middle East peace talks could lead to a resumption of Palestinian violence against Israeli citizens. He suggested that a change in either the Israeli or Palestinian leadership could make achieving a peace deal more feasible. He lashed out against Israeli settlement-building. And Kerry said that both Israeli and Palestinian leaders share the blame for the current impasse in the talks. Kerry also said that at some point, he might unveil his own peace deal and tell both sides to 'take it or leave it.'" (They would probably leave it.) [58108, 58109, 58132, 58168]

Abe Foxman, president of the Anti-Defamation League, states, "It is startling and deeply disappointing that a diplomat so knowledgeable and experienced about democratic Israel chose to use such an inaccurate and incendiary term." [58168]

Members of Israel's Knesset quickly excoriate Kerry for his remarks. Deputy Defense Minister Danny Danon tells the *Times of Israel* that the term apartheid could be applied to Hamas and the Palestinian Authority: "Today there is not a single Jew in Gaza, not a single Jewish soldier, and we still can see very well that hatred for Israel rules there. ... I think that the secretary of state saw for himself that it's impossible to change reality; and the reality is that [Palestinian Authority President Mahmoud] Abbas chose to go the way of terror and Hamas. Therefore, any effort to put blame on Israel is wrong and unfair." [58142]

Pamela Geller comments, "Using the vicious dehumanizing rhetoric of the Nazis and Jew-haters once relegated to the ugliest hate fringe of society, the US Secretary of State disgorged this blood libel: a unitary state [Israel] will be an 'apartheid state.' While Secretary of State John Kerry criticizes Israel for not eagerly negotiating with enemies who have repeatedly claimed they would wipe the Jewish state off the face of the earth, TimeofIsrael.com reports that the terrorist group Hamas not only continues to refuse to recognize Israel, it is threatening to seek legal recourse against *The Washington Post* for suggesting that it may be softening its stance. Hamas spokesman Taher Nunu states, "What I was quoted as telling the American paper is wrong, and I unequivocally deny it. The issue of Hamas recognizing Israel is a complete nonstarter... aimed primarily at weakening the movement's positions on Israel." [58154, 58155]

At a National Rifle Association "Stand and Fight" rally in Indianapolis, Sarah Palin says, "When [Obama], our congressmen, our anti-gun mayors are protected by bodyguards, wearing guns, and our banks, our jewelry stores are protected by guns, but our children, they're protected by a thin, tin sign that reads, 'Gun Free Zone,' yeah, like that'll stop the bad guys. That is stupid on steroids! ...If you control oil, you control an economy. If you control money, you control commerce. But if you control arms, you control the people." [58123]

On April 28, in Kuala Lumpur, National Security Advisor Susan Rice meets with leaders of three Malaysian opposition parties—one of which advocates the imposition of strict Islamic Shari'ah law. [58177]

At a joint press conference in the Philippines with President Benigno Aquino, Obama announces additional sanctions against Russia that will target an "expanded list of individuals and companies." The "goal is not to go after [Russian President Vladimir] Putin personally," says Obama, "the goal is to change his calculus and encourage him to walk the walk and not just talk the talk when it comes to diplomatically resolving the crisis in Ukraine." WashingtonTimes.com reports, "The White House said the new limited sanctions are hitting seven Russian government officials, including two members of Mr. Putin's inner circle, including a freeze on any U.S. assets and a ban on travel to the U.S. The actions are being taken because Russia 'has done nothing' since it agreed in Geneva on April 17 to reduce tensions in Ukraine by refraining from provocative and violent actions." (Obama's sanctions are largely meaningless and will not stop Putin from taking Ukraine if he wants it, but there is little Obama can do if the European Union is unwilling to impose meaningful sanctions.) At the press conference, Obama responds to a question from Fox reporter Ed Henry about the lack of foreign policy successes and asking him to define the "Obama doctrine." Obama says, "Well, Ed, I doubt that I'm going to have time to lay out my entire foreign policy doctrine. And there are actually some complimentary pieces as well about my foreign policy, but I'm not sure you [Fox News] ran them. ... Why is it that everybody is so eager to use military force after we've just gone through a decade of war at enormous costs to our troops and our budget? And what is it exactly that these critics think would have been accomplished? ... Frankly, most of the foreign policy commentators that have questioned our policies would go headlong into a bunch of military adventures that the American people had no interest in participating in and would not advance our core security interests." (The defensive Obama is here using one of his infamous false choice/straw man arguments: "People either agree with me or they want an irrational war." It does not occur to him that some can simply consider his foreign policy inept.) ABC's Jonathan Karl tweets, "Obama declines to define an Obama Doctrine but his comments boil down to this: slowly & steadily advance US interests, avoid unnecessary war." [58111, 58112, 58169, 58218, 52819]

Congressman Louis Gohmert (R-TX) appears on Fox & Friends and discusses the Veterans Administration's "secret waiting list" in Arizona that has led to 40 veterans dying before they could get appointments with physicians. Gohmert says, "It needs more than just a simple investigation: there are potential criminal charges here. We'll have hearings, but hearings won't be enough, because we cannot fire those people, we don't have the executive branch role. Of course, I guess we could usurp it the way [Obama's] usurped our role. But, they have to be the ones that fire and hold criminally responsible those who may have been involved in criminal negligence. ... This is what some of us had feared for the rest of the nation. This is where socialized medicine goes; this is where ObamaCare is going. People going on lists, the panel lists procedures you get, or don't get, at what ages." [58178]

