The Obama Timeline – Part II

The Doomed Presidency

October 2014

On October 1 Julia Pierson, head of the Secret Service, is forced to resign—only hours after White House press secretary Josh Earnest tells Morning Joe's Mika Brzezinski, "She's more than qualified to do her job. She's somebody who has a very difficult responsibility... What you saw her do yesterday was take responsibility for the shortcomings that are evident. [Obama] continues to have confidence in the ability of the leadership of the Secret Service to protect him and his family, and to implement the necessary reforms to strengthen that security." Pierson states, "I think it's in the best interest of the Secret Service and the American public if I step down. Congress has lost confidence in my ability to run the agency. The media has made it clear that this is what they expected. ... I'm disappointed that I didn't have an opportunity to implement structural and operational changes in the agency. I had a vision for the future. It's 31 years of service and a firm understanding of the organization. ... I felt this [resignation] was the noble thing to do...[in order to] take pressure off the organization." (That pressure is, of course, more than warranted.) Obama selects retired Secret Service official Joseph Clancy to replace Pierson. (Leftist columnist Bruce Covert blames Pierson's ouster on sexism: "Time and again, women are put in charge only when there's a mess, and if they can't engineer a quick cleanup, they're shoved out the door." Covert does not say how many armed ex-felons should be allowed in an elevator with Obama before the Secret Service director should lose her job.) [65364, 65415, 65416, 65455, 65456, 65511]

WashingtonPost.com reports that under Pierson's watch, "the agency continued to suffer from systemic problems that went well beyond the embarrassment of the prostitution scandal. For instance, staffing short-ages have grown so severe that the agency has had to fly in field agents from across the country for two-week temporary details, paying their travel, hotel and per-diem costs. Pierson also rejected an internal study's recommendations that the White House have a total of about 100 counter-surveillance officers to patrol the perimeter of the complex. She suggested cutting the recommended number by a third. And Pierson had agreed to shrink key units in the agency, including the number of officers from the uniformed division who guard the White House complex. In her 18 months in charge, Pierson also became the subject of derision among some lower-level agents for accommodating the White House staff's wishes for lesscumbersome security over the warnings of her tactical teams. [Pierson also failed—if she even tried—to persuade Obama to skip the funeral of Nelson Mandela, despite warnings from others in the agency that he cold not be adequately protected at the event.] In the spring, Pierson was irate at what she considered the excessive security measures her team had planned for the U.S.-Africa Leaders Summit, which Obama hosted this summer, demanding that it dismantle extra layers of fencing and reopen closed streets, according to two agency supervisors. Supervisors who had mapped out the security plan said they were taken aback when Pierson, who worked during high school at Walt Disney World as a costumed character and park attendant, said: 'We need to be more like Disney World. We need to be more friendly, inviting.'" (For the record, Disney World employees inspect bags of park visitors and do their best not to allow anyone to jump over a fence to avoid buying an admission ticket.) [65427, 65474, 65512]

At NationalReview.com Charles C. W. Cooker notes "An extraordinary item from Peter Baker in the New York Times: '...Obama must be touched by all the concern Republicans are showing him these days. As Congress examines security breaches at the White House, even opposition lawmakers who have spent the last six years fighting his every initiative have expressed deep worry for his security.' 'Even?' Can it really be too difficult to recognize that citizens who strongly disagree with [Obama] don't want him to be murdered? Is the moral imagination of the center-left truly so barren as to presume as a matter of course that vehement and caustic political opposition must, eventually, lead to execution? What, one wonders, does Peter Baker consider are the options for the politically active in a free republic: a) you support a president unconditionally or b) you want him dead? ...Of course we want [Obama] to be safe. Those who are surprised by this perhaps need to spend some more time with their ideological opponents, or—and this will be harder, I grant—spend a little more time examining what it is about their ideology that led them to conflate political opposition and violence in the first instance." A White House official denies a report that Obama planned to tell the Congressional Hispanic Caucus Institute that in 40 days he will announce his executive action on illegal immigrant amnesty. BuzzFeed.com is told that Obama's "remarks to the CHCI gala do not include the 'wait for 40 days' reference. Whoever provided that information did not see the speech and is inaccurately describing [Obama's] remarks." (Townhall.com's Guy Benson writes, "So a key element of the base will have to wait. They'll get their way, of course, just not immediately. There are ordinary Americans to fool in the interim, and that takes priority.") [65231, 65232]

White House press secretary Josh Earnest tells reporters the federal government will not impose travel restrictions to and from West Africa despite the Ebola virus outbreak: "The reason for that is that it is not possible to transmit Ebola through the air. ... The only way that an individual can contract Ebola is by coming into contact with the bodily fluids of someone who is exhibiting symptoms. ... We've provided guidance to pilots, flight attendants and others who are responsible for staffing our transportation infrastructure to ensure that if they notice individuals who are exhibiting symptoms ... that the proper authorities are notified. In light of this incident [a man from Liberia with Ebola entered the United States and is being treated in Dallas], the administration has taken the step of re-circulating our guidance ... to make sure people are aware there is an important protocol that should be implemented. ... These are the experts, they have a keen understanding of how to prevent the spread of this disease. We can stop the spread of Ebola in its tracks. ... We are confident that the sophisticated medical infrastructure that exists here in the United States can prevent the wide spread of Ebola. ... We live in a

global world [sic], and what we're confident that we can do is to both protect the safety of the traveling public and ...protect the broader American public by rigorously applying the kind of medical protocols that are recommended by the Centers for Disease Control." Earnest also avoids a question about Marine Sergeant Andrew Tahmooressi, responding, "My colleagues at the State Department are very focused on this issue, and so I'd refer you to them for their efforts to work with the Mexican government." Asked if Obama has telephoned the Mexican president, Earnest replies, "I don't believe it has [taken place], and that's because this is an issue that is being handled through the State Department and through the existing channels at the State Department." (That, of course, is why Tahmooressi is still in a Mexican jail. In a five minute telephone call Obama could say, "Release our Marine our you will not see a nickel of foreign aid ever again and we will start deporting Mexicans en masse.") [65463]

At Examiner.com, Robert Moon lists "Obama's top 30 most disrespectful insults to the military." They include: "Looking past all his civilian aides to order a Marine to hold an umbrella over his head like a butler for an entire speech at the Rose Garden, in violation of military regulations." "Skipping the funeral of the highest-ranking officer to be killed on foreign soil in over 40 years (Major-General Harold J. Greene), to play golf." "Ignoring a former Marine frivolously imprisoned in Mexico on trumped up weapons charges." "Imposing ludicrous rules of engagement on our troops that have needlessly gotten many soldiers killed." "Releasing five major terrorist leaders to appease the Taliban into releasing one America-hating deserter." [65566]

Breitbart.com reports that "...Obama, Health and Human Services Secretary Sylvia Burwell, Department of Homeland Security Secretary Jeh Johnson, and Secretary of State John Kerry are directly responsible for allowing Ebola into the United States, the Center for Immigration Studies Director of Policy Studies Jessica Vaughan told Breitbart News. Vaughan points to federal law—the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA)—which she notes gives the administration 'broad authority' to bar non-citizens like Thomas Eric Duncan, the first Ebola patient allowed into the U.S., from entering the country. The administration took no steps pursuant to that federal law, however, to block people like him from potentially endangering Americans. 'They have broad authority to bar any non-citizen from entering the country,' she said in a phone interview with Breitbart News. 'But the INA does have a provision on the books already that bars people who have communicable diseases who [are] of public health significance. It gives the authority to HHS to create that list. Oklahoma's News9.com reports, "Police have made contact with a man who was the subject of an unauthorized entry at Moore High School last week. Police say the man, who has not yet been identified, is cooperating and there is no threat toward the high school. They first announced they were searching for the man on Wednesday. The incident was not reported to police until Sept. 26. Police held a press conference Wednesday afternoon regarding the incident. Police described the person as an Arab male

in his 40s with a thick Arabic accent. They say while he was on campus the man contacted two students and a teacher and asked 'suspicious' questions. According to Moore Police Sgt. Jeremy Lewis, who spoke during the press conference, the man was able to get inside of the school through an unlocked door at the entrance of the performing arts building. The entire incident only lasted approximately three or four minutes. Moore Police believe this incident has nothing to do with the attack at Vaughan Foods, which took place days later. Police say they cannot disclose what questions the man asked until they first make contact with him. However, multiple sources tell News 9 that the man was asking questions about how many police officers worked there on a normal basis and how close the nearest police department was." Examiner.com reports, "On Sept. 30, statistician and economist Dr. Jim Willie was a guest on the Caravan to Midnight radio show to talk about current financial, economic, and geo-political events. During his three hour interview, Dr. Willie stated that one of the purposes behind China's creation of the new Shanghai gold exchange is to eventually take over global price controls for the monetary metal away from the Comex, and then force a global currency reset by raising the price of gold to its true or actual value. The way this will come about in the near future according to Dr. Willie, is that China will reprice gold to near or above twice the current price, which will have a devastating effect on derivatives and ongoing use of the Comex futures market to suppress gold prices, and protect the dollar. And based upon supply details for the Comex over the past two years, America's primary gold exchange no longer settles their contracts through the delivery of physical gold, but instead settles in cash payments or through the hedging of gold using derivatives. Subsequently, once this failure to deliver takes place, then China, through the Shanghai gold exchange, will become the default market for price discovery, and at that point will re-adjust gold to its true value, instantly causing massive chaos in the fiat currency markets and leaving the world little alternative but to implement a complete currency reset. ... China is recognizing that physical gold is the ultimate catalyst to force an end to the domination of purely fiat finance, and that by revaluing gold to its rightful price will have the effect of both protecting their own currency, and wresting financial control away from the West and the system of dollar hegemony." (In other words, China is tired of the world's reliance on the inflated U.S. dollar as the world's reserve currency, the Federal Reserve's devaluation of the dollar via the expansion of the money supply, and the manipulation of the price of gold. China is acting to raise the price of gold closer to its market level, rather than the phony level that has been kept artificially low by the Federal Reserve banks. Law enforcement officials tell *The Washington Post* that federal civil rights charges are unlikely to be brought against George Zimmerman, who shot and killed teenager Trayvon Martin in an apparent act of self-defense in 2012. (*The Obama Timeline* believes there

are several reasons the Obama administration might drop the issue. First, the Martin-Zimmerman story is "old news." Second, the likelihood of a successful prosecution are low. Reuters reports, "[The] Islamic State [ISIS] beheaded seven men and three women in a northern Kurdish area of Syria, a human rights monitoring group said on Wednesday, part of what it described as a campaign to frighten residents resisting the militant group's advance." [65423, 65424]

Although Obama blames faulty intelligence on his failure to anticipate the rise of ISIS, he has yet to match Charles Strozier, Professor of History and the founding Director of the John Jay College Center on Terrorism, who blames global warming for its appearance in the terrorist world. Strozier writes, "A historic drought afflicted the country [Syria] from 2006 through 2010, setting off a dire humanitarian crisis for millions of Syrians. Yet the four-year drought evoked little response from Bashar al-Assad's government. ... When we fail to get the facts right about greenhouse gas emissions, we may unwittingly enable ISIS, Al Qaeda, Boko Haram, Al Shabaab and other extremist groups to flourish. As we consider our personal positions on climate change, it is important to understand all that is at stake in our interconnected world." Despite nearly 300 air strikes on ISIS/ISIL targets, Admiral John Kirby tells reporters, "We still believe ISIL remains a very potent force. Yes, they've changed some of their tactics, there's absolutely no question about that, in response to the pressure that we put them under, but that doesn't make them less dangerous or less potent over time. Yes, they're blending in more. Yes, they're dispersing, and yes, they aren't communicating quite as openly or as boldly as they once were. That's a good thing, because if they aren't operating as freely, then they aren't as free to achieve their goals. That doesn't mean ISIL doesn't still pose a threat. It doesn't mean they aren't still trying and in some cases succeeding at taking and holding ground. No one said this would be easy or quick, and no one should be lulled into a false sense of security by accurate airstrikes. We will not, we cannot bomb them into obscurity." [65409, 65428]

WashingtonTimes.com reports, "U.S. officials are engaged in a high-stakes push to convince Sunni Muslim tribal leaders in Iraq to cooperate with Baghdad and Washington in the fight against Islamic State extremists, a strategy that sources say could take a year and highlights the need for fighters on the ground. A State Department official confirmed Wednesday that retired Marine Gen. John R. Allen, whom the Obama administration tapped to lead the international effort against the Islamic State in both Iraq and Syria, was en route to the region to begin pushing the strategy. The plan, according to sources who spoke on condition of anonymity, is to try and recreate the so-called 'Sunni Awakening' that saw Iraqi tribal militias take the fight to the Islamic State's predecessor outfit, al Qaeda in Iraq (AQI), between 2005 and 2007." In the *Daily Mail*, former CNN program host Piers Morgan writes that Obama "this week committed professional suicide. Let me explain. There is a theory in politics that once a leader has fired 50 or more people from his or her administration, he or she is finished. Hardly surprising when we discover yesterday that he has only attended 42.1 percent of his Presidential Daily intelligence briefings. No wonder the Secret Service gets complacent when The Boss exudes complacency from every pore. ...[R]efusing to intervene in conflicts like Syria has so far proved to be spectacularly self-defeating. Pelosi responds, "Well, we have many borders. We have the Canadian border, we have the southern border. We have people coming by land and sea. And we certainly have to protect the American people. That's our first responsibility, to protect and defend. I don't think it has anything to do with what [Obama] is going to do next on immigration. I think it has to do with what we are doing for our national security." (In other words, "I am not about to answer that question.") Meanwhile, Congressman Steny Hoyer (D-MD) claims, "There's not a border security issue." Israeli Prime Minister Binyamin Netanyahu meets with Obama in the White House, and says, "As you know, ...Iran seeks a deal that would lift the tough sanctions that you worked so hard to put in place and leave it as a threshold nuclear power. I firmly hope

under your leadership that would not happen." (In other words, "I don't trust you to keep Iran from getting nuclear weapons.") Obama, no doubt miffed by the remark, "gets even" by having press secretary Josh Earnest tell reporters that the administration opposes any new Jewish settlements in East Jerusalem. At Spectator.org Aaron Goldstein writes, "Obama's behavior towards Netanyahu is cowardly. He couldn't face him like a man. How could he? Bibi [Netanyahu] would have destroyed Obama in a discussion over settlements. Obama isn't intelligent enough to be in the same room with Bibi." [65544, 65545, 65546, 65587]

Jill Tahmooressi, the mother of the U.S. Marine held in Mexico for making a wrong turn and crossing the border with weapons in his vehicle, tells members of Congress that she has never received a telephone call from Obama about her son Andrew and has no idea if he has done anything to secure his release. Pete Hegseth, president of Concerned Veteran's for America, states, "The paradox before this committee, this Congress, and especially this White House, could not be more stark: this administration negotiated with the Taliban, and exchanged five terrorist killers with American blood on their hands, for the release of Army Sergeant Bowe Bergdahl, a soldier who deserted his unit on the front lines less than two months into his first tour of duty. Yet this administration has invested little-to-no effort negotiating the return, from a neighboring country, of a highly-decorated Marine with two combat tours? Sergeant Bergdahl cost American lives. On Special Report columnist Charles Krauthammer observes, "I don't think it's a malaise sense in the country at all, I think it is a sense in the country that we have [an administration] that is falling apart, and it isn't as if it all happened at once. [Obama] comes in with a great vision, expanding government, the government's going to solve a lot of problems, and withdrawal at home, if you say nice things in Cairo, you say we want an outstretched hand, we're going to eliminate all the blunders that the previous administration had made, things will get better abroad. Now, it takes years until the consequences of that are seen abroad in the vacuum that we created by Obama's retreat, more aggressive, more wicked, in fact some of the worst people on earth have filled in in Libya, in Syria, in Iraq, Putin's on the march in eastern Europe. to do is somebody leaves, you promote their deputy. This is, I think, part of the endemic problem of second terms. They don't go out and mix with people, find new people, new hotshots to fill these jobs. They just keep promoting the person whose turn it is and they're not as good as the person they picked the first time... And before you get me accusing [Obama] of being physically lazy, I think there is a social kind of laziness. Refusing to reach out and meet a lot new people and check a lot of possibilities. Don't just go with the next person in line. And I really think this second term cabinet is not up to the first term cabinet because they never are. And you know that... they just never are. Kennedy went out and met people like [Robert] McNamara and [Dean] Rusk and he went looking for them and he put them into the best slots he could. And he talked them into it, he recruited people he didn't even know [and] he recruited them. Presidents should go out and look for people. They should be practicing affirmative action all the time in leading or else they get atrophied into that little world of people like Valerie [Jarrett] and Mrs. Obama and you're just listening to the same voices all the time. I know it is a rigorous demand but it's a real one. Or else you're going to get smaller as your presidency goes on and therefore more vulnerable to surprises." [65433]

On *Hannity*, Mark Levin tells host Sean Hannity, "There's not a thing [Obama has] done well. And here's the problem, Sean. People who support big government, centralized government, liberalism—well, congratulations, you have it. And it's an absolute disaster. And here's what's remarkable to me. [Obama] doesn't go back and actually look at something, have some circumspection, [and] say, 'You know, we're going to fix ObamaCare. Let's pull back. Maybe we bit off more than we can chew.' [No,] It's full speed ahead, the foot on the gas pedal. Now it's going to be executive imperial fiats for [illegal immigrant] amnesty! He's looking for all these other areas where he can nationalize what shouldn't be nationalized, where he's undermining what shouldn't be undermined. It's just like one thing after another after another. ... This guy continues to be that community organizer, or disorganizer... sitting in the Oval Office, throwing political mud balls in every direction he possibly can. Have you noticed when he's happiest? And the fact of the matter is, he's not paying attention to his job. fighting a political war. These pinpricks are not stopping ISIS. ISIS is about to conquer Baghdad. It's on the move on the Turkish border. On October 2 Senator Mark Udall (D-CO) tells MSNBC he has been "a thorn in the side" of the White House. (The statement is total nonsense. We averaged \$10,000 to \$12,000 a year in billed out-ofpocket medical expenses before Obamacare became law. In 2013, we incurred just over \$27,000 in out-of-pocket medical expenses. ... Obama's signature piece of legislation has more than doubled our yearly medical costs. ... I publicly warned my own senator, Kay R. Hagan, North Carolina Democrat, about the impact the legislation would have on my children. The co-pay for a medication that protects my youngest son's kidneys from damage had been \$131 for a three-month supply for five to six years before the law passed. In 2011, the medication suddenly more than doubled. We watched in horror as it skyrocketed to \$532 by the middle of 2013, while at the same time trying to get a medical-necessity exception." "Obamacare not only made everything less affordable, it created more work for families and providers. We have witnessed a corresponding decrease in quality of care because of the extra administrative demands placed on physicians and their staff. During the past month, some of our sons' most important medications have been discontinued from coverage altogether. ...[Obama] and Mrs. Hagan repeatedly told us, 'if you like your plan, you can keep your plan.' We now know that is not true. My husband has a good job, but it doesn't pay nearly enough to cover all of the increased expenses. Yet he earns too much for us to qualify for relief programs from pharmaceutical companies because government regulations dictate who the private companies are allowed to help. ... Today we find ourselves deeply in debt and drowning in the paperwork of what has become a full-time fight to restore coverage of essential, lifesaving treatments for our sons. This year alone, we have been billed tens of thousands of dollars in health care costs out-ofpocket. Our credit cards are maxed out and our insurer, bound by rigid government rules, is unable to help us. Obamacare has been far from the salvation that was promised. 'Health care and social assistance' accounts for 22,700 of the new jobs, of which 63 percent consist of 'ambulatory health care services.' 'Performing arts and spectator sports' gave the economy 7,200 jobs, and 20,400 Americans found employment as waitresses and bartenders." [65594]

"...We are looking at the workforce of a third world country with the vast bulk of the jobs in low-pay domestic service jobs. People working these part-time and independent contractor jobs cannot form a household or obtain a mortgage. ...[T]hese jobs are filled by those aged 55 and over who take the low paying jobs in order to supplement meager retirement incomes. The baby boomers are the only part of the US labor force whose participation rate is rising. Of the claimed new jobs in September, 230,000 or 93 percent were jobs filled by those 55 and older. Employment of Americans of prime working age (25-54) declined by10,000 jobs in September from the August level. As the US labor force continues its transition from first world to third world, real median family income will continue to decline. Ladders of upward mobility will continue to be dismantled, and income and wealth will continue to concentrate in the pockets of the One Percent. America is truly a country run for the few." [65594]

At Millennium Steel Service in Princeton, Indiana, Obama plays up the good economic news and ignores the bad. During a question and answer period, Obama is asked by the plant's general manager, "We are seeing almost a double-digit increase in health-care costs every year. Do you think that trend is going to go down, and what can we do to

control that trend?" Obama responds, "The question is whether you guys are shopping effectively enough, because it turns out that this year and in fact over the course of the last four years, premiums have gone up at the slowest rate in 50 years. ...[T]he issue now is what can we do to make sure that you at Millennium are shopping and seeing more competition, Because the problem with the health-care market is there are different pockets in different parts of the country. What we are doing is to make sure there is more competition, driving down costs when it comes to both businesses who are trying to buy health care for their employees, but also folks who do not get health care on the job and are having to buy it on the end that is part of what the affordable care act is all about. ...I am going to make sure—are you in charge of buying health care? You are? What I'm going to do is make sure you that you talk to some of our health-care market folks. I bet we can get you a better deal. All right? We will see if we can save you a little money." Gallup reports, "Registered voters are more likely to view their choice of candidate in this year's midterm elections as a message of opposition (32%) rather than support (20%) for ... Obama. (House Republicans would like to see the documents before Holder leaves office. The Obama administration hopes to stall the release of any documents until after Obama leaves office.) At the end of the press conference, C-SPAN cameras catch an exchange between CBS reporter Major Garrett and two other journalists. Garrett then puts his arm around the man and jokes, "Just so you know... so I'm gonna give you a big kiss." The man pulls back and says, "No, no, no, no, no, I don't want your kiss." The woman says, "If this DC test comes back positive... [unintelligible]." King claims he was told by "a young man in the military in Missouri... said that his unit, in a meeting with military commanders, was told they needed to prepare for riots in Ferguson & St. Louis very soon. ...He said that the commanders, very specifically communicated that they did not expect [Ferguson police officer] Darren Wilson to be indicted [for the killing of Michael Brown] & it could come by Oct 15. ...The young man also communicated that they had been doing early morning drills to prepare for riots on how to shut them down quickly." (Whether the story is nonsense or has some truth to it is not known.) [65395]

At ValleyCentral.com Action 4 News' Nadia Galindo reports, "The Center[s] for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has issued a level three warning for US citizens to avoid

traveling to West African countries experiencing an outbreak of Ebola. Immigrants from West African countries have entered the US illegally, according to Chris Cabrera with the National Border Patrol Council. 'Not too long ago we did catch some people, I believe, from Liberia,' he said. During the 2013 fiscal year, statistics from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security website show Border Patrol agents apprehended 112 immigrants from Guinea, 231 from Liberia and 145 immigrants from Sierra Leone, which are the three countries currently experiencing the most cases of Ebola. 'Our main concern like it's always been is the health and safety of our agents,' Cabrera said. He worries agents are not properly protected in the event they come across an immigrant with the Ebola virus. 'Our agents are trained, however, they are not medical professionals,' he said. If an immigrant with the virus does make it past agents, he worries they could possibly pass the contagious virus to other immigrants while in a stash house like they saw recently during a scabies outbreak." CNN.com reports, "Days before he became the first person diagnosed with Ebola on American soil, Thomas Eric Duncan answered 'no' to questions about whether he had cared for a patient with the deadly virus. Before leaving Liberia, Duncan also answered no to a question about whether he had touched the body of someone who died in an area affected by the disease, said Binyah Kesselly, board chairman of the Liberia Airport Authority. Witnesses say Duncan had been helping Ebola patients in Liberia. Liberian community leader Tugbeh Chieh Tugbeh said Duncan was caring for an Ebola-infected patient at a residence in Paynesville City, just outside Monrovia. ... Duncan is in serious condition at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital. So far, no one who had contact with Duncan has shown any indication of having contracted Ebola, Dallas County Judge Clay Jenkins told reporters Thursday. ... This was Duncan's first time in the United States, Smallwood said. The Liberian national was visiting his son and his son's mother in Dallas, Smallwood said. ... Health officials are reaching out to as many as 100 people who may have had contact with Duncan, a spokeswoman with the Texas Department of State Health Services said Thursday. These are people who are still being questioned because they may have crossed paths with the patient either at the hospital, at his apartment complex or in the community." (Some might ask why an unemployed man from Liberia was given a visa to travel to the United States in the first place. Besides Liberia being a hotbed of Ebola, the Center for Immigration Studies notes that Liberians have the fifth highest visa overstay rate of all visitors to the United States. That is, they are likely to remain in the country illegally.) [65449, 65450, 65502]

According to Reuters, "...Duncan, in his mid-40s, helped transport a pregnant woman suffering from Ebola to a hospital in Liberia, where she was turned away for lack of space. Duncan helped bring the woman back to her family's home and carried her into the house, where she later died, the newspaper reported. Four days later Duncan left for the United States, the [New York] Times said, citing the woman's parents and neighbors. ...Two days after he was sent home from a Dallas hospital, the man who is the first person to be diagnosed with Ebola in the United States was seen vomiting on the ground outside an apartment complex as he was bundled into an ambulance. ... 'His whole family was screaming. He got outside and he was throwing up all over the place,' resident Mesud Osmanovic, 21, said on Wednesday, describing the chaotic scene before the man

was admitted to Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital on Sunday where he is in serious condition." (Obama insists the chances of an Ebola outbreak in the United States are "extremely low," and claims, "we have world-class facilities and professionals ready to respond. And we have effective surveillance mechanisms in place.") [65450, 65451, 65502]

The North Korea Intellectuals Solidarity reported Wednesday that Kim Yo-Jong convened a meeting of Workers' Party officials in early September and secured their support for her to act as regent while her brother is

hospitalized. All party officials have been commanded to continue faithfully carrying out Kim Jong-Un's orders and the military has been put on high alert, the NKIS said. The North Korean government last week publicly admitted that Kim Jong-Un is unwell although it did not elaborate on his health issues." Some claim that the government's Organization and Guidance Department stopped taking orders from Kim Jong-Un in 2013 and has secretly taken control of the country. (On October 14 the dictator appears in public, walking with a cane. It is later reported by South Korea's spy agency that the North Korean dictator had ankle surgery to remove a cyst.) According to WND.com, Larry Klayman, founder of Judicial Watch, is calling for Obama to be deported. Dr. Thomas Frieden, director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, tells reporters, "Though we might wish we can seal ourselves off from the world [because of the Ebola virus], there are Americans who have the right of return and many other people that have the right to enter this country. We're not going to be able to get to zero risk no matter what we do unless we control the outbreak in West Africa. In terms of the entry process, we really need to be clear that we don't inadvertently increase the risk to people in this country by making it harder for us to respond to the needs in those countries, by making it harder to get assistance in and therefore those outbreaks would become worse, go on longer, and paradoxically, something that we did to try and protect ourselves might actually increase our risk." (Frieden is suggesting that Americans do not even want aid workers traveling to Africa. That is absurd. Americans want a reasonable travel ban, not a complete travel ban. Although they may not want non-citizens from West Africa entering the United States, they are not demanding that U.S. citizens be prohibited from returning home. One fear is that West Africans exposed to the Ebola virus, knowing they would receive better treatment at an American hospital than at home, will do their best to enter the United States. Americans will not only end up footing the bill for the treatment, they will be at greater risk of infection. Although Americans may be more likely to be struck by lightning than killed by Ebola, the government cannot prevent lightning strikes. It can, however, limit air traffic from West Africa.) Regardless of what Erdogan may have said, Turkey has, in fact, been a conduit for terrorists, and both Qatar and Turkey have financed ISIS—either directly or via oil smuggling.) In these troubled days, we call on you to be patient and stay united as your enemies are now united against you. Forget rivalries." [65787]

BizPacReview.com reports, "Centers for Disease Control and Prevention officials were called to Newark Liberty International Airport Saturday after a passenger believed to be from Liberia showed signs of possible Ebola symptoms. The passenger was reportedly vomiting as the flight landed in New Jersey and was immediately taken to University Hospital in Newark for further evaluation, according to ABC News. A CDC Hazmat crew, fully dressed in protective gear, removed the passenger and his daughter from United Airlines flight 998 arriving from Brussels, ABC reported. The remaining passengers were quarantined, but have since been allowed to leave after the passenger in question was reportedly determined noncontagious [sic; non-contagious]." [65585]

Pictures of these Syrian Kurdish female combatants carrying their Kalashnikovs, or those of their Kurdish Iraqi counterparts—the Peshmergettes—stand out as a striking anomaly in the region's often male-dominated conflicts." (Pamela Geller writes, "She knew. She knew what these devout Muslims do to non-Muslim girls. This woman is a heroine. True courage.") [65603, 65604, 65860]

WashingtonTimes.com reports, "The Islamic State holds just about the same number of towns in Iraq today as it did two months ago, when the U.S. began a bombing campaign to whittle down the terrorist army and support Iraqi ground troops trying to retake territory. More troubling, analysts say, is that the Islamic State, also known by the acronyms ISIS and ISIL, is ramping up what appear to be operations designed to one day invade Baghdad. Its objective is to take the international airport and begin conquering the capital, section by section. The Islamic State is continuing its urban attacks with car bombs, some of which have been detonated by foreign suicide bombers. The Pentagon is not openly confident that the Iraqi Security Forces will hold Baghdad. A spokesman has declined to predict that the sprawling city will stay in government control. The 2-monthold air campaign can be viewed in two ways. On one hand, the U.S. coalition strikes have slowed and, in some cases, stopped the Islamic State's advances. On the other hand, they have done little to achieve the ultimate goal of breaking the terrorists' grip on Mosul, Tal Afar, Fallujah and more than 10 other towns in northern and western Iraq." Face the Nation broadcasts an interview with Israeli Prime Minister Binyamin Netanyahu that leaves out criticism of Obama that is included in CBSNews.com version of the interview. In the broadcast version, Netanyahu says his relationship with Obama is "quite good. We had a conversation, I don't want to say like an old married couple, but [Obama] said that he's had more meetings with me than with any other foreign leader. I think you get to a point of mutual respect, you cut to the chase very quickly. You talk about the real

things, openly, as is befitting of real allies. I think we have a relationship of mutual respect, and mutual appreciation." Almost two weeks after the Pentagon extended its aerial campaign from Iraq to neighbouring Syria in an attempt to take on Isis militants in their desert strongholds, Kurdish fighters said the bombing campaign was having little impact in driving them back. Isis units have edged to within two kilometres of the centre of Kobani, according to Kurds fighting a rearguard action inside the city. The jihadis, who this weekend generated further outrage with the murder of the British hostage Alan Henning, are simply too numerous to be cowed by the air assault by US fighter jets, the Kurds say. 'Air strikes alone are really not enough to defeat Isis in Kobani,' said Idris Nassan, a senior spokesman for the Kurdish fighters desperately trying to defend the important strategic redoubt from the advancing militants. 'They are besieging the city on three sides, and fighter jets simply cannot hit each and every Isis fighter on the ground.'" [65648, 65713, 65714, 65720]

CIS's research director Steven Camarota, the co-author of the report, said that this means the U.S.'s current immigration system is failing to properly assimilate people from foreign countries, and those assimilation problems are carrying over into future generations. Camarota said that can be attributed to all-time high levels of legal immigration with over a million people a year admitted into the U.S. legally, and a new 'tolerance' in Washington for the continued surge of illegal immigration. ... The report found there were seven foreign languages other than English that more than a million people speak predominantly inside their homes, Spanish being the most prominent at 38.4 million. Chinese is second with 3 million people in America speaking it as the primary language inside their homes; national Philippines language Tagalog is third, with 1.6 million; Vietnamese fourth, with 1.4 million; French, fifth with 1.3 million; and Korean and Arabic are tied for sixth with 1.1 million each." On 60 Minutes, FBI Director James Comey says there are "a dozen or so" Americans fighting with the terrorists in Syria, and admits, "Ultimately, an American citizen, unless their passport's [sic; his or her passport is] revoked, is entitled to come back. According to Napolitano, "federal statute makes it a crime, punishable by 10 years in jail, up to life in prison, for materially aiding a terrorist organization." If Comey knows who the American ISIS fighters are, he can request an arrest warrant and have them apprehended the moment they again set foot on U.S. soil. He does not need to "track them" as they wander freely throughout the United States. Napolitano to Kelly explains that American ISIS fighters cannot be charged with treason because the U.S. Constitution defines treason as giving aid and comfort to the nation's enemies, but ISIS is not a designated enemy because Congress has not declared war against that organization.) The American Civil Liberties Union and the Advancement Project asked the U.S. Supreme Court last week to take emergency action and block the law." (The Supreme Court has already ruled that Indiana's similar law is constitutional.) "Wisconsin's law requires people to show certain government-issued photo ID at the polls to vote. Anyone who doesn't have the proper ID on Election Day can cast a provisional ballot, and they would then have until 4 p.m. on the Friday after the election to present the required ID to have the vote counted." (Obama and Attorney General Eric Holder, who oppose photo ID for voting, will not be pleased—but Obama cannot issue an executive order forcing a state to ignore its own laws.) [65686, 65687, 65689]

Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the U.S. National Institute for Allergy and Infectious Diseases, tells The Canadian Press, "It is conceivable that this [Ebola] epidemic will not turn around even if we pour resources into it. It may just keep going and going and it might require a vaccine. As the epidemic gets more and more formidable and in some cases out of control it is quite conceivable, if not likely, that we may need to deploy the vaccine to the entire country to be able to shut the epidemic down. That is clearly a possibility." According to ModernHealthCare.com, on October 26 "Sierra Leone reported 121 deaths. That is more deaths in a single day than recorded in most Ebola outbreaks from start to finish. The World Health Organization says to date about 7,500 people are known to have been infected with the virus, and more than 3,400 have died." (While 3,400 deaths might be considered alarming, more than 50 million people were killed worldwide during the 1918-1920 flu epidemic. As destructive as the Ebola virus may be, far more Africans are killed each year by HIV/AIDS, malaria, starvation, tuberculosis, and diarrhea.) GlobalResearch.ca observes, "The article did not specify which country in particular Dr. Fauci—whose institute just so happens to be currently working on an experimental Ebola—vaccine (the first to begin human clinical trials) with Big Pharma giant GlaxoSmithKline—was referring to. Cruz was born in Canada to a Cuban father and an American mother. He was considered both a citizen of Canada and a citizen of the United States. However, he can arguably only be considered a generic U.S. citizen, rather than a "natural born citizen," and is therefore not eligible to serve as president. (Louisiana Governor Bobby Jindal, former Senator Rick Santorum, South Carolina Governor Nikki Haley, and Senator Marco Rubio (R-FL) are, like Cruz, not natural born citizens and cannot legally serve as president or vice president. Of course, Obama also cannot legally serve—for the same reason—but that did not prevent him from being elected. The political parties and the mainstream media simply chose to ignore the historical meaning of the term "natural born citizen" so that Obama could run. The film is called *Unfair: Exposing the IRS*, and it will screen in 674 theaters nationwide, though for one night only, courtesy of Fathom Events, a company that brings sports, concerts, speeches and other alternative entertainment to movie screens. The movie is about alleged abuse at the IRS, the agency responsible for collecting taxes in the U.S. Looming large is a scandal revealed last year wherein Republican and some Democratic lawmakers accused Lerner, at the time the director of the exempt organizations unit of the IRS, of delaying the applications of conservative groups seeking tax-free status from 2010-2013." He was Tasered by armed police who stormed a relative's flat where he was sleeping after flying into the country. The devout Muslim, studying in Sudan, is suspected of travelling to Syria and conspiring with the brutal terror group. Three of his friends, all aged 20 or 21, were also held by Scotland Yard counter-terrorism officers. Magistrates have granted police an extra five days to question four men arrested on suspicion of plotting a terrorist attack on the UK, the Met said this morning. ... Hassane was arrested on Tuesday on the Princess Alice Estate, West London, where two of the July 21 bombers were found nine years ago." [65861]

At the State Department, spokeswoman Jen Psaki is asked by the AP's Matt Lee, "Jen, you said that [Obama] had laid out a clear and comprehensive strategy for dealing with this. The Associated Press reports, "Wal-Mart Stores Inc. plans to eliminate health insurance coverage for some of its part-time U.S. employees in a move aimed at controlling rising health care costs of the nation's largest private employer. Wal-Mart told The Associated Press that starting Jan. 1, it will no longer offer health insurance to employees who work less than an average of 30 hours a week. The move affects 30,000 employees, or about 5 percent of Wal-Mart's total part-time workforce, but comes after the company already had scaled back the number of part-time workers who were eligible for health insurance coverage since 2011." According to DailyCaller.com, "The massive company employs 1.4 million people for both full- and part-time work. Of that, 1.2 million workers and family members take part in the company's health care plan. Wal-Mart expects to pay \$500 million more on health benefits this year just due to the growth of health care costs—already \$170 million higher than its February estimate of \$330 million. ... Wal-Mart is upping employees' share of premiums for all full-time workers. The company will take out of enrolled workers' paychecks for a basic health plan will rise to \$21.90 per pay period beginning Jan. 1, up from \$18.40. ... Wal-Mart is also cutting the percentage of out-of-pocket costs the company covers for full-time workers that use health reimbursement accounts and health savings accounts. Next year, the company will pay 75 percent of out-of-pocket costs after employees meet their deductibles, down from 80 percent this year. ... Target, Home Depot, and notably, Trader Joe's created waves last year for dropping their health care coverage for part-time workers as well." [65667, 65704]

The handbook, titled United Against Terrorism, has become a contentious issue for the RCMP since its release. Several sections of the guide instruct Muslim community members not to cooperate with police while others claim jihad 'is a noble concept.' The RCMP ultimately decided to reject the book, citing its 'adversarial tone." State Department spokeswoman Carolyn Glassman says, "[We were] simply sharing information about a new product related to counterterrorism. Our reposting does not connote an endorsement." The manual states, "Do not refer to terrorists as 'jihadis.' This only emboldens them and gives them a legitimate status in the eyes of the vulnerable. Terrorism is not jihad. Jihad is a noble concept in Islam." (Pamela Geller notes, "This booklet is a product of the National Council of Canadian Muslims, which is Hamas-CAIR in Canada.") But we're not—we know that this is going to be a long struggle. We know that ISIL is going to continue to grab ground. And there are going to continue to be villages and towns and cities that they take. We all have to recognize that reality. So when we get up here and we say it's going to be a long struggle and it's going to be difficult, and when we get up here and say airpower, military power alone, let's take airpower off the table for a minute, isn't going to be enough to fix it, we really mean it. And so we all need to prepare ourselves for the reality that other towns and villages, and perhaps Kobani, will be taken by ISIL. They have made no bones about the fact that that... that this is their goal, to govern, to have space and territory that belongs to them. So we just have to recognize that." (Kirby doesn't know why ISIS attaches importance to Kobani, and then admits its goal is to capture as much territory as possible. He is also incorrect when he says no one is asking questions about other towns and cities captured by ISIS. His main point is, however, that airpower alone will not defeat ISIS and without troops on the ground there may be no stopping the rise of the Islamic State—even if Obama refuses to admit that. Some might argue, of course, that Obama has no problem with the rise of an Islamic State.) [65777, 65781, 65782, 65826]

Department of Homeland Security Secretary Jeh Johnson tells CNN's Wolf Blitzer that about 150 people per day travel to the United States from the African nations most affected by the Ebola virus. "When somebody travels from one of those three West African countries, even through a transit point [in Europe], we know where they're coming from. So we're able to track this. And we know that on average it's about 150 passengers a day. ... The protocol is, first of all, our Customs personnel are very skilled at examining people, assessing people for a variety of reasons. And we're asking passengers to fill out a declaration about what symptoms do you have [sic]? Are you feeling ill? Where have you been for the last 21 days and where will you be for the next few days? [The personnel are "so good" that they did nothing to stop Ebola-infected Thomas Eric Duncan from entering the country.] And, through a non-contact thermometer, we're going to be taking the temperatures of every passenger that [sic; who] comes from one of the three affected countries." CNSNews.com observes, "Given the 21-day incubation period for Ebola and the 150 people coming in each day, that means that at any given time there could be 21 x 150 people in the U.S. who could be asymptomatically incubating Ebola, and who are free to wander around the country. That is 3,150 people who at any moment could become symptomatic anywhere in the country and start exposing people." [65820, 65821]

TheHill.com reports, "The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) told a federal court that it may have lost the text messages at the center of a lawsuit by a libertarian think tank. The Competitive Enterprise Institute (CEI) sued the EPA last year in federal court to compel the release of text messages to and from Administrator Gina McCarthy and her predecessor under the Freedom of Information Act. In the Tuesday filing to the United States District Court for the District of Columbia, Justice Department lawyers representing the EPA said the agency will soon file a notice that it may have misplaced records that it was legally required to retain." According to Breitbart.com, "A new report from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) finds that the Antarctic ice cap has exceeded 20 million square kilometers, a freeze that hasn't been seen since 1979 when the agency began to compile records. 'Sea ice surrounding Antarctica reached a new record high extent this year, covering more of the southern oceans than it has since scientists began a long-term satellite record to map sea ice extent in the late 1970s,' the NASA website reported on October 7." According to a CBS News poll, 40 percent of Americans approve of Obama's handling of the ISIS situation, while 51 percent disapprove. [65754]

In the Los Angeles area bumper stickers that read "EBOLA" start appearing—with the letter "O" replaced by the Obama campaign's blue arch and red and white roadway. [65756, 65757]

NBCNewYork.com reports, "A federal U.S. Customs and Border Protection agent who works on the front lines at Newark International Airport says customs officers at the tristate hub lack appropriate training and equipment to handle potential Ebola cases. 'They are assuring the public everything is being done, but it is not,' the agent told NBC 4 New York, adding there are currently no doctors or CDC personnel assigned to the airport for when flights with passengers from West Africa arrive. The agent's statements come as the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention announced new screening and security measures would be implemented this weekend at the five airports, including Newark, that account for 95 percent of travelers from Ebola-ridden countries. The agent expressed concern such measures had yet to be implemented. The agent says confusion reigned there Saturday when a passenger believed to be Liberian on an arriving flight was vomiting." CNSNews.com reports, "Judicial Watch president Tom Fitton says he has 'no doubt' that a Sept. 23 federal court order requiring the Department of Justice (DOJ) to turn over an index of documents relating to the [Operation] Fast and Furious scandal by October 22 prompted the resignation of Attorney General Eric Holder two days later." Fitton says, "There's no doubt the writing was on the wall between Fast and Furious and the IRS scandal circling around the Justice Department. He did not want to be a person of interest in Washington discussions when more information about Fast and Furious came out... and the Washington way is that [when] bad things happen, [people] get out of Dodge and hope everyone forgets. ...This is a battle that puts Holder in contempt of Congress, first time an attorney general's ever been put in contempt of Congress, saw Nixonian assertions of executive privilege by Barack Obama, and a hapless Congress in the face of all this lawlessness. ...If you were a private citizen and you allowed a gun to go 'walk' out of your home knowing, with the plan that it be used, with the idea and hope that it be used in a crime and show up at a crime scene, you'd be in jail. To make matters worse Dach wasn't fired after exploiting women [even though Secret Service agents who did the same thing as Dach were fired], he was hired as a policy advisor for the State Department's Office of Global Women's Issues. (Also as a side note, Dach's daddy [Leslie Dach, who Jonah Goldberg notes is a former Walmart lobbyist who also worked with Michelle Obama's "Let's Move" campaign] was a big Obama campaign donor.) White House press secretary Josh Earnest calls the story old news because it happened in 2012. (The activity may have occurred in 2012, but the cover-up was not reported then and is a valid October 2014 story.) National Journal's political editor Josh Kraushaar tweets, "[My] First instinct is to trust what the WH is saying, but they've squandered a lot of that trust lately." But with the release of the *Post* article, she will likely be removed from the list—to keep her from being grilled at a conformation hearing. The leak of information to the *Post* no doubt came from the Secret Service itself, in retaliation for attacks on the agency over recent security mishaps. 'The State of Texas will immediately appeal and will urge the Fifth Circuit to resolve this matter quickly to avoid voter confusion in the upcoming election,' said Lauren Bean, a spokeswoman for Abbott's office. ... Nineteen states have laws requiring voters to show identification at the polls. Courts across the country have knocked down challenges—including at the U.S. Supreme Court—but the Texas case attracted unusual attention from U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder. ... The office of Abbott, who is favored to win the race to replace [Rick] Perry as governor, said minorities and whites alike supported the law in public opinion polls. It also pointed to other states, such as Georgia and Indiana, where the similar measures have been upheld." [65881]

The St. Louis *Post-Dispatch* reports, "Another police-involved fatal shooting of a teenager, this time in south St. Louis not far from the Missouri Botanical Garden, led to hours of protests overnight Wednesday and into Thursday morning as an angry crowd gathered quickly when news spread across social media. St. Louis Police Chief Sam Dotson said the officer was off-duty, working a secondary job for a private security company, when he fatally shot an 18-year-old male Wednesday night. Police say the teen had opened fire on the officer. The officer was unhurt. Relatives of the dead teen who came to the scene identified him as Vonderrit Myers Jr., 18. They disputed the police version. They say he didn't have a weapon." (Myers' relatives neglect to mention to reporters that he was wearing an ankle bracelet monitor and was out on bail after a gun violation conviction.) [65812, 65815, 66051, 66052, 66152]

NBC chief foreign correspondent comments on a comment by Secretary of State John Kerry that the Syrian city of Kobani is not a strategic priority: "The situation in Kobani, from the global perspective, [it] might not be the most important city in the world, there other key cities in Syria. It is highly visible, and perhaps Secretary Kerry is being a little bit tone deaf to the importance that Kobani has taken on here in this country [Turkey], on social media, there are cities are being attacked by ISIS, but nobody can see them. Everyone can see Kobani, people are watching the city fall almost in real time and they are watching Turkish troops sitting 200 yards away doing nothing. Turkish tanks have their cannons pointed at Kobani and they're not firing. American airplanes, until very recently, haven't been doing very much. Now, there does sees to be something changing despite Secretary Kerry's statements that, well, Kobani's not that important. Clearly the message is sinking in because as you [Andrea Mitchell] mentioned, in the last 48 hours there have been 23 air strikes around Kobani. That's more air strikes than there have been around Kobani in the last three weeks. So, he might be saying it's not that important, but I think the U.S. is getting the message that this is a very visible and symbolic target that has a lot of people, particularly in Turkey, incredibly upset. About 21 people have been killed in riots here over the last couple of days because of Kobani. And that domestic unrest in Turkey is not over yet. Maybe it's not the only city in Syria that is under attack by ISIS, but it certainly has an over-weighted importance because of its visibility." (Turkish President Recip Tayyip Erdogan is doing nothing to save Kobani from ISIS because its residents are primarily Kurds. Erdogan himself probably would not mind the establishment of a powerful Islamic Caliphate—as long as he gets to be the caliph. It is worth recalling that the United States failed to act when Saddam Hussein slaughtered Kurds and Shi'ites in northern Iraq after the Gulf War. The Kurds therefore have more than a few reasons to believe Obama will not come to their rescue.) [65778, 65781, 65782, 65826, 65983]

(For many Muslims, the goal of emigrating to the United States is not to become Americans; it is to establish a beachhead in America, build mosques, spread Islam, have as many babies as possible, win elections via their increased numbers, force the acceptance of Shari'ah law, and be ready for the day when the word comes down to take over the United States.) Charles Krauthammer writes at NationalReview.com, "No one can match Stalin for merciless cynicism, but President Recep Tayyip Erdogan of Turkey is offering a determined echo by ordering Turkish tanks massed on the Syrian border, within sight of the besieged Syrian town of Kobani, to sit and do nothing. ... Because Turkey has its own Kurdish problem—battling a Kurdish insurgency on and off for decades—Erdogan appears to prefer letting the Islamic State destroy the Kurdish enclave on the Syrian side of the border rather than lift a finger to save it. Perhaps later he will move in to occupy the rubble. Moreover, Erdogan entertains a larger vision: making Turkey the hegemonic power over the Sunni Arabs, as in Ottoman times. The Islamic State is too radical and uncontrollable to be an ally in that mission. But it is Sunni. And it fights Shiites, Alawites, and Kurds. Erdogan's main regional adversary is the Shiite-dominated rule of Syria's Bashar Assad. Erdogan demands that the U.S. take the fight to Assad before Turkey will join the fight against the Islamic State. It took Vice President Biden to accidentally blurt out the truth when he accused our alleged allies in the region of playing a double game—supporting the jihadists in Syria and Iraq, then joining the U.S.-led coalition against them. His abject apologies to the United Arab Emirates, Saudi Arabia, and Turkey notwithstanding, Biden was right." [65859]

CNSNews.com reports, "Speaking in a video message to residents of West African countries currently experiencing outbreaks of Ebola, ... Obama dispensed advice on how residents can avoid the disease, including: 'You cannot get it through casual contact like sitting next to someone on a bus.' At the same time, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is advising Americans who travel to the Ebola-stricken nations to 'avoid public transportation.'" (Obama does not explain why the Ebola virus cannot be spread on a bus but can be spread on an airplane—because he is wrong. Even the CDC web site states, "Unlike respiratory illnesses like measles or chickenpox, which can be transmitted by virus particles that remain suspended in the air after an infected person coughs or sneezes, Ebola is transmitted by direct contact with body fluids of a person who has symptoms of Ebola disease. Although coughing and sneezing are not common symptoms of Ebola, if a symptomatic patient with Ebola coughs or sneezes on someone, and saliva or mucus come into contact with that person's eyes, nose or mouth, these fluids may transmit the disease" [emphasis added]." The site also states, "Ebola is killed with hospital-grade disinfectants (such as household bleach). Ebola on dried surfaces such as doorknobs and countertops can survive for several hours; however, virus in body fluids (such as blood) can survive up to several days at room temperature.") At FoxNews.com CDC director Tom Frieden argues against a travel ban to protect the United States from Ebola carriers. Frieden writes, "A travel ban is not the right answer. It's simply not feasible to build a wall—virtual or real—around a community, city, or country. A travel ban would essentially quarantine the more than 22 million people that make up the combined populations of Liberia, Sierra Leone, and Guinea. When a wildfire breaks out we don't fence it off. We go in to extinguish it before one of the random sparks sets off another outbreak somewhere else." (Frieden is, of course, not only incorrect—he is ignorant. When a wildfire breaks out, a *firebreak* is created—areas of land are cleared

around the fire so that it has no fuel to burn when it approaches. Frieden has apparently never heard of firebreaks, moats, drawbridges, or even Ellis Island.) Frieden continues, "We don't want to isolate parts of the world, or people who aren't sick, because that's going to drive patients with Ebola underground, making it infinitely more difficult to address the outbreak." (Frieden does not explain why an Ebola patient in Liberia would go "underground" simply because he cannot fly to the United States. Why would he not seek treatment in Liberia?) [66288]

"It could even cause these countries to stop working with the international community as they refuse to report cases because they fear the consequences of a border closing." (That is absurd. Why would a quarantined country ignore outside help and allow its citizens to die?) "Stopping planes from flying from West Africa would severely limit the ability of Americans to return to the United States or of people with dual citizenship to get home, wherever that may be." (Yes, and that is the point: to make it difficult for people in Ebola-infested nations to travel to other countries and spread the virus. After a 21-day quarantine they could be allowed to travel.) "In addition to not stopping the spread of Ebola, isolating countries will make it harder to respond to Ebola, creating an even greater humanitarian and health care emergency." (That is also absurd. No country would be totally isolated. Aid and assistance and medical workers would still be allowed into the country to treat patients and work to stop the spread of the virus, but anyone who goes in would be carefully monitored before they are allowed to go out.) "Importantly, isolating countries won't keep Ebola contained and away from American shores. Paradoxically, it will increase the risk that Ebola will spread in those countries and to other countries, and that we will have more patients who develop Ebola in the U.S." (It is ridiculous to claim that restricting travel to and from a nation like Liberia would "increase the risk" that Ebola would spread out of Liberia. Such a statement defies logic.) [66288]

"People will move between countries, even when governments restrict travel and trade." And that kind of travel becomes almost impossible to track." (It is correct that travel restrictions would not provide a 100 percent guarantee that no one from Liberia could enter the United States. But not enacting a travel ban would certainly guarantee that people from Liberia will enter the United States.) "Isolating communities also increases people's distrust of government, making them less likely to cooperate to help stop the spread of Ebola." (Why would a quarantine make people distrust government? It should be evidence that the nation is taking action to protect non-inflicted people.) "Isolating communities and regions within countries will also backfire. Restricting travel or trade to and from a community makes the disease spread more rapidly in the isolated area, eventually putting the rest of the country at even greater risk." (Frieden is essentially arguing that it is better to have the virus spread than be limited to some areas.) "To provide relief to West Africa, borders must remain open and commercial flights must continue." (Commercial flights can be banned, while charter flights can still be allowed to permit aid, supplies, and medical workers to enter nations like Liberia.) "There is no more effective way to protect the United States against additional Ebola cases than to address this outbreak at the source in West Africa." (But there is no reason dealing with the outbreak in Africa cannot also be accompanied with travel restrictions.) [66288]

"What works most effectively for quelling disease outbreaks like Ebola is not quarantining huge populations." (In fact, quarantining those infected populations is perfectly logical. That is why, for centuries, lepers were kept isolated from the rest of the general populations.) "What works is focusing on and isolating the sick and those in direct contact with them as they are at highest risk of infection." (Frieden apparently does not understand the meaning if the word "isolating," as that is precisely what travel restrictions would accomplish.) "Americans can be reassured we are taking measures to protect citizens here." (Allowing people to travel from Ebola-stricken nations to the United States would seem not to reassure anyone.) "Today, all outbound passengers from Guinea, Liberia, and Sierra Leone are screened for Ebola symptoms before they board an airplane." (The passengers have their temperatures taken and they are asked if they have been exposed to Ebola. Those steps will hardly prevent a person with the Ebola virus from entering the United States.) "Travelers from those countries will be escorted to an area of the airport set aside for screening. There they will be observed for signs of illness, asked a series of health and exposure questions, and given information on Ebola and information on monitoring themselves for symptoms for 21 days. Their temperature will be checked, and if there's any concern about their health, they'll be referred to the local public health authority for further evaluation or monitoring." ("Take their temperature, trust that they do not lie on a questionnaire, and have them monitor themselves for 21 days" hardly seems like the way to protect Americans.) [66288]

Interestingly, although Frieden opposes a travel ban to protect Americans from a killer West African virus, he has no problem telling Americans how to conduct their personal lives. Between 2002 and 2009 Frieden served as commissioner of New York City's Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, where he ran anti-smoking campaigns, supported the 2009 62-cents-per-pack cigarette tax, distributed more than 36 million "official" New York City condoms, adopted regulations to eliminate trans fats in restaurants, required chain restaurants to post calorie contents, and promoted various other "we know better than you" campaigns. (Frieden apparently believes he knows how to keep Americans from killing themselves, yet does not want to stop Liberians from flying into the United States to kill them.) [66523, 66524]

Also at FoxNews.com Dr. Keith Ablow suggests why Obama has chosen not to impose travel restrictions on West Africa: "...Obama is very sensitive to being defined in any way by the borders of this country. I think he sees himself as a citizen of the world and sees Americans as having infected others with our deadly economic policies for a long time, thereby inflicting untold suffering on developing nations. To now lead the way to America insulating itself from a scourge sweeping the very countries he seems to think we have preyed upon could, of course, strike him (if only unconsciously) as profoundly unfair. I believe [Obama] may literally believe we should suffer along with less fortunate nations. And if he does, that is a very dangerous psychological stance from which to confront Ebola. Let me say this plainly, as a psychiatrist who has studied [Obama] only from a distance: In order for ...Obama to keep thinking of himself as the leader of the world—and not just the free world—it may be that our boundaries must remain porous,

allowing illegal immigrants and, potentially, even diseases to flow through them." [65997, 65998]

Ablow's theory is quite logical. Obama has already demonstrated that he does not believe in American exceptionalism. He considers the United States just one of 190 other nations, and perhaps no better than any of them. In fact, he dislikes the United States for what he sees as its "imperialist" actions around the world, just as he hates Great Britain for having established colonies and protectorates during its "empire" days—never mind the fact that without such expansion the people of Africa might still not have shoes, law, or books. In Obama's worldview, Great Britain did not bring civilization to India and Africa, it brought death and destruction. That is why, on his first day in the White House, Obama exploded in anger and ordered the removal of a bust of Winston Churchill. To Obama, Churchill did not represent a nation's courageous battle against the Nazis, he represented a nation that subjugated the black man. To Obama, the United States is not a beacon of hope for all who long for liberty, it is a nation that imported slaves from Africa and has yet to be properly punished for its actions. He therefore does not care if Americans die from the Ebola virus. He believes they "have it coming."

Secretary of State John Kerry addresses an audience at the Massachusetts Clean Energy Center, and says, "And for those people who still stand in the way, for those people who even still today want to try to question whether or not their science is effective or not, I'd just ask you, ask a simple question: 'If we're wrong about this [global warming] future, what's the worst that could happen to us for making these choices? The worst that could happen to us is we create a whole lot of new jobs, we kick our economies into gear, we have healthier people, healthier children because we have cleaner air, we live up to our environmental responsibility, we become truly energy independent, and our security is stronger and greater and sustainable as a result. That's the worst that happens to us. What happens if they're wrong? If they're wrong—catastrophe. Life as you know it on earth ends. Seven degrees increase Fahrenheit, and we can't sustain crops, water, life under those circumstances." (Kerry is wrong on both points. If the Kerry supporters impose the global warming taxes and regulations they desire, the standard of living of almost all Americans will decline substantially because the cost of goods and services will dramatically increase. If the earth's average temperature does in fact increase by a degree or two over the next century, the result will be increased crop yields and an improved ability to feed the world. Kerry's warnings are valid *only* if the average temperature increases *substantially*, and there is no evidence that such a change will occur.) [65895]

WHO in Iowa reports that the state's insurance commissioner has approved 2015 premium increases averaging 14.5 percent for Blue Cross Blue Shield customers and 11.9 percent for Wellmark health plans. [65794, 65795]

DailyCaller.com reports, "Web users will face billions of dollars in new taxes if Congress allows a ban on Internet taxes to expire in December. The Internet Tax Freedom Act prevents state and local governments from taxing Internet use, and has been reauthorized every three years since 1998. If it is not reauthorized in December, consumers and businesses could face \$14.7 billion in new taxes, according to a new American Action

Forum report. Extension of the ban has wide support in Congress, but this time it could be linked to a much more controversial bill, the Marketplace Fairness Act, that would allow states to collect a sales tax on Internet goods sold in the state by companies located online or outside of the state. The tax would be a welcome source of revenue for cash-strapped governors, and supporters say it would take away the unfair advantage online companies currently hold over companies with physical locations. Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid [D-NV] told The Hill he'll do 'whatever it takes' to pass the Marketplace Fairness Act this year." [65907]

According to a CBS poll, Republicans have a 49 to 43 percent lead on the "generic" Congressional ballot. Townhall.com political editor Guy Benson notes, "It's historically rare for Republicans to have *any* advantage on this indicator, so what explains their substantial edge here? How about a 30 point lead among independents, and an eight-point enthusiasm gap." On the issue of terrorism, 53 percent of those polled say Republicans will do a better job, versus 32 percent who say Democrats would. On the economy, the GOP advantage is 49-40. On foreign policy, the edge is 49-38. Only 29 percent believe the economy is improving. (CBS makes no mention of its own poll's results on its evening news broadcast.) [65796, 65797, 65805, 65813]

With less than a month to election day, Senator Mary Landrieu (D-LA) fires her campaign manager—a clear sign she expects to lose (and a sign that she will probably unload some nasty ads against her opponent). [65798, 65817]

A Fox News poll shows Republican candidates for the U.S. Senate up by 4 in Alaska, up by 7 in Arkansas, up by 6 in Colorado, up by 5 in Kansas, and up by 4 in Kentucky. (Obama's approval rating is 36 percent or lower in each of those states.) [65796]

Democrat Senate candidate Alison Lundergan Grimes refuses to tell the editorial board of the *Louisville Courier-Journal* whether she voted for Obama in 2008 or 2012—despite the fact that she was a delegate in the Kentucky delegation at the Democrat National Convention in 2012. In her desperate attempt to distance herself from Obama, Grimes (whose father, Gerald Lundergan, donated \$46,000 to the Obama campaign in 2012) expects Kentuckians to believe that she never voted for him. She says, "You know, this election isn't about [Obama]." (Obama himself, of course, has said that the election was about his policies.) NBC's Chuck Todd later asks, "[C]an Kentuckians expect her to cast a tough vote on anything? Is she ever going to answer a tough question on anything? You want to be a U.S. Senator? If you can't say—if you can't find a way to stand behind your party's president, you can disagree with him but can't answer that basic question [then you] come across looking ridiculous. I think she disqualified herself." (Not surprisingly, Todd's "disqualified herself" remark finds its way into a campaign ad for her opponent, Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY).) In the Gallup poll, Obama's approval/disapproval rating falls to 40/55 percent. [659811]

Obama heads to California for three days of fundraising. One event is held at the home of the almost-universally disliked actress Gwyneth Paltrow. (Whether her children Apple and Moses each paid \$15,000 to attend is not known.) Actor/comedian Albert Brooks tweets, "The people attending the Obama function at Gwyneth Paltrow's house are going to be consciously uncoupled with their money." (In March 2014, Paltrow described her separation from her husband of 10 years as a "conscious uncoupling.") CBS News' Mark Knoller points out that Obama has made 25 trips to California since entering the White House, and 20 of those trips were for fundraising. Not surprisingly, Obama's motorcade disrupts traffic in the Los Angeles area, and in Paltrow's neighborhood in Brentwood. At the Paltrow event, the wealthy actress—net worth: an estimated \$140 million—gushes over Obama: "You're so handsome that I can't speak properly." She also praises Obama's equal pay agenda because the issue is important to her "as a working mother." She also says, "It would be wonderful if we were able to give this man [Obama] all of the power that he needs to pass the things that he needs to pass." (Paltrow does not suggest whether his title should be king or fuehrer.) Morning Jolt's Jim Geraghty comments on Paltrow: "There is a hardened cocoon of entitlement, self-absorption, and self-pity around many of our national elites." NYTimes.com later reports on the Paltrow event: "Traffic stood still, children were stranded at school, residents could not leave their own driveways. That's not the way life is supposed to be lived in Mandeville Canyon. In a post on the Nextdoor Mandeville Canyon website, a private social network for area residents, Bret Lewis said that the neighborhood did not need people like Ms. Paltrow 'who pay no heed to the concerns of their neighbors.' He went on to solicit support for having Ms. Paltrow kicked out of Mandeville Canyon. 'She belongs in the movie theaters, and ... Obama can entertain in the Staples Center,' he said. ...'I have a crying child on a soccer field!' one woman yelled as she passed by. (She was one of the few residents who were [sic; was] allowed to drive through.) Mr. Lewis, in his post, said his family ended up in a restaurant 'with a bunch of other displaced residents.' 'My 13-year-old daughter broke into tears, was unable to do her homework,' he said. 'We finally got home at 9:00 and my daughter was up late studying, ultimately ill-prepared for her exams.'" Politico reports, "Acting on a 6-3 vote, the U.S. Supreme Court has blocked Wisconsin from implementing a new voter ID law in next month's election. The high court released an order late Thursday that revived a permanent injunction a federal court judge imposed in April, barring enforcement of the 2011 law on the grounds that it discriminated against minorities by forcing many of them to get new identification. The justices who joined in the order... did not offer a rationale for their decision, which will remain in effect until the court either rules on the merits of the case or refuses to hear it." (On October 6 the Seventh U.S. District Circuit Court of Appeals upheld Wisconsin's photo ID law. The Supreme Court had previously ruled that Indiana's similar law was constitutional. The decision to block Wisconsin's law is related to timing, with Justices believing it is too close to election day to implement the new law. That is, the law may survive a future appeals process and be implemented for future elections.) [65686, 65687, 65689, 65818, 65898, 65911]

Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security tells an audience the border is secure, but "in the absence of facts, the American public is susceptible to claims that we have an open, porous border, through which unaccompanied minors and members of terrorist organizations such as ISIL may pass." According to CNSNews.com, he then admits that "in May, 10,580 unaccompanied children crossed the Southwest border; 10,622 crossed in June, 5,501 in July, 3,141 in August, and 2,424 in September," and that 68,434 illegal immigrant minors crossed the border in fiscal year 2014. (Johnson apparently does not know the meaning of the word "secure.") [65893]

DailyCaller.com reports, "The amount of coal-fired power capacity slated to shut down due to federal environmental regulations has more than doubled since 2011, according to a report from the free-market Institute for Energy Research. New Environmental Protection Agency rules to limit carbon dioxide emissions from power plants, along with past rules requiring power plants to install costly upgrades or shut down, will force 72.7 gigawatts of power capacity to shutter across 37 states in the coming years. This figure includes power capacity already taken offline as a result of the rules. In 2011, IER predicted EPA rules would only shutter 29 gigawatts of power—meaning EPA rules have put an additional 44.4 gigawatts of electrical generating capacity in jeopardy in just three years. A whopping 94 percent of these retiring plants are coal-fired. ...IER's analysis shows that EPA rules are shuttering enough power generating capacity to 44.7 millions homes, enough to power every home in every state west of the Mississippi except for Texas. Federal and state regulators have worried that so many shutdowns will imperil the electrical grid's reliability." IER President Thomas Pyle states, "These shutdowns will send electricity prices through the roof—inflicting the most harm on the elderly, the poor, those on fixed incomes, businesses, families, schools, and hospitals. These shutdowns also threaten the reliability of our grid and will cost thousands of Americans their jobs." [65843]

D. W. Ulsterman writes, "It appears hundreds of thousands more, perhaps even millions, of Americans will receive health plan cancellation notices in the coming weeks due to their plans being deemed 'non-compliant' by the federal government working under the new Obamacare law. That is going to be a lot of angry voters right before the November elections... The state of Virginia alone is facing a quarter million cancellations, with eleven more states across the nation being forced to eliminate non-compliant plans as well. Compliance often comes down to plans that don't cover the vast array of services as the Obamacare requires, like birth control for women who can no longer get pregnant, or pap smears for men who lack the basic plumbing to 'pap.' This 'one size fits all' approach is causing the cost of healthcare to skyrocket in the United States, and now with more affordable and individually chosen plans being banned, these costs will continue to rise exponentially. As ...Obama embarks Thursday on a three-day Democratic fundraising trip to California, the White House again refuses an umpteenth request from CBS News for the political travel information. ...[R]epeated requests are turned down for a breakdown of the costs and an explanation and specific examples of how the White House calculates how much is paid by taxpayers and how much must be reimbursed to the government by the Democratic National Committee or others. There's absolutely nothing in the information related to national security. It wouldn't do ISIS a bit of good if it got hold of the information. Very simply, the White House doesn't want to disclose the material because it might be embarrassing and would draw lots of criticism, which Mr. Obama can do without." (Bill Clinton and George W. The boys, age 16 and 17, were able to walk away unchallenged from Maryville Academy in Des Plaines, Illinois, outside Chicago, on Wednesday morning and carjack two victims before they were arrested more than 225 miles away outside Iowa City, Iowa, according to authorities. Police say they targeted an elderly man in Moline, Illinois, who was picking up his prescription at Walmart. They threatened him with violence, forced him out of his car and then sped off with his Buick LeSabre." [65924, 65925]

WorldTribune.com reports, "Israel has concluded that Hamas, aided by Iran and Syria, was perfecting underground warfare using tunneling technology developed by North Korea. ... Israeli analyst Jonathan Halevi, a senior intelligence officer, said Hamas did not require a massive tunnel network to harm Israel. He said as few as 20 tunnels would enable Hamas to send 1,000 fighters into the Jewish state, where they could attack nearby civilian communities. ... The report said [the Obama-supported] then-Egyptian President Mohammed Morsi enabled Hamas to greatly enhance its military in 2012 and 2013. Missiles and munitions were said to have moved through Egypt's Sinai Peninsula and the tunnel network to the Gaza Strip. The report said Hamas received components to 'construct plants and manufacture missiles.'" [65835]

SkyNews.com reports, "Canada says 80 citizens and immigrants who recently returned from war zones including Iraq and Syria are suspected of having links to 'terrorism' groups. The suspects were planning 'terrorist activity' on Canadian soil and are accused of working with the Islamic State organisation in Iraq and Syria, where a US-led coalition is launching air strikes against the jihadists. ... They are now under investigation by the Royal Mounted Canadian Police..." [65862, 65863]

Meanwhile, Breitbart.com reports, "An entire French family has packed up and left for Syria, where they are likely to take part in the fighting on the side of the Sunni Islamist opposition forces. ... The 11-strong family reportedly consists of a man, his two sisters, and their mother. Additionally, the spouses of the aforementioned individuals, including their children, are on their way to the jihad in Syria. Even a baby is said to be within the mix. France's *Nice-Matin* newspaper interviewed a 27-year-old woman by the name of Andrea, who said she left for Syria with her four and six-year-old sons. Andrea reportedly told her parents of her journey: 'All his well. I am in a superb region.' She then revealed to a friend that her religion was the chief motivation for the journey. 'I was not going to go, but before Allah I could not stand back,' declared Andrea." [65864, 65865]

Dick Morris, former political strategist for Bill Clinton, writes, "Leon Panetta, Bill Clinton's former Chief of Staff who was appointed with Hillary's blessing, has written a book with one clear motive: To bolster Hillary's narrative that the failures of the foreign policy that she designed were simply not her fault. According to *The Telegraph*, "Fighters from the Islamic State have proudly posted photos of a child who they claim is the youngest person to die while fighting on their side. The 10-year-old boy is named by the Islamists as Abu Ubaidah. A Twitter account run by Isil sympathisers said on October 9 that he was killed, alongside his father, by an American air strike two weeks ago." [65871]

On *Special Report*, Judge Andrew Napolitano comments on the Secret Service prostitution scandal: "I see a serious legal issue here. Here's the legal issue: the government is permitted legally to lie to us. Jay Carney, Josh Earnest, whoever's speaking for [Obama], may lawfully lie. We of course can be prosecuted if we lie to the government. But [although the government can lie to us,] the government can't lawfully lie to itself. The author of *The Obama Timeline* is interviewed by BirtherReport.com's WOBC radio. Then they go out for lunch in public after being told that they could be carrying the virus.") *The Obama Timeline* believes that some action will eventually be taken against Snyderman by NBC, if only for public relations purposes. While many wonder why Turkey is not acting against ISIS, Pamela Geller posts a photograph obtained from retired Lieutenant Colonel Oliver North that shows a smiling Turkish soldier greeting an ISIS anti-aircraft unit at Kobani. Geller writes, "Obama said his 'most trusted,' 'favorite ally' in the world is Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan—the man responsible for throwing off the modern era of Ataturk and returning Turkey to the backward savage system of the oppression and subjugation of Islamic rule. ... Erdogan thinks of himself as a caliph, and is looking at Syria with imperial ambitions. President [Bashar al-] Assad of Syria said, '[Erdogan] personally thinks that he is the new sultan of the Ottomans and he can control the region as it was during the Ottoman Empire under a new umbrella. 'As we have the longest border with Syria,' writes Orhan Kemal Cengiz, a Turkish newspaper columnist, 'Turkey's support was vital for the jihadists in getting in and out of the country.' Indeed, the ISIS strongholds not coincidentally cluster close to Turkey's frontiers. Kurds, academic experts and the Syrian opposition agree that Syrians, Turks (estimated to number 3,000), and foreign fighters (especially Saudis but also a fair number of Westerners) have crossed the Turkish-Syrian border at will, often to join ISIS. What Turkish journalist Kadri Gursel calls a 'two-way jihadist highway,' has no bothersome border checks and sometimes involves the active assistance of Turkish intelligence services." [65950]

"...Actually, the Turks offered far more than an easy border crossing: they provided the bulk of ISIS' funds, logistics, training and arms. Turkish residents near the Syrian border tell of Turkish ambulances going to Kurdish-ISIS battle zones and then evacuating ISIS casualties to Turkish hospitals. Indeed, a sensational photograph has surfaced showing ISIS commander Abu Muhammad in a hospital bed receiving treatment for battle wounds in Hatay State Hospital in April 2014. One Turkish opposition politician estimates that Turkey has paid \$800 million to ISIS for oil shipments. Another politician released information about active duty Turkish soldiers training ISIS members. Critics note that ... Erdogan, has met three times with someone, Yasin al-Qadi, who has close ties to ISIS and has funded it..." [65950]

The Guardian reports, "Iran's deputy foreign minister reportedly said on Saturday that his country has exchanged messages with the US about the fight against Islamic State (Isis) militants in Syria and Iraq. Hossein Amir Abdollahian was quoted by Iranian media, in what would be a rare confirmation of Iran-US discussions over Isis, as saying Iran had warned Washington that Israel would be at risk should the US and its allies seek to topple the Syrian president, Bashar al-Assad, while fighting the extremist group." (Aware of Obama's intense hatred of Israel, Jihad Watch's Robert Spencer quips, "Did Obama respond, 'What's the catch?"") [65959, 65960]

WashingtonPost.com reports that Moner Mohammad Abusalha, a Florida resident who blew himself up in a suicide attack in Syria on May 25, 2014, had returned to the United States from Syria in May 2013 and "went unmonitored" by U.S. authorities. "...Abusalha had made two trips to a conflict zone seen as the largest incubator of Islamist radicalism

since Afghanistan in the 1980s. Between those visits he wandered inside the United States for more than six months, U.S. officials said, attracting no attention from authorities after their brief telephone conversation with his mother [who said he was merely visiting relatives]. His movements went unmonitored despite a major push by U.S. security and intelligence agencies over the past two years to track the flow of foreign fighters into and out of Syria. ... 'It is extremely difficult for the FBI to identify individuals in the U.S. who have this kind of goal,' said George Piro, special agent in charge of the FBI's Miami field office, which led the Abusalha investigation. 'It requires a loved one or really close friend to note the changes. ... The family has to intervene.'" (In other words, Americans are not safe.) [66010, 66011]

In his weekly Internet/radio broadcast, Obama again calls for an increase in the minimum wage: "[O]ne of the simplest and fastest ways to start helping folks get ahead is by raising the minimum wage. Ask yourself: could you live on \$14,500 a year? That's what someone working full-time on the minimum wage makes. If they're raising kids, that's below the poverty line. And that's not right. A hard day's work deserves a fair day's pay. Right now, a worker on the federal minimum wage earns \$7.25 an hour. It's time to raise that to \$10.10 an hour. Raising the federal minimum wage to ten dollars and ten cents an hour, or ten-ten, would benefit 28 million American workers. 28 million. And these aren't just high schoolers on their first job. The average worker who would benefit is 35 years old. Most low-wage workers are women. And that extra money would help them pay the bills and provide for their families. It also means they'll have more money to spend at local businesses—which grows the economy for everyone." (There are only about 1.5 million American workers earning the minimum wage—a far cry from 28 million. Obama ignores the fact that increasing the minimum wage will take many workers not from \$7.25 per hour to \$10.10 per hour, but from \$7.25 per hour to \$0.00 per hour—when they are fired because their services are not worth \$10.10 to the employer. A minimum wage increase is, however, a payback to Obama's labor union supporters, because many of their collective bargaining agreements call for automatic wage increases when the federal minimum wage goes up. Additionally, of course, increasing the minimum wage means increased income tax and Social Security tax revenues for the federal government—with most of it coming from workers who are decades away from receiving Social Security benefits.) She was involved in Duncan's second visit to the hospital, when he was admitted for treatment, and was wearing protective gear as prescribed by the CDC: gown, gloves, mask and shield, Texas Health Resources chief clinical officer Dan Varga said." CDC head Tom Frieden states, "At some point there was a breach in protocol." (He does not explain what the "breach" was. Some might argue that a breach of protocol would be something like Obama forcing the Dalai Lama to use the back door of the White House to exit, not the failure of a biohazard suit to protect its wearer.) 'Out of an abundance of caution we immediately notified authorities and the patient was securely removed from the building and put into an ambulance...' Benjamin Kruskal, the chief of infectious disease for Harvard Vanguard, said in a written statement. Kruskal said the patient recently traveled to Liberia in West Africa. The ambulance was escorted by police to Beth Israel. The driver of the ambulance was wearing a mask and hazmat suit." The incident further emphasizes the need for travel restrictions from West Africa, even if the patient does *not* have the Ebola virus. (According to *Forbes* magazine, more than 5,000 Americans have already sought medical care in the mistaken belief that they have been infected by the Ebola virus.) Without travel restrictions, there will be countless incidents costing the nation tens of millions of dollars in actions taken merely "out of an abundance of

caution." Similarly, since the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks billions of man-hours and billions of dollars have been wasted in airport security lines "out of an abundance of caution." But progress in negotiations with Turkey—including Ankara's agreement to train several thousand Syrian moderate rebels—may not be enough to stop the massacre of civilians in Syria's border town of Kobani, where intense fighting continues. The Obama administration had been pressing Ankara to play a larger role against the extremists, who have taken control of large swaths of Syria and Iraq, including territory on Turkey's border, and sent refugees fleeing into Turkey. U.S. officials confirmed Saturday that Ankara had agreed to train Syrian moderate forces on Turkish soil. A Turkish government official said Sunday that Turkey put the number at 4,000 opposition fighters and said they would be screened by Turkish intelligence. Also Sunday, officials confirmed that Turkey agreed to let U.S. and coalition fighter aircraft launch operations against Islamic State militants in Iraq and Syria from Turkish bases, including Incirlik Air Base in the south. U.S. Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel, who has been traveling in South America, has said the U.S. wanted access to the Turkish bases." (Turkey is willing to help train "moderate" Syrian rebels not because it wants them to fight ISIS, but because it wants them to oust Syrian President Bashar al-Assad.) [65994, 66088]

Breitbart.com reports, "According to a report in the *San Antonio News Express* the US Army has completed but is refusing to release its investigation into the suspected

desertion of Army PFC Bowe Bergdahl who walked off his base in Afghanistan in 2009. ...Fox News is reporting however that the findings will be released to the public, but only after the November 4 midterm elections." [66003, 66004, 66158, 66159, 66197]

A tax-exempt Democrat group called The Agenda Project releases a campaign ad blaming Republicans for the Ebola epidemic because they have allegedly cut spending for the Centers for Disease Control. In fact, the budget for the CDC has doubled since 2000, and the budget for the National Institutes of Health increased from \$28.03 billion in 2013 to \$29.31 billion in 2014—more than \$1 billion. For the current year, \$1.32 billion has been budgeted for biodefense and emerging infectious diseases—just behind the AIDS budget's \$1.38 billion. It also received \$3 billion from ObamaCare's "Prevention and Public Health Fund." Obama himself cut \$72 million from the CDC's Public Health Emergency Preparedness Grant Program in his proposed 2012 budget. Stick around to the end for a surprising twist that will drive home the importance of being prepared for any emergency. Included in the novel is a Preparedness Checklist so that readers can get their family, workplace, or school ready before disaster strikes." At Politico.com Louisiana Governor Bobby Jindal writes, "In a paid speech last week, former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton attempted to link spending restraints enacted by Congress—and signed into law by ... Secretary Clinton claimed that the spending reductions mandated under sequestration 'are really beginning to hurt,' citing the fight against Ebola: 'The CDC [Centers for Disease Control and Prevention] is another example on the response to Ebola—they're working heroically, but they don't have the resources they used to have.' Her argument, like those made by others, misses the point. In recent years, the CDC has received significant amounts of funding. First, a federal government with nearly \$18 trillion in debt has no business spending money on non-essential priorities. Second, a government that attempts to do too much will likely excel at little. And the federal government has one duty above all: To protect the health, safety and well-being of its citizens." MSNBC's Joy Reid claims, "so far, the only 'spread of Ebola' in the U.S. was caused by a private hospital in a red [Republican] state." Could he be on a presidential ticket in 2016?" National Security Advisor Susan "it was a Youtube video!" Another that we'll be looking at closely in, in the investigation is the, the interventions that were done to try desperately to keep the index patient alive. This included dialysis and intubation. I think the fact that we don't know of a breach in protocol is concerning because, clearly, there was a breach in protocol. We have the ability to prevent the spread of Ebola by caring safely for patients." (After "many years of experience" the CDC can "care for patients... without risk" yet failed to do so in Duncan's case.) [66045]

Also on *Face the Nation*, Congressman Michael McCaul (R-TX), chairman of the House Homeland Security Committee, says, "There is a lot of talk about banning flights. I think we need to target more the individual themselves and look at the idea of potentially temporarily suspending the thirteen thousand visas that would be coming out of this region—allowing health care workers to go in, because they have to contain the threat—but then when it comes to the... original population out of West Africa leaving, I think until this gets under control, that's a measure that policymakers ought to be looking at. ...Now, [Ebola] is a virus that incubates for twenty-one days, so that still leaves the possibility that somebody could actually still get through [an airport screening] process." [66046]

On *Meet the Press*, infectious disease expert Dr. Anthony Fauci says a breach in hazardous suit protocol might occur if the worker is "fatigued, they've been working for a long time, and when they take it off, they do something inadvertent, like brushing their face or something like that. I don't know how it happened. The CDC's investigating it, but that's very likely what happened. An inadvertent breach." (Obama says no one should be afraid to ride on a crowded bus, but Fauci says brushing one's face may be enough to spread the virus.) Fauci also opposes a travel ban on flights from West Africa: "We can understand how people might come to that conclusion, but when you look at what happens when you isolate a country, you diminish greatly their ability to handle their own epidemic. If that happens, it very likely will spread to other African countries. And the best way to protect Americans is to completely suppress the epidemic in West Africa. If we do that, we wouldn't be talking about this today. So to isolate them, maybe with good intentions, actually can be counterproductive and make things worse." (Like the CDC's Frieden, Fauci is misstating the travel ban argument. No one is suggesting that doctors or health experts be prohibited from traveling to Liberia and other infected nations. They are suggesting that totally free travel to and from those nations be restricted. If Fauci and other experts support isolating individual patients, it is absurd to argue that stricken nations should not also be quarantined in some way.) [66045, 66047]

On *Fox News Sunday*, Republican establishment political strategist Karl Rove predicts the GOP will win U.S. Senate races in Montana, West Virginia, South Dakota, Alaska, Louisiana (in a likely December runoff election), Arkansas, Iowa, Colorado, and North Carolina, but lose in Kansas, Georgia, and Kentucky. (If Rove is correct, the Republicans will control the Senate with 51 seats to 49 for the Democrats/Independents. *The Obama Timeline* believes the GOP will win Kansas, Georgia, and Kentucky, and has a slight chance of winning New Hampshire.) A spokeswoman for the National Nurses United union demands training and biohazard suits for all hospitals. The union's executive director, RoseAnn DeMoro, tells *The New* York Times, "I'm angry about this. We want the first line of defense to be the most prepared. Our hospitals are resisting us. The CDC doesn't say that we need hazmat suits. If this doesn't change dramatically, we will picket every hospital in this country if we have to." BizPacReview.com adds, "Particularly offensive, according to reports, were the remarks made Sunday by CDC Director Dr. Thomas Frieden on CBS' 'Face the Nation.' Frieden told the country that the nurse in Dallas who contracted the deadly disease from 'patient zero,' the first case of Ebola diagnosed in the U.S., did so due to a 'breach of protocol,' a claim that puts the responsibility on the nurse, according to one public health expert. 'I think that is just wrong,' Dr. Gavin Macgregor-Skinner, an expert on public health preparedness at Pennsylvania State University said. 'We haven't provided them with a national training program. We haven't provided them with the necessary experts that have actually worked in hospitals with Ebola.' Possibly the most disturbing news is that professionals and the CDC don't even agree on a clear plan for a possible large-scale outbreak." (While the government may not be saying that hazmat suits are necessary, the State Department reportedly placed an order for 160,000 of them in September. While the government may plan to send them to West Africa, there are nowhere near 160,000 doctors and nurses treating Ebola in the region. Some might assume that many of those 1670,000 suits are intended for use in the United States.) [66075, 66702]

At the Daily Mail Sam Greenhill reports on the violence perpetrated by ISIS fighters as they battle to take the city of Kobani (also often spelled Kobane): "Thirteen-year-old Dillyar cannot get the image of his cousin being beheaded out of his mind. The pair were fleeing Kobane and running down a street when Islamic State fighters blocked their exit. Dillyar managed to slip through their grasp but his cousin Mohammed, 20, was seized, and gave a blood-curdling scream as one of the black-clad maniacs drew out a knife. 'They pushed him to the ground and sawed his head off, shouting 'Allahu Akbar,' the schoolboy told me yesterday. 'I see it in my dreams every night and every morning I wake up and remember everything.' ... According to those who escaped, the jihadis' savagery is more hideous than anyone feared. Headless corpses litter the streets of the besieged Syrian border town, they say, and some of the mainly Kurdish townsfolk have had their eyes gouged out. Refugees who made it to Suruc, just across the border in Turkey, tell of witnessing appalling horrors in hushed tones, as if they can barely believe it themselves. ... Ahmed Bakki, a farmer from a village near Kobane, said his cousin, a 48-year-old father of seven, stayed behind when the rest of the family fled. 'We phoned my cousin and IS answered his phone. They said, 'We've got his head, and we're taking

it to Jarabulus (an IS stronghold)." He added: 'An English teacher in our village tried to reason with them, but they just called him a kaffir (non-believer) and tied him to their car and dragged him away. We heard they beheaded him later." ... This 'scorched earth' policy is being waged by jihadis whose most brutal members seem to be Europeans. 'They are Chechen, they are English, they are from all over Europe. We know because we can hear their accents,' said Mr Bakki." (Obama is letting Kobani fall and allowing its citizens to be slaughtered because, as Secretary of State John Kerry has stated, the city is "not a strategic priority.") The leftist Salon.com interviews someone named Greil Marcus, "a critic of music and culture," who says, "[W]hen you look at the murder of Trayvon Martin, when you look at the murder of Michael Brown, when you look at those situations, it's not unrelated to Obama being [in the White House], but it's more the way in which the country has reframed itself or rewritten itself since his election, with all kinds of people saying to themselves, maybe never putting it into words, just feeling it, 'There's a fucking n—er in the White House? Former Department of Justice attorney J. Christian Adams tells WND.com vote fraud not only exists, it is made easier by the fact that voter registration lists contain massive numbers of ineligible names: "We have millions of people on the voter rolls who are not eligible to vote, millions of people who are not actually valid registrations. Absolutely nothing is being done about that from the government's perspective. Only private organizations have done anything about it. Our armed forces must prepare for a future with a wide spectrum of possible threats, weighing risks and probabilities to ensure that we will continue to keep our country secure. By taking a proactive, flexible approach to assessment, analysis, and adaptation, the Defense Department will keep pace with a changing climate, minimize its impacts on our missions, and continue to protect our national security." To no one's surprise, the White House confirms that Obama will not name a successor to Attorney General Eric Holder until after the November 4 elections. (The assumption is that Obama will choose someone controversial who Republican Senate candidates can use as an argument against voting for rubber-stamp Senate Democrats.) [66168]