DailyCaller.com reports that the Department of Justice "will begin collecting racial data about stops, searches, and arrests as part of an effort to reduce racial bias in the criminal justice system." According to Attorney General Eric Holder, "a recent study found half of African-American men had been arrested at least once by the age of 23. Further, he said, in 2012 black men were 6 times and Latino men 2.5 times more likely to end up in prison than white men. 'This overrepresentation of young men of color in our criminal justice system is a problem we must confront—not only as an issue of individual responsibility but also as one of fundamental fairness, and as an issue of effective law enforcement, Holder said in a video message. 'Racial disparities contribute to tension in our nation generally and within communities of color specifically, and tend to breed resentment towards law enforcement that is counterproductive to the goal of reducing crime.' ... 'Of course, to be successful in reducing both the experience and the perception of bias, we must have verifiable data about the problem,' Holder said. 'As a key part of this initiative, we will work with grant recipients and local law enforcement to collect data about stops and searches, arrests, and case outcomes in order to help assess the impact of possible bias." (Members of some groups being arrested more often than others can, of

course, mean that some police officers are unfairly targeting minorities. It may also mean that members of some groups simply engage in more criminal activity. Young white men are arrested in far greater numbers than elderly grandmothers, but that does not prove that the police are "picking on "young white men" and ignoring rampant crime sprees by gangs of elderly women.) TheBlaze.com reports, "A U.S. businesswoman and paid CIA and FBI informant in Libya who said she was a good friend of Ambassador Christopher Stevens told TheBlaze the Obama administration knew that weapons and aid were ending up in the hands of Al Qaeda-affiliated militants in the country before the deadly Benghazi attacks. The informant, going by the pseudonym 'Annie' to protect her identity, said she met with Stevens on numerous occasions during her time in Libya and gathered information for the CIA and FBI on rebel leaders and terrorist organizations operating inside the country. Annie told TheBlaze TV's For the Record that there was 'a disconnect between senior elected officials [and] Obama' as to the reality on the ground in Libya. The rebels were nothing more than terrorists backed by members of the Muslim Brotherhood; the fact that the administration was 'very aggressive in promoting support for the rebels' was perplexing, she said. In an example of that 'disconnect,' the State Department received multiple warnings not to hire the British security firm tasked with protecting the U.S. ambassador in Libya... Emails and documents obtained by conservative government watchdog Judicial Watch show that such warnings about security firm Blue Mountain Group were ignored... The Blue Mountain Group was the company providing security the night of the Sept. 11, 2012 terrorist attacks on the American diplomatic outpost and CIA annex in which Stevens, two former Navy SEALs-turned-CIA contractors, and a State Department information management officer lost their lives." CNSNews.com reports, "In 20 percent of American families in 2013, according to new data released by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), not one member of the family worked. ...In 2013, there were 80,445,000 families in the United States and in 16,127,000—or 20 percent—no one had a job." [58143]

Queens, New York, renames 204th Street, calling it "Salman Hamdani Way." (Hamdani is a Muslim first responder who lost his life on September 11, 2001. Whether the more than 400 non-Muslim first responders will be similarly honored is not reported. The renaming was promoted by the Council on American Islamic Relations.) [58150, 58195]

DetroitNews.com reports, "Toyota Motor Corp. said it will move its North American headquarters from California to Texas—and shift about 250 jobs to its Washtenaw County technical center near Ann Arbor. The Japanese automaker said it will move its headquarters from Torrance, Calif., over the next three years to a single, state-of-the-art campus in Plano, Texas. Toyota's North American finance arm also plans to move its headquarters to this new shared campus. Altogether, these moves will affect about 4,000 employees. ... The move will begin with small groups this summer. Toyota said the majority of employees will not move until construction of Toyota's new headquarters in Plano is completed in late 2016 or early 2017." (California's state income tax rates vary

from 8 to 13.3 percent, while Texas has no state income tax. Every Toyota employee who moves to Texas will therefore essentially be receiving a salary increase of between 8 and 13.3 percent—and be able to buy a house for a lot less than in California.) [58156]

DailyCaller.com reports, "Environmental Protection Agency administrator Gina McCarthy has issued a warning to Republicans who continue to question the integrity of the agency's scientific data: we're coming for you. 'McCarthy told an audience at the National Academy of Sciences on Monday morning the agency will go after a 'small but vocal group of critics' who are arguing the EPA is using 'secret science' to push costly clean air regulations." Senator David Vitter (R-LA) and Congressman Lamar Smith (R-TX) "have led the charge on pressing the EPA to make publicly available the scientific data behind its clean air regulations. McCarthy promised she would make such data publicly available during her confirmation process last year. Now her refusal to cough up the data has angered Republicans." Vitter states, "EPA's leadership is willfully ignoring the big picture and defending EPA's practices of using science that is, in fact, secret due to the refusal of the agency to share the underlying data with Congress and the American public. We're not asking, and we've never asked, for personal health information, and it is inexcusable for EPA to justify billions of dollars of economically significant regulations on science that is kept hidden from independent reanalysis and congressional oversight." McCarthy's excuse for not providing the data she promised to release is that it contains "confidential personal health data." A regulation against factory soot may have been based partly on a study of patients with lung disease, but the EPA can certainly release studies without including the personal data of those patients. McCarthy is using the personal data argument to avoid releasing any information. "That soot rule is supposed to yield \$4 billion to \$9 billion in benefits per year, while costing from \$50 million to \$350 million, but the data backing that claim up is not publicly available. ... House Republicans have backed a bill that would block the EPA from crafting regulations based on 'secret' data." (Obama's EPA is essentially saying, "You will just have to trust us when we claim a regulation that will cost hundreds of millions of dollars to implement will result in billions of dollars in benefits.") The Washington Post writes, "Vladimir Putin's assault on Ukraine has been relentless and increasingly reckless: Forces working with Russian personnel in eastern Ukraine are torturing and murdering opponents and holding international observers hostage. In contrast, ... Obama's response has been slow and excruciatingly measured. New U.S. sanctions announced Monday fall well short of the steps that senior officials threatened when the Russian offensive in eastern Ukraine began three weeks ago. No wonder that, even as he announced them, Mr. Obama expressed skepticism that they would work. 'We don't expect there to be an immediate change in Russia's policy,' a top aide told reporters. This official acknowledged that the United States could take steps that would impose 'severe damage on the Russian economy' but was holding them back. The obvious question is: Why would the United States not aim to bring about an immediate change in Russian behavior that includes sponsorship of murder, torture and hostage-taking?" At HotAir.com Ed Morrissey responds, "Why, indeed? These are extremely serious and disturbing tactics used by Moscow, which should prompt a massive economic response from the West. Instead, Obama and his European allies dither, giving Putin no

reason to stop using those tactics. When asked why the US insists on taking a micro-incremental approach, one 'senior official' suggested that they didn't want to impact economic growth in an election year. [That is, tough sanctions on Russia could end up harming the U.S. economy.] Well, *that's* one for the reprint of *Profiles in Courage*. ...Maybe Obama will have more flexibility after the election, eh?" According to the Associated Press, Senate Democrats are likely to bring a minimum wage bill to the floor on April 30. On the floor of the Senate, Senator Ted Cruz (R-TX) says, "I was convinced that as Secretary of State John Kerry would place what he considered to be the wishes of the international community above the national security interests of the United States. I fear with these most-recent ill-chosen remarks, Secretary Kerry has proven those concerns well founded. Secretary Kerry has thus proven himself unsuitable for his position and that before any further harm is done to our alliance with Israel, he should offer ... Obama his resignation and [Obama] should accept it. ... The term 'apartheid' means 'apart' different, isolated—the state of the victims of apartheid with which the Jews are all too familiar. The notion that Israel would go down that path, and so face the same condemnation that met South Africa, is unconscionable. The fact that Secretary Kerry sees nothing wrong with making such a statement on the eve of Holocaust Remembrance Day demonstrates a shocking lack of sensitivity to the incendiary and damaging nature of his rhetoric." (Applying the apartheid label to Israel—the only democracy in the Middle East—is absurd. Muslims have far more rights in Israel than Jews do in most Muslim nations, and even serve as elected members of the Knesset.) Senator Barbara Boxer (D-CA) tweets, "...any linkage between Israel and apartheid is nonsensical and ridiculous." [58133, 58144, 58160]

House Majority Leader Eric Cantor (R-VA) demands that John Kerry apologize to Israel for his apartheid remark. Cantor says, "Reports that Secretary Kerry has suggested Israel is becoming an apartheid state are extremely disappointing. The use of the word apartheid has routinely been dismissed as both offensive and inaccurate, and Secretary Kerry's use of it makes peace even harder to achieve. ... Obama has rejected the use of the term apartheid in the past, correctly saying it is historically inaccurate and emotionally loaded. I hope that ... Obama will again reiterate these views, and call on Secretary Kerry to apologize to the Israeli government and people." [58145, 58146]

On *Special Report*, Charles Krauthammer says that Kerry's remark is "beyond nonsense, it's pernicious and extremely harmful. What the Secretary of State of the United States has succeeded in doing, in what he thought was a private comment, is to echo and therefore to legitimize the *worst* of the libelous calumnies against the Jewish state. If there is one minority in the Middle East that enjoys the rule of law, and protection, and democracy it is Arabs in Israel. One out of every five Israelis is a Palestinian; overwhelming they're Muslim. There are Arabs in the government, in the Supreme Court, in all walks of life, in the universities. There's actually affirmative action if you are a Palestinian in the universities. And to compare that in anyway with the systematic discrimination against black Africans in South Africa is truly appalling and hurtful. I think Cruz is right, this is beyond something requiring an apology. I think this is a resigning type statement. This is an injury to an ally that will echo, because it will be repeated, and people will say, 'I'm not saying this, it's the Secretary of State of the United States.' It is untrue, it's pernicious, and it's truly something that demands at the very least an immediate apology." [58133]