Thomas "we're stopping it in its tracks" Frieden, director of the Centers for Disease Control, responds to the spread of Ebola to a nurse who treated Thomas Eric Duncan: "We have to rethink how we address Ebola control, because even a single infection is unacceptable. ... We need to consider the possibility that there could be additional cases, particularly among the health-care workers who cared for [Thomas Eric Duncan] when he was so ill. Father of four Amin Fajar said: 'I have seen tens, maybe hundreds, of bodies with their heads cut off. Others with just their hands or legs missing. I have seen faces with their eyes or tongues cut out—I can never forget that as long as I live. They put their heads on display to scare us all." After a CDC conference call with various hospitals, Dr. Betsy McCaughey, CEO of Defend Your Healthcare, health care expert, and former Lieutenant Governor of New York, appeared on Fox News, where she is asked how difficult it will be to set up hospitals to care for Ebola patients. PJMedia.com's Bryan Preston writes, "McCaughey's answer is stunning. According to her, after the CDC outlined its preparation strategy, one hospital administrator responded, 'What you're telling us would bankrupt my hospital!' She said that that administrator represents a Southern California hospital. McCaughey noted that there was no word on the call of who would pay for hospitals to get themselves ready for Ebola patients. And then she added: 'Treating one Ebola patient requires, full time, 20 medical staff. Mostly ICU (intensive care unit) people. So that would wipe out an ICU in an average-sized hospital.' In the case of Texas Presbyterian, McCaughey says that the hospital cordoned off its ICU to care for Thomas Eric Duncan and sent the rest of its ICU patients to other area hospitals. She added that many communities will not have multiple hospitals to choose from, so one Ebola case could cripple ICUs in small towns. 'But the most important thing,' McCaughey said, 'is that doctors and nurses are not ready for the challenge of using this personal protective equipment even if you see them with the helmet, the respirator, the full suits, as the CDC said on the call today, even all that equipment is not enough to guarantee the safety of health care workers because it is so perilous to put it on and particularly to remove it once it's become contaminated.' McCaughey said many of those on the call were 'daunted by the expectations, the separate laboratory next to the isolated patients, all kinds of—all kinds of adjustments, where to put the waste. Many states won't even let you dispose of this waste from such a toxic disease." [66262, 66263]

At the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, Dr. Michael Osterholm, director of the University of Minnesota Center for Infectious Disease Research and Policy, tells an audience that the current strain of Ebola is much worse that any that has been seen before: "It [is] much, much more severe." Osterholm says he was told by key

Ebola researcher Gary Kobinger, Head of Special Pathogens at Canada's health agency, "It is very worrisome to me." "Maybe this is a different virus," suggests Osterholm. "Maybe there is that possibility—if you do have that much virus in the lungs, maybe somebody might cough it up and maybe you might get a cycle. I'm not saying that here to scare people. Plan B: what the hell are we going to do if we suddenly see the potential for transmission that might be respiratory in nature? Do we have a plan? ... I don't know what that chance is but I want somebody thinking about it, and I want a plan." Dr. Peter Jahrling, chief scientist at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, also warns there is a possibility that mutations of the Ebola virus are creating much more dangerous strains. On the other hand, Jahrling has stated in an interview with Vox.com, "My gut feeling is that Ebola is going to burn out in human populations. ... In this epidemic, it would appear that there have been multiple introductions. It's not all person to person transmission. It's coming from animals again and again [such as fruit bats and monkeys]. ... Now there are all these different strains. That could also mean the virus is more mutable. We can't yet say. I think it's unlikely that this thing is going to perpetuate in humans." [66465, 66466, 66467, 66613, 66873]

It is worth noting that although the Ebola virus has killed about 4,000 people in Africa, HIV/AIDS killed more than one million, diarrhea killed more than 600,000, and vehicle accidents have killed more than 200,000. [66467]

John Hickenlooper, can be aired without disclosing its financers, a federal appeals court [the Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals] in Denver said Tuesday. Just two years later, Congress passed the Pandemic and All-Hazards Preparedness Act, which created a new assistant secretary for preparedness and response to oversee medical efforts and called for a National Health Security Strategy. Last year, Congress passed the Pandemic and All-Hazards Preparedness Reauthorization Act of 2013 which keep the programs in effect for another five years. If you look at any of the information about these pieces of legislation or the office and authorities that were created, this brand new expansion of the federal government was sold to us specifically

as a means to fight public health threats like Ebola. That was the entire point of why the office and authorities were created." [66072, 66373]

"...So, we have an office for public health threat preparedness and response. And one of HHS' eight assistant secretaries is the assistant secretary for preparedness and response, whose job it is to 'lead the nation in preventing, responding to and recovering from the adverse health effects of public health emergencies and disasters, ranging from hurricanes to bioterrorism.' ...[T]he woman who heads that office, Dr. Nicole Lurie, explains that the responsibilities of her office are 'to help our country prepare for, respond to and recover from public health threats.' So a large part of my office also is responsible for developing those countermeasures.' ... So why has the top official for public health threats been sidelined in the midst of the Ebola crisis? But maybe taxpayers and voters should force Congress to do a better job with its oversight rather than get away with the far easier passing of legislation that grants additional funds before finding out what we got for all that money we allocated to this task over the last decade. Mack, an epidemiologist at USC's Keck School of Medicine, battled smallpox outbreaks in Pakistan and has advised the Food and Drug Administration on the virus. He called the plan to stockpile Siga's drug 'a waste of time and a waste of money.' The Obama administration official who has overseen the buying of Siga's drug says she is trying to strengthen the nation's preparedness. Dr. Nicole Lurie, a presidential appointee who heads biodefense planning at Health and Human Services, cited a 2004 finding by the Bush administration that there was a 'material threat' smallpox could be used as a biological weapon." (Smallpox was essentially eradicated in 1978. Nevertheless, Lurie seemed to think it was acceptable to

This may not seem like an important difference, but it has a big impact on how easily a germ spreads. Airborne diseases are far more transmittable than dropletborne ones." (Additionally, according to WND.com, the U.S. Army Medical Research Institute of Infectious Diseases handbook, "USAMRID's Medical Management of Biological Casualties Handbook," states, "In several instances, secondary infections among contacts and medical personnel without direct body fluid exposure have been documented. The ad mentions Trayvon Martin and states, "Every 28 hours an African-American is killed by a police officer, security guard or vigilante. No parent in America should have to put their child in a bulletproof vest. On November 4, you have a choice; Vest or Vote." (The "subtle" message is: "Vote for the Democrats, or Republicans will let white people shoot you.") [66155]

At PJMedia.com former terrorist prosecutor Andrew C. McCarthy warns of actions Obama is poised to take: "Close Guantanamo Bay and unlawfully transfer the remaining

149 jihadists detained there into the United States... Yahoo News reports, "A second nurse who treated Ebola patient Thomas Eric Duncan has been diagnosed with the deadly disease a day after flying from Ohio to Texas, officials said. The nurse, identified by her family as Amber Joy Vinson, 29, reported a fever on Tuesday and was immediately isolated at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital in Dallas, officials said. [Vinson flew from Dallas to Cleveland to make some wedding arrangements, and then returned to Dallas.] Federal health officials said she is ill and will soon be transferred to a bio-containment unit at Emory University Hospital in Atlanta. Vinson was not experiencing symptoms at the time of her flight, but CDC director Dr. Tom Frieden said during a news conference that she 'should not have travelled' [sic; traveled] on her return flight to Texas after learning in Ohio that she was a potential infection risk. The CDC is now asking all 132 passengers on Frontier Airlines Flight 1143 from Cleveland to Dallas-Fort Worth which landed at 8:16 p.m. Monday to call 1-800-CDC-INFO." Fox4 reports via Twitter, "CDC officials confirm to FOX 4 they told Ebola patient Amber Vinson it was OK for her to fly Monday, even w/ a low grade fever." Despite Vinson having worked directly with Ebola victim Thomas Eric Duncan, she was told she could travel because her temperature was 99.5 degrees, and would not be considered "high risk" unless it reached 100.4 degrees. (The Frontier Airlines plane reportedly had five more flights before it was cleaned and returned to service.) [66180, 66234, 66242]

The Associated Press reports, "A Liberian Ebola patient was left in an open area of a Dallas emergency room for hours, and the nurses treating him worked for days without proper protective gear and faced constantly changing protocols, according to a statement released late Tuesday by the largest U.S. nurses' union. Nurses were forced to use medical tape to secure openings in their flimsy garments, worried that their necks and heads were exposed as they cared for a patient with explosive diarrhea and projectile vomiting, said Deborah Burger of National Nurses United. ...RoseAnn DeMoro, executive director of Nurses United, said the statement came from 'several' and 'a few' nurses, but she refused repeated inquiries to state how many. She said the organization had vetted the claims, and that the nurses cited were in a position to know what had occurred at the hospital. She refused to elaborate. Among the nurses' allegations was that the Ebola patient's lab samples were allowed to travel through the hospital's pneumatic tubes, opening the possibility of contaminating the specimen delivery system. The nurses also alleged that hazardous waste was allowed to pile up to the ceiling. ... The nurses alleged that: [Ebola victim Thomas Eric] Duncan was kept in a non-isolated area of the emergency department for several hours, potentially exposing up to seven other patients to Ebola; Patients who may have been exposed to Duncan were kept in isolation only for a day before being moved to areas where there were other patients; Nurses treating Duncan were also caring for other patients in the hospital; Preparation for Ebola at the hospital amounted to little more than an optional seminar for staff; In the face of constantly shifting guidelines, nurses were allowed to follow whichever ones they chose." White House press secretary Josh Earnest tells reporters travel restrictions to reduce the risk of the spread of the Ebola virus are still "not on the table." Earnest, who has apparently never heard of private charter flights, claims, "Shutting down travel to that area of the world would prevent the expeditious flow of personnel and equipment into the region." "A senior military source" tells Fox News' Bret Baier that the military actions against ISIS in Iraq and Syria will be called "Operation Inherent Resolve." (The name is immediately ridiculed on Twitter and Facebook.) [66147, 66170, 66281, 66291]

As further proof that Turkey has non interest in degrading ISIS, let alone eliminating it, WND.com reports, "the jihadist group ISIS has opened a consulate in the Turkish capital, according to a Middle East expert who monitors jihadist activity in the region. The consulate in Ankara, apparently open with the tacit permission of the Turkish government, is issuing visas for those who want to join ISIS in its fight against the Syrian and Iraqi governments, the source said." WND.com also reports, "Middle East sources also tell WND that Bilal Erdogan, son of Turkey's newly elected Islamic president, Recep Tayyip Erdogan, is working with Yassin al-Qadi, a Saudi businessman, who last year was linked to al-Qaida. He is on the U.S. Treasury Department's Specially Designated Global Terrorist list. Qadi separately has denied any linkage to al-Qaida. Because of the designation, Qadi was supposed to be

banned by Turkey from entering the country. But last December there were reports he had entered the country multiple times without the need of a passport or visa and was escorted by Recep Tayyip Erdogan's protective detail, when Erdogan was the prime minister. The same sources add that Qadi now is in the ISIS leadership. They say Bilal, with his father's support, is pushing Turkish business prospects in ISIS-occupied territories of Syria and Iraq, subjecting all who haven't been killed to strict Islamic law, or Shariah. Requests to the Turkish Embassy in Washington and the State Department for comment regarding the allegation ISIS has opened a consulate in Ankara and Bilal Erdogan's relationship with Qadi went unanswered." (Turkey has not joined the coalition against ISIS. The Erdogan administration cannot be trusted. That Obama is quite friendly with President Erdogan suggests either that Obama is incredibly naive, or that he also cannot be trusted.) [66227]

At DailySignal.com investigative reporter Sharyl Attkisson, who previously reported on an eyewitness who saw Hillary Clinton chief of staff Cheryl Mills sorting Benghazirelated documents into what they would and would not release to Congress, reports similar tales from longtime government employee Sonya Gilliam. Attkisson writes, "Gilliam, now retired, was responsible for Commerce Department responses to Freedom of Information Act [FOIA] requests during the Clinton administration. Back then, Mills was deputy White House counsel to President Clinton. At the time, multiple probes sought to determine whether the administration was fundraising illegally by selling seats on Commerce Department trade missions. Gilliam says she sat through countless task force meetings convened to respond to demands that began in 1994 for relevant records under FOIA requests and, later, from Congress, grand juries and news media. Prying key documents from the Clinton administration's political grip proved an often-impossible task, she says. ...Gilliam says the... document release by Commerce had to be 'coordinated' with the White House. 'I found many, many references that I have highlighted in those meetings that we had that said 'waiting on White House,' 'call Cheryl Mills,' 'Cheryl Mills has not responded yet,' 'Cheryl says no.'" "...Before the Clinton administration, Gilliam says, it had not been common practice to send non-White House documents to the White House for approval of their release. 'I was amazed and just really gobsmacked when I saw the White House involved to the extent it was,' Gilliam says. Two years into the investigations, on April 3, 1996, Commerce Secretary Ron Brown and 34 others were killed in a plane crash while on an official trade mission in Croatia. Brown recently had been served with a deposition notice regarding the alleged sale of trade mission seats. Evidence revealed a 'flurry of document shredding in the [Commerce] secretary's office' following his death. [There have been many claims that Brown was murdered, and that when his body was recovered at the crash site his head had a bullet wound. No autopsy was performed.] The document obstruction, which continued for years, is detailed in a 1998 federal court ruling. District Judge Royce C. Lamberth likened the behavior of Commerce Department officials to 'con artists' and 'hooligans.' He found that they 'wrongfully withheld documents, destroyed documents, and removed or allowed the removal of others, all with the apparent intention of thwarting the FOIA and [court] orders.'" Their message is simple—Don't Mess with Texas Preachers. Dave Welch, the executive director of the Texas Pastor Council, is one of the five ministers who received a subpoena. He said he will not be intimidated by Annise Parker, who is the city's first openly lesbian mayor, nor will he comply with the city's demands. 'My answer to that is—bring it on,' he said. Houston's city attorney issued the subpoenas in a response to a lawsuit filed related to the Houston Equal Rights Ordinance (H.E.R.O.), the city's new non-discrimination ordinance, also known as the 'Bathroom Bill.' The new law, which has yet to take effect, would (among other things) allow men who identify as women to use the restrooms of their choice—and vice versa. Opponents launched a petition drive to put the issue on the ballot. However,

the city threw out the petitions claiming there were not enough legitimate signatures. Opponents then filed a lawsuit—which led the city to issue the subpoenas." (Parker is retaliating against churches for their stand against gay marriage and her ordinance, and is attempting to intimidate them. Her actions are, of course, a violation of First Amendment rights. They are also inconsistent, as area mosques are far more critical of homosexuality than Christian churches, yet she has not issued subpoenas for mosques.) Senator Ted Cruz (R-TX) states, "Religious liberty is the very first protection in the Bill of Rights, the foundation of all our liberties. And we should all be proud to stand up and defend the pastors who are resisting these blatant attempts to suppress their First Amendment rights. For far too long, the federal government has led an assault against religious liberty, and now, sadly, my hometown of Houston is joining the fight. This is wrong. It's unbefitting of Texans, and it's un-American. The government has no business asking pastors to turn over their sermons. These subpoenas are a grotesque abuse of power, and the officials who approved them should be held accountable by the people." [66236]

Democrat candidate for the U.S. Senate in Georgia, Michelle Nunn, refuses to respond to a reporter who asks if she voted for Obama in 2008 and 2012. That 900,000 includes the 167,000 foreign criminals who have been ordered out of the country by courts, after their convictions for felony or misdemeanors." [66200]

Reuters reports, "Lockheed Martin Corp said on Wednesday it had made a technological breakthrough in developing a power source based on nuclear fusion, and the first reactors, small enough to fit on the back of a truck, could be ready for use in a decade. Tom McGuire, who heads the project, said he and a small team had been working on fusion energy at Lockheed's secretive Skunk Works for about four years, but were now going public to find potential partners in industry and government for their work. Initial work demonstrated the feasibility of building a 100-megawatt reactor measuring seven feet by 10 feet, which could fit on the back of a large truck, and is about 10 times smaller than current reactors, McGuire told reporters. ... Compact nuclear fusion would produce far less waste than coal-powered plants since it would use deuterium-tritium fuel, which can generate nearly 10 million times more energy than the same amount of fossil fuels, the company said." (One hundred megawatts could power between 80,000 and 100,000 homes. HotAir.com adds, "[E]ach reactor would require only 55 lbs. of fuel, most of which could come from sea water. That 55 lbs. would produce 10 million times as much energy as 55 lbs. of fossil fuels. It would be perfectly clean too, with zero carbon emissions, which should make greens happy if they weren't so invested in endless scaremongering about nuclear power. Bottom line: It's a dessert topping and a floor wax.

A Fox News poll "finds 58 percent of voters feel things in the world are 'going to hell in a handbasket.' That includes nearly half of Democrats (48 percent) and majorities of independents (61 percent) and Republicans (71 percent). ... Meanwhile, by a 61-36 percent margin, voters say they don't feel hopeful about the direction of the country. That's a reversal from 2012 when 57 percent felt hopeful. The shift is driven by a nearly 30-point drop among Democrats: 80 percent felt hopeful two years ago, while just 52 percent say the same now. In August 2012, Democrats were likely buoyed by Obama's re-election campaign." [66205]

At HotAir.com Mary Katherine Ham reports that journalists who cover the White House will (finally) distribute their own pool reports "to keep Obama from messing with them." (Journalists covering Obama's daily activities take turns writing summaries, which are then distributed by the White House press office to hundreds of reporters—which is why so many stories at numerous media outlets are essentially identical. The problem with the Obama White House is that it has censored many of the stories, striking out things it did not want reported. Most reporters apparently did not seem to mind, because they were all on Obama's "hope and change" bandwagon. But after six years of such actions, some journalists have finally had enough and decided they will report what they want to report, and share their pool reports on their own. Needless to say, had the Bush White House engaged in such censorship the media would have raised a huge fuss from day one. CNSNews.com reports, "Inflation-adjusted federal tax revenues not only hit a record high in fiscal 2014, but marked the first time that tax revenues have ever topped \$3 trillion, according to the latest Monthly Treasury Statement. In fiscal year 2014, inflation-adjusted federal tax revenues hit a record \$3,020,848,000,000, but the federal government still ran a \$483,350,000,000 deficit during that time." (In 2009, tax revenue was \$2.105 trillion. Spending was \$3.517 trillion—\$787 billion of which was from Obama's "stimulus legislation.") [66292, 66293]

Judicial Watch files a lawsuit charging that Congress illegally enrolled employees in ObamaCare though its "Small Business Exchange" even though, of course, Congress is certainly not a "small business." WND.com reports, "The lawsuit cites applications filed with the exchange by the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate. Copies of the applications were obtained by Judicial Watch through a Freedom of Information Act request. They show the House and Senate claimed to have only 45 employees each. A box is checked on the forms next to the confirming statement, 'I attest that I employ 50 or fewer full time equivalent employees.' But Judicial Watch notes Congress employs upward of 20,000 people. 'The applications also falsely state that the House and Senate are 'local/state governments,'' Judicial Watch said. …The exchange was given more than \$77 million in taxpayer money in 2013 and 2014. …Judicial Watch President Tom Fitton

said the documents his organization obtained show every member of Congress who has enrolled in Obamacare has obtained their insurance coverage and any taxpayer subsidies 'through fraud.'" According to the lawsuit, "At least 12,359 members of Congress, congressional staffers, and their spouses and dependents obtained health insurance through the Small Business Exchange as of February 9, 2014. These 12,359 persons represent approximately 86 percent of the 14,289 persons enrolled in the Small Business Exchange between October 1, 2013 and September 9, 2014." [66224]

D. W. Ulsterman reports: "According to sources on Capitol Hill, Valerie Jarrett received a scathing indictment from an individual responsible for raising millions of dollars for the Obama campaign in 2012 and 2008. This top political bundler went so far to threaten the earning power of the Obama brand after 2016—a threat that apparently had Jarrett jumping into action to try and salvage [Obama's] quickly sinking public image, including the sudden cancelling of two already scheduled fundraising appearances. Rumors of a widening divide between Schultz and the Obama White House, namely Valerie Jarrett, have been circulating in the media for the past several weeks. It is most likely the conversation was in fact shared by Congresswoman Schultz herself or a member of her staff. What we do know is that today the Obama White House announced the sudden cancellation of two scheduled fundraiser appearances by Barack Obama, though it is not clear if those cancellations are a direct result of the Jarrett/bundler phone conversation, the announcement of a second healthcare worker in the United States testing positive for EBOLA, or a combination of the two." On October 16 nurse Nina Pham, who was being treated for Ebola at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital in Dallas, is transferred to "a state-of-the-art National Institutes of Health facility in Bethesda, Md., for treatment," reports USAToday.com. "Officials at the Dallas hospital said the decision was made in consultation with Pham and her family out of concern the Ebola crisis had left it overwhelmed and short of critical staff." Hospital spokesman Wendell Watson states, "With so many of the medical professionals who normally staff our intensive care unit sidelined for the continuous monitoring, we felt it was in the best interest of the hospital's employees, the nurses, the physicians, the community, to give the hospital an opportunity to prepare for …for whatever comes next." [66230]

CBS's Charlie Kaye tweets, "Obama authorizes call-up of National Guard, [and Army] reserves if needed to address Ebola." USAToday.com clarifies, "Obama notified Congress of his order Thursday. It reads: 'I hereby determine that it is necessary to augment the active Armed Forces of the United States for the effective conduct of Operation United Assistance, which is providing support to civilian-led humanitarian assistance and consequence management support related to the Ebola virus disease outbreak in West Africa.' The Pentagon said it had no immediate plans to send reservists or National Guard troops to Africa, saying that the order simply allows the military to begin planning for those forces in its overall response." White House press secretary Josh Earnest tells reporters that Obama "has laid out very clearly what the mission is. The Department of Defense has told [Obama] that it will require about 4,000 Department of Defense personnel to execute the mission [Obama] has directed them to execute. What I don't know is the composition of that force." [66231, 66232, 66233, 66243, 66244, 66250]

CDC head Tom Frieden testifies before a House subcommittee. Frieden tells the committee, "We're open to ideas"—a remark that might not alleviate the fears of many Americans who worry more about the Obama administration's competence than the Ebola virus. Apparently believing he knows something others do not, Frieden says, "Borders can be porous." (Although Frieden is made to look like an uninformed fool by Republicans and Democrats alike, Politico comes to his defense with the Obama-

protecting headline, "CDC chief survives trial by fire on hill.") [66241, 66251, 66295, 66296, 66357]

Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, tells the House subcommittee that the doctors treating nurse Nina Pham will not be under travel restrictions: "According to the guidelines that the people who will be coming into contact with her will be physicians, nurses and others who will be in personal protective equipment, and therefore, they are not restricted [sic]." On CNN's *New Day*, former White House press secretary Jay Carney says, "[W]henever there is a crisis like I think you have now with Ebola, whenever you have a situation like ISIS in that region of the world, the problem with Ukraine and you have these cascading problems all at once, which are very hard to control individually, let alone collectively, you get a White House and an administration that appears to be all out and under a lot of strain. But, you don't get to choose the crisis you deal with... All of these things land on your doorstep. I think in the end this is not a political issue. It's an issue that has to be handled. As Hillary Clinton delivers a Democrat candidate-endorsing address at Oakland University, near Detroit, a man approaches conservatives protesting her appearance outside the event, licks his hand, and announces, "I just came from Texas. I have Ebola and now I'm going to give it to you. Without a public health system, we are going to have

the spread of Ebola. Libertarians don't want a public health system, so you're a fascist." Reuters reports, "Billionaire investor Carl Icahn said on Thursday a stock market correction is 'definitely coming' and he is worried about the economy, as U.S. stocks tumbled on fresh worries about global growth. Icahn told CNBC in an interview that he still has a lot of money invested in the stock market and has taken measures to protect his portfolio. 'I've been putting on quite a bit of hedges,' Icahn said, adding that he was shorting the benchmark Standard & Poor's 500 stock index, which was down 1.77 percent." [66258]

At Townhall.com Ken Blackwell notes that the ObamaCare legislation allows for "biosimilars," or "complex drugs which are medically equivalent versions of biologics (drugs derived from living organisms), and can treat deadly diseases ranging from Alzheimer's, AIDS, and rheumatoid arthritis. White House press secretary Josh Earnest tells reporters, "The risk of a widespread outbreak of Ebola in the United States is exceedingly low. We don't anticipate that's going to happen. What we do anticipate is certainly possible—maybe even likely—is that some additional cases of Ebola will occur. It is possible, again, maybe even likely that there will be additional healthcare workers from this hospital in Dallas who treated Mr. Duncan who may have contracted the virus. So that's why we are actively monitoring the health of other healthcare workers that came in contact with him. It certainly is possible that other individuals will travel to this country that don't exhibit symptoms in transit but

after they arrive may have the virus. [That, of course, would be less likely if travel restrictions are imposed.] And we will make sure that we have the kind of response that's needed to, as [Obama] directed yesterday, to detect, isolate and treat those individuals in a way that protects the American public and protects healthcare workers who are rendering that medical assistance." Obama states that he may need to appoint an Ebola "Czar." He tells reporters, "It may make sense for us to have one person …so that after this initial surge of activity we can have a more regular process just to make sure we are crossing all the T's and dotting all the I's." He also repeats his opposition to a travel ban. (Saying "it may be appropriate" means, of course, that Obama has already picked someone. He does not explain why his Secretary of Health and Human Services is not up to the job of making sure T's are crossed and I's are dotted.) [66314]

"If they come back to me and they say there's some additional things we need to do, I assure you, we will do it." (In other words, Obama is setting the stage for his caving in and imposing travel restrictions because he sees the handwriting on the wall.) "But it's important in the circumstances, for us to look at the history of how these infectious diseases are best dealt with, and it's currently the judgment of all those involved that a flat-out travel ban is not the best way to go." (The argument defies both logic and history. Quarantines and travel bans have been used throughout history. The Islamic State (ISIS) releases another terrorist recruiting video. It features jihadists from Great Britain, France, and Germany who threaten to behead any ground troops who oppose them. [66305, 66306]

During a debate in Iowa between U.S. Senate candidates Joni Ernst (Republican) and Bruce Braley (Democrat), Ernst, an Iraq veteran and a Lieutenant Colonel in the Iowa National Guard, responds to a question about "boots on the ground." She says, "I will

remind you that I have served in Iraq. My boots were on that ground that is now held by ISIS, so when we make these decisions I take them very seriously. So before I would commit our sons and daughters, I would sort through those criteria, but we have to recognize that this is a threat that has been out there for years, and we have an administration that has refused to acknowledge that this is a group that is killing innocent civilians, Christians, and even Americans." Ernst also hammers Braley on ObamaCare: "You stated just a few years back that you would not change a thing about ObamaCare, and yet today you're saying, 'Yeah, we do need to make some changes to the bill.' You said you read *every page* of this bill. You tabbed it. You highlighted it. So either you didn't understand what was in the bill, or you were misleading Iowans, and I don't know which one's worse." [66321]

During the debate Braley claims, "I have always stated, contrary to what [State] Senator Ernst said, that I oppose all late-term abortions that aren't necessary to save the life or health of a mother." (In fact, according to the Weekly Standard, "[I]n 2013, Congressman Braley voted against a bill that would have banned abortions later than 20 weeks after conception, with exceptions for the cases of rape, incest, and when a physical health issue endangered the life of the mother. Braley also cosponsored a new bill in 2013—the 'Women's Health Protection Act'—that would strike down almost all limits on abortion, including the 1989 Pennsylvania law used to convict the notorious murderer Kermit Gosnell... This bill that Braley supports is so extreme that even Colorado senator Mark Udall [D-CO] has declined to co-sponsor the Senate version of it.") Obama and his fellow Democrats cannot afford to lose Iowa's Senate seat to Ernst, but Ernst seems to have bested Braley in the debate—and she was already slightly ahead in the polls. (As of October 16, the mail-in, early ballot counts for Iowa Democrats in 2014 are ahead of their 2010 pace but lag way behind their 2012 numbers. Republican ballot counts for 2014 are less than their 2012 counts but are far ahead of their 2010 totals—when the GOP annihilated the Democrats.) [66321, 66322, 66370, 66371]

Newsmax.com reports, "Nearly every African nation has instituted travel bans on West African countries with significant Ebola outbreaks. Though the Obama administration has insisted travel bans are not necessary, even countries outside of Africa are beginning to start such travel bans, with Colombia and the Caribbean island of St. Lucia on Wednesday adding their names to a growing list of nearly 30 countries that block travelers from virus-stricken Liberia, Sierra Leone, and Guinea. African nations including Kenya, Zambia, and South Africa make up the bulk of the countries that have instituted some kind of ban, and now that countries on the other side of the Atlantic have begun imposing restrictions, calls for the U.S. to follow suit have intensified." NYPost.com reports, "A plane from Nigeria landed at JFK Airport Thursday with a male passenger aboard who had died during the flight after a fit of vomiting—and CDC officials conducted a 'cursory' exam before announcing there was no Ebola and turning the corpse over to Port Authority cops to remove, Rep. Peter King [R-NY] said on Thursday. The congressman was so alarmed by the incident—and by what he and

employees see as troubling Ebola vulnerabilities at JFK—that he fired off a letter to the federal Department of Homeland Security demanding more training and tougher protocols for handling possible cases there. The unnamed, 63-year-old passenger had boarded an Arik Air plane out of Lagos, Nigeria, on Wednesday night, a federal law enforcement source said." (How the CDC was able to quickly determine for certain that the patient did not have the Ebola virus is not explained, although he reportedly complained of chest pains and may have had a heart attack.) It is worth noting that Americans have good reason to question statements from the CDC. Obama once declared that "one in five women will be a victim of rape in their lifetime." His absurd claim comes from a 2010 "National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey" conducted by the CDC. The survey claimed that in 2010 approximately 1.3 million women were raped and an additional 12.7 million women and men were victims of sexual violence. According to the American Enterprise Institute's Christina Sommers, the Department of Justice's annual crime survey, "which is the gold standard in crime research," reported about 188,000 rapes and sexual assaults in 2010—a far cry from the 14 million claimed by the CDC. The CDC's statistics came from "a poorly constructed telephone survey, with a low response rate, and a non-representative sample of respondents. No one interviewed was asked if they had been raped or sexually assaulted. Instead of such straightforward questions, the CDC determined whether the responses indicates sexual violation." The survey asked if the contact ever had sex after someone "pressured you by telling you lies?" or because someone "made false promises about the future they knew were untrue?" or because someone "pressure[d] you by showing they were unhappy?" A "yes" answer to any of those questions was considered by the CDC to be proof of "sexual violence." Obama used the one-in-five claim, absurd as it is, because he wanted female voters to be frightened enough to vote for a "nanny state" that will protect them. His goal is not to address the problem, his goal is to enlarge the state and the number of Democrat voters. Using flawed methodology allows the CDC to justify almost any claim it wants to make. If it is in the Obama administration's best interests to claim that 20 percent of all women will be raped, it will find a way to justify that claim. The satirical web site ThePeoplesCube.com "reports," "...Obama issued an Executive Order today making November 4, 2014 a National Day of Quarantine for those Americans who are most at risk of contracting the Ebola virus. 'You cannot get Ebola through casual contact like sitting next to someone on a bus,' [Obama] said in a press conference shortly after signing the Executive Order. 'However you can catch it while waiting in line to vote.' The Executive Order only applies to registered Republicans who are currently less likely to be receiving government provided healthcare and are therefore more susceptible to catching Ebola. The quarantine will go into effect at midnight on November 3rd and will last until the polls close on November 4th. Republicans will be allowed to move freely throughout society so long as they do not come with 1000 feet of a polling booth. Many government agencies have been well armed over the past six years

and will be mobilized on election day to enforce the quarantine. Before leaving for a relaxing round of golf, [Obama] concluded his press conference by reassuring the American people that they will have a safe Election Day. 'Although we have had our disagreements, I more than anyone want Republicans to survive. Perhaps not as a political party, but as the taxpayers of our great nation.'" [66300]

Dr. Jane Orient, director of the Association of American Physicians and Surgeons, says, "If you look at the precautions against secondhand smoke, they are absurd. The hazard from secondhand smoke, unless you're just sensitive to it and it bothers you, are really nonexistent. Every decision this country has made is wrong. Everything's wrong. Everything is going wrong for the United States. When was the last time you heard something good about the United States? You don't hear it. China just took over as the great economic power ...this was unthinkable. But when you think of what's going on with Ebola, where we allow people that can be very, very sick and affect our entire population to be able to come into this country, there's definitely something wrong. [Obama is] either incompetent, he's very stubborn, or there's something wrong." [66345]

Trump also warns that the Ebola issue "could be bad for the [stock] market, there's no question about it. It's been very interesting the last week and a half, and it could certainly be a very bad thing for the market. We have people in charge of our country who make so many mistakes and such simple mistakes and things of common sense—so many different things." Trump calls ObamaCare a "disaster, which by the way, will destroy our country. ObamaCare doesn't really kick in big-league until 2016. That's when you'll

really see the effects, and the effects are already tremendous. So when we have the kind of mistakes and the kind of leadership that we have, you would almost think it [the stock market] has to go down." [66360]

In Chula Vista, California, about 50 students are quarantined for four hours after a Southwestern College student who was ill claimed she was on the flight with an Ebola patient. The student later recants her story. WashingtonTimes.com reports, "It's not clear why she told officials that she shared a flight with Amber Vinson, a second nurse at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital who tested positive for Ebola. It's also not clear if the student would be disciplined, San Diego 6 at the CW reported." [66302]

At an event honoring the Muslim holiday Eid al-Adha, Secretary of State John Kerry says, "The extremism that we see, the radical exploitation of religion which is translated into violence, has no basis in any of the real religions. There's nothing Islamic about what ISIL/Daesh stands for, or is doing to people. ... We're living at a point in time where there are just more young people demanding what they see the rest of the world having than at any time in modern history. ... And that brings us to something like climate change, which is profoundly having an impact in various parts of the world, where droughts are occurring not at a 100-year level but at a 500-year level in places that they haven't occurred, floods of massive proportions, diminishment of water for crops and agriculture at a time where we need to be talking about sustainable food. In many places we see the desert increasingly creeping into East Africa. We're seeing herders and farmers pushed into deadly conflict as a result. Kerry also whines that Israel is the problem as well because the lack of peace between the Jewish state and the Palestinians "has something to do with humiliation and denial and absence of dignity..." (In Kerry's view, radical Islamists have nothing to do with Islam. The jihadists are slicing off the heads of Christians, Kurds, and Jews and taking child brides and sex slaves because they are jealous of the wealth of the western world, because the Israelis build apartments in Jerusalem, and because "global warming" is apparently turning into deserts area that have been, well, deserts for as long as mankind lived there. Whether Kerry is merely regurgitating nonsense told him by Obama or Valerie Jarrett or he actually believes that nonsense is not clear, but in either case he is a dangerous person to have running the State Department.) On October 17 Obama names Ron Klain his "Ebola czar." Klain, a lawyer and lobbyist, has zero background in medicine. He has served as Vice President Joe Biden's chief of staff and Al Gore's chief of staff, worked as a lawyer for a lobbying firm (that represented U.S. Airways, Airborne Express, and ImClone Systems—the company whose insider trading scandal put Martha Stewart in prison), and is currently president of investment firm Case Holdings. (Obama does not explain the duties of Dr. Nicole Lurie, who heads the government's "Biomedical Advanced Research and Development Authority" and who has herself stated that the responsibilities of her office are "to help our country prepare for, respond to and recover from public health threats" and developing "countermeasures—the medicines or vaccines that people might need to use in a public health emergency.") Clearly, the appointment of Klain—whose wife is an environmental activist and an assistant to the Secretary of Defense—is for political, not medical, purposes. According to FoxNews.com, one Solyndra investor email read, "They about had an orgasm in Biden's office when we mentioned Solyndra." A Solyndra board member responded, "That's awesome! Get us a [Department of Energy] loan." DailyCaller.com writes that Klain "was one of the senior White House officials who advised that ... Obama should visit solar power company Solyndra... despite an auditor raising red flags about the company's finances." According to The Washington Post, Klain "dismissed auditor's concerns about Solyndra's solvency, reasoning that all innovative companies come with risk." By the time Obama visited Solyndra in May 2010, White House officials, including Klain, knew the company was in trouble. Nevertheless, Klain emailed Obama advisor Valerie Jarrett, "It looks like it is OK to me..." Jarrett responded, "I'm comfortable if you're comfortable." (The auditors were right; Klain, who essentially signed off on the loan, was wrong—and the mistakes cost the taxpayers a fortune.) In 2008, Klain served as the main lawyer on the "Gore-Lieberman Recount Committee" that attempted to get recounts in selective counties Florida—those that would have favored Gore over Bush. In 2009 Klain oversaw the disbursement of \$787 billion in "stimulus funds"—which many would argue was a massive failure. Klain also served as Obama's lead debate coach for the November 2012 campaign. Visitor logs show that Klain was at the White House for "debate prep" on September 11, 2012—the day of the terrorist attack in Benghazi. GAF Materials faced, '...huge liabilities related to asbestos-exposure lawsuits,' Vogel wrote... 'Public Citizen called the push for the bill, which didn't pass, 'a classic example of how special interests in Washington use political contributions, high-powered lobbying and public relations firms and prestigious academics to work their will in Congress—and trample on the rights of workers and consumers in the process." 'Klain's career as a lobbyist, during which clients paid nearly \$700,000 for lobbying in which he participated, ended when he left his partnership at the law firm O'Melveny & Myers in 2005,' Vogel wrote. He also lobbied for Fannie Mae, helping the mortgage giant to overcome 'regulatory issues,' as well as major airline and pharmaceutical companies. Klain 'epitomizes the side of the influence industry that Obama decried during his campaign: big companies paying Beltway insiders lots of money to craft laws and rules that help them,' Vogel noted." White House press secretary Josh Earnest tells reporters that Klain (who misses the day's Ebola meeting with Obama) "will ultimately however report to Ms. [Lisa] Monaco [a Homeland Security and Counterterrorism official] and to National Security Advisor Susan Rice in this effort." (Klain knows nothing about health care or infectious diseases; nor does Monaco; nor does Rice. Monaco and Rice are involved with terrorism and national security, neither of which relate to health issues—unless someone is concerned about the use of Ebola as a weapon.) [66320, 66323]

Also at LewRockwell.com, Pat Buchanan writes, "Growing up in Washington in the 1930s and '40s, our home was, several times, put under quarantine. A poster would be

tacked on the door indicating the presence within of a contagious disease—measles, mumps, chicken pox, scarlet fever. None of us believed we were victims of some sort of invidious discrimination against large Catholic families. It was a given that public health authorities were trying to contain the spread of a disease threatening the health of children. ... In the 1930s, '40s and early '50s, there were outbreaks of polio in D.C. Swimming pools were shut down. The Greatest Generation possessed a common sense that seems lacking today. ... Where once we suffered from infantile paralysis, now we suffer from ideological paralysis. And there appears to be no Salk or Sabin vaccine to cure our condition. ... In dealing with contagious and deadly diseases, common sense says to err on the side of safety. Public safety must come before political correctness. Community and country come ahead of any obligation to the people of West Africa. Indeed, is not the first duty of the government of the United States to protect the lives, liberty and property of the citizens of the United States? ... As for U.S. aid workers in Africa, they are heroic. But before bringing these good and brave people home, we ought to be sure they are not bringing back with them the Ebola they have been fighting. If that means quarantining them for 21 days, so be it. If that means no commercial fights to the United States from the three most affected countries of West Africa, and no admission to the USA of any travelers whose visas show they have been in those countries in recent days, then it ought to be done. Else political correctness is going to end up killing a lot of us." CNSNews.com reports that, according to the National Institutes for Health, "five nurses are assigned to care for [Ebola patient Nina] Pham on each 12-hour shift. 'We fully intend to have this patient walk out of this hospital, and we'll do everything we possibly can to make that happen,' NIH infectious disease specialist Dr. Anthony Fauci [said at a] news conference." Pham's care—a cost which would have been avoided had Thomas Eric Duncan not been allowed into the United States. (According to the Department of Health and Human Services, there are about 2.8 million registered nurses in the United States. At a ratio of 20 nurses to each Ebola patient, 140,000 could be cared for—if there were also enough doctors, enough hospitals, and enough money to handle such an emergency, and if no other Americans were hospitalized for anything else! Realistically, of course, a few thousand Ebola patients would overwhelm the U.S. health care system, which is precisely what is happening in West Africa. That is also precisely why a travel ban should be imposed. A few dozen Ebola-carrying travelers—or Ebola-carrying terrorists—in the United States could quickly turn into a few thousand victims.) Senator Kay Hagan (D-NC) says the Centers for Disease Control is "giving us great guidance, but we've got to make sure the implementation is perfect." (That "great guidance" includes claiming that one cannot get the Ebola virus in a crowded bus but people infected with Ebola should not fly, and imposing air travel restrictions would make the situation worse—apparently because Liberia has a "fledgling economy.") (Earlier in the week Hagan said, "That's not going to solve this problem. That's not going to contain the epidemic that we see happening in Africa." Senators from both political parties start lining up to call for temporary travel restrictions to help prevent the Ebola virus from spreading further in the United States. In a letter to Obama, nine Senators write, "We urge you to immediately cease issuing visas to persons of Sierra Leone, Liberia and Guinea, and to consider expanding this ban to other countries that may not have standards in place to properly screen travelers entering the United States. We also urge you to more strongly use tools at your disposal to receive flight manifests ahead of time to screen and turn away passengers if they have traveled to or are coming from countries with an Ebola outbreak. At this point, you and your administration must consider all options to prevent the spread of the Ebola virus. Dismissing a travel ban or a moratorium on visa issuances sends a signal that you're not serious about containing the outbreak and preventing infections of individuals on U.S. soil. We implore you to immediately use your statutory authority under Section 212(f) of the Immigration and Nationality Act to suspend the entry of all aliens or any class of aliens as immigrants or nonimmigrants [sic; non-immigrants] who are detrimental to the interests of the United States." HotAir.com observes, "If [Obama] institutes the ban and it turns out—after a sufficient time to gather facts and examine the results—to have been unnecessary or less effective than desired, he will have inconvenienced some number of travelers. If he does not

At Breitbart.com Sarah Rumpf reports, "As Ebola continued to ravage communities in West Africa this summer, U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), a division under the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) announced 'immigration relief measures' for citizens of three countries affected by the deadly virus." Those "relief measures" made it easier for citizens of Guinea, Liberia, and Sierra Leone to remain in the United States. "In short, the USCIS has been waiving fees, expediting the immigration process, and allowing extensions of visas for anyone coming from the three designated Ebola-stricken countries, provided that they are in the United States. ... Thomas Eric Duncan, the Liberian man who died from Ebola earlier this month, had traveled to the United States after his visa was approved in August, the same month that USCIS announced the new relief measures. One of the concerns many have had about the Ebola crisis is the lure those in the affected countries would—quite understandably—feel toward the advanced sanitation standards and medical care available in American hospitals, similar to how open borders, social services, and in-state tuition have been criticized as creating 'magnets' for immigrants to illegally cross the U.S.-Mexican border. These specific USCIS policies do not apply to those who are not yet in the United States and are seeking a visa to leave Guinea, Liberia, or Sierra Leone, but the more generous rules that await them once they arrive likely create further incentives for them to attempt to travel here. According to the Washington Post, the number of visas issued to Liberians by the United States has spiked, with about 3,500 visitor visas granted to Liberians last year, and another 10,000 granted to people from Guinea and Sierra Leone during that same time period. The *Post* also reported that Liberians also have a very high rate of 'visa overstays,' the fifth highest after Cuba, Burundi, Eritrea and the Democratic Republic of Congo, according to immigration expert Jessica Vaughn with the Center for Immigration Studies. Vaughn has sharply criticized the Obama administration's immigration policies regarding Ebola, noting that Kenya and other African countries have closed their borders to any travelers from Ebola-afflicted areas." (Meanwhile, the U.S. government continues to process 100 or more travel visas per day from citizens of Guinea, Liberia, and Sierra Leone.) [66317, 66318, 66372, 66386]