Secretary of State John Kerry goes on the offensive over the response to his anti-Israel apartheid remark, saying, "I will not allow my commitment to Israel to be questioned by anyone, particularly for partisan, political purposes, so I want to be crystal clear about what I believe and what I don't believe. First, Israel is a vibrant democracy and I do not believe, nor have I ever stated, publicly or privately, that Israel is an apartheid state or that it intends to become one. Anyone who knows anything about me knows that without a shred of doubt. Second, I have been around long enough to also know the power of words to create a misimpression, even when unintentional, and if I could rewind the tape, I would have chosen a different word to describe my firm belief that the only way in the long term to have a Jewish state and two nations and two peoples living side by side in peace and security is through a two state solution." (Kerry's remarks were recorded, yet he still denies having said them—and has the unmitigated gall to reprimand those who justifiably criticized him. His claim that criticism directed against him is partisan is ridiculous; he is being excoriated form all sides.) [58157, 58167, 58220]

On April 29 FoxNews.com reports, "The lawyer for former Internal Revenue Service official Lois Lerner sent a letter to House Republican leaders on Monday, asking for an opportunity to address the House ahead of a vote to hold his client in contempt of Congress. ... 'Holding Ms. Lerner in contempt would not only be unfair and, indeed, un-American, it would be flatly inconsistent with the Fifth Amendment as interpreted by the

Supreme Court,' Lerner's lawyer, William W. Taylor III, wrote in a letter to House Speaker John Boehner (R-OH). ... 'No court will hold that she waived her privilege,' Taylor said. 'Supreme Court precedent is clear that a witness compelled to appear before a congressional committee does not waive her Fifth Amendment privilege by asserting her innocence." (Lerner's problem is that she appeared before the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee and made a statement not only professing her innocence but presenting a number of facts and arguments in her defense. When asked questions she refused to answer, claiming her Fifth Amendment rights. Lerner arguably waived her Fifth Amendment rights by giving a lengthy statement. In a murder trial, for example, the defendant cannot tale the witness stand, claim he is innocent, present his version of the events, and then refuse to answer questions from the prosecutors. The Obama Timeline believes the House of Representatives will vote to hold Lerner in contempt and call for prosecution by the Department of Justice—which will then drag its feet in order to protect Lerner, and the people she is trying to protect. In the long run she might never be forced to testify, but she will spend a lot of money paying attorneys to keep her from doing so.) [58158, 58159, 58161]

Obama's approval rating reaches a record low 41 percent in a Washington Post/ABC poll. Among independents, Obama's approval rating is a dismal 39 percent. On health care, foreign policy, and the economy, his ratings are 37, 34, and 42 percent, respectively. By 53–39 percent, registered voters would rather have the GOP in control of Congress as a counterbalance to Obama's power abuses than a Democrat Congress supporting him—a result that should frighten Democrats. (The poll would be even worse for Obama if the D/R/I weighting had not been 32/21/38. That is, 32 percent of registered voters surveyed were Democrats, 21 percent Republicans, and 38 percent were independents.) [58162, 58174, 58265]

Some might argue that a 41 percent approval rating is about as low as Obama can go, considering the make-up of the U.S. population. Obama has overwhelming support among blacks and large support among Hispanics, and together they make up about 30 percent of the population. Absent an incredibly offensive action by Obama (like being caught in bed with a live man or a dead woman), he can largely count on most of that 30 percent as his political base. Another portion of the population consists of die-hard Democrats, leftists, statists, socialists, college professors, and government employees who would be unlikely to readily turn on Obama, and that group probably brings Obama up to a 40–41 percent level. The answer to the question, "How low can he go?" has possibly been answered by the Washington Post/ABC poll. [58184]

According to a study by the Competitive Enterprise Institute, when the cost of federal regulations are "[c]ombined with \$3.454 trillion in federal spending, Washington's share of the economy now reaches 31 percent. Costs for Americans to comply with federal regulations reached \$1.863 trillion in 2013. That is more than the GDPs of Canada or Australia. ...Regulatory costs amount to an average of \$14,974 per household—23

percent of the average household income of \$65,596 and 29 percent of the expenditure budget of \$51,442. This exceeds every item in the household budget except housing—more than health care, food, transportation, entertainment, apparel, services, and savings. Some 63 departments, agencies and commissions have regulations in the pipeline." [58165, 58166]

In an interview with *The Fine Print*, consumer advocate and former presidential candidate Ralph Nader says, "Oh, most definitely" to the question of whether Obama should be impeached for violating the U.S. Constitution. "The reason why Congress doesn't want to do it is because it's abdicated its own responsibility under the Constitution." [58172, 58173]