The Carnival cruise line ship Magic is turned away from a port in Cozumel, Mexico because one of its passengers is a health worker who handled Ebola patient Thomas Eric Duncan's lab work. (The worker, who has not exhibited signs of the virus, was reportedly placed in quarantine on the ship.) [66324, 66325, 66338, 66339, 66352]

A judge in Broward County, Florida is forced to clear his courtroom after defendant Joseph Britton announces he has the Ebola virus. WSVN.com reports, "The inmate was ordered to stay in the room where hazmat crews entered to put him in full protective gear. Broward County Sheriff Scott Israel said as soon as the judge made the decision to clear the courtroom, his team acted. 'We contained his contact with anyone else, the hazmat team responded, and they went with their protocols and procedures working with the CDC, and they're going to take him over to the hospital for examination.' Britton was then taken to Broward Health Medical Center in a plastic-covered ambulance. He was later checked out of the hospital with no indication of actually being sick. Before the courtroom scare, police reported Britton was drunk at the time of the arrest and was screened at that time with no symptoms. He never had any contact with the virus. Israel said officials handled the situation well. 'We don't believe this inmate has Ebola, but we've taken what we feel is going to be a non-life-threatening situation and turned it into a training mission,' Israel said." [66401]

WashingtonExaminer.com reports, "Judicial Watch, the conservative public watchdog group, says in a shocking report that [Obama] is 'actively formulating plans' to admit Ebola-infected non-citizens just to be treated. 'Specifically, the goal of the administration is to bring Ebola patients into the United States for treatment within the first days of diagnosis,' said the group. Such a plan would likely cause a political outcry throughout the nation, on edge over the spread of the virus." According to Judicial Watch, "The plans include special waivers of laws and regulations that ban the admission of non-citizens with a communicable disease as dangerous as Ebola," and "[T]he Obama administration is keeping this plan secret from Congress. In case the ultra-educated (many Ivy-League) U.S. diplomatic corps have forgotten: those Cubans are the hapless subjects of a totalitarian regime. ...Reports recently smuggled out of Cuba indicate that these hapless 'medical professionals' dragooned to west Africa by the Castro regime are being warned they will not be allowed back into Cuba if they contract Ebola. NYTimes.com reports, "The police officer who fatally shot Michael Brown in Ferguson, Mo., two months ago has told investigators that he was pinned in his vehicle and in fear for his life as he struggled over his gun with Mr. Brown, according to government officials briefed on the federal civil rights investigation into the matter. The officer, Darren Wilson, has told the authorities that during the scuffle, Mr. Brown reached for the gun. It was fired twice in the car, according to forensics tests performed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The first bullet struck Mr. Brown in the arm; the second bullet missed. The forensics tests showed Mr. Brown's blood on the gun, as well as on the interior door panel and on Officer Wilson's uniform. Officer Wilson told the authorities that Mr. Brown had punched and scratched him repeatedly, leaving swelling on his face and cuts on his neck. ... In September, Officer Wilson appeared for four hours before a St. Louis County grand jury, which was convened to determine whether there is probable cause that he committed a crime. Legal experts have said that his decision to testify was

surprising, given that it was not required by law. But the struggle in the car may prove to be a more influential piece of information for the grand jury, one that speaks to Officer Wilson's state of mind, his feeling of vulnerability and his sense of heightened alert when he killed Mr. Brown. Police officers typically have wide latitude to use lethal force if they reasonably believe that they are in imminent danger. The officials said that while the federal investigation was continuing, the evidence so far did not support civil rights charges against Officer Wilson. To press charges, the Justice Department would need to clear a high bar, proving that Officer Wilson willfully violated Mr. Brown's civil rights when he shot him." [66402, 66403]

NowTheEndBegins.com reports, "A few days ago ...Obama, in an interview he gave France's Canal+ TV Channel, said that the American people need to be better educated about Islam, since US could and should be regarded as a Muslim country. He said that the number of Muslims residing in the US makes it 'one of the biggest Muslim nations." (Obama has made this absurd claim in the past—and *The Obama Timeline* has commented on it in the past. Although Obama has made it a point several times to state that the United States is not a *Christian* nation, he is perfectly willing to state that it is a Muslim nation. The point of Obama's comment—other than to pander to Muslims—is not clear. The report by the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights in Britain could not be independently confirmed, and U.S. official said they had no reports of Islamic State militants flying jets in support of their forces on the ground. ... The Observatory said the planes, seen flying over the Jarrah air base in the countryside of Aleppo province in eastern Syria this week, are believed to be MiG-21 and MiG-23 jets. Rami Abdurrahman, director of the Observatory, said the planes have been flying at a low altitude, 'apparently to avoid being detected by Syrian military radar in the area.' He described the flights as a 'moral victory' for the Islamic State group, saying 'the jets could not fly much further without being knocked down by the (international) coalition.'" On October 18 the U.S. Supreme Court upholds Texas' photo ID law for voting and rules that it can be applied in the upcoming November 4 elections. The three dissenting Justices include Ruth Bader Ginsburg, who makes the absurd claim that the requirement "may prevent more than 600,000 registered Texas voters... from voting for lack of compliant identification." (Ginsburg does not explain how those 600,000 Texans managed to register to vote in the first place without presenting proof of identity.) Trying to seal off an entire region of the world—if that were even possible—could actually make the situation worse. It would make it harder to move health workers and supplies back and forth. (Of course, the United States most certainly can and arguably should cut itself off rom West Africa. Allowing infected people to easily leave the region ensures that it will spread. To argue that a travel ban would encourage people to lie and "evade screening" ignores the fact that they will do that even if there is not travel ban. As proof there is Thomas Eric Duncan, who even without a travel ban lied to gain access to the United States. For Obama to argue that it would have done no good to make it more difficult to enter the United States is absurd.) Obama also claims, "Ebola is actually a difficult disease to catch," a claim that is also absurd—considering how it has already spread in West Africa. "Before this is over," says Obama, "we may see more isolated cases here in America, but we know how to wage this fight." (The government has already demonstrated that it does *not* know how to "wage this fight." Additionally, to state, "Before this is over" suggests a virus that has been killing people in Africa for decades will soon be eradicated is offering false hope. "As a rule," writes Last, "one should not panic at whatever crisis has momentarily fixed the attention of cable news producers. But the Ebola outbreak in West Africa, which has migrated to both Europe and America, may be the exception that proves the rule. ...(1) Start with what we know, and don't know, about the virus. ...Not everyone is convinced that this Ebola isn't airborne. Last month, the University of Minnesota's Center for Infectious Disease Research and Policy published an article arguing that the current Ebola has 'unclear modes of transmission' and that 'there is scientific and epidemiologic evidence that Ebola virus has the potential to be transmitted via infectious aerosol particles both near and at a distance from infected patients, which means that healthcare workers should be wearing respirators, not facemasks. ... And even if this Ebola isn't airborne right now, it might become so in the future. Viruses mutate and evolve in the wild, and the population of infected Ebola carriers is now bigger than it has been at any point in history—meaning that the pool for potential mutations is larger than it has ever been." "...(2) General infection rates are terrifying, too. In epidemiology, you measure the 'R0,' or 'reproduction number' of a virus; that is, how many new infections each infected person causes. When R0 is greater than 1, the virus is spreading through a population. When it's below 1, the contamination is receding." (The R0 in the United States is already two, with Thomas Eric Duncan having infected at least two health care workers. The devastating flu virus of 1918-1920 had an R factor of between two and three, and killed between 50 and 100 million people worldwide. More than 500,000 died in the

United States.) ...(3) Do you *really* want to be scared? What's to stop a jihadist from going to Liberia, getting himself infected, and then flying to New York and riding the subway until he keels over? This is just the biological warfare version of a suicide bomb. Can you imagine the consequences if someone with Ebola vomited in a New York City subway car? A flight from Roberts International in Monrovia to JFK in New York is less than \$2,000, meaning that the planning and infrastructure needed for such an attack is relatively trivial. This scenario may be highly unlikely. But so were the September 11 attacks and the Richard Reid attempted shoe bombing, both of which resulted in the creation of a permanent security apparatus around airports. We take drastic precautions all the time, if the potential losses are serious enough, so long as officials are paying attention to the threat." [66379, 66393, 66408, 66409]

"(4) Let's put aside the Ebola-as-weapon scenario—some things are too depressing to contemplate at length—and look at the range of scenarios for what we have in front of us, from best-case to worst-case. The epidemiological protocols for containing Ebola rest on four pillars: contact tracing, case isolation, safe burial, and effective public information. On October 14, the *New York Times* reported that in Liberia, with 'only' 4,000 cases, 'Schools have shut down, elections have been postponed, mining and logging companies have withdrawn, farmers have abandoned their fields.' Which means that the baseline for 'best-case' is already awful. In September, the CDC ran a series of models on the spread of the virus and came up with a best-case scenario in which, by January 2015, Liberia alone would have a cumulative 11,000 to 27,000 cases. That's in a world where all of the aid and personnel gets where it needs to be, the resident population behaves rationally, and everything breaks their way. The worst-case scenario envisioned by the model is anywhere from 537,000 to 1,367,000 cases by January. Just in Liberia. With the fever still raging out of control." [66379]

"(5) And by the way, things could get worse. All of those worst-case projections assume that the virus stays contained in a relatively small area of West Africa, which, with a million people infected, would be highly unlikely. What happens if and when the virus starts leaking out to other parts of the world? ...It isn't crazy to see how a health crisis could beget all sorts of other crises, from humanitarian, to economic, to political, to existential. ...(6) While we're on the subject of political crisis, it's worth noting that the politics of Ebola are uncertain and dangerous to everyone involved. Thus far, there's been only one serious political clash over Ebola, and that's concerning the banning of flights to and from the infected countries in West Africa. Obama administration refuses to countenance such a move, with the CDC's [Tom] Frieden flatly calling it 'wrong.' ...Frieden's entire argument is so strange—and so at odds with what other epidemiologists prescribe—that it can only be explained by one of two causes: catastrophic incompetence or a prior ideological commitment. The latter, in this case, might well be the larger issue of immigration. ... What would happen in the event of an Ebola outbreak in Latin America? Then America would have to worry about masses of uninfected immigrants surging across the border—not to mention carriers of the virus. And if we had decided it was okay to cut off flights from West Africa, would we decide it was okay to try to seal the Southern border too? You can see how the entire immigration project might start to come apart. So for now, the Obama administration will insist on

keeping travel open between infected countries and the West and hope that they, and we, get lucky." [66379]

It is worth noting that Ebola can perhaps more easily spread in Islamic countries than in others because of Muslim burial customs. According to InstigatorNews.com, "When Muslims die, family members don't turn to a funeral home or crematorium to take care of the body. In Islam, death is handled much differently. Relatives personally wash the corpses of loved ones from head to toe. Often, several family members participate in this posthumous bathing ritual, known as Ghusl. Before scrubbing the skin with soap and water, family members press down on the abdomen to excrete fluids still in the body. A mixture of camphor and water is used for a final washing. Then, family members dry off the body and shroud it in white linens. Again, washing the bodies of the dead in this way is considered a collective duty for Muslims, especially in Muslim nations. Failure to do so is believed to leave the deceased 'impure' and jeopardizes the faithful's ascension into Paradise (unless he died in jihad; then no Ghusl is required). Before the body is buried, Muslims attending the funeral typically pass a common bowl for use in ablution or washing of the face, feet and hands, compounding the risk of infection. Though these customs are prescribed by Shariah law, they're extremely dangerous and should be suspended. Mosque leaders must step in to educate village Muslims about the dangers of interacting with corpses. Ebola victims can be more contagious dead than alive. Their bodies are covered in rashes, blood and other fluids containing the virus. 'Funerals and washing dead bodies in West African countries have led, to a great extent, to spread the disease,' a World Health Organization spokeswoman recently warned." Perhaps not surprisingly, Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital has turned into a "ghost town," according to area health care vendor Rachelle Cohorn, who tells ABC News, "No one is even walking around the hospital." The emergency room wait time has been reduced from an average of 52 minutes to zero—because patients fear that the Ebola virus is still present and they are heading elsewhere for treatment. Dr. Dan Varga, the chief clinical officer of Texas Health Resources, which owns the Dallas hospital, tells ABC, "I would tell this community that Presby is an absolutely safe hospital to come to. We've been in communication with our doctors that have their private offices in our professional buildings around the campus who are getting 40, 50, 60 percent cancellations just for fear of being somewhere in the geography of the hospital where Ebola is treated." (This is an example of how fears of Ebola—both rational and irrational—can harm the U.S. economy. If the lack of a travel ban allows even one Ebola carrier to infect several people in a crowded shopping mall, amusement park, restaurant, or movie theater, businesses across the country could possibly lose billions of dollars in profits because customers choose to stay home. In his efforts to protect Liberia's "fledgling economy," Obama may be inadvertently [or intentionally] causing great harm to the economy of the United States.) [66407]

Dr. William Miller, author of *The Microcosm Within: Evolution and Extinction in the Hologenome*, tells WND.com he supports a travel ban. He states, "There seems to be a pushback against a travel ban by the media, national leaders and other persons of

authority; yet everyone whom I speak to believes that we need to protect ourselves by every means. "Am I the only voice that is willing to speak against current policy? I deeply feel that we are playing infectious-disease roulette. ... We have now seen the U.S. health-care system was unprepared and under-rehearsed for an outbreak of Ebola, but what the CDC doesn't understand is that that source of Ebola coming here is open-air travel. ... If we do whatever we can to reduce the incidence of a pathogen like Ebola making its way here on our soil, we are better off. ... Unfortunately, there may be some 13 percent of people who are infected with Ebola who have the ability to transmit the disease before they get a fever. Yes, we can stop air travelers that show symptoms, but Ebola has a latency period of up to 21 days that it takes the virus to incubate. So, a person infected by Ebola can travel from West Africa and be perfectly well, showing no signs of infection." [66410, 66676]

"What makes it more ironic is that Texas health officials have now decided that health-care workers that have contact with Ebola patients will not be allowed to travel on public transportation, including buses, trains and airplanes, during a quarantine period of some 21 days. So we are going to restrict our own citizens—Texas health-care workers who voluntarily agree to treat Ebola patients—to a quarantine where all they can do is work or stay in their homes, but at the same time we are going to allow people from Ebola-affected countries to enter the United States at will, provided they are not showing symptoms of the disease while they are traveling. That makes no sense whatsoever.

...We have to look at this from the perspective of assuming that Ebola becomes a terrifying epidemic in the United States, and we don't want to have to look back and say the one thing we should have done to keep the disease from becoming a problem here was that the CDC should have imposed bans to restrict air travel." "...Our standard right now should be to do everything possible to protect the health and safety of the American people. The United States will not be able to help other regions of the world suffering from Ebola if we first do not protect ourselves at home. ...Americans are good Samaritans by nature, and we don't like closing our borders to anyone. But the problem we have to understand is that Ebola is a virulent disease that recognizes no boundaries of class distinction, ethnicity, language, race or religion. If we are going to stop U.S. citizens that provide health care to Ebola patients from getting on public transportation whether they are sick from Ebola or not, we cannot continue to let international passengers from West Africa fly here freely as long as they don't currently have a fever. It's basically suicidal not to impose air-travel restrictions, and from the point of view of medical science, it's crazy to think otherwise." [66410, 66676]

At LewRockwell.com Jack Perry writes that Ebola czar Ron Klain is "President of Case Holdings and General Counsel of Revolution LLC, which is an investment group. Now, I did a little digging on Revolution LLC and discovered that one of their companies is called Extend Health. Who are they? They're a Medicare insurance private exchange juggler. They say of themselves that they help people find the right Medicare plan and coverage and then enroll in it. So, evidently, this probably has some ties with Obamacare someplace. Another company that Revolution holds is called FedBid, an online marketplace for federal, state, and local government buyers where they can purchase,

guess what? Medical supplies, lab equipment, communications devices, hazardous waste containers, hazmat suits, hospital beds, sanitation and janitorial supplies, heavy equipment, pharmaceuticals, medical diagnostic test kits, emergency medical personnel contractors, office equipment, IT hardware/software, and facilities. All the stuff you need to set up an 'Ebola Task Force' and equip those CDC 'SWAT teams,' as well as the military. Among the buyers who use FedBid are the DOD, the U.S. Army, Dept. of Health and Human Service, and the Dept. of Homeland Security. What FedBid basically does is set up a place where businesses and contractors can connect with federal government agency buyers. Does this not seem a bit suspicious to any of you folks out there? Suddenly, a guy with ties to a company that connects sellers of things such as medical supplies and lab equipment with government agency buyers is made the 'Ebola Czar' in charge of the whole shebang. What's more, Klain reports to White House homeland security advisor Lisa Monaco and national security advisor Susan Rice. Homeland Security is one of FedBid's buyers, as is the military. The no-bid contracts will soon be here." [66416]

"...Folks, this is déjà vu all over again. This administration is using this crisis to profit from it and, quite possibly, award no-bid contracts to their friends. ... And that if there is one thing the Great Father [the federal government] can be counted on to do in a crisis, it is to play politics with it. The State of Ohio issues restrictions limiting the travel "of people currently required to have their health condition monitored daily by a local health department and those required to report their health condition themselves to a local health department. ... Ohioans required to have a public health official monitor their health condition daily would be prohibited from leaving their health department's jurisdiction unless the health department jurisdiction to which they are travelling agrees to assume that daily monitoring responsibility. If that agreement is not reached, the individual cannot travel and must keep their daily monitoring appointments in their home health department jurisdiction. Ohioans under self-monitoring and reporting requirements cannot leave the United States due to the inability to track them down in the event they fail to meet their daily reporting requirements." (A number of Ohio residents are being closely monitored for symptoms of Ebola because of their exposure to Dallas health care worker Amber Vinson, who traveled to the state after handling laboratory work for Ebola victim Thomas Eric Duncan.) On October 19 the Carnival cruise ship Magic docks in Galveston, Texas. The passenger who some fear was exposed to the Ebola virus leaves the ship and drives home with her husband. [66457]

At a church parking lot in Fayetteville, North Carolina, the worshippers were greeted by flyers showing a lynch mob and the words, "[If] Kay Hagan Doesn't WIN! Obama's IMPEACHMENT Will Begin! VOTE IN 2014." Fayetteville NAACP president Jimmy Buxton says the flyer is not racist because "That's what the community feels." [66544, 66545, 66552, 66566, 66567, 66918]

The Georgia Democrat party sends mailers encouraging blacks to vote, with a photo of two black toddlers holding "Don't Shoot" signs. Above the photo is the warning, "If You Want To Prevent Another Ferguson In Their Future..." (Michelle Nunn, the Democrat candidate for the U.S. Senate from Georgia, refuses to denounce the fliers, stating, "I think that we need to use Ferguson as a platform to have a conversation with our communities around what kind of society do we want, how do we ensure equal justice and equal treatment under the law." (From Nunn's perspective, suggesting to black voters they will be shot if Republicans are elected is a "platform to have a conversation.") [66607, 66608, 66785, 66918, 67102]

Despite objections from Turkey, the U.S. military drops 27 bundles of weapons and supplies, via three C-130 cargo planes, to Kurdish fighters in Iraq to help them prevent ISIS from capturing the city of Kobani. According to TheDailyBeats.com, "At least one bundle of U.S. weapons airdropped in Syria appears to have fallen into the hands of ISIS, a dangerous misfire in the American mission to speed aid to Kurdish forces making their stand in Kobani." Cliff Kincaid writes at NewsWithViews.com, "Barbara Loe Fisher of the National Vaccine Information Center has written a series of questions that illustrate how the Obama administration has facilitated the spread of Ebola to the U.S. Her conclusion is that 'some people in industry, government and the World Health Organization did not want the Ebola outbreak to be confined to several nations in Africa because that would fail to create a lucrative global market for mandated use of fast-tracked Ebola vaccines by every one of the seven billion human beings living on this planet.' The flaw in this thinking is that Ebola could spread so fast that millions will die and economies will collapse (including our own) before a vaccine is developed. ... It's not clear if an Ebola vaccine will be effective or if it can be ready in a short period of time. ... Obama's use of the race card in the case of Ebola will become overt if members of Congress persist in calling for a travel ban. A page on the Centers for Disease Control web site that had provided directions for removing gloves to avoid the risk of infection is removed and replaced with a "Page Not Found" message. (On October 15 Dr. Jonathan Reiner tweeted, "Follow these instructions from CDC website for removing gloves & you risk contamination. Not how to do it." Reiner was far from alone in criticizing the CDC instructions.) [66428, 66429]

At a rally for Maryland gubernatorial candidate Anthony Brown (who is favored to win despite his colossal mistakes in implementing the state's ObamaCare exchange that cost the taxpayers more than \$100 million), many people in the audience walk up and leave during Obama's speech. Reuters' Jeff Mason tweets, "Steady stream of people leaving Maryland rally continues as Obama speaks. It's noticeable and noisy. They would have waited hours to get in." "Lost that tingle in your leg..." "I'm bitter and I had to go home and 'cling to my guns & religion."" (It is worth noting that for some time Obama's public appearances have been limited to fundraisers and controlled photo ops. The walkouts at the Maryland event help to explain why.) team members will be sent to Fort Sam Houston in Texas for up to seven days of specialized training in infection control and personal protective equipment (PPE). That training is expected to start within the next week or so and will be provided by the U.S. Army Medical Research Institute of Infectious Diseases. Upon conclusion of training, team members will remain in a 'prepare to deploy' status for 30 days, available to be sent to other CONUS [continental United States] locations as required. They will not be sent to West Africa or elsewhere overseas and will be called upon domestically only if deemed prudent by our public health professionals." (Some might argue that a civilian team from the CDC should be assembled for the task, not a military team, and may question the legality of such an action because the Posse Comitatus Act of 1878 prohibits the U.S. military from engaging in actions within the United States. In any event, a rapid response team of 30 people would be able to handle only one or two Ebola cases. The care for Ebola patient Nina Pham uses five nurses for each 12-hour shift.) Dr. Ezekiel Emanuel, an ObamaCare architect, later says of the Pentagon's Ebola response team, "I'm a little confused by it, why we need the Pentagon to do it. We have a lot of incredibly competent healthcare people in the federal government at the [National Institutes of Health] and other facilities. I think that may look like it's actually a little bit of overkill." (Obama's goal with the team is arguably to make it look as though he is doing something, not to actually do something.) [66503]

On State of the Union, Senator Ted Cruz (R-TX) tells CNN's Candy Crowley, "We should stop issuing travel visas from Liberia, which, interestingly enough, the neighboring countries in Africa have done. What we need from [Obama] is serious leadership to protect the American people. It shouldn't be a partisan issue. We should be protecting citizens of this country. ... The doctors and the experts that [sic; who] are saying [a travel ban wouldn't work] are working for the [Obama] administration and are repeating the administration talking points, and their arguments don't make sense. The first argument about the screens [sic; screenings] doesn't make sense because they don't work during the 21-day incubation period, and the second argument that they make is they say a travel ban would prevent health care relief workers from arriving in West Africa. No one is talking about banning flights into West Africa. Of course physicians and nurses and health care workers should be allowed to go in there and we can send them in on charter flights or military C-130 aircraft with appropriate safety precautions. That's very different from saying commercial airliners should fly, day after day, with hundreds of passengers connecting with thousands of passengers coming all throughout the country. The arguments they're giving don't make sense, and what is unfortunate is watching the Obama administration treat this as yet another political issue rather than as a public health crisis." Crowley asks Cruz, "What mistakes were made at the hospital level [when treating the Ebola patient in Dallas]? What mistakes were made by Texas public health officials?" Cruz replies, "Candy, the first mistake that was made was allowing Thomas Duncan to get on an airplane and fly to the United States. ... If he hadn't flown to the United States, none of the other mistakes would have happened." Crowley also asks about Obama's

appointment of Ron Klain to be the Ebola czar, saying, "didn't this need someone, uh, who had organizational skills, which the White House says Ron Klain has, uh, to kind of... give the public the feeling that the government is on top of this." The quick-witted Cruz responds, "Candy, we should be less concerned about giving the public the *feeling* that the government is on top of this and more concerned about the government *actually* being on top of it." Also on CNN, *New York Times* reporter Jonathan Martin tells John King that the Ebola situation "is a gift-wrapped issue for the GOP. The second issue is this larger question of a world coming undone, and the backdrop of events to which this election is playing out, whether it's beheadings, whether it's Ebola, the events taking place with Vladimir Putin. For Republicans, they simply have the point in saying 'Competence and Chaos?' and that's a pretty compelling message in a year that's structurally good for them anyways." [66449]

On *This Week*, ABC's George Stephanopoulos eagerly comes to Obama's defense on his controversial appointment of Ron Klain to coordinate the government's Ebola communications: "You know you've got a lot of medical experts working on Ebola right now but to the extent there is a crisis in the United States, which I don't think there is, there's a communications crisis and a management crisis inside the government." [66481]

Also on *This Week*, Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Infectious Diseases, shifts the blame for two Americans contracting Ebola from the CDC to the World Health Organization (WHO), saying, "the protocol that was originally recommended was a protocol that's a WHO protocol that's best fitted for out in the field. It doesn't cover every single aspect of your skin. That worked in the field. What's very clear now, if you're in an intensive care setting, doing things you would never do in the bush or in the field in Africa, very invasive type procedures, that that is not the optimal way. So, we don't know for sure, but it is likely she [nurse Nina Pham] got infected because she was not completely covered." Fauci also says, "I think this idea that every single hospital can take care of a seriously ill Ebola patient right now is just not true." [66486, 66489]

On *Meet the Press*, Republican strategist Mike Murphy says the GOP will do well in the November 4 elections because of Obama's incompetence: "You can't get [Democrat Senate candidate] Alison Grimes to admit who she voted for with the jaws of life. I mean that was a disaster for her and [Senator] Mitch McConnell's going to win [reelection. [Obama's approval] numbers are down at 40 percent; I mean, broccoli is at 45. You're going to have a rejection [of Obama's policies by the voters]. Right now, I believe the thing is moving in a good Republican direction because of the national reject [Obama] numbers. And it's gonna [sic; going to] come down to a ground grame [sic], I think that—a ground game. (Mitchell does not explain why having to show a photo ID to vote will make it "really hard for Democrats." Whether she believes Democrats routinely drive without licenses, never fly on airplanes, never cash checks, never enter federal buildings—or are simply too stupid to carry an ID with them—is not clear. Some, perhaps Mitchell included, make the claim that requiring a photo ID to vote is racist—but they never explain why they believe that blacks and Hispanics are less likely to have identification than whites. Although it is true that illegal immigrants may often not carry valid photo IDs, they are not supposed to be voting anyway.) [66482]

On *Fox News Sunday*, Congresswoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz (D-FL), chairwoman of the Democrat National Committee, insists, "We [Democrats] are going to hold the Senate. Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan says he has no plans to assist the Kurds in their fight against ISIS: "It would be wrong for the United States, with whom we are friends and allies in NATO, to talk openly and to expect us to say 'yes' to such a support to a terrorist organization [PKK]. It cannot expect such a thing from us and we cannot say 'yes' to such a thing either." CNSNews.com notes, "The main Syrian Kurdish group defending the strategic border town of Kobani against an ISIS assault is the Democratic Union Party (PYD), a secularist organization that was outlawed and suppressed by the Assad regime for years before the civil war broke out. Turkey is hostile towards the PYD because it has links to the Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK), a group that waged a bloody separatist struggle in south-eastern Turkey for three decades until it entered a peace process with Ankara last year." Meanwhile, the White House states that Obama and Erdogan "pledged to continue to work closely together to strengthen cooperation against ISIL." (They can hardly be working closely together if they cannot even agree on the identity of the enemy.) [66491]

Breitbart.com reports, "Despite no official action from [Obama] ahead of the election, the Obama administration has quietly begun preparing to issue millions of work authorization permits, suggesting the implementation of a large-scale executive amnesty

may have already begun. Unnoticed until now, a draft solicitation for bids issued by U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) Oct. 6 says potential vendors must be capable of handling a 'surge' scenario of 9 million id cards in one year 'to support possible future immigration reform initiative requirements.' The request for proposals says the agency will need a minimum of four million cards per year. In the 'surge,' scenario in 2016, the agency would need an additional five million cards—more than double the baseline annual amount for a total of 9 million. 'The guaranteed minimum for each ordering period is 4,000,000 cards. The estimated maximum for the entire contract is 34,000,000 cards,' the document says. The agency is buying the materials need to construct both Permanent Residency Cards (PRC), commonly known as green cards, as well as Employment Authorization Documentation (EAD) cards which have been used to implement President Obama's 'Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals' (DACA) program. The RFP does not specify how many of each type of card would be issued." The U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services states that such requests are "frequent practice" and "fluctuations in the number of immigration applications received... can arise for any number of reasons." Katie Pavlich writes at Townhall.com, "The 34 million number brings up questions about how many people are really living in the United States unlawfully. Further, 34 million work visas for non-American citizens will only continue to crush and devastate the middle class and low-income American workers, something Democrats claim they want to avoid. Exit question: If 34 million work visas are issued to illegal immigrants will they then be eligible for taxpayer funded benefits? Most likely." [66459, 66485, 66539, 66577, 66587, 66759]

WSJ.com reports, "Voters likely to cast ballots in the midterm elections favor a Republican-led Congress over a Democratic one, 49% to 44%, a new Wall Street Journal/NBC News/Annenberg survey finds. Registered voters, a larger group than likely voters, also said they'd prefer the election to produce a Republican-led Congress, a first since the poll began asking five weeks ago. The GOP held a lead of 45% to 43% on the question among registered voters. The survey is yet more evidence that Democratic voters are tuning out the midterms. Democrats carried a 10-point lead among low-interest voters, who the party is trying to reach and motivate with vigorous turnout operations across the country. Republicans carried a 10-point lead in the new survey among voters who said they were highly interested in the election." [66484]

At TheDailyBeast.com Jamie Dettmer reports that humanitarian aid from the United States intended for displaced Syrians is instead helping ISIS, whose terrorists are intercepting the shipments and either confiscating it or demanding bribes to allow delivery. [66502, 66525, 66894]

Dick Morris, former political strategist for Bill Clinton, writes, "Those trying to stop Obama from turning America into a one-party nation should hail Saturday's Supreme Court decision upholding the Texas Voter ID law. The photo identification requirement will stop the left from committing massive vote fraud. To understand how, we must grasp how the process works. Acting under the authority of the Motor Voter Law, the federal Justice Department does not allow voting registrars to delete from the rolls the names of those who have not voted or answered post cards until four years have elapsed. As a

result, millions of dead voters and tens of millions who have moved are still on the voter rolls, opening a massive opportunity for fraud. With so many dead or relocated voters still eligible to have ballots cast in their name, the opportunities multiply. And having twelve million undocumented people living in America, the chances to get people to vote illegally increase. (In 1995, Obama represented the leftist activist group ACORN in a lawsuit against the State of Illinois to force it to comply with the Motor Voter Law, which then-governor Jim Edgar correctly argued would invite voter fraud, partly because government officers registering new voters are "under orders not to ask anyone for identification or proof of citizenship." Got a problem with the economy, go out and do a jobs speech and then add to it with a jobs seminar at the White House featuring columnists from *New York Times*, job done, mission accomplished. But, of course, nothing's changing, nothing's being accomplished. Everything is falling apart. Everything is fraying, and it's not the fault of the Republicans. It's a golden opportunity. The Democrats are losing in the polls for women. It's a golden opportunity to blame Republicans for it [yet Brown blames Obama]!" With tongue in cheek, Limbaugh says, "I never knew... I don't know about you; I never knew Tina Brown was a racist like this. I mean, you have the first African-American [in the White House], and she's out saying that he makes women feel unsafe? Where is her sensitivity to all of this? I don't know." (Some will argue, as does one of Limbaugh's listeners, that Brown is "setting up" the voters for Hillary Clinton in 2016. That is, "Only

At PJMedia.com Ron Radosh writes, "The announcement in yesterday's New York Times that [Obama] will seek an Iran deal 'that will avoid Congress' reveals his utter contempt for the American people. Moreover, it shows us that what clearly will be a very, very bad deal is one he hopes to portray as proof that he has brought stability to the Middle East, and that—just as he had argued—Iran has shown that it is cooperative, is under 'moderate' leadership, and has proved that it wants peace and can be a partner of the United States. Denmark's 10News.dk posts an English translation of statements by an Afghan refugee in Sweden, Zulmay Afzali, who asks how the nation is preparing for jihadist attacks. Afzali states, "Friday, 26 September, I attended the usual Friday prayers in a mosque... It's a pretty small mosque with room for around hundred people. It's usually so crowded that you stand shoulder to shoulder with your Muslim brothers when performing prayer. This day was different. I looked around while I listened to the Khutba (Friday sermon). There were 50 people in the prayer room, most older men. I turned to my Afghan friend next to me and whispered, 'It's almost just you and me who are younger here. It seems that the younger one have stopped going to the mosque, it feels so empty.' My friend looked at me and said, 'But do you not know?' 'Know what?' I wondered. 'Most have gone to Syria and Iraq for jihad. They have joined the Islamic State.' ... It is almost four years since I came to Sweden to seek asylum and thus protection. What I heard in the mosque made me seriously concerned about the safety of myself and the Swedes. I managed to escape from drug barons and the brutal murderers from the Taliban, but from what I heard this Friday in the half full mosque, I'm not sure how long I am safe in this country. What happens when these warriors come back to Sweden? Men who participated in the most cruel and brutal assaults on other people, the civilians in Iraq and Syria. Could they perform jihad, also here in Sweden? I see it as an entirely feasible reality. How is Sweden preparing for this?" [66915, 66916, 66917]

"I became even more worried a few days later when I spoke with a man I met at the gym... He told me that jihadis, members of the Islamic State, now comes to Sweden disguised as asylum seekers. I wondered what they would gain from it. He replied: 'When the time comes, they will rise up and call to jihad also here. Zulmay, you must understand that the Islamic State is not a joke, they are real. They send so-called 'sleeper cells' into the country and where they are building up their power." (Some may choose not to believe it, but the United States faces the same risk: secret terror cells in American cities that may some day spring into action. Of course, U.S. citizens have an advantage denied most Europeans: guns and ammunition.) The Muslim population in Sweden is quite large. It has become increasingly dependent on welfare and is also becoming more violent. In an incident earlier in the month, an elderly man was attacked by Muslims because they thought his hearing aid was the earpiece of a police radio and that he was an informant. The *Miami Herald* reports, "A U.S. national security panel has approved for release from Guantánamo a long-held prisoner whose advocates argued was less of a risk at-large than

the five Taliban captives sent to Qatar in exchange for Army Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl in May. Muhammed Zahrani, 45, [arrived at] Guantanamo in August 2002 and was until this month held as an indefinite detainee, without charge or eligible for release, a 'forever prisoner.' The Periodic Review Board announced Monday he was eligible for repatriation to his native Saudi Arabia, raising to 80 the number of men approved for transfer from the remote prison holding 149 detainees. ...Zahrani persuaded the board to make him eligible for release, according to a document released by the Pentagon, because of his 'candor with the board about his presence on the battlefield, expressions of regret, and desires for a peaceful life after Guantanamo.'" (A promise to refrain from jihad is apparently enough to get a terrorist released from Guantanamo.) [67097]

In Iraq, ISIS takes two towns on Sinjar Mountain—in areas the U.S. military had secured in August. (On August 15 Obama said, "We broke the ISIL siege of Mount Sinjar. We saved many innocent lives. Because of these efforts, we do not expect an additional operation to help rescue people off the mountain, and it is unlikely that we are going to need to continue humanitarian air drops on the mountain.") In Chicago to campaign for Illinois Governor Pat Quinn, Obama takes time to cast an early ballot for the November 4 election—and needs assistance to figure out how to use the machine. (Whether he voted twice, under the name Barack Obama and again under the name Barry Soetoro, is not known. Whether Valerie Jarrett told him who to vote for is also not known.) As Obama votes, a woman named Aia Cooper makes her ballot selections on the machine next to him. Additionally, the business is called "Hugh Jass Burgers" and has menu items that include "Charlotte's Rack" and "Abby's Hugh Jass." According to DailyCaller.com, her family's catering business, Lundergan Catering, has unpaid interns. Its web site states, "The Lundergan Group offers internships for currently enrolled college students. These internships are unpaid and can be either part-time or full-time. Interns gain experience and knowledge of the event-planning business." (The interns gain knowledge and experience, while the business gains free labor.) [66564, 66748, 66865]

Paul Craig Roberts, former Assistant Secretary of the US Treasury and former associate editor of *The Wall Street Journal*, writes at LewRockwell.com, "A group of 30 doctors and scientists have published their findings on the website of the New England Journal of Medicine that the Ebola ravaging West Africa is a new strain of the disease and was not imported from Central Africa. The doctors and scientists' conclusion is consistent with

Dr. Cyril Broderick's report... that the strain originated in US government biowarfare labs and was injected into humans in Department of Defense field trials that began just weeks prior to the ebola breakout. The US government has a history of using unsuspecting humans for tests. Blacks in Alabama and Guatemalan soldiers and prisoners were infected with syphilis and gonorrhea in order to study the effects of the diseases and to experiment with cures. Another interesting piece of information is that apparently someone had advance notice that there would be an Ebola outbreak. The New York Daily News reports that Phoenix Air has a jet plane specifically outfitted to transport ebola patients and that the company's vice president said it required 30 months to get the plane equipped and ready. "... The Obama regime sent 4,000 US soldiers to West Africa to fight ebola. Soldiers don't have training or equipment with which to combat Ebola. Why expose 4,000 Americans to an epidemic? Other commentators have noticed that West Africa is an area of Chinese investments. Uh, [Obama], again, wanted somebody who could serve, uh, in a coordinating function, to manage the implementation of our whole of government [sic; whole government?] approach to this

Uh, and, uh, so, I guess, uh, to more directly address your question, what we were looking for is not an Ebola expert, uh, but rather an implementation expert, uh, and that's exactly what Ron Klain is, uh, he is somebody who has extensive experience, uh, in the federal government, he's somebody that [sic; who] has extensive management experience, uh, when it comes to the private sector, uh, you'll recall that when he served here at the White House, he was responsible for working in the vice president's office at a time when that office was responsible for implementing, uh, the recovery act." According to Breitbart.com, "Harvard University has imposed an effective travel ban on Ebola-striken [sic; stricken] countries, requiring students, faculty, and staff to obtain official permission from the university administration before traveling to affected parts of West Africa, and possibly staying off campus for 21 days after returning to the U.S. from those countries." The Centers for Disease Control releases revised guidelines for protective covering for medical workers for care for Ebola patients. [66562, 66563]

According to Gallup, Obama's quarterly average approval rating has fallen to 41.5 percent. [66501]

At the National Press Club, Secretary of Labor Tom Perez says that paid family leave legislation would bring more Americans into the work force. "[T]he most frequently asked question I get [is], 'What can you do, Tom, to increase labor force participation?' Well, let's talk about paid leave..." (Paid family leave legislation would force employers to pay their employees their full wages or salaries if they are off work for a variety or "personal" reasons. Obviously, such legislation would add more employers to the workforce because employers would have to hire additional employees to cover for those who are absent. That is what the far-left Perez "sees." What he fails to see—or chooses to ignore—is that many companies will go out of business because they cannot routinely afford to pay two employees to do the work of one, and those businesses that survive will be forced to increase the prices of their products and services in order to cover the added expense of additional employees. *Unpaid* family leave legislation is already in place, and that proved to be a disaster for many businesses as a result of employees who unfairly took advantage of the law. A Youtube video shows Obama's Ebola czar Ron Klain warning about global warming and overpopulation. (The video is undated. In any event, one can assume that Klain does not believe he is one of the "too many" occupants of the planet. ZenGardner.com writes, "What is noteworthy is a statement by an award-winning Texas scientist who in 2006 advocated for the extermination of 90% of the Earth's population using an airborne Ebola virus. University of Texas professor Dr. Eric R. Pianka [who reportedly has stated that human beings are 'no better than bacteria'] called Ebola, 'His preferred method of exterminating over five billion human beings was via airborne Ebola (Ebola Reston), because it is both highly lethal and kills its victims in days rather than years." Obama's science czar, John Holdren, is also an overpopulation alarmist. Holdren, who assisted in the production of Al Gore's global warming propaganda film An Inconvenient Truth, has suggested implanting "sterility capsules" in young girls, allowing them to be removed only after they have received government permission to have a baby. Holdren outdoes even that outrageous suggestion by stating that "Even ...laws requiring compulsory abortion ...could be sustained under the existing Constitution.") (WND.com reports that Politico is adding fuel to the fire by misrepresenting her remarks at the September 26 Values Voters Summit. Bachmann stated, "It's because we have jihadists who are subscribing to this radical ideology that believes that dying in the name of Islam gets them to heaven. This is spiritual warfare, and what we need to do is defeat Islamic jihad. Sadly, [Obama] has the wrong prescription. He even failed to acknowledge their motivations for bringing about jihad. Yes, Mr. [Obama], it *is* about Islam. And I believe that if you have an evil the order of this magnitude, you take it seriously. You declare war on it, you don't dance around it, just like the Islamic State has declared war on the United States of America. After making get-out-the-vote calls to black radio stations, Obama attends a \$10,000 per person fundraiser in Chicago's Lincoln Park neighborhood. At the event he says, "Ultimately, I think the Equal Protection Clause [of the U.S. Constitution] does guarantee same-sex marriage in all 50 states. But, as you know, courts have always been strategic. There have been times where the stars were aligned and the Court, like a thunderbolt, issues a ruling like *Brown v. Board of Education*, but that's pretty rare. And, given the direction of society, for the Court to have allowed the process to play out the way it has

may make the shift less controversial and more lasting. In some ways, the decision that was just handed down to not do anything about what states are doing on same-sex marriage may end up being as consequential—from my perspective, a positive sense—as anything that's been done. Because I think it really signals that although the Court was not quite ready—it didn't have sufficient votes to follow *Loving v. Virginia* and go ahead and indicate an equal-protection right across the board—it was a consequential and powerful signal of the changes that have taken place in society and that the law is having to catch up." (Until 2012 Obama was publicly opposed to gay marriage—a position he should not have taken *if he really believed* that it is supported by the U.S. Constitution. Instead, he publicly opposed gay marriage because it was the politically expedient thing to do. He then declared he had "evolved" on the issue, conveniently in time to retain the support of gays in the 2012 election.) [66514, 66517]

Obama also comments, "One of the nice things about being home is actually that it's a little bit like a time capsule, because Michelle and I and the kids, we left so quickly [He had two months from election day 2008 until he moved into the White House in January 2009] that there's still junk on my desk, including some unpaid bills—I think eventually they got paid—but they're sort of stacked up. And messages, newspapers and all kinds of stuff." Politico reports that Obama's remark about not paying his bills did not make its way into the official transcript of his speech. The White House transcript reads, "One of the nice things about being home is actually that it's a little bit like a time capsule because Michelle and I and the kids, we left so quickly that there's still junk on my desk, including some—*(inaudible)—newspapers and all kinds of stuff." CBS' Mark Knoller tweets, "WH: stenographer's tape recorder problem to blame for omission of ... Obama's remarks about his 'unpaid bills' from WH transcript." (George W. Obama addresses the Ebola issue, telling campaign donors, "The Ebola crisis... [which] has been the only story here in the United States for the last couple of weeks, is not an outbreak and epidemic here. To give you some sense of perspective, around 20,000 to 30,000 people [in the United States] die of flu every year. So far we've got one person dying of Ebola. ... This is a virulent disease and it is up to us, once again, to mobilize the world's community to do something about it, to make sure that not only we're helping on a humanitarian basis those countries but we're not seeing a continued epidemic and outbreak that can ultimately have a serious impact here." According to a Politico poll, voters in battleground states believe George W. Bush was "more effective at managing the basic functions of the federal government" than Obama, by a margin of 38-35 percent, while 26 percent believe they are equally effective (or ineffective). [66527, 66528]

In addition to delaying an illegal immigrant amnesty order until after the election, Obama is also reportedly delaying regulations on methane emissions. I just think we're going to find out a whole lot after the election. ...It [the lack of a travel ban and sending U.S troops to West Africa] makes no sense whatsoever except this is some little deal [Obama's] made with people to keep them quiet before the election. We haven't heard a lot from West Africans, except we know [they] were not happy with [Obama] not publicly offering them more. Why would they be so quiet unless there's a deal back there that, gee, once we're past the election, [Obama] will have more flexibility." (Some might suspect that Obama's "plan" is to allow some Americans to become infected with Ebola in order to gin up support for massive federal spending to develop a cure. That is, public support to "save Americans" would be much stronger than public support to "save Liberians.") [66633, 66634]

The leftist group MoveOn.org releases an ad featuring Robert Reich, former Secretary of Labor under Bill Clinton, warning that if the Republicans win the Senate on November 4 they will use a "tricky, little known maneuver to try to ram though their right-wing policies. The maneuver is called 'reconciliation,' and it require sonly 51 votes to pass major tax and budget legislation." (Reich does not mention that Senate Democrats used that same "tricky, little known maneuver" to pass ObamaCare in 2010.) [66573, 66574]

Former Department of Justice attorney J. Christian Adams reports at Breitbart.com, "An expert witness paid with tax dollars by the United States Department of Justice testified that North Carolina election laws impact black voters disproportionately and that blacks are less sophisticated. Charles Stewart, a political scientist was retained by the Justice Department to testify against voter identification laws and other election integrity measures. His testimony argued that ending same day voter registration and requiring voters to vote in the precinct where they live constitutes racial discrimination. When asked if terminating the ability to register to vote on the day that someone casts a ballot impacts blacks disproportionately, Stewart testified in court that it did. Stewart: 'It's also

the case that—well, yes, so it would, empirically more likely affect African Americans. Also, understanding within political science, that people who register to vote the closer and closer one gets to Election Day tend to be less sophisticated voters, tend to be less educated voters, tend to be voters who are less attuned to public affairs. That also tells me from the literature of political science that there are likely to be people who will end up not registering and not voting. People who correspond to those factors tend to be African Americans, and, therefore, that's another vehicle through which African Americans would be disproportionately affected by this law.' ... When asked if ending the ability to register to vote at the same time one casts a ballot would harm blacks more, Stewart testified: 'As I said before, this is particularly a mechanism and a time that's well situated for less sophisticated voters, and, therefore, it's less likely to imagine that these voters would—can figure out or would avail themselves of other forms of registering and voting.' A federal court ruled that the election law changes [in North Carolina] do not discriminate against blacks, but the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals reversed. The Supreme Court of the United States stayed the ruling by the appeals court, and thus the election law changes will be in place for the November elections." (In an effort to overturn a law that eliminates same-day registration and voting, Obama's Department of Justice essentially argued that black voters are not as intelligent as white voters.) WashingtonExaminer.com reports, "The federal government has shelled out more than \$700 million in paid leave to more than 57,000 employees who were home from work for time periods stretching from one month to three years, a Government Accountability Office report has found. In a 62-page report published Monday, the GAO analyzed why so many federal employees were home and getting paid for such long periods of time and they discovered a variety of reasons. In many cases, employees were home awaiting the outcome of investigations into alleged misconduct and criminal actions. Some racked up paid leave for 'physical fitness activities,' and others were away from work seeking professional development. Employees also took paid leave for 'recuperation' from overseas work." DailyCaller.com reports that the worst offenders are with the Department of Defense: "According to the report, during that time over 9,000 DoD employees took 'higher than average' amounts of paid administrative leave, with breaks ranging from one month to two-and-a-half years. Altogether, these employees got 409,420 paid days off." [66558, 66609]

The CBS affiliate in St. Louis reports, "Information about the Michael Brown fatal police shooting is beginning to leak out, and former St. Louis County Police Chief Tim Fitch says it's no accident the feds are allowing the information. Fitch discussed a New York Times article indicating, according to federal investigators, there was a struggle that led up to the fatal police shooting of Brown, with KMOX's Mark Reardon on Monday. Fitch calls the information from the investigation coming out as phase two—to 'coordinate leaks to the media, and to start getting some of the facts out there to kind of let people down slowly,' he says. 'When I say this is phase two—phase one was really Eric Holder's announcement how they were going to basically do a complete review and take over the Ferguson Police Department.' Fitch says he thinks the feds recognize that it's 'probably very unlikely' that there's [sic; there are] going to be charges against Ferguson

police officer Darren Wilson." (*The Obama Timeline* believes information will be released sporadically, as Fitch suggests, in order to "stretch out" the news that will anger black residents of Ferguson and St. Louis. It will be after the election when authorities announce there will be no charges against Wilson, because Obama doesn't want riots before November 4—riots that will frighten more "law and order" white voters to the polls.) On *On the Record*, retired Lieutenant Colonel Oliver North tells Greta van Susteren his sources in Iraq predict an ISIS attack on the U.S. embassy in Baghdad. "They know Baghdad. They've lived in Baghdad. …They are at the gates of Baghdad. They're coming for us. …I don't think [Obama] gives a damn. I think he's hoping that he can hold the lid on this until after this election so it won't be just another disaster for this administration." (The next day mortar shells fired by ISIS land within 500 meters of the U.S. embassy.) [66557, 66570, 66571, 66709, 66710]

Attorney General Eric Holder tells CNN his biggest regret is not getting "really reasonable" gun control legislation passed. [66588]

In an interview with MSNBC's resident race pimp, Al Sharpton, Obama says, "Well, look, it, here's the bottom line. We, we've got a, a tough [electoral] map. Uh, a lot of the states, uh, that are contested this time are states that I didn't win [in 2012], and so some of the candidates there, uh, you know, it is, uh, difficult for them to have me in the state because the Republicans will use that, uh, to try to fan Republican turnout. The bottom line is, though, these are all folks who vote with me. They have supported my agenda in Congress, they are on the right side of minimum wage, they are on the right side of fair pay, they are on the right side of rebuilding our infrastructure, they're on the right side of early childhood education, so, uh, you know, this, this isn't about, uh, my feelings being hurt. These, these are folks who are strong allies and supporters of me, and, uh, you know, I, I, I tell them, I said, 'You know what, you do what you need to win. I will be responsible for making sure that our voters [that is, black voters] turn up." (In other words, "I know that Democrat candidates do not want to be seen with me because they don't want to be associated with my policies and failures, but they all, in fact, support those policies, so I have told them to pretend they oppose me if that will help them win." Obama's protestations notwithstanding, it is clear from his comments that his ego has been bruised by the fact that many Democrats are keeping their distance from him. That is precisely why he feels it is necessary to say, "But they really do support me!") Obama may regret saying, "I will be responsible for making sure that our voters turn out," because if they do not there will quite a few "former Democrat Senators" eager to hold him accountable. Amazingly, Obama tells Sharpton, "Keep in mind that most of these [photo ID] laws are not preventing the overwhelming majority of folks who don't vote from voting. Most people do have an ID. The bottom line is, if less than half of our folks [that is, black people] vote, these laws aren't preventing the other half from not voting." (This would be the same Obama whose administration has been whining for six years that photo ID laws prevent blacks

from voting. Of course, the mainstream media will ignore the remark. It will also ignore his "our folks" language—which, if used by a white politician, would cause a 24x7 stir until he was driven out of office.) [66690]

At National Journal.com Josh Kraushaar writes, "In July, I wrote that the odds of a nationalized election were growing because of that worsening environment for Democrats. Back then, there were clear signs that the red-state races were tilting in the GOP's direction, while Republicans were running surprisingly strong campaigns in swing states. Those trends have only solidified since then. The national environment can change over time—few could have predicted a panic over Ebola in the summer, for example but it was hard to see the issues dragging down the president and his party subsiding by the fall. Now, it's becoming likely that Republicans will win more than the six seats necessary to retake control of the Senate. ... In the latest NBC News/Wall Street Journal poll, support for the health care law isn't far from its all-time low, with 36 percent supporting and 48 percent opposing (a whopping 43 percent opposing strongly). After the health care website debacle in December 2013, 34 percent supported and 50 percent opposed. Its potency as an issue isn't too far off from 2010, an election where Republicans made historic gains in the House. ... Over the summer, worsening foreign policy was also an issue that looked bound to get worse for Democrats, not better. Presidential speeches and promises can only do so much in combating the reality of terrorists gaining ground in the Middle East and Russian President Vladimir Putin making a land grab in eastern Ukraine. As George W. Bush learned in his presidency, when events turn bad overseas, it's rare that they improve quickly. ... Obama is now talking about defeating ISIS in terms of decades, not months or years. The limited airstrikes in Iraq and Syria have only had a limited effect, with the terrorist group creeping closer to Baghdad despite the U.S efforts. As a result, [Obama's] approval ratings on foreign policy and national security—a first-term strength—have dropped to at or near all-time lows, and haven't recovered much with his prime-time address." "All told, the cascading number of controversies and scandals in [Obama's] second term has fed into the perception that this administration is out of its depth in doing its primary job: managing government. And that's not good for Democrats, both the party in power and the party associated with an activist federal government. The dominant theme in the campaign's final month is Democratic Senate candidates struggling to distance themselves from [Obama]... Republicans now are positioned to net between six and nine Senate seats in the upcoming midterms, with the higher end looking more likely. When Democrats are relying on winning races they weren't even planning to contest in South Dakota and Kansas, it speaks volumes about the state of play two weeks before Election Day." [66541]

In Ferguson, Missouri, State Senator Jamilah Nasheed, a sponsor of anti-gun legislation, is arrested during a protest outside the police department—while carrying a 9mm handgun and additional ammunition. She refuses a breathalyzer test. Nasheed later states, "It was a symbolic arrest—[I was] sending a message to the protesters that we can protest peacefully and that we must protest peacefully and that we want justice for Michael Brown, but we don't want it in vain." [66611, 66612, 66664]

On October 21 WND.com reports, "A woman who says she prophesied the assassination attempt on President Ronald Reagan says God has revealed to her a new, startling warning. 'He showed me that if Christians don't start praying more than they ever have... this next [presidential] election is not going to take place. That it's going to be suspended. Because evil going to arise,' Glenda Jackson tells Sid Roth of the 'It's Supernatural' show. 'Some disasters are going to happen. Things are going to be put in place. [Obama is] not going to be removed and he's going to stay in. It's going to be very bad if we don't get hold of God,' she said. 'The church has got to get back to prayer.'" (*The Obama Timeline* includes this report only because it relates to Obama—and because more than a few Americans suspect that Obama wants to figure out a way to serve a third term. It is not an endorsement of Jackson, Roth, or belief in the supernatural.) [66526]

Department of Homeland Security Secretary Jeh Johnson announces limited travel restrictions, "in the form of additional screening and protective measures at our ports of entry for travelers from the three West African Ebola-affected countries. These new measures will go into effect tomorrow. ... Today, I am announcing that all passengers arriving in the United States whose travel originates in Liberia, Sierra Leone or Guinea will be required to fly into one of the five airports that have the enhanced screening and additional resources in place [JFK in New York City, Newark, Dulles, Atlanta and Chicago]. We are working closely with the airlines to implement these restrictions with minimal travel disruption. If not already handled by the airlines, the few impacted travelers should contact the airlines for rebooking, as needed. We currently have in place measures to identify and screen anyone at all land, sea and air ports of entry into the United States who we have reason to believe has been present in Liberia, Sierra Leone or Guinea in the preceding 21 days." (Of course, during the 21-day incubation period person who have the Ebola virus may not exhibit signs of illness, so merely taking their temperatures as they arrive in the United States is far from foolproof.) [66532, 66533]

Infectious disease expert Dr. William Miller tells CNSNews.com, "In infectious disease, it's always a numbers game. It's just about numbers. It's statistics. It's cold-blooded numbers. The Ebola virus has no standards other than trying to find susceptible hosts. So letting people in from the outside is a form of roulette. It was based on the presumption, which has turned out to be incorrect, that the United States' [medical] system is uniquely well-prepared to handle epidemics of this kind. Now as it happens, the United States has the robust set of resources that will enable it to treat Ebola here in the U.S. in ways that it cannot be done in Africa. We're finding that the system, at least as it was a couple of weeks ago, was under-prepared and unrehearsed. We're not ready for prime time yet with Ebola. So we need to have a travel ban." [66676]

"...Unfortunately, for diseases with no cures, isolation and quarantine are the only measures that have ever worked in history and they are the only measures that are going to work today. From the point of view of biology, I feel strongly about, the concept of enhanced screening that we're being offered as a sense of concern from our government is the crudest form of theater. The issue is not about those patients who show symptoms. It's latency. In all infectious diseases, there's a latent period. You have the bug, you have the virus, and you don't show symptoms. You can be a carrier and you're not infecting anyone. You are infected, but you have no symptoms. You may never develop them. That's characteristic of many latent infections. But others, like Ebola, can go up to 21 days of latency. Then it can explode inside you according to its own terms and scope. That's how viruses act. That's how this virus in particular acts. So the latency period is what we need to be concerned with, and the screening that they're doing has absolutely no way of uncovering latent infections. So every single one of them [people who come to the U.S. from an Ebola hot zone] is kind of a ticking time bomb of potential infectious disease. And it's just a matter of roulette where we get the next one." [66676]

White House press secretary John Earnest tells reporters, "The stakes for this election are high which is why you've seen [Obama] so invested in raising money and trying to lend some organizational expertise to other Democratic candidates. In some cases he's campaigned for them. [Obama] is dedicated to supporting candidates who support a middle class agenda that he has strongly advocated. What I'm saying is that individual candidates across the country are running their own campaigns as they should and I'm confident that they will get all of the credit or blame that they deserve for the outcome of the election. I'm also confident that people will evaluate what [Obama] could have done to be helpful. Did he do all he could to raise as much money for Democratic candidates given all of the challenges that are on his plate? And [Obama] has worked very hard." (In other words, "Democrat candidates who lose should not blame Obama.")

Townhall.com's Katie Pavlich notes, "This year alone Obama has hosted 40 fundraisers and during his tenure at the White House, he's been to 400." (If the Democrats lose control of the Senate on November 4 it will not be because Obama didn't attend enough fundraisers.) [66537]

On CNN, National Journal's Ron Fournier says, "The clearest indication we have that perhaps they're [Democrats are] going to lose is, my phone was lighting up yesterday with White House officials blaming Senate candidates and the Senate campaign

committee, and Senate campaigns complaining about the White House. There's already finger pointing inside the beltway." Examiner.com's Jim Kouri reports that the letter "is part of an inquiry into the alleged billions of dollars in seizures made through the Justice Department's Equitable Sharing Program, which is the Justice Department's largest asset forfeiture initiative under ...Obama. 'While we must ensure law enforcement is properly equipped, they should not be funded by slush funds accrued by violating Americans' civil liberties,' Sensenbrenner said in his statement... What is also disturbing to the GOP is that originally forfeitures were used when dealing with narcotics money and lab equipment, vehicles used to transport drugs and contraband, and other assets linked to crimes. Today it's being used during the 'fishing expedition' investigations of legitimate businesses." (As an example, federal law requires additional documentation for cash bank deposits in amounts of \$10,000 or greater. The logic is that it would primarily be drug dealers who make such large deposits. As a result, large cash deposits that are near but below \$10,000 arouse suspicion. But the government abuses the law and goes after legitimate businesses, such as restaurants, that might make large cash deposits. Business owners unexpectedly learn that the government has confiscated all the cash in their accounts, and are forced to prove their innocence in order to get their money back—rather than the government having to prove their guilt. That means hiring expensive lawyers. Sensenbrenner properly states in his letter, "The implications on civil liberties are dire. The right to own property is a fundamental right implicitly recognized in the Fourth, Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments. I also believe that it is a human right.") [66944, 66987]

In a federal court in Manhattan, a British citizen is charged with attempting to establish a jihadist training camp in the United States. According to NYDailyNews.com, "Haroon Aswat, 40, mumbled 'not guilty' in Manhattan Federal Court as Judge Katherine Forrest read the charges of providing support to terrorists. The bleary-eyed British citizen with shaggy black hair had been extradited from the United Kingdom earlier in the day. He is accused of being an accomplice of hook-handed hate cleric Abu Hamza al-Masri, who is awaiting sentencing after being convicted in May of conspiring to open a terrorist training camp in rural Bly, Oregon, in 1999." Q13Fox.com reports, "Three teenage girls who set out from a Denver suburb apparently bound for Syria to join extremists fighting there are back home after their parents alerted authorities and the trio was stopped in Germany, U.S. officials said. The teens—two

sisters of Somali descent and a friend whose family is Sudanese, according to a Denver community leader—were detained when their flight landed in Frankfurt on Friday after the FBI flagged their passports. They were flown back to Denver on Sunday, officials said. Parents of the girls called the FBI after becoming concerned the girls may have been traveling to Turkey. ... The girls, believed to be between the ages of 15 and 17, are U.S. citizens thought to have become radicalized in their hometown, officials say. It's not exactly clear how the girls planned their trip or how they were going to make their way to Syria, but officials say their ultimate plan was to try and join extremists fighting there." [66628, 66629]

Despite jihadist attacks around the world and ISIS fighters decapitating Kurds, Christians, and Jews in Syria and Iraq, Mary Zeiss Stange warns at USAToday.com that it is "Christian extremists" who "pose a threat." She calls them "more threatening than Islamist jihadists, ...militia/patriots, racist skinheads and neo-Nazis..." (Stange is a professor of religion and director of the religion program at Skidmore College and a member of USA Today's Board of Contributors.) [66912]

The Dallas Cowboys waive Michael Sam, the openly gay football player. (When previously drafted by the Rams, Obama stated that he "congratulates Michael Sam, the Rams & the NFL for taking an important step forward today in our Nation's [sic; nation's] journey. From the playing field to the corporate boardroom, LGBT Americans prove everyday [sic; every day] that you should be judged by what you do and not who you are." (LGBT defenders argue that people should be judged by their performance, not their private, personal life choices. They should therefore have been offended that Obama made Sam's homosexuality an issue. Neither that nor his race have anything to do with his abilities on the football field—which the Cowboys eventually discovered.) [58646, 58647, 66542, 66543]

DailyCaller.com reports, "The Obama administration has funded a new study by top consulting firm RAND Health that startlingly finds that if taxpayer subsidies are eliminated, Obamacare exchanges will fall into a 'death spiral.'" (In other words, if people actually have to pay full price for their ObamaCare policies, without taxpayer subsidies, they will stop buying those policies. Why taxpayer dollars had to be used to pay a company *to state the obvious* is not explained.) "RAND found that without the ACA's subsidies, the cost of premiums will rise by 43.3 percent and Obamacare enrollment will fall by a whopping 68 percent. That would mean 11.3 million more Americans would be uninsured." (In other news, full-price Cadillacs don't sell as quickly as those sold at half-price.) [66549]

FoxNews.com reports, "At least two mortar shells landed inside Baghdad's heavily-fortified Green Zone on Tuesday as insurgents continued their recent wave of attacks on the Iraqi city. Security officials told the Associated Press no casualties were reported inside the Green Zone, which houses the Iraqi government headquarters and the U.S. and British embassies. The officials said one of the mortar shells fell about 500 meters from the U.S. embassy building. The incident came amid a wave of bombing attacks in and near Baghdad that killed at least 30 people. Police officials said the deadliest attack took

place Tuesday afternoon when a double car bomb attack hit Habaybina restaurant in the Shiite-majority district of Talibiya in eastern Baghdad, killing 19 people and wounding 32 others." (Whether Obama and Susan Rice are looking for another anti-Islam Youtube video is not known.) [66570, 66571]

In a New Yorker interview, Obama is asked by Jeffrey Toobin if he would consider an appointment to the Supreme Court after he leaves the White House. He responds, "When I got out of law school, I chose not to clerk, partly because I was an older student, but partly because I don't think I have the temperament to sit in a chamber and write opinions. I love the law, intellectually. I love nutting out [sic] these problems, wrestling with these arguments. I love teaching. I miss the classroom and engaging with students. But I think being a Justice is a little bit too monastic for me. Particularly after having spent six years and what will be eight years in this bubble, I think I need to get outside a little bit more." (Obama probably chose not to be a law clerk for the same reason he never wrote law articles while at Harvard law School: it is too much work. For someone who "loves the law," Obama has shown an incredible lack of knowledge about the U.S. Constitution—or at least a willingness to act in defiance of it. Kevin Glass tweets, "That is A+ self-serving question-dodging. 'I couldn't bear to limit myself *only* to being a Supreme Court Justice." HotAir.com's Noah Rothman observes, "No one will be beating down Obama's door to serve as a Supreme Court justice once he leaves office, even if all the unlikely conditions which might lead to his nomination arise. [His] Shermanesque albeit preemptive rejection of the honor is probably unnecessary, but it does serve to polish what must be a rather wounded ego these days.") [66578, 66579]

At WND.com, talk show host, columnist—and lifelong Democrat—Bob Just writes, "I am ashamed of my party. But it goes deeper than shame. After successfully exposing monkeys to airborne Ebola, which 'caused a rapidly fatal disease in 4-5 days,' scientists with the U.S. Army Medical Research Institute of Infectious Diseases (USAMRIID) concluded Ebola can spread through air but likely hasn't in Equatorial Africa because the region is too warm, with temperatures rarely dropping below 65°F. 'We... demonstrated aerosol transmission of Ebola virus at lower temperature and humidity than that normally present in sub-Saharan Africa,' the 1995 study entitled Lethal Experimental Infections of Rhesus Monkeys by Aerosolized Ebola Virus reported. 'Ebola virus sensitivity to the high temperatures and humidity in the thatched, mud, and wattle huts shared by infected family members in southern Sudan and northern Zaire may have been a factor limiting aerosol transmission of Ebola virus in the African epidemics.' ... A 2012 study also by the USAMRIID, which exposed monkeys to an airborne filovirus similar to Ebola, reached a similar conclusion to the 1995 study. 'There is no strong evidence of secondary transmission by the aerosol route in African filovirus outbreaks; however, aerosol transmission is thought to be possible and may occur in conditions of lower temperature and humidity which may not have been factors in outbreaks in warmer climates,' the

study entitled A Characterization of Aerosolized Sudan Virus Infection in African Green Monkeys, Cynomologus Macaques and Rhesus Macaques stated." [66594, 66595, 66873]

WashingtonPost.com reports, "Two weeks ago, we looked at initial early voting data compiled by the U.S. Election Project with the aim of sussing out [sic; learning] how campaigns were doing at putting votes in the bank. At that point, it seemed like Democrats were doing particularly well in Iowa and North Carolina compared to voter registration numbers. Republicans were doing well in other battleground states. Now, that's changed. Compared to overall voter registration, Iowa and North Carolina Democrats are doing much worse than earlier in the month, and Republicans in those states much better. Why? yourself!' the man said, according to LaFaro. 'I don't have to tell you who I am.' The activist's attitude was 'militant' and 'threatening' LaFaro told the Daily Caller—at one point telling LaFaro 'go f*** yourself, gringo'—but what the confrontation really showed was how riddled with potential fraud Arizona's election laws are." CarolinaJournal.com reports "confirmation that a cluster of businesses owned by Democratic U.S. Sen. Kay Hagan's husband and other family members collected even more subsidies from taxpayers than initially reported. Senator Kay Hagan (D-NC) fails to show up for her fourth and final debate with her GOP opponent, Congressman Thom Tillis (R-NC). (The next morning ABC, CBS, and NBC decide the story is not worth reporting.) [66600, 66604, 66754]

In a New Hampshire debate between Senator Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH) and Republican challenger Scott Brown, Shaheen brings up the issue of outsourcing jobs. Brown responds, "You outsourced your independence to ...Obama." Asked to respond with a yes or no answer to the question of whether she approves of Obama's job performance, Shaheen replies, "In some ways I approve, and some things I don't approve." (The response prompts audience laughter.) Shaheen also says she is "absolutely" proud of her support for ObamaCare. Brown accuses Shaheen of having been opposed to the Seabrook nuclear power, to which she strangely responds, "No I'm not! I wasn't in office then!"—

as if only those holding an elected office can oppose a power plant. (In a September 2008 video makes it clear she opposed the facility. On September 14, 1986 *The Washington Post* wrote that Shaheen "is lining up the anti-nuclear forces, which have kept Seabrook at bay for 10 years, to go door to door for McEachern—as they would for anyone breathing who tries to stop the plant.") An Associated Press/GfK poll shows that 44 percent of likely women voters favor the Republicans while 42 percent favor the Democrats. (Whether that means women voters have finally grown tired of the stale Democrat claim of a Republican "war on women" is not clear.) Obama's approval/disapproval ratings fall to 41/60 percent—his worst disapproval figure ever in that particular poll. Obama's numbers are 42/58 on the economy, health care and ISIS, 34/65 on immigration, and 38/62 percent on managing the government. On the issue of same-sex marriage, Obama is at 50/49. Republicans lead Democrats 40 to 32 on the "generic ballot" question. By 47 to 39 percent, voters prefer that Republicans control Congress. The fact of the matter is *none* of these Democrats who are running are moderates, they're all radicals, none of them believe in small government, they all believe in massive, centralized government, none of them believe in the working man and the citizens of this country—they spend more time worrying about illegal aliens and how they're going to be taken care of, and so forth and so on. In the following moments and hours, Royal Canadian Mounted Police converged on the scene, more shots were fired less than a mile away near a mall and officials told Ottawa residents to barricade themselves in their homes as they searched for one or more [other] possible gunmen. At a news conference hours later, authorities described a 'fluid situation,' and could not confirm whether more potential gunmen were at large, although they said no arrests had been made. ... The U.S. embassy was placed on lockdown following the shootings, said U.S. State Department spokeswoman Marie Harf. The Pentagon authorized additional security at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery, as well." Another shooting is also reported, at the nearby Rideau Center shopping mall. He was then scheduled to head to a downtown hotel, where the 17-year-old from Pakistan was to receive honorary Canadian citizenship.

Harper's spokesman says both events have been cancelled." (On October 10 Yousafzai was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for her support of female education. She survived an assassination attempt in Pakistan. Whether the shootings at the Canadian Parliament were related are not known.) [65885, 65899, 66718, 66719]

The Ottawa terrorist shot and killed by the sergeant at arms is identified as Michael Zehaf-Bibeau, a Canadian Muslim born in 1982 with the name Michael Joseph Hall. *The Sydney Morning Herald* reports that he "was recently designated a 'high-risk traveller' by the Canadian government—meaning it was feared he would travel abroad to commit crimes—and that his passport had been seized. Who is calling upon Muslim leaders in Canada or anywhere else to back up their condemnations of jihad terror with real action against it, including programs to teach young Muslims to reject that understanding of Islam?") [66723, 66724, 66728, 66848]

Haroun Bouazzi, a spokesperson for Association des Musulmans et Arabes pour la Laïcité du Québec (the Quebec Association of Muslims and Arabs for Secularism), tells the Montreal Gazette, "We must be very careful not to point the finger at mosques and instead see them as allies against this kind of phenomenon, because it is they who can alert police. The main victims, other than the people who died yesterday, are Muslims themselves because more and more, they are seen as an enemy from inside. ...I think it's important to point out that people who are radicalized are not being radicalized in Muslim institutions like associations and mosques. They are really being radicalized through international networks, mainly on social media." (Of course, the mosques have *not* been alerting the police to radicals, and many mosques throughout the United States, Canada, and Europe are, in fact, radicalizing their members. Robert Spencer writes, "The pattern

never changes: in the wake of a jihad terror attack or plot, Muslims in the West do not do what they should do: redouble their efforts against jihadis in their own communities, and their cooperation with law enforcement officials. Instead, they claim that they are already cooperating, despite all the evidence to the contrary, and complain that they are being victimized by a 'backlash' and try to seize the spotlight as victims. The CBC's Derek Stoffel tweets, "Amid the speculation in the Ottawa shooting in Canada, it's important to remember ISIS hasn't shown interest in attacks abroad." (Why someone as uninformed as Stoffel could be a reporter for the CBS is unknown. He apparently missed the September statement by ISIS spokesman Abu Muhammad Al-Adnani urging supporters to kill disbelievers everywhere. Stoffel later deletes his tweet.) [66913, 66914]

While some Americans have traveled to Syria and Iraq to fight with ISIS, others have gone to fight with the Kurds against the jihadist army. At Mashable.com Emily Feldman reports that "Jordan Matson, a U.S. military veteran who quit his job to fight the Islamic State, was wounded in battle shortly after getting to Syria. But rather than discourage other Americans from coming to the front lines, the 28-year-old from Wisconsin instead turned to Facebook, becoming an intermediary between Kurdish forces and Americans eager to join the battle against jihadi militants. 'I'm ready to stay until the end,' Matson said via Skype, wearing fatigues and a Kurdish scarf draped across his shoulders. ... Veterans did their tours of Iraq. To watch Mosul fall—and to see all that we paid to bring democracy to Iraq fall apart—is hard. ... Many other veterans are upset." "Currently," writes Feldman, "there are only four known Americans fighting alongside the Kurds in northeastern Syria, according to Kurdish journalist Sinan Cudi. But Matson expects many more to be on their way. 'They're coming,' he said." [66795, 66796]

While ABCNews.com writes, "Authorities in Canada are trying to understand what motivated a gunman to kill the soldier..." Pamela Geller reports that the Ottawa jihadist "is not a recent convert [to Islam], but a longtime Muslim whose parents truly represent the two tenets of the global jihad. His father [Bulgasem Zehaf] fought with the jihadists in Libya (maybe he can tell us something about Benghazi). Libya is in utter chaos and has deteriorated into a jihad terror state. His mother [Susan Bibeau] is deputy chairperson of a division of Canada's Immigration and Refugee Board. [This is] stealth jihad—immigration (al hijra) and colonization of the West." And the United States is fully prepared—if they do that and begin that process, we are prepared to begin the process of denuclearize—of, of reducing the need for American force and presence in the region, because the threat itself would then be

reduced." (There are about 28,000 U.S. troops in South Korea.) North Korea's official news agency responds that the nation's nuclear weapons "can never be bartered for anything." (Why Kerry even wasted his time talking about the subject is not clear.) [66761]

The *Daily Mail* reports, "SIS fighters have fired a crude chemical weapon at the Kurdish forces defending the Syria-Turkey border town of Kobane, it has been reported. BBC reporter Güney Yıldız says a Kurdish official from the war-torn town told him of a suspected IS chemical attack last night, which has caused people to lose their eyesight, blistering on the skin and respiratory problems. Testing on victims has not taken place because of the intensity of the fighting there, but a Kurdish doctor in the town, who was also injured by the strike, says he is '75 per cent' sure it is a chemical weapon." (Whether the chemical weapons came from Syria (even though the Obama administration claims they were all destroyed) or from Iraq (which the media claims never had weapons of mass destruction) is not known.) Project Veritas' James O'Keefe posts hidden camera video showing vote fraud in Colorado, and Democrat operatives encouraging it. Meredith Hicks, director of the leftist group Works for Progress, encourages an undercover O'Keefe to use discarded mail-in ballots of people who aren't bothering to vote. "One of O'Keefe's investigators speaks with Nicole Hanlon, who works for Democrat State Representative Joe Salazar. The investigator talks about her friends from Oregon who "are here 'cause you can do in-mail registration" to vote. Hanlen advises they register at the "city and county building, 120th and Sable"—even though Oregon residents cannot also legally vote in Colorado. Hanlen advises that even though the friends do not have Colorado drivers licenses, "Yeah, if they have bills here... they should be okay. ... I think you can try it out. I don't know if it will work but you can try it." (In other words, Hanlen knows the Oregonians cannot legally vote in Colorado, but believes it is worth it for them to try to register because they might get away with it.) Colorado's only method of voting is via mail-in ballots—a change the Democrats fought very hard to make, along with same-day registration. One need only live in the state 21 days to register, and there is little stopping residents of other states from registering and then voting in both states. Additionally, because many of the mail-in ballots are thrown away by disinterested residents or left behind by people who move, blank ballots are not difficult to come by. That makes it easy for someone to fill out the ballot and mail it in. With no in-person voting and no photo ID requirement, fraud is incredibly easy—which

O'Keefe's report is posted just as a Citizens United documentary called *Rocky Mountain Heist* is released. The film, hosted by Michelle Malkin, shows how wealthy leftists have been working to turn Colorado from what had been a relatively conservative state into one that consistently supports Democrats. Of course, voting twice or using the identity of another person are only two ways to commit vote fraud. A more significant problem may simply be that large numbers of noncitizens are illegally registered to vote. That occurs because immigrants are often merely asked, "Are you a U.S. citizen?" on their voter registration forms. They can improperly check the box "Yes" and register to vote. Photo ID laws will not stop that fraud because the person may very well have a drivers license and a name on the registration list when he goes to the polling place. (WashingtonPost.com reports the results of a Cooperative Congressional Election Study poll: "More than 14 percent of non-citizens in both the 2008 and 2010 samples indicated that they were registered to vote. Furthermore, some of these non-citizens voted. Our best guess, based upon extrapolations from the portion of the sample with a verified vote, is that 6.4 percent of non-citizens voted in 2008 and 2.2 percent of non-citizens voted in 2010. ... Because non-citizens tended to favor Democrats (Obama won more than 80 percent of the votes of non-citizens in the 2008 CCES sample), we find that this participation was large enough to plausibly account for Democratic victories in a few close elections. Non-citizen votes could have given Senate Democrats the pivotal 60th vote needed to overcome filibusters in order to pass healthcare reform and other Obama administration priorities in the 111th Congress. Sen. Al Franken (D-MN) won election in 2008 with a victory margin of 312 votes. Votes cast by just 0.65 percent of Minnesota non-citizens could account for this margin.") [66854, 668671

The problem: The subject line of the e-mail referred to Braley as the 'Democratic candidate for governor.' The botch came after the first lady repeatedly referred to the Democratic Senate nominee as 'Bruce Bailey' in a campaign appearance earlier this month—and it took an attendee in the crowd to correct her mistake. Indicating the sensitivity of the mistake, top Senate Democratic officials wasted no time lashing out at the Obama administration's political team in response, suggesting it was acting like a junior varsity operation two weeks before the midterms. The slipup comes one day after [Barack] Obama told Rev. Al Sharpton on his radio show that Senate Democrats keeping their distance from him are still 'folks who vote with me. They have supported my agenda in Congress.' That alarmed Senate Democrats up for reelection this November, most of whom are working hard to distance themselves from [Obama]. 'The ineptitude of the White House political operation has sunk from annoying to embarrassing,' one senior Senate Democratic aide told National Journal. Another Senate official told the Washington Post that Obama's

comments were 'not devised with any input from Senate leadership.' ...Democrats are growing increasingly pessimistic about their chances of holding onto the Senate... A plugged-in Democratic House official said internal polling showed Braley trailing Republican Joni Ernst in all of the state's congressional districts, even those that typically favor Democrats. Democrats are even struggling to hold Braley's House seat." [66645, 66646, 66680]

Townhall.com's Guy Benson writes, "The pre-election blame game is already underway, it would seem—even as Republicans still have plenty of time to blow their advantage, according to, um, a Republican Senator [Missouri's Roy Blunt]. Whether Earnest will note the Schrödinger's cat experiment on November 5 to explains why the Democrats lost the Senate is not known. (The Schrödinger's cat experiment is theoretical and

Two experts not directly involved with the case added to the newspaper that the official autopsy report appears to support Wilson's claim that a struggle did take place before the fatal shooting. Further, a toxicology report revealed that Brown tested positive for marijuana." Additionally, a number of black witnesses have supported Wilson's account, as do blood platter analysis from inside the vehicle, shell casings, and ballistics tests. Rush Limbaugh comments, "See, the facts are coming out. It's actually a wonderful opportunity for [Obama] and the attorney general to set the record straight. It's a wonderful opportunity for some leadership, but that isn't going to happen. This is a political defeat. This isn't even a matter of law. This is a political defeat. That is why I say smearing and destroying a police officer, that's what they had to do. ...It was necessary, it was appropriate to Democrats in order to create mobs, property damage, which leads to voter registration and voter turnout. That would satisfy Obama's desire to play golf in between highly-paid speaking engagements. But *The Obama Timeline* believes Michelle Obama has no desire to enter politics.) The likelihood of the GOP picking up the Iowa Senate seat left open by the retirement of leftist Senator Tom Harkin appears to be increasing, as Conn Carroll reports at Townhall.com, "According to data compiled from the Iowa Secretary of State's office by [blogger] Ace of Spades HQ, Democrats have turned in just 170 more ballots (98,492) than Republicans have (98,322). Republicans have never turned in more early ballots than Democrats. To put that 170 ballot lead in context, by this time in 2012, Democrats had a 56,303 ballot advantage, and in 2010 they had 17,228 advantage. The Republican improvement in early voting is just another sign the Republican Senate Candidate Joni Ernst will beat Rep. Bruce Braley (D-IA) this November. The game is intended to teach parents how to convince their children to try and eat new healthier food choices." "6. The National Endowment for the Humanities has provided \$47,000 for undergraduate classes that teach students about laughing and humor." "7. The National Science Foundation spent \$856,000 to teach mountain lions how to walk on treadmills as part of a research project whose aim was to better understand mountain lions' instincts." Breitbart.com reports, "With the North Carolina U.S. Senate race in a dead heat, state election officials say they have discovered 145 names on the voting rolls who are ineligible to vote because they are illegal immigrants who have been granted ...Obama's Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals status. ... The people in question were not sick, the spokesman, William Gerrish, said, but were being watched under an order signed by Gov. Dannel P. Malloy on Oct. 7, declaring a public health emergency in the state. They were not publicly identified because of privacy concerns, but officials said three were Yale University students and the others were from one family. At least some had traveled to West Africa. ...Officials said that the quarantining of the nine people was voluntary, and that none had objected to it." [66703]

USAToday.com reports, "New records contradict the Obama administration's assurances to Congress and the public that the 2,200 people it freed from immigration jails last year to save money had only minor criminal records. The records, obtained by USA TODAY, show immigration officials released some undocumented immigrants who had faced far more serious criminal charges, including people charged with kidnapping, sexual assault, drug trafficking and homicide. The release sparked a furor in Congress. Republican lawmakers accused the Obama administration of setting dangerous criminals free. In response, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement said it had released 'low-risk offenders who do not have serious criminal records,' a claim the administration repeated to the public and to members of Congress. The new records, including spreadsheets and hundreds of pages of e-mails, offer the most detailed information yet about the people ICE freed as it prepared for steep, across-the-government spending cuts in February 2013. They show that although two-thirds of the people who were freed had no criminal records, several had been arrested or convicted on charges more severe than the administration had disclosed." Bloomberg.com reports on "The Democrats' Coming Blame Game," as it becomes increasingly clear that election day will be a disaster for the Democrat party. Lisa Lerer and Margaret Talev write, "Years of disappointment and tension between Democrats and [Obama] are now on open display as politicians, party leaders and strategists worried about their chances in the midterm elections begin casting about for someone to blame. ... 'Folks are beginning to scapegoat and second guess, but there are plenty of reasons to do that,' said strategist Jim Manley, a former aide to Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid. "...Obama doesn't like to get his hands dirty. He seemingly floats above it all." ...Senator Joe Manchin of West Virginia told The Washington Post that there is 'nothing' Obama can do to help swing competitive races to moderate Democrats. A ...campaign visit, he said, 'is not going to be productive.' Even the party's top surrogates are trying to avoid explicit mentions of [Obama]. At a Tuesday event in western Kentucky, former President Bill Clinton urged Democrats not to let their dislike of Obama influence the decision in the state's race for Senate. 'Make sure nobody casts a protest vote,' he said on Tuesday. 'Whoever heard of somebody giving a six-year job [to a Senator] for a two-year protest [of Obama]?' The White House, bracing for an escalation of friendly fire should Democrats lose control of the Senate, has begun laying out its post-election defense by arguing that candidates are ultimately responsible for their own electoral outcomes. 'The success of many of these Democratic candidates will depend on their own success in

motivating voters that strongly supported the president in 2012,' White House spokesman Josh Earnest said Tuesday. 'It's their name that's on the ballot.' ... Democrats also privately gripe that the administration's response to Ebola was too slow, playing directly into a Republican narrative of Democratic mismanagement. In August, [Obama's] decision to issue a statement about the beheading of journalist James Foley by Islamic militants and then head directly to a golf game was viewed as tone deaf, at best, an assessment shared by [Obama] himself." On October 23 Morning Joe airs an interview with Senator Kay Hagan (D-NC) in which she is asked by MSNBC's Kasie Hunt, "Do you think that ...Obama is a strong leader?" Hagan answers, "You know, ...Obama has a lot on his plate, and it seems like whether it's the oil spill, uh, that took place earlier, a number of years ago in the Gulf, uh, to this Ebola crisis now, uh, to ISIS, um, gaining strength, I mean, you look at all the combination of, of things like that." Hagan is pressed by Hunt again, "And do you think he's acted as a strong leader in those crises?" and Hagan replies, "You know I think there's definitely—like, with Ebola, we have definitely been late to the table in, um, making decisions about that, being sure that CDC, uh, has a, has a—understands and gets messages out to hospitals." Hunt presses again: "So you don't think he's shown strong leadership?" Hagan: "You know, certainly there are issues that I certainly think, um, no." After the clip is played, host Joe Scarborough says, "These are not hard questions to answer." Hunt says, "Sometimes the simplest questions are the toughest." [66817]

White House press secretary Josh Earnest laughably later attempts to spin Hagan's response, telling reporters, "Senator Hagan is somebody that [sic; who] has a track record, uh, and credentials for, uh, gettin' [sic] results for the people of North Carolina, even if it means criticizing members of her own party, even if it means criticizing the leader of her own party. Uh, I think that's a testament to her character." [66933]

Katie Pavlich, who has doggedly pursued the truth in the Operation Fast and Furious story since day one, reports at Townhall.com that the Department of Justice has finally "complied with a court order and turned over a list to government watchdog Judicial Watch, known as a Vaughn Index, of Fast and Furious documents being held from Congress and the American people under ...Obama's assertion of executive privilege. Not surprisingly, DOJ failed to fully comply with the requirements of providing a Vaughn Index. ...Regardless, the list of documents shows Obama asserted executive privilege to protect Attorney General Eric Holder's wife and to protect information

showing Holder helped to craft talking points during the fallout of the scandal. What a preliminary review of Vaughn Index by Judicial Watch shows: 'Numerous emails [including about 20 between Holder and his wife, Sharon Malone] that detail Attorney General Holder's direct involvement in crafting talking points, the timing of public disclosures, and handling Congressional inquiries in the Fast and Furious matter.' 'Numerous entries detail DOJ's communications (including those of Eric Holder) concerning the White House about Fast and Furious.' 'The scandal required the attention of virtually every top official of the DOJ and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF). Communications to and from the United States Ambassador to Mexico about the Fast and Furious matter are also described.' 'Few of the records seem to even implicate presidential decision-making and advice that might be subject to ...Obama's broad and unprecedented executive privilege claim.'" [66735, 66736, 66752, 66784, 66791, 66792, 66793]