According to a Harvard University Institute of Politics (IOP) poll, "Less [sic; fewer] than one-in-four (23%) young Americans under the age of 30 say that they will 'definitely be voting' in the fall, a sharp decrease of 11 percentage points since November 2013 IOP polling (34%) and eight percentage points lower than seen during a similar time period prior to the 2010 midterm elections (31%: Feb. 2010). In addition, traditional Republican constituencies seem to be showing more enthusiasm than Democratic ones for participating in the upcoming midterm elections and are statistically more likely to say they will 'definitely be voting.' For example, 44 percent of those who voted for Mitt Romney in 2012 say they will 'definitely be voting,' a statistically significant difference compared to the 35 percent of 2012 Barack Obama voters who say the same. Additionally, self-identified conservatives (32%) are 10 points more likely to vote than liberals (22%); men (28%) are 9 points more likely to vote than women (19%); and young Whites (27%) are more likely to vote than African Americans (19%) and Hispanics (19%)." Townhall.com's Daniel Doherty observes, "[I]f millennials stay home in November, this could spell electoral doom for many incumbent Democrats, many of whom traditionally court young voters to help them win re-election." WashingtonTimes.com reports, "Fixing the ObamaCare website and improving it so it's ready to handle a second round of enrollments will cost the federal government \$121 million, according to Accenture, the contractor hired to repair the glitchy website after the original contractor, CGI Federal, was fired. That cost is roughly \$30 million more than initially projected, underscoring the price of trying to keep ...Obama's signature domestic law on track. The price is also about \$30 million more than the reported value of CGI's initial Obamacare contract, signed in 2011." [58186]

DailyCaller.com reports, "A White House task force's report made some startling errors about campus sexual assault rates, and proposed recommendations that endanger students' constitutional rights, according to civil libertarians. The report, which was authored by the White House Task Force to Protect Students From Sexual Assault, leads with the bizarre and wholly false claim that 1 in 5 women are sexually assaulted while at college. The statistic, originally reported in a Centers for Disease Control report several years ago, is at odds with most other data relating to violent crimes, and has been repeatedly dunked by criminologists. ... The scale of the problem is just the report's first

error. It also outlines several ways to address sexual assault that would threaten the civil liberties of students accused of sexual assault. The report specifically instructs universities to abridge students' due process by denying them the right to confront their accusers. 'The parties should not be allowed to personally cross-examine each other,' said the report. The Sixth Amendment to the Constitution, however, explicitly grants this right in normal criminal proceedings. ...One of its more dangerous proposals would empower universities to choose a single administrator to investigate the case, adjudicate it and choose a suitable punishment. There would no trial and no recognition of due process rights at all. ...The report is the first formal product of the task force, which was convened by ...Obama in January." [58210]

TalkingPointsMemo.com reports, "A federal judge in Milwaukee has struck down Wisconsin's voter Identification law, saying it unfairly burdens poor and minority voters. [Clinton-appointed] U.S. District Judge Lynn Adelman [a hardcore Democrat who unsuccessfully ran for Congress three times] issued his long-awaited decision Tuesday. It invalidates Wisconsin's law. Wisconsin's law would have required voters to show a state-issued photo ID at the polls. Supporters said it would cut down on voter fraud and boost public confidence in the integrity of the election process. But Adelman sided with opponents, who said it disproportionately excluded poor and minority voters because they're less likely to have photo IDs or the documents needed to get them." Adelman ignores the fact that in 2008 the U.S. Supreme Court ruled 6–3, in *Crawford v*. Marion County Election Board, that laws requiring voters to furnish photo ID to vote are not unconstitutional. Justice John Paul Stevens wrote, "The relevant burdens here are those imposed on eligible voters who lack photo identification cards that comply with SEA 483.[2] Because Indiana's cards are free, the inconvenience of going to the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, gathering required documents, and posing for a photograph does not qualify as a substantial burden on most voters' right to vote, or represent a significant increase over the usual burdens of voting. The severity of the somewhat heavier burden that may be placed on a limited number of persons—e.g., elderly persons born out-ofstate, who may have difficulty obtaining a birth certificate—is mitigated by the fact that eligible voters without photo identification may cast provisional ballots that will be counted if they execute the required affidavit at the circuit court clerk's office. Even assuming that the burden may not be justified as to a few voters, that conclusion is by no means sufficient to establish petitioners' right to the relief they seek." Justice Antonin Scalia wrote, "It is for state legislatures to weigh the costs and benefits of possible changes to their election codes, and their judgment must prevail unless it imposes a severe and unjustified overall burden upon the right to vote, or is intended to disadvantage a particular class." Despite the Supreme Court ruling that photo ID laws are not unconstitutional, Obama's Department of Justice continues to try to thwart them. If the Wisconsin case is appealed, Adelman's ruling will likely be reversed. Democrats are forcing such appeals if for no other reason than to cause their opponents to have to spend money on litigation. [58187, 58188, 58198, 58270]

TPNN.com reports, "The Missouri House of Representatives will hold committee hearings on Wednesday to consider the impeachment of Democrat Governor Jay Nixon. ThePostEmail.com's Sharon Rondeau reports that Carl Gallups, of WEBY's Freedom Friday, has issued another "tease" on the progress of Maricopa County, Arizona Sheriff Joe Arpaio's cold case posse investigation of Obama's forged birth certificate and Selective Service registration form. According to Gallups, there is "an astounding pile of evidence" that is "beyond description" and "beyond universe-shattering." Gallups claims, "The evidence that they're going to present is going to be so overwhelming that I believe something legal will have to happen...it will have to happen..." but "It's not going to happen until it's ready. There are legal loopholes to jump through, legal logistics to take care of." According to Gallups, the lead investigator for the posse, Mike Zullo, says, "It will happen sooner rather than later." The attempted vote followed the resignation of Abdullah al-Thinni, who stepped down as prime minister earlier this month after he and his family were targeted by militiamen. Libya has been plagued by instability since armed groups toppled Muammar Gaddafi's regime in 2011. ...It is unclear who was behind the disturbance." (Perhaps to the BBC it is not clear, but it is more than likely that radical Islamists were "behind the disturbance." Interestingly, the BBC claims that only "armed groups" forced Gaddafi out of power. Perhaps because the regime change has been a disaster, the leftist BBC chose not to emphasize that the "toppling" was done with the eager assistance of the Obama administration.) [58193]