The shielded documents also include emails from Holder to his mother. Neither his wife nor his mother are federal employees, let alone White House officials. There is, therefore, no legal justification for Obama to use "executive privilege" to keep those emails from being released to Judicial Watch or Congress. Obama simply cannot legally use the executive privilege claim for those email records. (Holder certainly knows that, but his immediate goal is stalling their release until after the November 4 election. With that he has succeeded.) Judicial Watch notes, "The Vaughn index explains 15,662 documents. Typically, a *Vaughn* index must: (1) identify each record withheld; (2) state the statutory exemption claimed; and (3) explain how disclosure would damage the interests protected by the claimed exemption. The Vaughn index arguably fails to provide all of this required information but does provide plenty of interesting information for a public kept in the dark for years about the Fast and Furious scandal." (The Obama administration is refusing to release 15,662 documents related to Operation Fast and Furious, claiming executive privilege over all of them. According to Cornell University Law School, executive privilege "allows the president and other high officials of the executive branch to keep certain communications private if disclosing those communications would disrupt the functions or decision-making processes of the executive branch. As demonstrated by the Watergate hearings, this privilege does not extend to information germane to a criminal investigation." On the one hand, Obama has claimed he was not involved in and knew nothing about Operation Fast and Furious. On the other hand, he does not want the public to see more than 15,000 documents related to the operation. Judicial Watch—and many Americans—deserve to know how the release of those documents "would disrupt the functions or decision-making processes of the executive branch.") Pavlich notes, "After more than a year of stonewalling and a lawsuit from Judicial Watch, DOJ attorneys asked for an extension until November 3, the day before the midterm elections, to turn of the list explaining more than 15,000 documents. That request was denied. ... Obama asserted executive privilege over thousands of Fast and Furious documents just moments before Holder was held in contempt of Congress by the House Oversight Committee in June 2012. That same month, Republicans and Democrats in the House voted Holder in civil and criminal contempt of Congress. Holder is the first sitting

cabinet member in U.S. history to be held in contempt of Congress. After six years at the Department of Justice, Holder submitted his resignation to ...Obama in September, but will stay in his position until a new Attorney General is confirmed after the midterm elections." (Note that Judicial Watch has not been given documents; it has merely been given a *list* of 15,662 Operation Fast and Furious documents the Obama administration refuses to release. Judicial Watch knows, therefore, that Holder does not want anyone to see what is in his emails about the gun-walking scheme, and curious citizens would certainly like to know what he was telling his wife and his mother. Those emails obviously did not read, "Okay, I'll pick up a gallon of milk on my way home from work.") [66735, 66736, 66752, 66784, 66791, 66792, 66793]

Pavlich adds, "The family of Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry, who was murdered in the Arizona desert in December 2010 by Mexican bandits carrying guns obtained through Fast and Furious, is baffled that [Obama] would use his executive authority to protect Holder's wife and is disappointed with the continuing lack of transparency from DOJ and the White House. 'We are shocked that some of these Vaughn Index documents show that Attorney General Holder was personally involved in crafting talking points and helping his office in responding to the Congressional inquiry into Operation Fast and Furious from very early on. We are baffled that personal emails from the Attorney General to his wife and mother are part of the information covered by [Obama's] claim of Executive Privilege,' Terry family spokesman Ralph Terry said in a statement. 'Furthermore, we are incredibly saddened that even after the death of Brian Terry and four years after Operation Fast and Furious was put to an end, the weapons of Operation Fast and Furious continue to appear and present a clear danger to the public. The Administration continues to show no remorse for their actions in Operation Fast and Furious. The Department of Justice continues to engage in deceptive measures that are designed to cover up the links between multiple acts of violence and the guns that were allowed to be bought by straw buyers and ultimately delivered to some of the most violent criminals in North America,' Terry continued. 'As evidenced by the weapon recovered in Phoenix, the Attorney General has once again failed to inform Congress and the American people that the weapons from the botched gun trafficking program put into place by ATF and former U.S. Attorney Dennis Burke continue to injure and maim American citizens. We urge ... Obama to cooperate with Congress and to release the thousands of documents outlined in the Vaughn Index. Americans deserve the truth and deserve transparency from their government in this matter." [66828]

Congressman Ed Royce (R-CA), chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, reacts to a report about an audit of the USAID, which discloses that the State Department's U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) funded groups in Egypt that were not only not registered with that nation's government, they were linked to the radical Muslim Brotherhood—and the report was modified to hide that information. Royce states, "I am concerned by this morning's report that the USAID Inspector General withheld information from audit reports submitted to Congress. Inspectors General are required by law to keep Congress 'fully and currently informed' about fraud and other serious problems, abuses, and deficiencies at their respective agencies. Any violation of this mandate is unacceptable. The Foreign Affairs Committee

is working with the Office of the Inspector General to get to the bottom of this matter." Examiner.com's Jim Kouri states that the "disturbing report... accuses yet one more top Obama administration official of falsifying a report in order to protect ... After the fall of Mubarak, under Secretary Clinton, the [USAID] hired several private sector organizations [to] help in the development of pro-democracy programs in Egypt despite warnings that some involved in the process were actually members of the radical Muslim Brotherhood. ... Despite Islamic terrorism experts and intelligence analysts warning the White House and State Department otherwise, Obama, Clinton and even Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano insisted the Muslim Brotherhood was a moderate Muslim organization." "Less than a year later," writes Kouri, "the new Egyptian government arrested and charged 43 non-governmental organization (NGO) workers with illegally operating a business in that Arab country. Meanwhile the USAID did not have a permanent inspector general and relied on an acting official. Of the 43 criminally charged 17 of them were United States citizens. That number included then-U.S. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood's son. The Americans, including Raymond LaHood, Jr., were finally freed in March 2012, but [not] until after the Obama State Department secretly gave the Egyptian government a 'ransom' payment of \$4.6 million, which was on top of all the money the U.S. government gave to the Egyptians in foreign aid, loan guarantees, and other 'support.' ... [W]hen the OIG [Office of Inspector General] issued its final audit report to the U.S. Congress and the news media, the OIG's report was changed in order to remove certain findings, according to Washington Post reporters who managed to get copies of the original report. According to the Post, the original, complete report was 21-pages while the one released to lawmakers and the public was fewer than 10-pages in length." (Kouri's report is not surprising. Obama has long been a closet supporter of the Muslim Brotherhood, and is either too naive that it is radical or does not care. He actively worked to get Mubarak ousted so that the Muslim Brotherhood's Mohammed Morsi could get elected. Much to the annoyance of Obama, the Egyptian people did not wait long to rid themselves of Morsi.) [66887]

FreeBeacon.com reports on recent comments by Ali Younesi, senior advisor to Iranian President Hassan Rouhani, in an interview with the Fars News Agency. Younesi calls Obama "the weakest" of all U.S. leaders. ...[H]e had humiliating defeats in the region. Under him the Islamic awakening happened. ...Americans witnessed their greatest defeats in Obama's era: Terrorism expanded, [the] U.S. had huge defeats under Obama [and] that is why they want to compromise with Iran. ...[U.S.] Conservatives are war mongers, they cannot tolerate powers like Iran. If conservatives were in power they would go to war with us because they follow Israel and they want to portray Iran as the main threat and not ISIS. ...We [the Islamic Republic] have to use this opportunity [of Democrats being in power in the U.S.], because if this opportunity is lost, in [the] future we may not have such an opportunity again." (In other words, "Iran should take advantage of the United States while it is under the weak leadership of Obama and the Democrats.) Saeed Ghasseminejad, an Iranian dissident and associate fellow at the

Foundation for Defense of Democracies (FDD), states, "...Obama does believe that by rewarding Iran and permitting it to do whatever it wants in the region, the mullahs in Tehran will be convinced to compromise. ...[But] the result has been disastrous: Iran controls three Arab capitals (Damascus, Beirut, and Baghdad) and its allies just captured the fourth one (Sana in Yemen) and Iran's economy has significantly improved [because of reduced sanctions]. Unfortunately, it does not seem that the mullahs reached the conclusion desired by the administration. Iranians believe this administration is weak, it has lost its economic leverage over Iran and there is no credible military option on the table. Iran has been rewarded upfront, they now ask for more while [they] are determined to keep their nuclear program intact." [66899, 66900]

Campaigning for Senator Mark Udall (D-CO), Michelle Obama says, "As a fifth generation Coloradan, Mark understands what makes this state special." (Udall was not even born in Colorado. It is his Republican challenger, Congressman Cory Gardner (R-CO), who is a fifth-generation Coloradan. On the other hand, she at least did not refer to him as Bill Bailey.) Mrs. Obama also says, "We will get Mark Udall into office"— apparently unaware he is already in the Senate and is in a reelection fight. [66742, 66743, 66744, 66866, 66880]

In New York City a man with a hatchet attacks and injures two police officers. One is struck in the arm and the other in the head. Two other officers shoot and kill the attacker. CNN.com states, "The law enforcement official identified the suspect as Zale H. Thompson, who had a criminal record in California and had been discharged from the Navy for misconduct, according to the source." Police Commissioner William Bratton tells reporters, "No known motive for this attack has been established," but Thompson's Facebook page includes statements in Arabic, extremist views, and statements such as: "Helicopters, big military will be useless on their own soil. They will not be able to defeat our people if we use guerilla warfare. Attack their weak flanks..." [66771, 66772, 66773, 66774, 66775, 66787, 66799, 66800, 66801, 66810, 66812, 66813, 66826, 66827]

On Andrea Mitchell Reports, Andrea Mitchell asks Canadian Member of Parliament Charlie Angus, "But do you fear, do you worry that there is going to be this reaction [backlash against Muslims because of the terrorist attack in Ottawa] as, frankly, we had after 9/11? We had to really have bipartisan efforts by the President, George W. Bush at the time and others, to bring together the community and stop anger and discrimination against some in our society?" (The Media Research Center points out that there was no significant backlash against Muslims in the United States after 9/11. According to FBI statistics, "From 2002 to 2011, Muslims are estimated to have suffered hate crimes at a frequency of 6.0 incidents per 100,000 per year—10 percent lower than blacks (6.7), 48 percent lower than homosexuals and bisexuals (11.5), and 59 percent lower than Jews (14.8). Americans should keep these numbers in mind whenever Islamists attempt to silence critics by invoking Muslim victimhood." Mitchell also asks Angus, "[D]o you think this is going to change Canada's commitment to remain in the military coalition against ISIS or ISIL, whatever you want to call it. It is controversial." (The question is absurd. It implies that a nation can be brought to its knees by a few acts of terrorism, and that those acts in themselves are enough to cause it to withdraw from the fight against

radical Islam and cower. For Mitchell to suggest that fighting ISIS is "controversial" is even more absurd—unless her sympathies lie with the jihadists.) [66786]

The Obama administration dumps the Ebola issue partly in the laps of the states. White House press secretary Josh Earnest tells reporters that states will decide what to do it travelers from Ebola-stricken nations fail to self-report, and the "additional layer... will be based upon an effort to share information with state and local health authorities so they can put in place the measures that they believe would be most effective in protecting the populations of their states." (Instead of a travel ban, the administration is allowing travelers from Ebola countries into the United States, but a 21-day monitoring period is the responsibility of the individuals and the state and local health departments. If a visitor ends up in Chicago with Ebola symptoms, Illinois will then be to blame, not Obama and the CDC.) [66762]

Meanwhile, CNSNews.com asks both the Department of Homeland Security and the Centers for Disease Control for a copy of the questionnaire that is being given to travelers from Ebola countries when they arrive at airports in the United States. There is no response to the request. [66763]

Newsmax.com reports, "Sears Holdings Corp. is shuttering [sic; closing] more than 100 stores and laying off at least 5,457 employees, investor website Seeking Alpha reported on Thursday, indicating the struggling retailer may be stepping up store closures. Sears said in August it had closed 96 stores in the six months since February and planned to close a total of 130 underperforming stores during the full fiscal year. It added at the time that it may shutter additional stores beyond the 130 target. Sears spokesman Chris Brathwaite declined to comment on the number of planned closures, saying the company would provide an update when it reports quarterly earnings next month. Reducing operations to the best performing stores is key to Sears' revival strategy, he said."

The Associated Press reports, "Supporters of a higher minimum wage took their message to Nebraska's airwayes in the final few weeks before voters decide whether to approve a gradual increase to \$9 an hour. The group Nebraskans for Better Wages has spent an estimated \$79,000 on ads supporting the ballot measure, according to analysis released Thursday by the Center for Public Integrity. The ads that were counted started airing the week of Sept. 28 and continued through Oct. 11." Doug Kagan, president of Nebraska Taxpayers for Freedom, which opposes the measure, says, "We just can't match that broadcasting of our message statewide as long and loud as the proponents of the minimum wage increase. They have so much more money than we do, and more access to TV and radio advertising." The AP notes, "Some small business owners have voiced opposition to the measure, but Nebraska's largest business groups haven't aggressively challenged it." (Some on the political left point to the fact that many large companies support an increase in the minimum wage and say that is proof that an increase will not harm businesses. What they neglect to realize is that larger companies know full well that a substantial increase in the minimum wage will put their smaller competitors out of business. A large company may be willing to pay employees more than they are worth if

it means gaining additional business that had been going to its competitors. Thus, some large companies are essentially relying on the power of government to help them by harming others. A CEO who says, "I support an increase in the minimum wage" may actually be saying, "I welcome government action to put my competition out of business.") [66868, 66869]

WashingtonTimes.com reports, "A federal court shot down a tea party group's effort to permanently bar the Internal Revenue Service from targeting conservative groups for special scrutiny, issuing a ruling Thursday that says the tax agency has taken enough steps to correct the problem. Judge Reggie B. Walton also refused the request by True the Vote, a Texas-based group that tries to combat election fraud, to make Lois G. Lerner and other current and former IRS employees pay a penalty for having blocked the group's tax-exempt status and made intrusive inquiries into the group's activities. Without ruling on whether the initial targeting was unlawful, Judge Walton said there was no longer a case because the IRS eventually did approve tax-exempt status." (Some might argue that the judge's decision is like letting a bank robber go free simply because he promised to not do it again.) Jay Sekulow, chief counsel of the American Center for Law & Justice, reacts: "The decision by the court is disappointing. However, it does not deter our efforts to seek justice for our clients. We are reviewing the decision and plan to appeal." Catherine Engelbrecht, founder of True the Vote, states, "We are stunned by today's judgment. The notion that the IRS can target Americans for years because of their political beliefs is reprehensible." [66770, 66783]

Congressman Steve King (R-IA) is asked by Newsmax radio host J. D. Hayworth what Congress is prepared to do if Obama uses an executive order to grant millions of illegal immigrants. King replies, "...Some of that's going to depend on... what kind of response comes form the American people. I can say what I'm prepared to do. If [Obama] violates the Constitution by executive edict, in whatever form the document takes, and seeks to legalize several million people, or five to nine million or more people, I've said this. Wherever I am, and if I'm not in Washington, I will go directly to the airport, I will go to Washington DC, I'm going to call for [House Speaker] John Boehner [R-OH] to call for a special session. We can cut off the funding, and then he will threaten to shut down the government, and likely he will shut down the government again if we do that. He's going to throw a tantrum to get the unconstitutional act that he wants. We know there is the "I" word [impeachment] in the Constitution that none of us wants to say or act on, but... in this context everything is on the table because our... constitutionally republic is on the table. ... So far now he has ordered ICE to break the law, they've complied with his order that ICE break the law by refusing to... put people into removal [deportation] proceedings that they encounter that are here illegally." On *The Five*, panelists discuss Media Matters' intentional misrepresentation of co-host Kimberly Guilfoyle's comments about jury selection. On a prior broadcast, Guilfoyle, an attorney and former prosecutor, had noted that attorneys typically try to exclude young, single women from serving on juries because they tend to be less well-informed and because "They don't get it. They're not in that same life experience of paying the bills, doing the mortgage, kids, community, crime, education, healthcare... They're like healthy and hot and running around without a care in the world. ...I just thank and excuse them [from jury duty], so they can go back on kinder or match.com." The leftist, George Soros-funded Media Matters turned that into a story about how Fox News was telling young women not to vote. Leftist sites like HuffingtonPost.com repeated the false charge, as did many in the media—without bothering to find out what Guilfoyle had actually said. Huffington Post wrote, "Fox News is discouraging young people from voting again, but this time the target is more specific: young women..." A physician from "Doctors Without Borders" is hospitalized in New York City after showing Ebola virus symptoms (high fever and diarrhea). According to NYDailyNews.com, Dr. Craig Spencer "recently returned from disease-wracked West African country Guinea," had taken taxis, ridden on the subway, and gone bowling in Brooklyn. "The shocking revelation that Spencer was roaming around town—after first telling authorities he self-quarantined himself [and did not admit the truth until being confronted by police who examined his public transportation MetroCard and credit card records]—emerged after the 33-year-old medic was hauled off to Bellevue Hospital in a protective suit with symptoms of the deadly disease. Those include nausea and a 103-degree fever, sources said." (Whether foot sweat in rented bowling shoes is considered a "bodily fluid" capable of transmitting the Ebola virus is not addressed in the article.) [66775, 66756, 66776, 66778, 66788, 66814, 67036]

NBC's Andrea Mitchell tweets, "NYC and Bellevue [Hospital] are prepared. This patient [Dr. Craig Spencer] is a professional and did great service in Guinea. Everyone take a deep breath." Mitchell does not say whether the bowling ally Spencer went to is prepared. (As a precaution, the bowling alley temporarily shuts its doors. Whether the facility will reopen with a new name, "Ebowlarama," is not known.) [66777]

Donald Trump tweets, "If this doctor, who so recklessly flew into New York from West Africa, has Ebola, then Obama should apologize to the American people & resign!" [66825]

Later in the day Spencer tests positive for Ebola. New York City mayor Bill de Blasio and Governor Andrew Cuomo hold a press conference to tell everyone not to worry because Ebola is "very difficult to contract," while also saying they are doing their best to identify everyone with whom Spencer came in contact. Cuomo says, "We are as ready as one can be for this circumstance. New York is a dense place, a lot of people on top of each other, but the more you know, the less frightening it is." Cuomo also congratulates de Blasio, his own staff, and even the incoming Ebola czar Ron Klain for their great

work. (What Klain has done to warrant congratulations is not explained.) [66779, 66780, 66788, 66794, 66844]

Donald Trump tweets, "Ebola has been confirmed in N.Y.C., with officials frantically trying to find all of the people and things he had contact with. Obama's fault" and "I have been saying for weeks for ...Obama to stop the flights from West Africa. So simple, but he refused. A TOTAL incompetent!" [66825]

News reports show New York City police officers who were at Dr, Craig Spencer's apartment building discarding their protective gloves and masks in a trash can on the sidewalk. [66845, 66874, 66875]

Twitter user Amr Ar Rumi threatens the life of author, blogger, and freedom activist Pamela Geller, tweeting, "Anyone having opportunity kill her, if not spam her account at least." (The mainstream media shamelessly describes Geller as "anti-Muslim" because of her efforts to bring attention to the problem of radical Islamists intent on killing non-Muslims and establishing a global caliphate. There is, of course, a vast difference between "anti-Muslim" and "anti-violent jihad.") [66797, 66798]

The Democrat candidate for governor in Pennsylvania, Tom Wolf, joins the group of candidates who refuse to say whether they voted for Obama. (Wolf can get away with it; he has a substantial lead in the polls.) [66824]

In a debate between Democrat Martha Robertson and Congressman Tom Reed (R-NY), Robertson says Reed is "part of the war against women"—promoting audience laughter and ridicule. (Although the "war on women" theme seemed to work for Obama and his fellow Democrats in the 2012 campaign, it may have played itself out. Pham visits the White House and receives a hug from Barack "no photo ops" Obama. CBS' Mark Knoller tweets, "Still photographers said they heard ... Obama tell Nurse Nina Pham words to the effect of: let's give a hug for the cameras." (Twitter user redsteeze writes, "Joe Biden, desperate to upstage Obama's hug with the Ebola victim just drank from the WH toilet she just used." Whether Bill Clinton offered to exchange bodily fluids is not known.) [66835, 66838, 66839, 66842, 66879]

New York Governor Andrew Cuomo and New Jersey Governor Chris Christie impose mandatory 21-day quarantines on travelers from Liberia Guinea, and Sierra Leone. [66953, 66971]

Kaci Hickox, a nurse returning to the United States from Sierra Leone, where she was caring for Ebola patients, is stopped by airport and health officials and placed into 21-day quarantine after allegedly exhibiting a fever. Hickox writes, in an account published at DallasNews.com, "This is not a situation I would wish on anyone, and I am scared for those who will follow me. I am scared about how health care workers will be treated at airports when they declare that they have been fighting Ebola in West Africa. I am scared that, like me, they will arrive and see a frenzy of disorganization, fear and, most frightening, quarantine. ...One after another, people [at the airport] asked me questions. Some introduced themselves, some didn't. One man who must have been an immigration officer because he was wearing a weapon belt that I could see protruding from his white coveralls barked questions at me as if I was a criminal. ... I was tired, hungry and confused, but I tried to remain calm. ... I was feeling physically healthy but emotionally exhausted. Three hours passed. No one seemed to be in charge. No one would tell me what was going on or what would happen to me. ... Four hours after I landed at the airport, an official approached me with a forehead scanner. My cheeks were flushed, I was upset at being held with no explanation. The scanner recorded my temperature as 101. ... I explained that an oral thermometer would be more accurate and that the forehead scanner was recording an elevated temperature because I was flushed and upset. ... Eight police cars escorted me to the University Hospital in Newark. Sirens blared, lights flashed. Again, I wondered what I had done wrong. ... After my temperature was recorded as 98.6 on the oral thermometer, the doctor decided to see what the forehead scanner records. It read 101. The doctor felts my neck and looked at the temperature again. 'There's no way you have a fever,' he said. 'Your face is just flushed.' My blood was taken and tested for Ebola. It came back negative." At a Democrat rally in Massachusetts in support of Gubernatorial candidate Martha Coakley, Hillary Clinton says, "Don't let anybody tell you that raising the minimum wage will kill jobs. They always say that." (Clinton is, of course, mistaken—if not lying outright. In fact, many such jobs were lost when the government imposed a luxury tax on yachts. Economist Walter Williams has noted, "When Congress imposed a 10 percent luxury tax on yachts, private airplanes and expensive automobiles, Sen. Ted Kennedy and then-Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell crowed publicly about how the rich would finally be paying their fair share of taxes. ... Within eight months after the change in the law took effect, Viking Yachts, the largest U.S. yacht manufacturer, laid off 1,140 of its 1,400 employees and closed one of its two manufacturing plants. Before it was all over, Viking Yachts was down to 68 employees. In the first year, one-third of U.S. yacht-building companies stopped production, and according to a report by the congressional Joint Economic Committee, the industry lost 7,600 jobs. When it was over, 25,000 workers had lost their jobs building yachts, and 75,000 more jobs were lost in companies that supplied yacht parts and material"—and tax revenue from the industry went down.) Clinton therefore has to move to the political left to protect her chances of winning the nomination, and if she does she will then have to scurry to the center to capture the votes of independents and moderates in the general election. As formidable as Mrs. Clinton looks even before declaring herself a candidate, liberals are casting about for a committed populist to run against her in 2016. They see the former secretary of state and senator as too closely aligned with large corporations and question whether she can be counted on to narrow the income gap in America. They hope to either recruit a candidate able to capture the nomination outright or at least give Mrs. Clinton enough of a scare that she embraces progressive policy goals. Their aim is to make the primary process a debate over the Democratic Party's direction, rather than an uncontested march by Mrs. Clinton to the nomination." [66886]

JudicialWatch.org (JW) reports, "... Obama's trusted senior advisor, Valerie Jarrett, was a key player in the effort to cover up that Attorney General Eric Holder lied to Congress about the Fast and Furious scandal, according to public records obtained by Judicial Watch. ... Practically lost in the 1,000-plus pages of records is an index that shows Jarrett was brought in to manage the fact that Holder lied to Congress after the story about the disastrous gun-running operation broke in the media. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco Firearms and Explosives (ATF) ran the once-secret program that allowed guns from the U.S. to be smuggled into Mexico so they could eventually be traced to drug cartels. Nevertheless, given the timing and subject of these e-mails, it seems clear that Jarrett quickly became a key player in the Fast and Furious cover-up in the immediate aftermath of the revelation that Holder had lied to Congress." At NationalPost.com Patricia Pearson writes, "It's been a tough week for Canadian Muslims. After two tragic deaths attributed to homegrown Islamic terrorists—celebrated on Twitter by fellow jihadists—a predictable backlash has emerged. On Friday, for example, a mosque in Cold Lake, Alta., was vandalized, its windows smashed, its front defaced by graffiti calling for members to 'go home." (Some might argue that it was a far tougher week for Patrice Vincent and Nathan Cirillo, the two Canadians murdered by the jihadists. A man named Luis Enrique Monroy Bracamonte (also known as Marcello Marquez and Julian Beltran) hijacks several cars in Northern California, leads police officers on a chase through two counties, and shoots and kills two sheriff's deputies. LATimes.com reports that Bracamonte, "an undocumented immigrant, was deported in 1997 following his arrest and conviction in Arizona for possession of narcotics for sale, according to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement. He was arrested and repatriated to Mexico a second time in 2001." Bracamonte's wife, "38-year-old Janelle Marquez Monroy, who allegedly accompanied him for much of Friday's six-hour rampage, was booked on attempted murder and carjacking charges." Maricopa County, Arizona Sheriff Joe Arpaio states that Bracamonte/Marquez was jailed twice in his facility and twice turned over to ICE. Arpaio tells the Fox News Channel's Neil Cavuto, the "history surrounding this one illegal alien exposes the inherent dishonesty and ineptitude surrounding the federal government approach to illegal immigration. ... I am calling for a congressional hearing to find out why illegal aliens arrested by my deputies and other police officers for often serious crimes are handed over to ICE, only to end up back in my jail, arrested again on more charges. Either ICE is letting these individuals go out the back door, free to commit more crimes, or is the border so open that even though they're being deported they turn around and immediately return? ... Now this situation, which has always been intolerable, has resulted in tragedy, with two sheriff's deputies dead and a third wounded. Now, maybe, I will get the answers I have been calling for month after month. Now, maybe, ICE and the federal government will be called to account for their actions." [66897, 66927, 66931, 67000]

At NYPost.com Kyle Smith reports on a new book by investigative journalist Sharyl Attkisson, Stonewalled: My Fight for Truth Against the Forces of Obstruction, Intimidation, and Harassment in Obama's Washington. In the book, Attkisson "unloads on her colleagues in big-time TV news for their cowardice and cheerleading for the Obama administration while unmasking the corruption, misdirection and outright lying of today's Washington political machine. ... Reporters on the ground aren't necessarily ideological, Attkisson says, but the major network news decisions get made by a handful of New York execs who read the same papers and think the same thoughts. Often they dream up stories beforehand and turn the reporters into 'casting agents,' [who are] told 'we need to find someone who will say...' that a given policy is good or bad. 'We're asked to create a reality that fits their New York image of what they believe,' she writes. Reporting on the many green-energy firms such as Solyndra that went belly-up after burning through hundreds of millions in Washington handouts, Attkisson ran into increasing difficulty getting her stories on the air. A colleague told her about the following exchange: '[The stories] are pretty significant,' said a news exec. 'Maybe we should be airing some of them on the 'Evening News?'' Replied the program's chief Pat Shevlin, 'What's the matter, don't you support green energy?' Says Attkisson: That's like saying you're anti-medicine if you point out pharmaceutical company fraud. ... In mid-October 2012, with the presidential election coming up, Attkisson says CBS suddenly

lost interest in airing her reporting on the Benghazi attacks. 'The light switch turns off,' she writes. 'Most of my Benghazi stories from that point on would be reported not on television, but on the Web.'" [66898, 66950, 66977, 66990, 67002, 67046, 67116]

Smith also notes that in her book Attkisson "says a source who arranged to have her laptop checked for spyware in 2013 was 'shocked' and 'flabbergasted' at [sic; by] what the analysis revealed. She speculates that the motive was to lay the groundwork for possible charges against her or her sources. Attkisson says the source, who's 'connected to government three-letter agencies,' told her the computer was hacked into by 'a sophisticated entity that used commercial, nonattributable spyware that's proprietary to a government agency: either the CIA, FBI, the Defense Intelligence Agency or the National Security Agency.' ... The spyware included programs that Attkisson says monitored her every keystroke and gave the snoops access to all her emails and the passwords to her financial accounts. ... But the most shocking finding, she says, was the discovery of three classified documents that [her source] told her were 'buried deep in your operating system. In a place that, unless you're a some kind of computer whiz specialist, you wouldn't even know exists.' 'They probably planted them to be able to accuse you of having classified documents if they ever needed to do that at some point,' [he] added." [66898, 66950, 66977, 66990, 67002, 67046, 67116]

"When the White House didn't like [Attkisson's] reporting," writes Smith, "it would make clear where the real power lay. A flack would send a blistering e-mail to her boss, David Rhodes, CBS News' president—and Rhodes's brother Ben, a top national security advisor to ... Obama. The administration, with the full cooperation of the media, has successfully turned 'Benghazi' into a word associated with nutters, like 'Roswell' or 'grassy knoll,' but Attkisson notes that 'the truth is that most of the damaging information came from Obama administration insiders. From government documents. From sources who were outraged by their own government's behavior and what they viewed as a coverup.' ... Attkisson, who received an Emmy and the Edward R. Murrow award for her trailblazing work on the [Operation Fast and Furious] story, says she made top CBS brass 'incensed' when she appeared on Laura Ingraham's radio show and mentioned that Obama administration officials called her up to literally scream at her while she was working the story. ... Attkisson left CBS News in frustration earlier this year. When Attkisson had an exclusive, on-camera interview lined up with Nakoula Basseley Nakoula, the YouTube filmmaker Hillary Clinton blamed for the Benghazi attacks, CBS News president Rhodes nixed the idea: 'That's kind of old news, isn't it?' he said." program similar to Fast and Furious, called Wide Receiver. She did dozens of toughminded stories on Bush's FDA, the TARP program and contractors such as Halliburton. ... After Pelley and Shevlin aired a report that wrongly tarnished reports by Attkisson (and Jonathan Karl of ABC News) on how the administration scrubbed its talking points of references to terrorism after Benghazi, and did so without mentioning that the author of some of the talking points, Ben Rhodes, was the brother of the president of CBS News, she says a colleague told her, '[CBS] is selling you down the river. They'll gladly sacrifice your reputation to save their own. If you don't stand up for yourself, nobody will.' Kathryn Ruemmler, former White House counsel, asks that her name be withdrawn from consideration as Attorney General nominee. (The news is not surprising. If she were nominated by Obama, she would face questions about her participation in "screening" Operation Fast and Furious documents, resisting the release of Solyndra loan documents, involvement in developing Benghazi talking points, covering up the fact that the IRS was targeting conservative groups, and deciding there was no White House participation in the Secret Service prostitution incident. In Illinois, Republican gubernatorial candidate Bruce Rauner leads Democrat governor Pat Quinn 45-43 in a *Chicago Tribune* poll. (Libertarian candidate Chad Grimm has 4 percent—partly because labor unions are helping to finance his campaign because they believe he will siphon votes from Rauner.) [66840, 66841]

In a Boston Globe poll, Republican gubernatorial candidate Charlie Baker leads Democrat Martha Coakley by nine points—in one of the most liberal states in the union. (Massachusetts is one of the few states where Obama's approval rating is above 50 percent; he is at 51 percent.) [66850, 67098, 67225, 67261]

The desperation of some Democrat candidates is displayed by State Senator Vincent Shaheen, who is trying to upset South Carolina's Republican governor, Nikki Haley. At CNBC.com Larry Kudlow writes, "The Republicans are going to recapture the Senate, picking up more seats than most any forecaster expects. And the House GOP is going to add to its majority. But then comes the big story: The beginning of a new conservative revolution. The idea that nothing much will change if the GOP captures the whole Congress is just plain wrong. The politics and policies in Washington are about to change in a major way. Obama may still be [in the White House]. But he is going to be

immediately confronted with a flood of new bills that will change the debate on tax reform, energy, health care, education, international trade, and regulations. ... Obama's head will spin with all the new paperwork on his desk. He may even have to cut back on his golf game. Of course, because of his left-wing ideology, Obama may veto everything. But if he does, he's setting up a new Republican agenda for the 2016 presidential race. Conflict Kitchen, a pop-up restaurant located at the intersection of Carnegie Mellon University and Pittsburgh University, seeks to use food to educate locals and college students about countries that are allegedly in conflict with the United States. It recently began serving Palestinian food wrapped in leaflets that include quotes from Palestinians defending terrorism and opposing the existence of Israel. ... Conflict Kitchen is supported in part by the Heinz Endowment, which is chaired by Kerry's wife, Teresa Heinz Kerry. A spokesman for the Heinz Endowment told the Washington Free Beacon that it gave Conflict Kitchen a \$50,000 grant last April to support its relocation to another site in Pittsburgh." [66846, 66847]

According to *The Denver Post*, "Election offices across the state have received 40,000 more ballots from Republican voters than Democrats in the 10 days since ballots were mailed to voters, a spread that far outpaces the advantage the GOP had in voter turnout at this time four years ago. As of Wednesday, the most recent day the Colorado secretary of state's office released ballot return data, 145,824 Republican voters had mailed back their ballots while 105,401 Democrats had done the same. More than 77,000 unaffiliated voters had also returned their completed ballots. In 2010, during the country's last midterm election, Republicans held a 10,000-count edge over Democrats—81,000 to 71,000 returned ballots—as of Oct. 20 of that year." [66922, 66923, 66957]

On *The Kelly File*, Democrat strategist Kirsten Powers is asked how, with Democrat candidates distancing themselves from Obama, Obama has insisted the elections are about his policies. Investigative journalist Sharyl Attkisson writes at Twitter, "I asked CDC if those who work at companies contracted to handle Ebola waste have been background-checked to make sure they have no questionable background, could be likely to be bribed or have nefarious motives with access to the contagious waste. Surely somebody has thought of these things... these really aren't hard questions. ...I asked CDC what is the plan to deal with situations that defeat the honor system, in other words, someone who might have bad judgment or would have an intent to harm? They didn't answer. Surely there's an idea of something we should or could be doing to protect ourselves in the unlikely event... And I know and hope it's very unlikely but should there be an outbreak in the US, since Ebola can be transmitted in meat, I asked CDC what are the plans for ensuring safe meat/food supply here, etc. and they didn't answer." At a White House Correspondents Association symposium, Obama's claim of "the most transparent administration in history" is repeatedly mocked. ABC reporter Ann Compton says, "The distance between [Obama] and the press pool—it's as if we were all carrying the Ebola virus." [66978]

At the same event, USA Today Washington Bureau Chief Susan Page says, "This administration's been more restrictive and more challenging to the press—more dangerous to the press, really—than any administration in American history in terms of legal investigations, and so on, and I think access to the White House has just gotten worse and worse." Page also says she worries that the administration has set a new "floor" for future administrations to follow. (Whether most mainstream media journalists realize they allowed Obama's abuses to grow because of their pathetically weak and

According to NYPost.com, "those who showed up were terrified to enter his isolation chamber..." One hospital source tells the *Post*, "The nurses on the floor are miserable with a 'why me?' attitude, scared to death and overworked because all their co-workers called out sick. One nurse even went as far as to pretend she was having a stroke to get out of working there, but once they cleared her in the ER they sent her back up." [66895, 66896]

At WND.com F. Michael Maloof reports on the death of American journalist Serena Shim in Turkey. Shim "was a journalist for Iran's state-owned Press TV. She was killed in a car crash in the city of Suruc after she reportedly collided with a 'heavy vehicle.' She was in a rental car returning from her assignment when the crash occurred. Neither the 'heavy vehicle' nor its driver has been located, although her driver reportedly was arrested. Just days before her death, she had expressed concerns to colleagues and later on camera that she could be arrested by Turkish officials over her reporting. She disclosed that ISIS jihadists were being smuggled into Turkey and back into Syria in the back of humanitarian aid vehicles. Suruc was located near the Turkish-Syrian border where most of the international media are assembled to cover the Kobani siege by ISIS. ... 'Just a couple of days ago she had been threatened by Turkish intelligence,' Press TV stated. A few days prior to her death, Shim had spoken on camera of her fears of being arrested. She claimed Turkish intelligence agents had accused her of spying after her report of the alleged smuggling of ISIS militants." (The suspicion is that the government of Turkey may have had Shim killed.) Obama has no comment. [66885]

YnetNews.com reports, "There is a crisis with the Americans and it needs to be addressed as a crisis,' [Israeli] Finance Minister Yair Lapid said Saturday after ongoing tensions between Washington and Jerusalem led US officials to block Defense Minister Moshe Ya'alon from meeting with senior administration officials during his current US visit. 'We mustn't pretend there isn't a crisis,' Lapid told a crowd in Tel Aviv Saturday.

'Our relations with the US are vital and everything that can be done must be done to end this crisis.' Earlier on Friday, Ynet revealed that the Obama administration refused the Israeli defense minister's request to meet with other top officials, including Vice President Joe Biden, Secretary of State John Kerry, and the National Security Advisor Susan Rice. Since then, reports have said the same officials tried to prevent Ya'alon from meeting with the US' UN ambassador Samantha Power—and when the two did meet, Ya'alon reportedly heard mostly of Power's objection to settlement construction." (The White House treatment of Ya'alon is no doubt in retaliation to his comments that "The American security plan presented to us is not worth the paper it's written on," Kerry's diplomatic efforts were "obsessive and messianic," and "The only thing that can 'save us [Israel]' is for John Kerry to win a Nobel Prize and leave us in peace." The petty Obama and Kerry—like Obama advisor Valerie Jarrett—obviously hold grudges for a *long* time: Ya'alon's comments were made in *January*.) [66890, 66891, 66910, 66911]

WorldBulletin.net reports, "Muslims in French prisons reach up to 60% claims France's UMP party deputy Guillaume Larrive. The conclusion drawn by Larrive in a report as part of an action plan 'against Islamist radicalisation in prison' This action plan is now likely to involve several hundred prisoners, Le Figaro reported. The report estimates that 60% of the prison population in France, that is to say 40,000 prisoners, can be considered Muslim, 'culturally or originally.'" [66947, 66948, 66949]

Obama plays golf at Fort Belvoir. [66925]

In a debate in New Hampshire, Senate Jeanne Shaheen is asked if she'd like Obama to visit the state to campaign fir her. She replies, "He's very busy." (Some claim that Obama has been afraid to visit New Hampshire ever since he learned the state's motto is "Live Free or Die.") [66924]

NBC's *Saturday Night Live* skewers Obama over the Ebola issue and his choice of Ron Klain as his Ebola czar. An actor portraying Obama says, "As you know, just two days ago another American, this time a doctor in New York was diagnosed with Ebola. Now, some people want to criticize the way our administration has handled this crisis, and it's true we made a few mistakes early on. But, I assure you, it was nowhere near as bad as how we handled the ISIS situation. I mean, our various Secret Service mishaps, or the scandals of the IRS and NSA. And I don't know if you guys remember, but the Obamacare website had some pretty serious problems too. In fact, if you look at all the stuff that's happened in my second term, this whole Ebola thing is probably one of my greatest accomplishments." [66932, 66935, 66982]

On October 26 the Boston Globe endorses Republican candidate for governor Charlie Baker, over Democrat Martha Coakley. [66983, 66984]

Townhall.com's Debra J. Saunders reports on an absurd ordinance in San Francisco that forces landlords to pay tenants a penalty if they need to be evicted (such as when the landlord chooses to sell the property, or simply decides he wants to live in the rental unit himself). The payment essentially compensates tenants enough to rent a comparable

apartment or house "for two years at market rates." With rents as high as they are in San Francisco, a "typical case" would involve a payout of \$45,000. (Whether such regulations will finally persuade some residents of the city to vote Republican instead of Democrat remains to be seen. Tenants no doubt love the regulation, while landlords hate it. Of course, the eventual impact of the regulation will be to drive rents even higher. Just 3.7 thought it deserved an A grade, while 21.7 percent gave it a B and 28.8 percent a C. ...Jeffrey A. Singer, who practices general surgery in Arizona and is an adjunct scholar at the Cato Institute, says a major reason that Obamacare is unpopular with many doctors is that it has disrupted patients' relationships with their physicians. Many of his patients saw their insurance plans canceled because they didn't meet Obamacare's minimum requirements, and they had to move into new plans that did not include Singer in their network. ... Other pertinent findings of the Physicians Foundation survey include: Physicians now spend 20 percent of their time on non-clinical paperwork. 81 percent describe themselves as overextended or at full capacity. 72 percent believe there is a physician shortage. 29 percent would not choose medicine if they had their careers to do over, but 50 percent would recommend medicine as a career to their children or other young people. 25 percent of doctors do not see Medicare patients or limit the number of Medicare patients they see, while 38 percent deal with Medicaid patients that way. 39 percent of physicians

say they will accelerate their retirement plans due to changes in the healthcare system." [66926]

WSJ.com reports, "Republicans have expanded their advantage in the final days of the midterm campaign and now hold an 11-point lead among likely voters on the question of which party should control Congress, a new Wall Street Journal/NBC News/Annenberg survey finds. Some 52% of likely voters in the survey said they wanted the election to produce a Republican-led Congress, while 41% favored Democratic control. A week earlier, Republicans had held a narrower, 5-point lead on the question in the Journal/NBC/Annenberg survey. ...By historical measures, an 11-point lead on the question of which party should control Congress is large. Republicans held a seven-point lead on the question at this point in the 2010 election in a Journal/NBC survey, which used a different method to determine which voters were most likely to cast ballots." (A CNN poll shows Democrats with a one-point lead, rather than a Republican 11-point lead, but the poll is arguably skewed because it surveyed 10 percent more Democrats than Republicans—and virtually no one believes there will be a massive Democrat turnout on November 4. Townhall.com notes, "[T]he 2012 electorate was D+6 in 2012, and D+0 in 2010." It will most certainly not be D+10 in 2014.) [66934, 66967]

On *Meet the Press*, Senator Charles Schumer (D-NY) states that if the Democrats retain control of the Senate in the mid-term elections, "I say that Harry Reid [D-NV] will run for majority leader and he will win with an overwhelming—probably very close to a majority vote." [66937]

Also on *Meet the Press*, Sophie Delaunay, executive director for Doctors Without Borders, says, "We are very much concerned about this situation in West Africa where the outbreak is still out of control, and quarantine measures or coercive measures against aid workers could give a superfluous sense of security, while the most important [thing] is to tackle the epidemic at its source there. ... We ask our volunteers coming back from West Africa to monitor their temperature twice a day during 21 days, to continue their malaria prophylaxis in order to avoid that there would be a confusion between malaria symptoms and Ebola, which can be similar. And more importantly, we recommend that they report the symptoms as soon as they realize that they exist, and this is, actually, the protocol that our colleague Craig has strictly followed this week." (Craig lied when he initially claimed that he had not left his apartment. After questioning by police, he admitted he had left the building, gone jogging, used mass transit, went to two bowling alleys, and ate at a restaurant. Most Americans would expect that "following protocol" does not include lying to authorities.) [67048]

On CNN's State of the Union, Congresswoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz (D-CA) dodges the question of whether Obama's policies are on the ballot, as he himself as claimed, saying, "This election is about making sure that we elect a congress that will

Also on State of the Union, Candy Crowley asks Senator Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) for her reaction to the rumor that Michelle Obama may want to run for her Senate seat if she retires in 2018. Feinstein replies, "I'm flattered, if that should be true. Somehow I do not believe it is true, but I would be flattered if it were." (Feinstein does not explain why she would be "flattered." The comment is nonsensical.) [67022]

On Fox News Sunday, New Jersey Governor Chris Christie defends his state's quarantine rules for airport arrivals of people coming from Ebola areas in West Africa. Christie says, "I think the [Centers for Disease Control and Prevention] eventually will come around to our point of view on this. I don't believe when you're dealing with something as serious as this that we can count on a voluntary system. This is government's job. If anything else, the government job is to protect safety and health of our citizens. And so, we've taken this action and I absolutely have no second thoughts about it. ...I think this is a policy that will become a national policy sooner rather than later." (Within two days—and after pressure from the White House—Cuomo revises his state's policy to allow people to self-quarantine at home as long as they show no symptoms of Ebola. Whether Cuomo considers going bowling part of a self-quarantine regimen is not clear.) [69772, 66985]