An American [leader] should never say, as you did Monday in Manila when you got frustrated in a press conference with the Philippine president: 'You hit singles; you hit doubles. Every once in a while, we may be able to hit a home run.' Especially now that we have this scary World War III vibe with the Russians, we expect the [leader], especially one who ran as Babe Ruth, to hit home runs." [58240]

"...In the immortal words of Earl Weaver, the Hall of Famer who managed the Baltimore Orioles: 'The key to winning baseball games is pitching, fundamentals, and three-run homers.' A singles hitter doesn't scare anybody. It doesn't feel like leadership. It doesn't feel like you're in command of your world. More than 100 pages of documents were released to the conservative watchdog group Judicial Watch as part of a Freedom of Information Act lawsuit. Among them was a Sept. 14, 2012, email from Ben Rhodes, an assistant to [Obama] and deputy national security adviser for strategic communications. The Rhodes email, with the subject line: 'RE: PREP Call with Susan: Saturday at 4:00 pm ET,' was sent to a dozen members of the administration's inner circle, including key members of the White House communications team such as Press Secretary Jay Carney. In the email, Rhodes specifically draws attention to the anti-Islam Internet video, without distinguishing whether the Benghazi attack was different from protests elsewhere. The email lists the following two goals, among others: 'To underscore that these protests are rooted in an Internet video, and not a broader failure of policy.' 'To reinforce [Obama's] and Administration's strength and steadiness in dealing with difficult challenges.' ...Judicial Watch President Tom Fitton said the documents read like a PR strategy, not an effort to provide the best available intelligence to the American people. 'The goal of the White House was to do one thing primarily, which was to make [Obama] look good. Blame it on the video and not [Obama's] policies,' he said." [58180, 58181, 58182,

White House lawyer Michael Gottlieb is married to NPR's White House correspondent Ari Shapiro. *Washington Post* reporter Sari Horwitz is married to William B. Schultz, the general counsel of the Department of Health and Human Services. Shailagh Murray, a former *Washington Post* reporter who now serves as Vice President Joe Biden's communications director is married to Wall Street Journal political reporter Neil King. FreeBeacon.com adds, "Also contained in the 41 pages of documents obtained by Judicial Watch is a Sep. 12, 2012 email from Payton Knopf, the former deputy spokesman at the U.S. Mission to the United Nations. In this communication, Knopf informs Rice that senior officials had already dubbed the Benghazi attack as 'complex' and planned in advance. Despite this information, Rice still insisted that attacks were 'spontaneous.' The newly released cache of emails also appear to confirm that the CIA altered its original talking points on the attacks in the following days. Then-CIA Deputy Director Mike Morell is identified as the person who heavily edited the critical fact sheet." [58180, 58181, 58182] 58185, 58189]

It is worth asking why Judicial Watch was even able to obtain additional emails, when the White House insisted in May 2013 that it had already released *all* of them. (Jay Carney's unbelievable explanation: "This document was not about Benghazi." The Judicial Watch Freedom of Information Act request specifically asked for documents related to Benghazi and talking points given to Susan Rice—and a lawsuit was needed to pry it loose from the Obama administration.) Carney makes the ridiculous claim that the Rhodes email was not specifically about Benghazi, but about Middle East protests in general—even though the name Benghazi was a heading in the email. Townhall.com political editor Guy Benson writes that the questioning "represents something of a vindication for Karl, whose previous accurate reporting on Benghazi has been assailed by the administration as false. ...[T]he bottom line is that Karl and former CBS News reporter Sharyl Attkisson were correct all along: The White House did, indeed, play a role in shaping Susan Rice's deeply misleading Benghazi talking points, and they lied about it. Carney himself once claimed that the only change the White House or State Department made to her talking points was a single cosmetic revision. For the umpteenth time, that has been exposed as a lie. True to form, Carney treated Karl with sneering contempt throughout the exchange, at one point intimating that the journalist was too jet-lagged to ask coherent questions." Senate Republicans block job-killing legislation to increase the minimum wage to \$10.10 per hour. (Needing 60 votes to advance the bill, the Democrats manage only 54—including one Republican, Senator Bob Corker of Tennessee.) According to the Congressional Budget Office, an increase in the minimum wage to \$10.10 per hour would cause the loss of between 500,000 and one million jobs, and cost businesses an additional \$15 per year in wages—much of which would, of course, be passed on to the

consumer in the form of higher prices. Prior to the vote, the National Federation for Independent Business warned, "Yet again, lawmakers are targeting the nation's economic engine—small business owners—with an anti-employer agenda. With increases to health care costs, higher taxes, more costly regulations, and now a dramatic minimum wage increase, small business owners simply can't afford another excessive government mandate." (Almost everyone who is paid only the minimum wage is 24 years old or younger. Only 0.8 percent are age 29 or older, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. CNSNews.com notes, "A supermajority of 67.5 percent who earned the minimum wage or less in 2013, according to BLS, worked in what the government calls the 'Leisure and Hospitality' industry. This includes restaurants, bars, hotels, theatres, amusement parks and other facilities catering to people pursuing recreational activities. Workers who get tips on the job can be paid less than the legal minimum wage if their combined wages and tips exceed the minimum wage.") [58197, 58211, 58235, 58258]