On *Media Buzz*, veteran journalist Bob Woodward says, "It is a reality now in my view that in the Obama administration, there are lots of unanswered questions about the IRS [conservative-targeting scandal], particularly. If I were [a] young [reporter], I would take Carl Bernstein and move to Cincinnati where that IRS office is and set up headquarters and go talk to everyone. Now, there's been political spin put on it by lots of people, including Fox News, including the White House. [The] Question is, what are the facts? What really happened?" (Setting up headquarters next door to Lois Lerner might also make some sense.) [66939, 66940]

NBC's *Meet the Press*, CBS's *Face the Nation*, and ABC's *This Week* all neglect to even mention Hillary Clinton's absurd statement that corporations and businesses do not create jobs. [66981]

FreeBeacon.com notes that "Texas Governor Rick Perry and professional public speaker Hillary Clinton both held rallies in North Carolina over the past few days for their respective party's Senate candidate in what is shaping up to be a close race that has already attracted its fair share of 2016 contenders. Embarrassingly for Clinton, the crowd she drew at a Kay Hagan rally in Charlotte (population 800,000) was less than half the size of what Perry was able to attract in Smithfield (population 12,000) in support of Thom Tillis." According to CrowsNestPolitics.com, Senator Tom Udall (D-NM) leads his Republican challenger, retired Marine Colonel Allen Weh, 48-44 percent in a new "in-depth poll." (If the poll is accurate, Weh has made a massive improvement in his position.) [67004, 67005]

FoxNews.com reports, "The four hostages known to have been beheaded earlier this year by the Islamic State militant group in Syria suffered severe physical torture before their deaths, according to a published report. The New York Times says that hostages were severely beaten, starved, underwent mock executions, and were even waterboarded by their captors. The paper reports that the American and British hostages, including beheaded journalists James Foley and Steven Sotloff and aid workers David Haines and Alan Henning were singled out for the worst torture, largely because Washington and London have refused to pay the ransoms provided by other Western governments. The Times claims that the waterboarding was so dreaded by the hostages that their fellow prisoners were relieved if they came back from an encounter with their guards covered in blood." [66943]

Canada' RCMP states it "has identified persuasive evidence that Michael Zehaf-Bibeau's attack was driven by ideological and political motives. Zehaf-Bibeau had prepared a video recording of himself just prior to conducting this attack. The RCMP is conducting a detailed analysis of the video for evidence and intelligence. You must understand that we cannot release this video at this time and I would ask for your patience in this regard." (Pamela Geller writes, "I would like to understand how the Royal Canadian Mounties and the police work with 'violent extremists.' At Politico, Michael Hirsh writes of the Obama administration's "bumbling" on national security issues. According to multiple sources, behind the scenes a few things went badly awry in the launch of Obama's new policy. Buck McKeon, the Republican chairman of the Armed Services Committee, said they were appalled by what they saw: language so sloppy that it failed to mention adequate protections against so-called 'green-on-blue' attacks by trainees on American troops, and effectively left the Defense Department liable for funding the mission against the Islamic State in Iraq and the Levant (ISIL)—even though [Obama] was telling members of Congress he didn't need money for this new mission, since the Saudis were putting it up. 'What came over would have not have been a mission the DoD [Department of Defense] could have executed,' says a senior Republican committee staffer. ... But it's clear the finger-pointing between the White House and Pentagon reflects no mere technicality. Both examples cited to me by well-placed sources close to the Defense Department offer new evidence of a criticism that has dogged this administration for most of its six and a half years: that Barack Obama's White House is so insular and tightly controlled it often avoids 'outside' consultation—including with its own cabinet secretaries and agencies." Hirsh continues, "...Despite an NSC [National Security Council] staff that's grown from 50 under George H.W. Bush to more than 300 under Obama—in part because White House support and Homeland Security staffs have been folded into the NSC—'there is a sense that the NSC is run a little like beehive ball soccer, where everyone storms to wherever the ball is moving around the field,' according to another recently departed

senior administration official. 'They are managing by crisis rather than strategy... It's Syria one day, Iraq the next, North Korea the next, and so on. The NSC is finding multitasking very hard these days.'" (It is clear that Obama and Valerie Jarrett and a few other White House insiders make decisions without thinking them through and without even bothering to consult with the people who will be charged with implementing those decisions. According to *The Washington Post*, Obama announced his "Dreamers" amnesty policy in 2012 without first bothering to meet with then-Secretary of Homeland Security Janet Napolitano. That is tantamount to the president of General Motors announcing a new vehicle line-up without first discussing it with the stylists and engineers who will have to design and build the cars.) During a debate with challenger Scott Brown, Senator Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH) is booed when she interrupts Brown's closing remarks to charge that he is funded by the Koch brothers. It is worth noting that although the Obama administration does not like Christian priests and ministers preaching politics from their pulpits on Sunday, the odds of it criticizing the DC Muslim Caucus for telling all Muslims how to vote is zero.) [67403, 67404, 67405]

New federal Ebola guidelines go into effect. According to *The New York Times*, "Under that new policy, any traveler retuning from Sierra Leone, Liberia and Guinea will be required to report their temperatures to their local health authorities. They will also be required to give health officials the names and addresses of their relatives and where they will be staying in the three weeks after they arrive, the approximate amount of time the disease takes to incubate." [66971]

The U.S. Army begins quarantining personnel returning from Ebola-stricken countries. FoxNews.com reports, "So far, the Army is the only military branch to take the step of ordering mandatory quarantines. In a decision Fox News confirms was made by Army Chief of Staff Gen. Ray Odierno, the Department of the Army has issued guidelines ordering troops returning from West Africa into a 21-day isolation, separated from their families and other troops. Currently, a team that consists of Maj. Gen. Darryl A. Williams and 11 other troops is being held in isolation in a building at their base in Vicenza, Italy, after returning from Liberia." The Army's action is in conflict with the Obama administration's belief that travelers need not be quarantined. Asked about the

inconsistency, White House press secretary Josh Earnest tells reporters, "We will let the Department of Defense make an announcement. ...We're going to let science drive that process." [67044, 67045, 67162]

New Jersey officials allow Ebola nurse Kaci Hickox to leave quarantine and return home to Maine because she has been symptom-free for 24 hours. (In other words, New Jersey Governor Chris Christie caved in to pressure from the White House.) [66989]

DailyCaller.com reports that Hickox "is a Centers For Disease Control and Prevention employee... The lawyer who helped earn her release [Norman Siegel] is a recent White House state dinner guest. ... Siegel is the former director of the New York affiliate of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU). Siegel previously partnered with Al Sharpton to fight against a New York state proposal to keep a DNA database of felons." [67026]

According to a national Rasmussen poll, "86% of Likely U.S. Voters now consider radical Islamic terrorism a threat to the United States. That's up 11 points from January." [66962, 66963]

Denver radio talk show host Peter Boyles (710 KNUS) interviews Canadian author Mark Steyn, who says, "Oddly enough, as a condition of my presence in this country [the United States], I did have to provide my long-form birth certificate... I don't know whether I'm ready to go 'full birther' but I think it's slightly odd that... if I want to come to the United States I have to provide a long-form birth certificate but if I want to run for president, any old photocopy from Kinko's will do. ... What if find odd is when people present it [doubts about Obama's background and birth certificate] as a crazy conspiracy—I don't think it is crazy. It's the sort of thing that could happen very easily and if you're audacious enough and you had the cooperation of a relatively small number of people you could do it [fake your background and a birth certificate] very easily. ... Anyone who thinks it would be difficult to obtain a fake Hawaiian certificate of live birth is someone who just doesn't know how theses things work. ... The fascinating thing about Obama is that he's a man with this mutable biography that is just whatever happens [to be needed] at the moment. So, for example, ... for over 15 years his publicist found it convenient to promote him as a man born—in his official biography—as a man born in Kenya. ...He's this man from out of nowhere, invented an identity that he thought was rather cool, and stepped into it. But it was essentially something he created for himself, this identity, relatively late in life, in his early thirties. ... And people who are fascinated by some friend of a friend of a friend of somebody who Bristol Palin dated for 20 minutes in grade nine paid no interest whatsoever ...in the great inconsistencies and gaps in the Obama narrative." Congressman Lamar Smith (R-TX) states, "We've had hearings on the subject of the security or lack of security with the ObamaCare website and what we've discovered is that it seems to be easy to be hacked, the security is not secure." [67001]

WatchDog.org reports that some Diebold brand voting machines in Maryland are automatically switching some Republican votes to Democrat votes. "Joe Torre, election

director in Anne Arundel [County], called it a 'calibration issue' involving a single machine." (Cook County, Illinois officials have also used the "calibration" explanation for irregularities with their machines. Whether the "calibration issues" ever switch Democrat votes to Republican votes is not known.) [66964, 66965, 67063]

In an example of political correctness run amok in Great Britain, JihadWatch.org reports that a memorial to Lee Rigby, the British soldier beheaded by a Muslim terrorist in the streets of London, will not include his name because it would attract "undesirable interest from extremists." (Pamela Geller writes, "Call me old fashioned but isn't a memorial—by it's very *definition*—supposed to remember a person or event? How can you have a memorial without naming the person or event? This young man was beheaded by a devout Muslim in broad daylight on a public street outside of London, but he will go unnamed. If you recall, the British authorities banned Robert Spencer and me from entering the UK when we were scheduled to leave a wreath at the site of Rigby's murder. The Brits were afraid the Muslims would riot. Further down the rabbit hole goes a once great nation. Keep digging, England.") [67012, 67013, 67096]

Also in England, after 75-year-old retiree Paul Griffith is asked to remove his shoes at Stansted Airport, he comments to the security guard, "I am not Muslim, am I?" Although the man does remove is shoes, his remark prompts the guard to call the police—who charge him with causing "racially or religiously aggravated harassment, alarm or distress." [67014]

At the daily White House press briefing, it becomes increasingly clear that some reporters are getting tired of administration incompetence. Press secretary Josh Earnest is asked by one reporter, "Let's take the case of the Pentagon. You talked about how the administration has been aware and has acted on the Ebola outbreak since March. And then shouldn't these, shouldn't a [quarantine] policy [already] have been in place when you decided to send troops to West Africa? Shouldn't [the administration have decided] how you are going to treat those returning troops in a matter of a protocol then, rather than to what appears to be being made up on the fly as we go?" After a few minutes of dodging and spin by Earnest, Reuters' Roberta Rampton asks, "So is the White House concerned that the decision made by one commanding officer... is sending a mixed message to people about the needs for these kinds of [Ebola quarantine] policies?" After more spin from Earnest, Rampton asks, "I'm confused though because we have known about this outbreak for some time and we are going to hear, as you say, from CDC later today guidelines and protocols for returning medical workers which, we know they were there. Why haven't—and the Pentagon too in the case of these people who are being held or sort of semi-quarantined in Italy. Why weren't these kinds of decisions made earlier?" Earnest responds, "Well, Roberta, I think what this reflects is a commitment by this administration to regularly review the guidelines that are in place to make sure that they, um, that they reflect what's necessary to protect the American people..." [67039]

Newsmax.com reports that Obama "will launch a series of executive actions on Monday to strengthen U.S. advanced manufacturing, including a \$300 million investment in three

technologies considered crucial to the country's industrial competitiveness. ... The White House said NASA and the departments of Defense, Energy and Agriculture would invest more than \$300 million in the emerging technologies of advanced materials including composites and bio-based materials, advanced sensors for manufacturing, and digital manufacturing." (Where the \$300 million will come from is not explained.) [66976]

DailyCaller.com reports, "Things appear to be tightening in Maryland, where a poll leaked to The Daily Caller shows the gubernatorial race is 'extremely close—only 2 points, 46 to 44, separate Democratic Lieutenant Governor Anthony Brown and Republican small businessman Larry Hogan.' ...[L]et's assume for a minute this survey is accurate. [It appears to be an outlier, but was conducted by a reputable firm.] This would represent a nine point swing from a week ago, when, according to the RealClearPolitics poll average, Hogan was down by 11 points. How could this be possible? I mean, what has happened in the last week? For one thing, ...Obama—not welcome on the trail in red states—campaigned for Brown in Maryland, where crowds began streaming out during his speech, leaving empty bleachers behind. Could it be that ...Obama is such a drag on Democrats that he even hurts them in ...Maryland?" (The largest city in Maryland is Baltimore, which has a majority black population—63.7 percent in the 2010 census. If Hogan wins, it will because many blacks did not bother voting.) [66991, 66992]

A Rasmussen poll shows Congressman Cory Gardner (R-CO) with a 51-45 percent lead over Senator Mark Udall (D-CO). [67015]

Gardner may need every vote he can get, to compensate for vote fraud. DailyCaller.com reports, "The Colorado secretary of state is investigating allegations that some Boulder County Republican election judges are actually Democrats in disguise. Boulder County GOP Chairwoman Ellyn Hilliard initially raised the alarm when visiting polling locations where she didn't recognize some of the GOP judges who are tasked with comparing voter signatures on mail ballots to protect against vote fraud. She became alarmed when she noticed some ballots whose signatures clearly didn't match those on file for the voter being accepted. Deputy Secretary of State Suzanne Staiert began investigating and confirmed to the Daily Camera that she found 'some troubling inconsistencies with some election judges.' 'One of them was a Democrat who had changed party affiliation on Oct. 10..." Hilliard "cited instances in which she said she saw judges accept ballots with signatures that clearly did not match those on file for the voter." (The scheme is simple: A registered Democrat changes his or her registration to Republican, volunteers to be an election judge, and then intentionally fails to question inconsistent signatures—which would come up, for example, if someone votes using the name of a person who recently died. Across the country, political operatives routinely rely on newspaper obituary columns to get the names of voters who have recently died.) [67151]

Attorney General Eric Holder tells *The Washington Post* he is angry that there have been leaks about the grand jury which is considering whether to indict Ferguson, Missouri police officer Darren Wilson for the shooting of convenience store robber Michael Brown. Holder says, "This notion of leaking out selective information, which started as

early as release of that tape... [at] the convenience store [that showed Brown robbing it and abusing the owner]. And then these leaks about what happened in the [police] car. These are all the kinds of things that I think are inappropriate. I've said I'm exasperated. That's a nice way of saying it. I'm mad. ...I think that somebody, these leakers, have made the determination that they're trying to somehow shape public opinion about this case. And that's inconsistent with the way in which we conduct investigations, and especially grand jury investigations which are supposed to be secret." (The remark is laughable, considering that Holder traveled to Ferguson to meet with the parents of Michael Brown to tell them he was seeking justice for him. Holder did not meet with Wilson and has said nothing about whether he is entitled to justice. In fact, Holder states that he sees a "need for wholesale change" in the Ferguson police department—which suggests he has already made up *his* mind about the case. The hypocritical Holder believes he can "shape public opinion," but wants no one else doing the same thing.) [67152, 67191, 67216]

A New England College poll shows Republican challenger Scott Brown leading Senator Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH) 48.3 to 46.8 percent. Republican challenger Frank Guinta leads Congresswoman Carol Shea-Porter (D-NH) by six points, while in anther district Republican challenger Marilinda Garcia trails Congresswoman Ann Kuster (D-NH) by seven points. [67051]

According to a WashingtonPost/ABC poll conducted October 23-26, 68 percent of those surveyed say the country is on the "wrong track." Only 28 percent believe the economy is getting better; 40 percent say it is about the same; 31 percent say it is getting worse. Only one percent say the economy is excellent; 26 percent call it excellent; 44 percent not so good; and 28 percent poor. [67150]

Politico reports, "Nervous that Democrats could lose control of the Senate, the White House is already discussing how to cut deals with a Republican majority" by focusing on Republican Senators who may face tough reelection battles in 2016 and may therefore want to appear to be cooperative rather than confrontational. [66996]

OurAmericaAction.com releases a powerful ad by Louisiana State Senator Elbert Guillory (who is black) urging North Carolina blacks to vote against Senator Kay Hagan (D-NC). Guillory says, "In 2008, 95 percent of black folk in North Carolina voted for Kay Hagan. Democrats have created the illusion that they are the salvation of the black community. But who among us have they saved? In North Carolina the poverty rate for blacks has risen to 34 percent. You see, black people are just being used... by limousine liberals who have become our new overseers. We've only traded one plantation for another. You are not Kay Hagan's cause, and you're certainly not her charity. You are just a vote. She has stepped off your backs to fame and fortune and left you behind, on food stamps, deprived of the American dream. Fifty years of this so-called 'Great Society' has nearly destroyed the black community, but now we have a chance to return the favor. It has come time to send Kay Hagan home." [67041, 67042]

Meanwhile, Rebel Pundit posts a video featuring black activists in Chicago—all of whom are ex-convicts—who argue that the oppressors of blacks are black Democrats. Paul McKinley says, "They always talk about black on black crime, and when you here the words black on black crime, the first thing you think of is a black man robbing you or a black man breaking into your house, and that is a black on black crime. But lets take it one step further. There's a black on black crime down in city hall, there's a black on black crime down in all the state capitols in America, where all the black folks are voting against our interests. ...We're always talking about what the Republican's ain't done for us, but my life has been hurt by democrats." Mark Carter says, "They [black Democrat leaders] forced us into a life of welfare. We don't welfare. We want opportunities to go to work, we want opportunities to own businesses." Harold Ward says, "Everywhere you go, there is poverty in black areas. It's the same way in every black community across the country. ...How can the same process happen over and over again, and can't nobody do nothing about it [sic]?" [67054, 67105, 67117, 67271]

Hillary Clinton tries to "clarify" her bizarre statement that corporations and businesses do not create jobs with a statement at a campaign event for Congressman Sean Patrick Maloney (D-NY): "So-called trickle-down economics has failed. I short-handed this point the other day, so let me be absolutely clear about what I've been saying for a couple of decades: Our economy grows when businesses and entrepreneurs create good-paying jobs here in an America where workers and families are empowered to build from the bottom up and the middle out—not when we hand out tax breaks for corporations that outsource jobs or stash their profits overseas." (Clinton may as well have said, "Bakeries do not sell cakes," and then "corrected" herself by saying, "What I meant was that a cake baked at home is much better than a cake purchased from a bakery." That saying corporations and businesses do not create jobs is somehow "shorthand" for "corporations should not be given tax breaks" is preposterous. Arguably, corporations create *more* jobs when given tax breaks because reduced taxes leave more money available for expanding the business. Additionally, one can hardly claim a remark was "shorthand" when it was read from a prepared speech. But if Clinton was not reading from prepared text and was "winging it," her remark certainly suggests she cannot be trusted with the presidency. The nation has already had six years of someone who can't speak without a teleprompter—and often makes no sense when he uses one.) [66994, 66995, 67023, 670401

Kenneth Palinkas, president of the National Citizenship and Immigration Services Council—the union that represents 12,000 employees of the United States Citizenship and Immigration Service—urges members to oppose Obama's immigration policies with their votes on November 4: "Let your voice be heard and spread the word to your neighbors... [we] are pleading for your help—don't let this [executive order amnesty] happen. ... Whether it's the failure to uphold the public charge laws, the abuse of our asylum procedures, the admission of Islamist radicals, or visas for health risks, the taxpayers are being fleeced and public safety is being endangered on a daily basis. On ABC's World News Tonight, anchor David Muir finally mentions the coming midterm elections. (According to the Media Research Center, "It had been 137 days since the ABC evening newscast had made any mention of the 2014 midterms. The last story on the campaign occurred on June 11... In stunning contrast to the single election story the evening show ran from September 1 to October 27 in 2014, during that same time period in 2006, ABC's World News Tonight provided 51 midterm stories. That included 27 full reports on the topic and 24 reports mentioning the campaign. As a recent Media Research Center study concluded, when the prospects of a Democratic electoral wave were high in 2006, the networks provided wall-to-wall coverage. However, with Republicans seemingly poised to make big gains in 2014, the networks suddenly lost interest in politics.") [67112]

On Special Report, the panel discusses Hillary Clinton's claim that corporations and businesses do not create jobs. The Washington Post's Charles Lane quips, "I thought NBC created a job for Chelsea, so that's at least one corporation that has created a job." Columnist Charles Krauthammer comments, "Well, sort of the guru of this kind of argument is [Senator] Elizabeth Warren [D-MA], who is very articulate in saying that the government is instrumental, society is instrumental in creating success and jobs and a successful economy, and not so much entrepreneurs or individuals. She's the best. Remember there was an attempt at recapitulating this that Obama made in '08 [sic; 2012] when he said if you built it, if you have success, it's not you. He botched it. Now, [Hillary Clinton] got it worse. Hers was like a D on a scale of D to A. She was trying to take a stab at this idea that government, that it's not sort of individual capitalism and corporations, those evil corporations [that create job], but it had no elaboration and it is going to haunt her. ...[Her comment] will be shown over and over again. But it does show you how much the Democrats overestimate her skill as a politician. ... It will be played again and again. It's a signal to Democrats. If you can't make the elementary liberal argument about the role of government without having this ridiculous statement that jobs are not created by corporations, then you are not going to be a good candidate, as she showed in 2008. She is a person who said in the White House we were dead broke. We had trouble paying the mortgages on our houses. If you are going to plead poverty, you don't refer to your homes in the plural. That's pretty elementary. She is not getting the elementary stuff." [67027]

Mitt Romney tells MSNBC's Ronan Farrow that Obama's plan to issue an executive order granting amnesty to millions of illegal immigrants "is a very shameful thing. It's very clear that what he wants to do he knows will be very unpopular, and so he won't tell the people until after the election. That is really a very cynical thing and inappropriate." [67084]

On *The Kelly File*, John Coleman, founder of The Weather Channel and a 60-year veteran in the industry, tells host Megyn Kelly the "global warming hysteria is based on "incredibly bad, bad science" that is being irresponsibly hyped by the mainstream media. [66966, 67237]

On October 28 CBS This Morning's Charlie Rose says, "If the Republicans win the Senate and control the Congress, they have no mandate." (In fact, they will indeed have a mandate: stop Obama's extreme agenda.) Rose asks political director John Dickerson, "So, why is it they [disillusioned voters] don't like [Obama] so much? Is it a spillover from ObamaCare or something else?" (Rose and Dickerson are both Obama apologists, and neither can therefore see what millions of voters see: the many failures of Obama. Dickerson, in fact, is highly partisan. In January 2013 Dickerson wrote at Slate.com, "The challenge for ... Obama's [inaugural] speech is the challenge of his second term: how to be great when the environment stinks. Enhancing [his] legacy requires something more than simply the clever application of predictable stratagems. Washington's partisan rancor, the size of the problems facing government, and the limited amount of time before Obama is a lame duck all point to a single conclusion: [Obama,] who came into office speaking in lofty terms about bipartisanship and cooperation can only cement his legacy if he destroys the GOP. If he wants to transform American politics, he must go for the throat. ... Obama's only ... option is to pulverize [the Republican Party]. Whether he succeeds in passing legislation or not, given his ambitions, his goal should be to delegitimize [sic] his opponents. Through a series of clarifying fights over controversial issues, he can force Republicans to either side with their coalition's most extreme elements or cause a rift in the party that will leave it, at least temporarily, in disarray." [41697, 41698, 67111]

Katie Pavlich reports at Townhall.com that the Obama administration refuses to cave in after losing a federal lawsuit by retired ATF agent and whistleblower Jay Dobyns and plans to appeal the decision. Pavlich writes, "In his opinion, U.S. Court of Federal Claims Judge Francis Allegra described ATF officials as demonstrating misfeasance in the case 'rooted in the sorry failure of some ATF officials.' Dobyns was awarded \$173,000, an insufficient amount considering his family has been nearly bankrupted as a result of ATF's behavior, not to mention the emotional stress incurred throughout the process. Now unsatisfied with a loss in court and berating by a federal judge, ATF and the Department of Justice are appealing the ruling." Dobyns states, "I will never give in and I am excited to now have a panel of judges examine what ATF and DOJ have done. ATF and DOJ want more scrutiny on their conduct? Let's go. I wrongly believed that they would not want any more exposure on what dirty and corrupt organizations they are running but it appears that they have not yet felt enough pain. They will. I promise." Dobyns' attorney, James Reed of the Law Enforcement Legal Defense Fund, comments, "It really doesn't seem like a good use for the taxpayers' money, but one of the problems with the Department of Justice is the amount of accountability there is for decision making." (The Obama administration is willing to spend far more than \$173,000 in taxpayer dollars to appeal the lawsuit—not for monetary purposes, but to inflict as much suffering on Dobyns as it can. It is worth recalling Obama advisor Valerie Jarrett's 2012 comment: "After WE win this election, it's our turn. Payback time. Everyone not with us

is against us and they better be ready because we don't forget. The ones who helped us will be rewarded, the ones who opposed us will get what they deserve. There is going to be hell to pay." Jarrett's comment was not about Dobyns in particular, but is an example of the vindictive attitude of Obama and his closest advisors.) [66960, 66961]

Congressman Lamar Smith (R-TX) calls for the defunding of an ObamaCare provision that is being misused by the Obama administration to fund television ads reminding illegal immigrants to act to renew documents that have allowed them to remain in the United States. According to CNSNews.com, Smith "cites a \$15 million grant from the Prevention and Public Health Fund that the Department of Health and Human Services gave the California Endowment. The Prevention and Public Health Fund was created by the Affordable Care Act to support public health care initiatives. The California Endowment is a statewide, private health foundation that supplies grants for various organizations throughout California, and has served as one of the Obama administration's loudest promoters of Obamacare. ... Using federal tax dollars from the health fund, the foundation then sponsored ads on Univision reminding qualifying illegal aliens to renew their Deferred Action for Childhood Arrival (DACA) permits before they expire." Smith states, "Regardless of how one feels about Obamacare, taxpayer money being spent to remind undocumented immigrants to renew their DACA permits does not promote healthcare. ... This slush fund has virtually no oversight as to where taxpayer money is spent and gives the Department of Health and Human Services free reign to spend the money in any manner it chooses." WashingtonPost.com reports, "Republicans enter the final week of the midterm campaign holding higher ground than the Democrats, aided by public dissatisfaction with ... Obama's leadership, with the overall direction of the country and with the federal government's ability to deal with major problems, according to a new Washington Post-ABC News poll. ... When asked whether they will vote for the Democrat or the Republican for the House in their districts, 50 percent of likely voters say Republican and 44 percent say Democrat. Among the larger universe of registered voters, Democrats have an edge—47 percent to 44 percent. That swing of nine points between registered and likely voters is identical to the difference recorded at this point in 2010. ... The new Post-ABC survey puts Obama's overall national approval rating at 43 percent, up a statistically insignificant three points from two weeks ago. His disapproval remains unchanged, at 51 percent. The view of his handling of the economy is 42 percent positive, 52 percent negative, roughly the same as it has been this fall." (The poll's Democrat/Republican/Independent sampling is 33/30/31.) [66967, 66968, 67035]

With Ebola czar Ron Klain nowhere in sight, Obama holds a brief press conference to say virtually nothing about the Ebola issue beyond the fact that he plans to meet with doctors and public health officials on October 29. (Talk show host and columnist Tammy Bruce tweets, "Obama: Blah, blah, Me! Ebola vigilant! Glurp, tough job, applauded! Science blurp! Prudent, safe glarb, Ebola no fear, HOPE! Facts, erm gurf." [66969, 67019, 67121]

After his brief comments Obama takes only one question from reporters. (NBC's Luke Russert later comments, "Why do we have different regulations, it seems, between those

individuals who are going over there [to West Africa] voluntarily, who are giving up their time and medical capacity, as opposed to the military? Well, there was not a real clear answer upon that, some saying that the military is having more stringent quarantine rules, why shouldn't the average population who goes over there, the common citizen have that? You saw Obama take a question on that. It was unexpected that he would take a question. I'm just going to speculate: that may have been one that an aide ahead of time told a reporter, 'Go ahead, you might get this one answered,' because they wanted to be more clear on it." (In other words, the question was planted. The reporter was told what to ask, and Obama was told which reporters to recognize.) [67091]

Obama's answer to the planted question is: "They [U.S. troops in West Africa] are, first of all, not treating patients. Second of all, they are not there voluntarily. It's part of their mission that's been assigned to them by their commanders and ultimately by me, their commander-in-chief. They are already, by definition if they're in the military, under more circumscribed conditions [than civilian doctors and nurses]." Obama notes that the civilian health care workers are not as easily monitored as soldiers, and says, "We don't want to do anything that's not based on science and best practices." (HotAir.com's Noah Rothman writes, "...Huh? I'm not trying to be reflexively contrary, but how does it make any sense that soldiers whose movements and mission is [sic; are] 'circumscribed' should be isolated and monitored, but voluntary health care workers, who cannot be tracked, should not be avoid being quarantined if they are suspected of displaying Ebola-like symptoms? Moreover, if the aim is not to scare health care workers from voluntarily traveling to West Africa, what does he think an involuntary quarantine of American troops will do? Did I miss the conscription act that [Obama] signed into law? Why wouldn't... cavalier disregard for the interests of American troops serving at their own discretion overseas have a depressing effect on future enlistments? The White House's logic simply does not make any sense.") [67118]

At WashingtonPost.com *The Atlantic's* Jeffrey Goldberg writes, "The Obama administration's anger is 'red-hot' over Israel's settlement policies, and the [Prime Minister Binyamin] Netanyahu government openly expresses contempt for Obama's understanding of the Middle East. Profound changes in the relationship may be coming." Goldberg relates that "a senior Obama administration official" referred to Netanyahu as "a chickenshit." (Netanyahu served in the Israeli Defense Forces and was wounded. Obama served in... the Illinois State Senate.) According to Goldberg, "The relationship between these two administrations—dual guarantors of the putatively 'unbreakable' bond between the U.S. and Israel—is now the worst it's ever been, and it stands to get significantly worse after the November midterm elections. We are taking this action as a precautionary step, to safeguard U.S. government personnel and facilities, and the visitors to those facilities. The reasons for this action are self-evident: the continued public calls by terrorist organizations for attacks on the homeland and elsewhere, including against law enforcement and other

government officials, and the acts of violence targeted at government personnel and installations in Canada and elsewhere recently. Given world events, prudence dictates a heightened vigilance in the protection of U.S. government installations and our personnel. As we have stated in prior advisories, we urge state and local governments and their law enforcement personnel, along with critical infrastructure owners and operators, to be equally vigilant, particularly in guarding against potential small-scale attacks by a lone offender or a small group of individuals. Likewise, we continually urge the public at large to be vigilant and report any suspicious activities to appropriate authorities." [67016, 67017, 67127]

'She doesn't want to agree to continue to be confined to a residence beyond the two days,' Hyman said. Maine health officials have said they expect Hickox to agree to be quarantined at her home until 21 days have passed since her last potential exposure to the virus." [67018]

The government of Australia announces it will issue no new travel visas for visitors from the Ebola-affected countries. Those who have already received visas will be subject to a three-week quarantine. [67032, 67033]

Nurse Amber Vinson leaves Emory University Hospital after no longer showing signs of the Ebola virus. [67033]

Maine health officials say they are prepared, if necessary, to legally enforce the state's quarantine of nurse Kaci Hickox, who had been treating Ebola patients in Africa. Department of Health and Human Services Commissioner Mary Mayhew states, "We do not want to have to legally enforce in-home quarantine. We're confident that selfless health workers who were brave enough to care for Ebola patients in a foreign country will be willing to take reasonable steps to protect residents of their own country. However we are willing to pursue legal authority if necessary to ensure risk is minimized for Mainers." [67113, 67114]

Donald Trump remarks, "You're going to see a whole new kind of 'hell to pay'" if any of the U.S. troops Obama sent to West Africa come down with the Ebola virus. But Trump notes that Obama "has been hit from so many angles, for so many mistakes that he's

The White House—or the Executive Office of the President (EOP)—regularly gets hit with hapless cyberattacks from all corners of the web, but the one revealed Tuesday, said people familiar with the situation, has been much more significant in duration and strength, putting the system on the fritz for nearly two weeks, if not longer. A White House official confirmed on Tuesday that the White House had 'identified activity of concern on the unclassified EOP network.' Network outages are not uncommon in the White House, but they typically last no more than a few hours. For the system to be damaged for days on end indicates an attack of significant strength. 'Certainly a variety of actors find our networks attractive targets and seek access to sensitive government information. We are still assessing the activity of concern, and we are not in a position to provide any additional details at this time,' the White House official said in a statement." (It is believed that the hacking was done by the Russian government.) [67055, 67056, 67057, 67099, 67123]

Fox News' Adam Housley obtains a State Department memorandum that shows the administration is considering bring Ebola patients to the United States for treatment even though they are not U.S. citizens. The document states, "There are four essential elements to every medical evacuation: 1. Medical evacuation capacity; 2. Overflight, refueling and landing permission; 3. A hospital able and willing to treat the patient; and 4. Funds to backstop reimbursement, about \$200,000 for medevac and \$300,000 for treatment per case." (With the federal government almost \$18 trillion in debt, Obama is considering spending \$500,000 per person to bring non-Americans to the United States for Ebola treatment.) Townhall.com's Katie Pavlich notes, "On page four of the memo, there is an admission that contracting Ebola as a non-citizen makes an individual ineligible for a visa due to a 'significant' threats to public health and therefore executive action would be necessary to reverse the policy." (While most Americans support a travel ban—70 percent in a Rasmussen poll—the State Department supports not only *not* imposing a travel ban, but *lifting restrictions* on those who are already known to have Ebola.) Housley reports that the State Department claims the document was "drafted by a midlevel official, but [was not] not cleared by senior leaders." (In other words, "We got caught.") The State Department does not explain why a "mid-level official" should have the responsibility of drafting such significant policies—or why the document went from the State Department to the Department of Homeland Security for inter-department coordination without anyone above "mid-level" knowing about it. White House press secretary Josh Earnest claims, "That [bringing Ebola patients to the United States] certainly hasn't happened so far. I don't know of any plans to do that." Commerce Secretary Penny Pritzker says, "Yes, the private sector creates jobs." (Whether Pritzker has advised Hillary Clinton of that fact is not known.) [67194]

The Obama administration implements a new policy that will essentially allow American women to "sell" U.S. citizenship to foreigners. DailyCaller.com explains, "The change means that a woman who is a U.S. citizen can be hired by a reproductive medical clinic to become pregnant overseas and to give birth in China, Saudi Arabia, or anywhere else, and then effectively hand a U.S. passport to the baby. That's a huge benefit to the child, because it makes him or her a U.S citizen, even if he or she never breathes American air, or lives among Americans, knows English or shares any American cultural norms or ideas with their natural-born American citizens. It is also a huge benefit for the parents, because they too can get citizenship once their child becomes an adult. That citizenship allows them—and their other children—to move to the United States in time for them to access Obamacare or Medicare benefits in their retirement. That's also a huge benefit to the companies that broker the birth contracts. They can now raise their prices to overseas customers because they can deliver U.S. citizenship with the baby, no matter where the parents are living or where the child is born." [67086]

A PBS documentary on *Frontline* makes it clear that the Obama administration did little or nothing to stop the growing threat of ISIS even though it was warned repeatedly that the group was gaining fighters and territory. [67052, 67115]

On *The Daily Show*, Democrat Texas gubernatorial candidate Wendy Davis whines that redistricting by Republicans has made it difficult for Democrats to win races. (The argument is only valid, of course, for local races. It is totally irrelevant for state-wide races—such as the one she is about to lose by a big margin on November 4.) [67090]

On *The O'Reilly Factor*, Charles Krauthammer observes, "This really is a Republican tide. I think the chances are very good, maybe 70 percent, that Republicans retake the Senate and for good reason. The reason is that this is essentially a referendum on Obama. In 2010 it was a referendum on his ideology: the overreach with ObamaCare, the stimulus, cap and trade. And now, six years in, it's a referendum on ideology, but now added on to that, it's on sheer [in]competence. When you are not only the party *in* government, you are the party *of* government, and you preach about the glories of government and in fact you get Hillary saying the other day, you know, it's not corporations that create jobs, the implication being it's government, then if you are incompetent and lose the confidence of the people you're in trouble, and you've [also] got every scandal there is, everything from the VA, to the ObamaCare rollout to the Secret Service and now with Ebola, where they're running around, have no idea what to do and they change the protocols every other day. So, given the climate, I think it would be—you know, if the GOP can't win back the Senate in a climate like this, maybe the party ought to look for another country." [67103, 67106]

In a candidate debate in Louisiana, Senator Mary Landrieu (D-LA), who has been trying to distance herself from Obama, also finds it necessary to (somewhat) distance herself

from unpopular Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-NV). Asked if she would again support Reid for the leadership position, Landrieu replies, "I'm gonna [sic] make my decision. I said, a couple months ago, uh, that I would, but I'm gonna make my decision based on what is before me and who is running. ... I'm gonna wait to see what the leadership looks like, because, let me just say this, you're pressing me on it so I'm gonna press back. My job is to represent this state. My job is to get things done for this state. I don't go there to support Mitch McConnell or Harry Reid, I go there to represent this state. So we'll see. I think Harry Reid gets beat up more than he deserves, and I'm not saying yes, and I'm not saying no. I'm gonna see what the leadership is, what the line-up is, and make my decision based on that." (Landrieu's answer is nonsensical. First, if the Democrats retain control of the Senate, Reid will again run for Majority Leader, will likely be unopposed, and will win the position again. Landrieu will not challenge Reid. Additionally, what does it even mean to say, "I'm gonna see what the leadership is" when the task is to choose that leadership? That is like saying, "I'll decide who to vote for after I see who wins." Landrieu did not win any points with her remarks—if anyone even understood them.) [67119]

In Long Island, New York, a man beheads his mother, drags the head and body out to the street, and then kills himself by jumping in front of an oncoming train. FoxNews.com reports, "The female victim has been identified by Farmingdale State College officials as Patricia Ward, a longtime professor at the university who taught language arts. ... Witnesses told the [New York] Post that some of the woman's neighbors initially thought the headless body in the street was a Halloween prank, only to discover the body was real after attempting to lift it." On October 29 Ebola nurse Kaci Hickox appears on NBC's *Today* show (via satellite) and insists, "I don't plan on sticking to the guidelines. I remain appalled by these home quarantine policies that have been forced upon me, even though I am in perfectly good health and feeling strong and have been this entire time completely symptom free. I truly believe this policy is not scientifically nor constitutionally just, and so I'm not going to sit around and be bullied around by politicians and be forced to stay in my home when I am not a risk to the American public. ...I will go to court to fight for my freedom." On Fox & Friends, Brian Kilmeade says to columnist Charles Krauthammer, "A big editorial in The Washington Post [suggests that] our relations with Turkey have never been worse. And now with Israel the same exact thing. According to a high-ranking senior Obama administration official, personally ripping into Benjamin Netanyahu, calling him chicken [bleep], because they said he's too worried about starting a war, only worried about his own political skin, getting real personal about a guy that's just coming off a war [with Hamas] the administration didn't want him to fight. What's behind this?" Krauthammer replies, "Look, I think there is animosity between the leadership, [Obama], and the prime minister, unlike any in the history of Israel. It goes back to 1948. This is unique. However, there is an underlying policy issue here. What the Israelis are worried

about more than anything else is that Obama cuts a bad deal with Iran. The deadline is in three weeks and no one is sure what's going to happen. But the way that the administration and the western powers had been making one concession after another in the middle of the negotiations as a way to almost beseech the Iranians to go ahead and make a deal, it looks as if, if there is a deal, Iran will be a threshold nuclear power, meaning it'll be three months away, four months away and any time it wants in the future of getting a nuke and that for Israel would be an existential threat. ... The Federal Reserve announces it will end its bond-buying program, stating, "There has been a substantial improvement in the outlook for the labor market since the inception of [the] current asset-purchase program. Moreover, the [Fed] continues to see sufficient underlying strength in the broader economy to support ongoing progress toward maximum employment in a context of price stability." (In other words, the Fed will stop its "Qualitative Easing" scheme of creating money out of thin air—at least until the stock market drops and it is pressured to re-inflate the money supply.) WSJ.com writes, "The program ends with mixed reviews. While it clearly didn't cause the inflation outbreak some predicted, it also didn't clearly lead to a surge of economic output or hiring. (Some believe the Fed's Qualitative Easing program was a success because it has not resulted in massive price inflation. Of course, its has resulted in price inflation: in the stock market. That inflation has not been seen to a great extent in consumer prices because the newly-created money has essentially remained in the stock market. Once businesses start spending and banks start lending, hundreds of billions—if not trillions—of dollars will enter the consumer economy. At that point, prices of goods and services will skyrocket.) I have been on the battlefield many times. I have risked my life for the country and I am not prepared to make concessions that will endanger our state. It must be understood that our supreme interests with security and the unity of Jerusalem first and foremost are not among the top concerns of those anonymous elements that are attacking us and me personally, because the attack on me comes only because I am defending the State of Israel." Meanwhile, according to Algemeiner.com, "Rabbi Marvin Hier, the founder and Dean of the Simon Wiesenthal Center, has called on ... Obama to 'name, apologize for, and repudiate' the anonymous official quoted in an Atlantic Magazine article describing Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu as a 'chickenshit.' ... In a telephone call with The Algemeiner from his Los Angeles office, an incensed Rabbi Hier declared: 'It is rather ironic that a senior American official is prepared to curse his friends, yet when it comes to the mortal enemies of the United States—as the Iranians discovered during the recent nuclear negotiation—praise is heaped on them." (It is Obama who will be proven to be the coward, because he does not have the courage to identify, apologize for, and repudiate the official—especially if it is one of his administration's key Jew-haters, such as advisor Valerie Jarrett, National Security Advisor Susan Rice, or U.N. They're the improvisational jazz musicians of American diplomacy, always ready with just the right word to solidify alliances, avoid unnecessary confrontation, and reassure Americans they know exactly what they're doing in the face of bloody violence. This is what happens when the academic Left runs American foreign policy. ...[T]he American academy has been characterized by two prime impulses: one substantive, the other stylistic. largely—if not entirely—be traced back to America's sins and the sins of our Western allies, most notably Israel. ... Asked if officials were trying to identify the source of the "chickenshit" remark, Psaki says, "No." [67165, 67166]

Blogger IowaHawk tweets, "Washington DC in a nutshell: hack calling somebody 'chickenshit' while insisting on anonymity." [67080]

HotAir.com comments, "As a million people on Twitter are noting this afternoon, 'the chickensh*t' served as a team leader in the IDF's special forces unit, Sayeret Matkal. Team Hopenchange isn't questioning his personal bravery, though, they're questioning something they naturally consider more important—political bravery. Which is interesting because The One's [Obama has] shown plenty of gutlessness on international affairs himself over the past few years. "And," continues Earnest, "the fact of the matter is, uh, the United States continues to have, uh, to this day, an unbreakable commitment to the security of the nation of Israel. That's why you see the ongoing close coordination when it comes to matters related to Israel's security and that's why, that's one reason, that [Obama's] national security adviser Susan Rice is hosting, uh, a high-level Israeli delegation to talk about these matters. Uh, these are discussions that are communed every six months and they just happen to be, uh, uh, starting up tomorrow. ... I think the fact of the matter is, Ed, what I'm mostly concerned about is two things. Bibi instead of damaging his coalition continues through today... At the beginning of his administration Obama actions were a signal that he must be obeyed. But the Prime Minister wouldn't kneel down to his demands and the Israeli people wouldn't oust the Premier. [The] thin-skinned [Obama] does not react well to being disobeyed. That more than anything caused the anger driving Obama to 'call' Netanyahu 'chickenshit.'" [67288, 67289, 67290]