At Townhall.com Katie Pavlich writes, "New numbers show the GDP took a nose dive in the past quarter going from 2.5 percent to just 0.1 percent, prompting analysis that America could be headed for a double dip recession. ... High taxes, Obamacare and economic uncertainty are coming home to roost." WSJ.com reports, "The U.S. economy slowed in the first quarter to one of the weakest paces of the five-year recovery as the frigid winter appeared to have curtailed business investment and weakness overseas hurt exports. Gross domestic product, the broadest measure of goods and services produced across the economy, advanced at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 0.1% in the first quarter, the Commerce Department said Wednesday. Economists surveyed by The Wall Street Journal had forecast growth at a 1.1% pace for the quarter." (The Obama Timeline believes first quarter "growth" was actually negative, but the government manipulated the official inflation rate in order to eke out a positive, albeit minuscule, GDP figure. Obama does not want his Oval Office record marred by a recession, so he made sure the GDP number was positive.) Meanwhile, health spending is up at an annual rate of 9.9 percent in the first quarter of 2014—the largest quarterly increase in 34 years, and on top of a 5.6 percent increase in the fourth quarter of 2013. (The White House blames the weather, stating that the GDP is "subject to a number of notable influences, including historically severe winter weather, which temporarily lowered growth." At Townhall.com Christine Rousselle observes, "Curiously, the severe winter weather did not have a similar economic effect on our neighbor to the north, Canada. Canada's GDP grew by 2.5 percent, exactly what was forecast. Several Canadian cities experienced their coldest and snowiest winters in decades.") Despite the weak economy, the Dow Jones Industrial Average closes at a record high 16,580—largely because investors believe the Federal Reserve will keep artificially expanding the money supply with its "Qualitative Easing" scheme. (The "bubble" may continue for a while longer, but when the Federal Reserve ends its policy the bottom will drop out of the stock market.) [58232]

According to the Media Research Center, "Tuesday's World News ignored ABC's own poll showing ... Obama's lowest approval rating... ABC gave a scant 18 seconds to the

numbers on *Good Morning America* earlier in the day." Additionally, "Newly-surfaced emails link the White House directly to false talking points that were disseminated days after the Benghazi attacks in September of 2012, but the broadcast networks ignored the story on Tuesday evening." In a discussion of Los Angeles Clipper owner Donald Sterling, Rush Limbaugh mentions a statement by Kevin Johnson, a former NBA player and the mayor of Sacramento, California. Johnson said, "This is a very stark reminder that we still have a lot of work to do. Yes, we have an African-American [in the White House]. Yes, justice happened in a swift manner and forceful [sic; forcefully], yes, that occurred today. But these events remind all of us that hatred and bigotry are far from over. Despicable as Sterling may be, Kevin Johnson is not one to be delivering moral lectures. As noted previously in this *Timeline*, in 2009 Obama fired Gerald Walpin, the Inspector General (IG) of the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS). A week earlier, Walpin had questioned the Teaching Fellow Program of the AmeriCorps program and contested a settlement made with Sacramento mayor Kevin Johnson for misuse of AmeriCorps funds used by the Hood Corps, an inner city project. Johnson, a former NBA player with the Phoenix Suns, major campaign supporter, and Obama pal, agreed to pay back \$423,000 in misused grant money received from AmeriCorps—but was generously given 10 years to return the money and was not indicted, convicted, or jailed. Walpin said he acted "with the highest integrity" in investigating AmeriCorps, and reported evidence and conclusions "in an honest and full way." Some claimed that Michelle Obama was making a number of decisions about CNCS. It was then announced that her chief of staff, Jackie Norris, would become a senior advisor at CNCS. Obama had asked for Walpin's resignation. (White House counsel Norman L. Eisen called Walpin on his cell phone and gave him an hour to resign or be fired.) When Walpin refused, Obama fired him. Obama should have complied with a law requiring that he give Congress 30 days notice before firing an inspector general. (Ironically, Obama was a co-sponsor of that legislation when he was a Senator.) Obama was also required to describe the reasons for the termination—he could simply say, "It was time for a change" or "I no longer have the fullest confidence in him." According to *The Washington Examiner*, one unnamed source said, "Bottom line, getting rid of a tough, Republican-appointed IG who has been aggressively going after waste and fraud gives Obama a chance to replace that IG with a more compliant team player." Little media fuss was

made about Obama's firing of Walpin. Senator Charles Grassley (R-IA) wrote Obama, saying, "We cannot afford to have inspector general independence threatened. I urge you to review the Inspector General Reform Act you cosponsored and to follow the letter of the law should you have cause to remove any inspector general." Grassley (R-IA) later demanded an investigation into Obama's firing of Walpin, who dared to perform his job and identify corruption in the AmeriCorps program and, even worse, went after Obama's pal Kevin Johnson—who misused more than \$800,000 in federal funds. Grassley demanded the release of "any and all records, e-mail, memoranda, documents, communications or other information, whether in draft or final form," related to Walpin, contacts with [Obama], and "contacts with officials in the Office of the First Lady." (Grassley is probably still waiting for all the records.) Even staunch Obama supporter Senator Claire McCaskill (D-MO) stated that sufficient justification for the firing was not provided. It was then reported that the day before Walpin was fired, the head of AmeriCorps, Alan Solomont, met with Jackie Norris, a top aide to Michelle Obama. Solomont initially denied meeting with Norris, but White House visitor logs confirmed that they met three times. Johnson not only avoided jail, his only punishment was to take an online course called "Cost Principles." Because Walpin dared to expose Johnson, Brown went after him with trumped up ethics charges. Walpin was cleared of the spurious charges, demanded his job back, and

Dues were then automatically collected from the care recipients' Medicare or Medicaid checks. ... 'Family members were told they were public employees,' Patrick Wright, director of the Mackinac Center Legal Foundation, a Michigan-based policy group, told FoxNews.com. 'They are not public employees and this was not proper.' 'It was an underhanded scheme to get these people in [the union],' he added. The measure, which counted the home healthcare recipient as an employer and the caregiver as an employee, was adopted during the administration of Democratic Gov. Jennifer Granholm, but abolished by Republicans including current Gov. Rick Snyder, who was elected in 2012. His election coincided with the state's vote to end forced unionization by approving a right-to-work ballot measure. Snyder subsequently signed a bill that ended the SEIU's due collection scheme. Wright's organization estimates that the SEIU reaped nearly \$35 million from Michigan's elderly and disabled from 2006 to last year. Of some 59,000 residents classified as home-based caregivers, about 80 percent stopped paying when they learned they did not have to." [58231, 58242]

According to the House Energy and Commerce Committee, "Data provided to the committee by every insurance provider in the health care law's Federally Facilitated Marketplace (FFM) shows that, as of April 15, 2014, only 67 percent of individuals and families that had selected a health plan in the federally facilitated marketplace had paid their first month's premium and therefore completed the enrollment process. Nationwide, only 25 percent of paid enrollees are ages 18 to 34." At PJMedia.com J. Christian Adams reports, "A lawyer for the Federal Election Commission has resigned after being found to have engaged in prohibited political activity to help ... Obama's reelection on government time. The Federal Election Commission is the agency charged with regulating campaign finance for the presidential campaigns and serving as a purportedly neutral federal agency. ... The Hatch Act prohibits federal employees from engaging in political activity on government time or using government resources to aid the election of candidates. The most serious penalty possible for violation of the Hatch Act is loss of federal employment. Criminal charges are not available for violations of the Hatch Act. ... PJ Media has identified the former FEC attorney as April Sands." According to WashingtonTimes.com, Sands, who was paid \$133,264 per year and once worked with the now infamous Lois Lerner, "solicited campaign donations for Mr. Obama and other political campaigns, and even took part in a web broadcast from an FEC facility where the employee criticized the GOP and Republican 2012 presidential candidate Mitt Romney." No injuries have been reported yet, although witnesses described a floor-shaking explosion that sent a fireball almost 200 feet into the air. Early news reports indicate that oil has spilled into the nearby James River, which flows into the Chesapeake Bay. Cities downstream are switching to alternate sources of water. The derailment is the latest in a series of oil train explosions in the U.S. and Canada over the past several months. As the U.S. oil boom has cranked up, trains have become the preferred mode of transport for much of the oil industry. In the third quarter of 2013, trains carried 93,312 carloads of crude oil, or about 66 million barrels—about 900 percent more than in all of 2008. Much of that crude is coming out of the remote Bakken region of North Dakota." (The oil spills will lead some to argue for the approval of the Keystone XL pipeline, because pipelines are far safer—

and less expensive—than transport by rail or truck. Others will argue that oil should simply be left in the ground and never transported anywhere. Still others will possibly claim the derailments are part of a "conspiracy" to help prompt approval of the pipeline.) [58268, 58269]

MaggiesNotebook.com reports, "I'm wading my way through the new documents on Benghazi released by Judicial Watch and found a shocking tweet by CNN freelancer Jomana Karadsheh. The significance: Rice directly received a heads-up, whether she believed it or not, that Ansar al-Sharia was attacking our compound before the attack was over, yet went on the Sunday news shows and blamed street rabble-rousers, upset about a little-seen anti-Islam video with no mention of Jomana Karadsheh's information." The Karadsheh message read, "Got off phone to someone near the scene #Benghazi – clashes ongoing between Ansar al-Sharia & security forces at #US consulate. #Libya." That message was then forwarded to Rice, who therefore knew the evening of the Benghazi attack that it was being conducted by Islamist terrorists—yet several days later she appeared on five Sunday talk shows to push the phony "spontaneous anti-video demonstration" story.