From the White House, Obama speaks on the Ebola issue—with several doctors in lab coats standing behind him. (Why Obama thinks Americans believe doctors wear lab coats everywhere they go is not clear. When astronauts visit the White House they do not show up in their space suits.) Obama says, "If we are not dealing with this problem there, it will come here." (Once again, Obama seems incapable of comprehending that Ebola victims can be treated in Africa and at the same time a travel ban can keep infected people out of the United States. With an overwhelming number of Americans in favor of travel restrictions, it is difficult to understand why Obama is so intransigent on the issue. His ulterior motive is not yet clear, but he likely has one.) "We don't run and hide when there's a problem. Because we don't react to our fears, but instead, we respond with commonsense and skill and courage. That's the best of our history—not fear, not hysteria, not misinformation. We react clearly and firmly, even when others are losing their heads. That's part of the reason why we're effective. That's part of the reason why people look to us." (That many Americans, and legislators of both parties, do not agree with Obama in the travel ban issues does not make them "hysterical.") "America has never been defined by fear. We are defined by courage and passion and hope and selflessness and sacrifice... So I put those on notice who think that we should hide from these problems. That's not who we are. That's not who I am. That's not who these folks are. This is America. We do things differently." (Obama is using his trademark straw man argument, incorrectly defining the views of those who oppose his in order to make them appear unreasonable. There are valid arguments on both sides of the quarantine and travel ban issue; it is not "Obama is right" versus "everyone else is hiding and hysterical.") [67072, 67073, 67074, 67076, 67183, 67192]

"And some of these men and women [standing behind me] have recently returned [from Ebola areas in Africa]; others are heading there shortly. But all of them have signed up to leave their homes and their loved ones to head straight into the heart of the Ebola epidemic... And we need to call them what they are, which is American heroes. They deserve our gratitude, and they deserve to be treated with dignity and with respect." (Obama is suggesting that anyone who disagrees with his opposition to a travel ban does not consider medical workers risking their lives in Africa to be heroic. No one has made any such statements.) "When I hear people talking about American leadership, and then are promoting [sic; they promote] policies that would avoid leadership and have us running in the opposite direction and hiding under the covers, it makes me a little frustrated..." (A travel ban is not "hiding under the covers." It is prudence.) "And it's... our ability to learn from mistakes that are made, and our ability to work through problems that are really complicated, and to see something through, and not lose our heads; to have grace under pressure and apply ourselves with slow, steady effort—the kind that change and progress requires [sic]. ... We're at our best when we are standing up and taking

responsibility, even when it requires us making sacrifices, especially when it requires us making sacrifices." (Obama should be reminded that going bowling rather than complying with quarantine rules is not exactly taking responsibility or sacrificing.) "It is how we help others around the world that's important." (Obama is incorrect. The first responsibility of the government is to protect the lives and the rights of U.S. citizens—not help others around the world.) Obama also says, "I'm confident we will contain and eventually snuff out this outbreak of Ebola." [67072, 67073, 67074, 67076, 67183, 67192]

Secretary of Defense Chuck Hagel orders a 21-day period of "supervised isolation" for all troops returning from Ebola missions. (Hagel apparently believes the American people will not equate "supervised isolation" with "quarantine.") Whether Obama considers Hagel's policy "hiding under the covers" and not demonstrating leadership is not stated. [67077, 67078, 67118]

In San Mateo, California, a doctor who had been treating Ebola patients in Liberia is placed under "modified quarantine." The local CBS affiliate in San Francisco reports, "Dr. Colin Bucks returned to the Bay Area on Friday [October 24], but no state or federal quarantine orders were in place at the time. Dr. Bucks is not experiencing any symptoms of Ebola, but he is the first Californian to be quarantined under the new guidelines. Bucks is considered by health officials to be at 'some risk.'" [67175, 67176]

NJ.com reports that Nobel Prize-winning doctor and medical researcher Dr. Bruce Beutler says he supports New Jersey's mandatory quarantine for health care workers who have been exposed to Ebola patients. Beutler states, "I favor it, because it's not entirely clear that they [asymptomatic people like nurse Kaci Hickox] can't transmit the disease. It may not be absolutely true that those without symptoms can't transmit the disease, because we don't have the numbers to back that up. It could be [that] people develop significant viremia [viruses enter the bloodstream and gain access to the rest of the body], and become able to transmit the disease before they have a fever, even. People may have said that without symptoms you can't transmit Ebola. I'm not sure about that being 100 percent true. There's a lot of variation with viruses. ... Even if someone is asymptomatic you cannot rely on people to report themselves if they get a fever. You can't just depend on the goodwill of people to confine the disease like that—even healthcare workers. They behave very irresponsibly." [67177, 67178]

Attorney General Eric Holder is asked, "[W]hat's the one decision you made that you wish you could do over?" He responds, "I think that—I think about the subpoena to the Fox reporter, [James] Rosen. I think that I could have been a little more careful in looking at the language that was contained in the filing that we made with the court. He was labeled as a... as a co-conspirator. I mean, you had to do that as a result of the statute, but there are ways in which I think that could have been done differently, done better. And that's one of the reasons why I thought the criticism that we received because of that, and the AP matter as well, was something that we had to act upon and why we put in place this review of our—the way in which we interact with the media." (Holder does not regret persecuting Rosen or going after his family's private communications; he only

regrets how it looked to the media. Lovers of liberty and a free press should not find Holder's comments calming.) [67075, 67141]

James Rosen responds, "Throughout this ordeal for my family and me, I have tried to keep my head down and continue covering—and breaking—the news. I consider myself blessed to have an employer in Fox News, and a boss in Roger Ailes, who have stood by me and enabled me to remain focused on what matters most to me in professional terms: first-rate journalism. At some later point, I may have more to say about this entire controversy, which—as commentators from across the ideological spectrum have noted—does indeed raise serious concerns about the state of press freedoms under the present administration. Suffice to say for now that the attorney general's latest comments about my case, like his previous remarks, scarcely address the relevant facts of his conduct." [67141]

At RealClearPolitics.com Jonah Goldberg observes that in trying to protect vulnerable Democrat Senators from having to vote on tough issues Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-NV) he has in fact hurt them. The Republican candidates are now using to their advantage statistics that show many Senators "voted with Obama" 95-97 percent of the time. Those Senators can hardly say, for example, "I stood up to Obama on the controversial vote on the Keystone XL pipeline!"—because Reid never allowed a vote on that, or any other, controversial issue. In residing over a do-nothing Senate, Reid has turned quite a few Democrat Senators into do-nothing legislators. Goldberg writes, "This live-for-today approach—what GOP consultant Brad Blakeman calls 'momentarianism'—protects the short-term interests of political elites but harms the long-term interests of just about everyone. It prevents Republicans from forging creative strategies for winning over Democrats and vice versa. But it also denies letting voters know what politicians are really for by concealing their true positions in a fog of procedural nonsense. Gridlock is great when it reflects principled disagreements between duly elected representatives of the people, not when it's used to protect politicians from their own constituents." [67109]

According to NYTimes.com, "A new poll from the Institute of Politics at Harvard University contains a surprising finding: Slightly more than half of young Americans who say they will 'definitely be voting' in the midterm elections would prefer a Republican-controlled Congress. So-called millennial voters, those age 18 to 29, have been big backers of Democrats since 2004, and helped put ... Obama in office. In 2010, the last time Harvard polled young voters before a midterm election, 55 percent of those very likely to vote favored a Democratic Congress, while 43 percent preferred Republican control. The new survey, released Wednesday, found a preference for Republican control among very likely voters, 51 percent to 47 percent. The institute's polling director, John Della Volpe, said the findings suggest that the youth vote may now be up for grabs. 'The period of time from 2004 to 2012 where Democrats maintained a significant margin of young voters appears to be over,' Mr. Della Volpe said. 'The youth vote is now returning back to pre-2004 levels, where it is actually a key swing vote.'" In the 2010 poll, 55 percent said they were voting Democrat and 43 percent said they were voting Republican. According to the poll, 33 percent of the surveyed millennials consider

themselves "liberal" or "moderate leaning liberal," while 35 percent consider themselves "conservative" or "moderate leaning conservative." If the poll is anywhere near accurate, Democrats could suffer significant losses on November 4. On the other hand, only 26 percent of millennials say they will even bother to vote. According to a Pew Research Center poll, 57 percent of registered Hispanic voters support or lean toward the Democrat candidate for Congress, while 28 percent support or lean toward the Republican. (In 2010 the numbers were 65 percent and 22 percent.) [67161]

On *Outnumbered*, Democrat consultant Kirsten Powers comments on the problems within the White House: "I really think that [Obama] is the problem, I don't think it's the staff. ... I think that [Obama] tends to surround himself with people who suck up to him, you know? And he doesn't—he claims that he had this idea like Lincoln that he was... going to have all these people that are [sic; who were] going to be disagreeing with each other and offering different points of view, but I don't think he really has that. I think he has a lot of, sort of, Kool-Aid drinkers who think everything he does is right and I think he needs to be able to have people there to confront him." [67160, 67199]

On his radio program Glenn Beck interviews Erik Prince, founder of the private security firm Blackwater, Inc. and author of *Civilian Warriors: The Inside Story of Blackwater* and the Unsung Heroes of the War on Terror. When Beck says, "The people in Benghazi that were killed, private contractors, we just left them behind, just discarded them. I think we were running guns over to Syria," Prince interjects, "NO. Actually missiles. ...Look, the reason that annex was there, they [CIA operatives] were buying back missiles from the Libyans and shipping them to Syria." [67203]

DailyCaller.com reports, "The Democrat-controlled Senate Select Committee on Ethics said that it never received a complaint pertaining to Democratic Sen. Harry Reid and the Obama administration's efforts to approve visas for certain investors, according to a government watchdog group, despite previously confirming that it received the complaint—and saying that it opened an investigation. ...Senate Ethics Committee Chief Counsel and Staff Director John C. Sassaman called Cause of Action to state over the phone that the committee 'never received' the complaint, according to Cause of Action executive director Dan Epstein. But Cause of Action received a signed returned receipt from the Senate mail dated Dec. 20, 2013, according to the organization." [67170]

More instances of voting machines switching Republican votes to the Democrats are reported—this time in Moline, Illinois. [67146]

Bryan Preston reports at PJMedia.com, "An election integrity watchdog group is suing the state of Maryland, alleging that it has discovered massive and ongoing fraudulent voting by non-U.S. citizens in one county. But because of the way that the non-citizens are able to cast votes in elections, the fraud is likely happening in every single county and subdivision across the state. The group believes that the illegal voting has been happening for years. The group, Virginia Voters Alliance, says that it compared how voters in

Frederick County filled out jury duty statements compared with their voting records. The group's investigation found that thousands of people in Frederick County who stated that they are not U.S. citizens on jury duty forms went on to cast votes in elections. Either they failed to tell the truth when they were summoned for jury duty, or they cast illegal votes. Both are crimes. The same group previously found that about 40,000 people are registered to vote in both Virginia and Maryland. It is a federal crime to cast votes if you are not legally eligible to vote. Non-citizens, whether in the country legally or not, are prohibited from voting in most local and all state and federal elections. Yet the VVA investigation found that hundreds of non-citizens have been voting in Frederick County, Maryland. One in seven Maryland residents are non-U.S. citizens. ...Maryland state law makes it easier for non-citizens, both those present legally and those in the country against the law, to vote. Maryland issues drivers licenses to legal and illegal aliens. Driver's licenses in turn make it easier under the Motor Voter law to register to vote. Maryland also offers copious taxpayer-funded social programs to non-citizens in the state." [67190]

Vice President Joe Biden campaigns for Congressman Seth Moulton in Massachusetts. (That Biden has to campaign for a Democrat in far-left-leaning *Massachusetts* is a clear sign that Democrats are very worried about losses on November 4.)

In New York's 21st Congressional District, GOP candidate Elise Stefanik has an 18-point poll lead over Democratic and Working Families Party candidate Aaron Woolf. (Congressman Bill Owens (D-NY) did not seek reelection.) In the state's 19th District, Congressman Chris Gibson (R-NY) has a whopping 23-point poll lead over Democrat candidate Sean Eldridge—despite the fact that Eldridge is fabulously wealthy and the "husband" of Facebook co-founder Chris Hughes. (FreeBeacon.com writes, "Eldridge perfectly embodies the hypocrisy and self-serving douchebaggery voters find so obnoxious about entitled liberals. He preaches about the need to 'reduce the influence of special interest money in politics,' while taking money from labor unions, Silicon Valley CEOs, Goldman Sachs executives, billionaire financiers George Soros and Tom Steyer, and his multi-millionaire husband.") [67179, 67180, 67181]

WatchDog.org reports, "One day after billionaire Tom Steyer welcomed the Democratic Party elite into his home for a \$400,000 fundraiser, he was jetting cross-country to meet with fellow billionaire George Soros and a top Obama aide in the West Wing of the White House. It was Feb. 20, and the two-hour meeting was with John Podesta, counselor to ... Obama and fourth in line of importance under the chief of staff. The visit also included Michael Vachon, Soros' spokesperson and chief adviser to his international hedge fund, Soros Fund Management. In the following months, millions flowed from the billionaires and Podesta's family to liberal U.S. Senate candidates Gary Peters of Michigan, Bruce Braley of Iowa, Mark Udall of Colorado and Jeanne Shaheen of New Hampshire, Watchdog.org has learned. Shaheen and Udall, who are the only incumbents in the group, also were at Steyer's soiree. 'The whole thing is very Third World—billionaires meet with the regime and get policy decisions and suddenly money flows to candidates,' said Phil Kerpen, president of the free-market advocacy group American Commitment. 'I don't blame them for trying. I blame the administration for agreeing.'

Steyer and Soros are no strangers to the White House, having visited numerous times in the past. But if the pair discussed fundraising at 1600 Pennsylvania Ave., Podesta would be violating a law that prohibits political activities by the Executive Branch. Steyer would meet again with Podesta in the West Wing on March 31, for six hours, but this time without Soros." (While Democrats and the mainstream media whine about the influence of the Koch brothers, who donate millions to conservative causes, they are silent about the influence of Steyer and Soros—who give tens of millions to leftist causes.) [67125]

According to BirtherReport.com, "a recently discovered report from a Maui Police Detective reveals that" plane crash victim Loretta Fuddy did not have a heart attack, as was originally reported. Instead, "She drowned.... with her life jacket on." (Fuddy, the director of the Hawaii Department of Health who was involved in the Obama birth certificate controversy, was the sole victim of the crash of a small plane off the coast of Hawaii. The "crash" was actually a very smooth emergency landing on the water, which gave all the passengers time to put on life jackets and exit the plane. All the passengers were rescued floating in the water only a few hundred yards form the shore. No passengers were injured. Fuddy was the only person to die. BirtherReport.com notes, "Shortly before the plane crash, Fuddy had been named in an affidavit requesting that a Grand Jury launch an investigation into Obama's forged birth certificate and Fuddy's role, if any, in the production of it. Hence, there was an almost immediate suspicion that something was strange about the timing of her death. ... A public records request, made to the MPD [Maui Police Department], has revealed that the Medical Examiner's preliminary cause of death for Loretta Fuddy was drowning. The public records got lost in the shuffle on the requestor's end, and were not discovered until late August. They were forwarded to me in September. ... Loretta Fuddy's cause of death was changed, not just a little, but between two very disparate causes. Drowning takes precise testing to prove and it is virtually impossible to prove cardiac arrhythmia. This slight of hand pretty much screams that someone was trying to hide something about Fuddy's death. The fact that her official autopsy report, in spite of being a public record, was so heavily redacted that virtually every medical finding disappeared into a black hole, lends credence to this assertion. Want to make people suspicious? Start hiding stuff." [67129]

A Monmouth University poll shows the Republican U.S. Senate candidate in Georgia, David Perdue, with a 49-41 percent lead over Democrat Michelle Nunn. (Georgia requires a run-off election if no candidate tops 50 percent.) [67138, 67185]

In a Louisiana State University debate, Senator Mary Landrieu (D-LA) says, "I support a strong border and have for many years as chair of the Homeland Security Committee. I've increased the number of border agents from 15,000 to 20,000 and joined John McCain, a friend of my opponent here, in passing a comprehensive immigration bill to double it from 20,000 to 40,000. I also support a fence, 700 miles long that can tell the difference between whether a deer crosses or a person so we can allocate our resources effectively. So these attacks that I'm not for a secure border are absolutely false." (In June 2013 Landrieu said, "I voted for the dumb fence once. I'm not going to do it again because I learned my mistake when I went down there to look at it and realized that we

could build two dumb fences or three dumb fences, and it's not working. So I am simply not going to waste the money to do something that I know will not work.") [67274]

Politico writes, "Most Americans don't want to get rid of Obamacare. They just don't share its fundamental goal of universal coverage anymore. And not only did the political benefits that Democrats thought the 2010 law would eventually bring them not materialize, opposition has only grown, according to an analysis of multiple polls taken between 2010 and last month. 'There have been backlashes, but never like this,' said Robert Blendon, a professor at the Harvard School of Public Health and co-author of the analysis released Wednesday by the New England Journal of Medicine. That backlash doesn't appear directed at the mechanics of the law but at its underlying core principle. Only 47 percent of Americans agree that it's the government's job to make sure everyone has health coverage, down from 69 percent in 2006, the analysis found. That shift is particularly pronounced among likely voters. Of those who are most likely to show up at the polls on Nov. 4, one in four believe in this principle." Guy Benson adds at Townhall.com, "In Marquette's Wisconsin poll, Obamacare is upside-down by 20 points (34/54), and Harvard's poll of millennials shows a 57 percent majority of young voters disapproving of the law. The vast majority of Americans would like to see the law repealed or scaled back with significant changes." [67221, 67222]

On *The O'Reilly Factor*, Charles Krauthammer says that even if the Republicans win the Senate, "They are not going to win in 2016 by hiring a new PR [public relations] firm or coming up with a slogan. The only thing they need to do and the most important thing they need to do is to show the country in the next two years—if they control the two houses of Congress—that they have a governing agenda. Right now, they are the party of 'no,' which is all you can be if you control only one house. ... The only reason to retake the Senate is to enact the agenda that would come out of the House into the Senate and confront Obama with a veto threat. Sharpen the differences. Show the country you are not the party of no, that you're a party that's prepared." [67147]

Also on the program, *Wall Street Journal* editor Jason Riley says there is a "racial angle" to Obama's resistance to a travel ban to protect Americans from the Ebola virus. "This administration is obsessed with race and racial slights and maintaining street cred with the black community. And I think that has played into this decision regarding the Ebola policy, definitely. ...[T]he administration's concerns are political. They don't want to do anything to offend the black community. And a policy that bans black people from West Africa from coming to the U.S.... could be spun that way, and they don't want that. Particularly among a group that many need to turn out in higher than usual numbers next week in order to hang on to the Senate." (Riley happens to be black.) [67169]

On October 30 a CBS poll shows Republicans ahead of Democrats 50-42 in a "generic Congressional ballot" question. (The spread was 49-43 on October 8.) The GOP also holds the lead on the issues of immigration (+2), the economy (+7), foreign policy (+10, and responding to terrorism (+20). Townhall.com political editor Guy Benson notes, "The eight-point Congressional ballot margin for Republicans is wider than CBS News'

last pre-election survey in 2010, which seems newsworthy, yet CBS News doesn't seem very excited about reporting their own results." [67142]

In a Quinnipiac poll, Congressman Cory Gardner (R-CO) leads Senator Mark Udall (D-CO) by seven points. [67142, 67149, 67196]

According to a University of Arkansas poll, Tom Cotton leads Senator Mark Pryor (D-AR) by 13 points. [67142]

An Elon poll shows Senator Kay Hagan (D-NC) with a four-point lead over Thom Tillis. [67142]

In Virginia, Senator Mark Warner (D-VA) leads GOP challenger Ed Gillespie 44-40 percent. (Gillespie was once down 29 points. Warner is still favored to win, but for Warner to be six points under 50 percent only days before an election will not help Democrat strategists sleep well.) [67239]

In a Marquette Law School poll of likely voters, Wisconsin Governor Scott Walker opens up a seven-point lead, 50-43, over Democrat challenger Mary Burke—who dropped in the polls after Obama's appearance with her. (Burke has not been helped by reports that her own family fired her from its Trek bicycle business in the 1990s. Burke claims, "We reorganized and eliminated the position that I had." Townhall.com's Guy Benson reports, "Multiple former executives at Trek Bicycle now say Burke was forced out of her position by her own family as a consequence of her terrible management, and a fellow member of a Democratic administration referred to her leadership as 'a disaster' in a contemporaneous assessment. And now she wants to be governor. Even as GOP-aligned pollsters are privately warning that Marquette's Walker +7 projection is more bullish than their internal findings, this can't be the front page coverage Team Burke was hoping to see five days out from the election: 'Scott Walker's Opponent Was Fired By Her Own Family... For Incompetence.'") [67156, 67167, 67184, 67267]

In Neenah, Wisconsin, a postal worker discards 879 Republican political mailings into a dumpster rather than deliver them. According to Watchdog.org, "A resident had witnessed the mail carrier dump the campaign literature... There were no reports that campaign mailers from Democratic Party candidates have been similarly mishandled." Robert Rukes, special agent with the U.S. Postal Service's inspector general's office in Chicago, tells Wisconsin Reporter, "Based upon our investigation, this was nothing done toward a specific candidate or party. It looks like it was a decision made by the carrier, and it was not a good decision. ... A lot of times, what happened in this situation, you have a carrier who felt overwhelmed with the volume of mail so they [sic; he or she] decided to discard some of the mail without delivering." (Americans who pay the salaries of the postal workers may not be too happy to here that mail gets discarded "a lot of times.") [67358, 67359]

In Iowa early voting, Democrats are about five points behind their 2010 pace. [67142]

Also in Iowa, Hillary Clinton—fresh off her absurd assertion that corporations and businesses do not create jobs—claims that if Republican U.S. Senate candidate Joni Ernst "gets her way," women will lose access to mammograms because Ernst opposes ObamaCare. (Clinton is not only wrong, ObamaCare actually restricts access to mammograms because it forces insurers to follow U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) guidelines that call for screening after age 50—rather than at age 40.) [67234, 67235]

In Kansas, where Democrats hope to unseat Senator Pat Roberts (R-KS), about 54 percent of the early votes were cast by registered Republicans; 31 percent were cast by Democrats; independents cast the remainder. Clay Barker, Kansas Republican Party Executive Director, states, "Early voting is turning out as our voter data models predicted and is consistent with early voting patterns in 2010 and 2012. Republican voters are building a substantial lead over Democrats that is increasing with each passing day. There were no October surprises." Dr. Milton Wolf, a cousin of Obama (on his mother's side of the family) and a Tea Party candidate who lost to Roberts in the GOP primary, writes at Facebook, "I urge you, I urge all Kansans, to set aside our differences and vote Republican in this critical Senate race on November 4th. Whatever your opinion of Pat Roberts, his re-election to the United States Senate may be the deciding factor that dethrones Harry Reid and elevates solid constitutional conservatives like Ted Cruz, Mike Lee and Rand Paul." [67214, 67242, 67266]

The Kansas Republican Party registers a complaint with the Federal Election Commission, charging that the Kansas Democrat Party has violated federal election laws by working to support independent candidate Greg Orman. (The Democrat candidate withdrew from the race earlier in the year.) That Orman would likely vote with Senate Democrats if elected is irrelevant to the issue of campaign law. The Republicans note, "Any activities or expenditures made by the Kansas Democrats on behalf of Orman... are in-kind contributions to Orman and is [sic; are] subject to the \$5,000 combined state and local party contribution limit and reporting requirements." (The FEC will no doubt "investigate" the issue, but conveniently for Orman will likely not do so until after the election.) [67296]

RollCall.com's Stuart Rothenberg observes that "Obama is likely to have the worst midterm numbers" since Harry S. Truman. "Truman lost a total of 83 House seats during his two midterms (55 seats in 1946 and 28 seats in 1950), while Republican Dwight Eisenhower lost a combined 66 House seats in the 1954 and 1958 midterms. Obama had one midterm [2010] where his party lost 63 House seats, and Democrats are expected to lose another 5 to possibly 12 House seats (or more), taking [Obama's] total midterm House loses to the 68 seat to 75 seat range. ... The GOP lost 30 House seats in George W. Bush's second midterm, but gained 8 seats in his first midterm for a net loss of 22 seats. The party lost 26 seats in Ronald Reagan's first midterm, but a mere 5 seats in his second midterm for a net loss of 31 seats. Democrats got shellacked in 1994, losing 54 seats in Bill Clinton's first midterm, but the party gained 5 House seats in 1998, Clinton's sixyear-itch election, for a net Clinton loss of 49 House seats. ... Democrats lost 6 Senate

seats in 2010 and seem likely to lose from 5 to as many as 10 seats next week. That would add up to Obama midterm Senate losses of from 11 seats to as many as 16 seats." (The figures do not include special elections or party switches.) [67286, 67287]

Under the terms of the deal, the former commanders would remain under the control of the government of Qatar for one year and be subject to 'restrictions on their movement and activities,' a senior U.S. official has told NBC News—including a one-year travel ban. A diplomatic source later told NBC News that their movements within the Arab emirate are not restricted. [67143, 67144]

Meanwhile, FoxNews.com reports, "As many as 20 to 30 former Guantanamo Bay detainees—some of whom were released within the last three years—are suspected by intelligence and Defense officials of having joined forces with the Islamic State and other militant groups inside Syria... The development has cemented fears that the U.S. military would once again encounter militants taken off the battlefield. The intelligence offers a mixed picture, and officials say the figures are not exact. But they are certain at least some of the released detainees are fighting with the Islamic State, or ISIS, on the ground inside Syria. Others are believed to be supporting Al Qaeda or the affiliated al-Nusra Front in Syria." [67145]

In Iraq, the bodies of 150 Sunnis who had resisted ISIS are found in a mass grave. According to Reuters, "Islamic State militants took the men from their villages to the city of Ramadi and killed them on Wednesday night and buried them, an official in a police operations center and another security official told Reuters. In a separate case, witnesses said they found 70 corpses from the same Albu Nimr tribe near the town of Hit in the Sunni heartland Anbar province. ...Most of the victims found near Hit were members of the police or an anti-Islamic State Sunni force called Sahwa (Awakening)." (Pamela Geller comments, "Obama is responsible for the threat posed by the Islamic State, by leaving Iraq precipitously and creating a vacuum giving an opportunity to this group. His response is to deny it has anything to do with Islam, despite its name, as if his stating such an absurd notion would make it so. He is encased in blinding, narcissistic denial and willful ignorance. His airstrikes have had little impact on the Islamic State and his aid and

In fact, Jean Baptiste Kingery, the California man accused of being a grenade trafficker, came to the attention of the inspector general's office during the probe of Fast and Furious, which also occurred on Attorney General Eric Holder's watch as head of the Justice Department. The missteps of the U.S. attorney's office in Arizona and the ATF allowed Kingery, a 43-year-old U.S. citizen, to move massive amounts of grenade parts and ammunition to Mexico's ruthless drug cartels, Inspector General Michael Horowitz concluded. This 'grenade walking' mirrored, in some respects, the controversial gun-walking strategy used in ATF's Operation Fast and Furious and also involved the same U.S. attorney and ATF offices." [67232]

Defying a quarantine in Fort Kent, Maine, possible Ebola-carrier Kaci Hickox goes on a 55-minute bicycle ride with her boyfriend. Hickox's return home is not without controversy. Gateway Pundit writes, "Local news reports say Hickox is the talk of the small town by 'scared' [sic; frightened] locals. Fort Kent residents are canceling medical procedures out of fear of Hickox returning to Fort Kent after being released from quarantine in New Jersey. Students at the college of her nursing student boyfriend Ted Wilbur, the University of Maine at Fort Kent, were said to be 'panicked' that the boyfriend would return to campus after spending time with Hickox—with some students talking [about] a boycott. ... CTV reports residents of Clair, New Brunswick, just across the border from Hickox's hometown of Fort Kent, are 'nervous' about Hickox's refusal to abide by quarantine orders. They fear she could spread Ebola to Canadians who visit Fort Kent. That concern was exacerbated by Hickox' in-your-face bike ride Thursday morning. The Canadian government has taken measures to screen Hickox should she try to enter Canada." (Whether fears of catching the Ebola virus are rational is irrelevant to the fact that those fears exist. If even one person who came in contact with Hickox in New Jersey, or Dr. Craig Spencer in New York City, contracts the disease, the economies in those huge areas could be affected. Reduced business at sporting events, restaurants, shopping malls, or other crowded places could cost many people their jobs.) [67148, 67204, 67268]

At The Trading Report.com Michael Snyder writes, "Mark this day on your calendars. The Dow is at 16974, the S&P 500 is at 1982 and the NASDAQ is at 4549. Greg Amick, Carmichael's campaign manager, stepped down Friday after being videotaped allegedly telling an actress who expressed concern about her alleged legal status, that she shouldn't have any problem voting. 'As long as you're registered to vote, you'll be fine,' said Amick, according to the video. ... The woman claimed to be an undocumented Brazilian immigrant who had a driver's license and received a voting registration card by mistake. She claimed to know she wasn't supposed to vote but wanted to support U.S. Sen. Kay Hagan, the Greensboro Democrat who is in a tight race against Republican challenger Thom Tillis. Several of the Mecklenburg campaign workers and volunteers appear to tell her that she should vote. Rob Brisley, a spokesman for the Carmichael campaign, confirmed that Amick had stepped down from his position." Brisley remarks, "It is unfortunate that a social media virus has added noise and sometimes confusion to an election in our community."

(Uncovering vote fraud is "noise and confusion.") Townhall.com reports that an investigation by the North Carolina Board of Elections "has flagged 1,425 registered voters who are believed to be non-citizens." Coming from a 'good Christian home,' he was confused and 'hurt' that he had to write and say the Muslim declaration of faith (the shahada) and write it repeatedly. The mother was beside herself. ... One parent on Facebook wrote, 'Parents, be concerned and check your child's assignments. My son came to me last night to get help with his Social Sciences assignment about the one God (Allah) and the Five Pillars of Islam. As you can imagine, we were completely shocked. Now to clarify, I have no problem with my child learning about the various cultures around the world and the religions they practice, but for a school to emphasize and actually teach a single religion to children while discouraging the others is beyond deplorable. If you are worried that your child may be forced to endure these teaching please see the ACLU website. By law children are allowed to be excused from any lessons or discussions they object to on religious grounds without consequence. We will be opting out of this one." Geller comments, "The ACLU ain't going to help you, lady. They are part of the problem." (No one in Obama's Department of Education is doing anything to stop the spread of Islamic teaching. In fact, it is probably aiding and abetting the efforts.) In Maryland, parent Kevin Wood—a Marine Corps veteran—was banned from entering his daughter's school because he dared to complain that she was instructed to write an essay on the five pillars of Islam, Mecca, and Mohammed. In Rhode Island, Obama delivers yet another "Republican war on women" speech in the hopes of driving more Democrats to the polls on November 4. He says, "The idea that my daughters wouldn't have the same opportunities as somebody's sons, well that's unacceptable." (Obama is correct—but not in the way he suggests: his daughters will certainly not have the same opportunities somebody's sons; they will have far greater opportunities.) Obama also says, "Sometimes, someone, usually [a] mom, leaves the workplace to stay home with the kids, which then leaves her earning a lower wage for the rest of her life as a result. And that's not a choice we want Americans to make." Obama is trying to offer an escape from reality. Life involves choices, and one of them is often the choice of a career or child-raising. Obama wants the voters to believe that if they simply vote for the Democrat candidate they can avoid difficult choices. Obama is also implying that a career is more important than child-rearing, that it is irrational for someone to give up an income in order to remain home with her or his children, and that the government must necessarily step in to make keeping a job the number one priority. Obama fails to comprehend that many families have both the husband and the wife working not because they *prefer* that, but because they cannot afford not to. High taxes and inflation have turned two-income families into an act of economic self-defense. (Whether Obama is considering 'solving" the problem with an executive order banning stay-at-home moms is not clear. Or perhaps he is considering forcing employers to

Pushing government pre-schools, Obama says, "Moms and dads deserve a great place to drop their kids off every day that doesn't cost them an arm and a leg." (That government pre-school would cost less than private pre-school is ridiculous. *Wherever* the children are placed there are costs: rent, utilities, salaries, insurance, etc. Whether it is the government agency or a private business paying those bills, those bills exist. Additionally, government employees tend to receive higher wages and benefits than employees in the private sector. Thus, the per-child cost of government pre-school would likely be higher than the cost at a privately-run facility. What Obama wants, of course, is *not* for the parents to pay for the pre-school directly; he wants the *taxpayers* to pay for the pre-schools. He wants to spread the cost among *all* taxpayers—regardless of whether they have children. As a result, people who have no children would be paying part of the day-care costs of people who do have children, and working Americans would be paying *all* of the costs of non-working Americans with children. Townhall.com's Katie Pavlich writes, "The war on women rhetoric... has fallen flat with many female voters in this election cycle. Overall, ... Obama is underwater with women in swing states and with everything going on in the world, contraception being provided through federal government force isn't high on the priority list. ... Further, an Associated Press poll released last week shows more women want to vote for Republicans, not Democrats on Tuesday." (By "more," Pavlich means increasing numbers of women have shifted toward the GOP; it is not a majority. The poll shows that women have moved from favoring Democrats 47-40 percent to a 44-44 tie.) Obama and his fellow Democrats may learn on November 4 that the "grand coalition" they built in 2008 is not as stable as they believe it to be. Obama won with only 53 percent of the vote in 2008, and while that coalition may still have—and may perhaps always have—the far-left ideologues and the black voters, it does not have to lose many women, millennials, or union workers who want the Keystone XL pipeline approved for that 53 percent to fall to 48 percent—and you don't win elections with 48 percent. Pavlich also notes that support for gun control legislation has fallen among women, who "are the fastest growing demographic of gun owners in America. So what does this mean? A few things. The first is that these numbers show fear mongering, smears and false accusations against the gun industry and gun shop owners individually aren't working. These numbers also prove that pro-gun activists have been successful in not only showing Americans that 'universal background checks' don't work to stop crime, but are a threat to Second Amendment Rights down the road." Time magazine's Mark Halperin tweets that Obama will have meetings on November 3 and 4 and not appear with any candidates. [67227]

Secretary of State John Kerry telephones Israeli Prime Minister Binyamin Netanyahu to tell him the White House does not really believe he is a "chickenshit." (Whether Kerry also mentioned coward, recalcitrant, myopic, reactionary, obtuse, blustering, pompous, and "Aspergery"—all of which have been Obama administration descriptions of Netanyahu—is not reported.) Investigative reporter Sharyl Attkisson releases video she took with her cell phone camera showing date being erased from her computer without her touching the keyboard or the mouse, as evidence that her system was hacked by, she suspects, the federal government. (Doubters and Obama supporters will claim her video proves nothing, while others will argue that she has far more to lose by inventing a story than by reporting the truth.) Attkisson also reports that a "stray fiber-optic line" was connected to her house, which her service provider, Verizon, said it did not install. A Verizon technician inspected the installation and said, "That shouldn't be there." [67228, 67282, 67309, 67318]

At FreeBeacon.com Matthew Continetti reports, "Deputy National Security Adviser and MFA in creative writing Ben Rhodes likened an Iranian nuclear deal to Obamacare in a talk to progressive activists last January, according to audio obtained by the Washington Free Beacon. The remarks, made at a since-discontinued regular meeting of White House personnel and representatives of liberal interest groups, reveal the importance of a rapprochement with Iran to ... Obama, who is looking to establish his legacy as his presidency enters its lame-duck phase." In the recording, Rhodes says, "Bottom line is, this is the best opportunity we've had to resolve the Iranian issue diplomatically, certainly since ... Obama came to office, and probably since the beginning of the Iraq war. So [this is] no small opportunity, it's a big deal. This is probably the biggest thing ... Obama will do in his second term on foreign policy. This is healthcare for us, just to put it in context." Rhodes also says, "We're already kind of thinking through, how do we structure a deal so we don't necessarily require legislative action right away." (Obama considers and his toadies consider ObamaCare the crowning achievement of his first term, and they want an agreement with Iran to cap his second term—even if it means acting behind the backs of members of Congress.) Continetti writes, "I am going to express fear. Fear that the chances of some sort of dangerous and misguided détente with Iran are high, and that they increase if Republicans capture the Senate and improve their majority in the House. Fear that Obama sees an Iran deal not just as health care reform for the second term, but as his version of George W. The desire for détente with Iran, for comity and diplomatic accord between longtime enemies, for a new Middle East in which security is left to regional stakeholders, and Shiite and Sunni alike see the United States as 'evenhanded' in its

treatment of Israelis and Palestinians, holds immense sway over the alliance of progressives and realists that conduct American foreign policy. It has for a decade." {67259, 67260}

"...For six years the White House has been careful not to provide the Iranians with any reason to reject negotiations, to prevent his fantasy from becoming real. To the contrary: It has been solicitous of Iran and Syria, in a demonstration of its willingness to address their grievances. That is why Democrats called Bashar al-Assad a reformer, why Obama remained silent during the 2009 protests over Mahmoud Ahmadinejad's rigged election, why the State Department doesn't include human rights or ballistic missiles in the scope of its negotiations with Iran. It is why Obama has resisted overthrowing Assad even after he crossed the red line of chemical weapons use, why he refers to the 'Islamic republic of Iran,' bestowing legitimacy on the revolutionary regime, and why administration officials reject congressional proposals to reinstate sanctions should the negotiations with Iran fail. These decisions are not made in light of the national security interests of the United States. They are made to keep alive ... Obama's dream of peace with Iran. And the purpose of these decisions isn't to mollify American politicians. It's to satisfy Iranian ones. ...Repudiated, isolated, ineffective, stymied, Obama cannot persuade the Iranians of the strength of the American position. So he will move as far as he can in the direction of the Iranian one. Unable to make Iran pro-American, he will settle for making America pro-Iranian. It is part of his dismal, pathetic, ill considered, shortsighted, and injurious 'legacy.'" [67259, 67260]

HotAir.com writes that Continetti's points about Obama "securing a legacy and reshaping the Middle East with a single bold flourish are true. So is the idea that both the surge and a nuke deal were/are desperation moves aimed at curing a long stretch of American ineffectiveness with one master stroke. The key difference, obviously, is the faith each man put in his enemy's willingness to follow international rules. Bush bet that Saddam couldn't be trusted long-term not to play with nukes; he had to be removed. Obama's betting that Khamenei can be trusted—for the next two years, at least, after which O will be out of office and making sure that Iran sticks to its agreement will be someone else's problem." In a discussion with Fox News' Martha MacCallum, *The Weekly Standard's* Stephen Hayes notes that the White House had recently denied "that it was seeking ways to work around Congress to implement some kind of a deal with Iran. ... Now we see [Obama] carrying out policies that open the door to some kind of a detente or rapprochement with Iran, and I think we're going to rue the day that he's done that." Hayes references the Jeffrey Goldberg article at TheAtlantic.com, and the official who bragged that the Obama administration had pressured Israel not to strike Iran's nuclear facilities, and observes that the boasting is "not going to look good when Iran has a nuke." (It will do Israel little good to say, "I told you so" a few minutes before Iran drops one on Tel Aviv. The reality is that Obama does not care if Iran obtains nuclear weapons. Nor does he care if Iran uses them to blackmail—or destroy—Israel.) [67260]

In Mexico, Judge Victor Octavio Luna Escobedo of the Sixth Federal District Court in Tijuana orders the immediate release of U.S. Marine Andrew Tahmooressi because he would not be able to receive proper care for his Post Traumatic Stress Disorder if he remained incarcerated. (Whether Obama—who remained virtually silent about the situation during the entire period of Tahmooressi's incarceration—will claim sole credit for the release, while blaming the GOP for standing in his way, is not yet known.) Arguably, it was Congressman Matt Salmon (R-AZ), Fox News in general, Fox News' Greta Van Susteren in particular, Montel Williams, and the American people who applied the pressure that led to the Marine's release. Salmon thanks former New Mexico Governor Bill Richardson for his assistance, along with Congressman Ed Royce (CA), and the American people. Congressman Dana Rohrabacher (R-CA) says Obama, "who is also the commander in chief, didn't do his job. There is a lack of concern for this man, for this American hero who served our country. As commander in chief he showed a total disdain and non-interest in an American hero who served us in Afghanistan and a total disregard for the fact that he was suffering. ...[Obama] not stepping forward was a slap in the face to veterans. On election day some GOP candidates may be helped more by Americans who do not bother to vote than by those who do. Conn Carroll reports at Townhall.com, "According to months of polling from NBC News, The Wall Street Journal, and Annenberg Foundation, the 2014 electorate will be even older, whiter, and wealthier than it was in 2010. ...[A]ccording to 6,346 interviews with likely voters taken between September 2nd and October 29th, the 2014 electorate will be 78 percent white, just 11 percent of voters will be aged 18-29, and just 32 percent of voters will make less than \$50,000. Meanwhile, the survey shows the African-American vote ticking down to 10 percent, and the Hispanic vote falling to 7 percent. If the Democrats predicated their 2014 hopes on turning out Obama's 2012 electorate, this poll suggests that they failed miserably." (Also impacting the election will be new voter ID laws. Some states require photo ID to vote, some accept non-photo IDs, and others require no identification.) [67273, 67315]

Bill Clinton campaigns for Senator Kay Hagan (D-NC). (She appears with him onstage wearing a blue dress, apparently having no advisors intelligent enough to warn her that a blue dress with Bill Clinton is not a good image—nor is a Politico headline: "Bill Clinton plugs Kay Hagan in N.C.") In Colorado, Republican mail-in ballots lead Democrat ballots by 104,000. [67301]

Rick Weiland, the Democrat candidate for the U.S. Senate in South Dakota, circulates a petition calling for Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-NV) to be ousted as Senate leader and replaced by Elizabeth Warren (D-MA), Dick Durbin (D-IL), Bernie Sanders (I-VT), or someone else. Weiland states, "This is a fight I intend to continue no matter how long it takes, because it is a fight for the new leadership the Congress must have if the larger battle to drive big money out of Congress, and thus open the door to progress for all of America, is to succeed." (Weiland's action is pointless. He apparently believes that by criticizing Reid he can appear to be more independent and attract more votes on

November 4. But Weiland will almost certainly lose to Republican Mike Rounds and will never make it to the Senate to vote on the party's leadership.) [67322, 67323]

WashingtonPost.com reports, "Justice Department investigators have all but concluded they do not have a strong enough case to bring civil rights charges against Darren Wilson, the white police officer who shot and killed an unarmed black teenager in Ferguson, Mo., law enforcement officials said. ... 'The evidence at this point does not support civil rights charges against Officer Wilson,' said one person briefed on the investigation, who spoke on the condition of anonymity because of the sensitivity of the case. Justice Department officials are loath to acknowledge publicly that their case cannot now meet the high legal threshold for a successful civil rights prosecution. The timing is sensitive: Tensions are high in greater St. Louis as people await the results of a grand jury's review of the case." (HotAIr.com writes, "Much like the leaked reports about the state level case, we still can't rule out the possibility that these things are being leaked out in a slow drip to mitigate public unrest if it turns out that there will be no charges of any kind. I don't know how effective that strategy would prove, though. The ongoing, simmering anger on the streets of Ferguson suggest that there will be an eruption of some sort in that event.") Canada announces it will stop processing travel visa applications from non-Canadians who have visited African nations dealing with the Ebola virus. [67304, 67305]

Officials with the Oregon Health Authority announce that a woman who recently visited Liberia has been hospitalized in Portland with a high fever. KOIN.com reports, "The 21-year-old woman—whose name has not be released because of confidentiality issues—had been being monitored since she moved from Liberia to Portland on Tuesday, according to Nate Kerkulah, the chairman of Oregon's Association for Liberia. When the fever developed Friday morning, EMS teams were sent to assess her condition. ...Officials said this does not mean the patient has Ebola. A full series of tests will be done and the CDC will also evaluate the tests before any kind of diagnosis is revealed. Kerkulah said she is also being tested for malaria and added that she could have been injured in a recent car accident." [67320]

WAGMtv.com reports, "Sheila Pinette of the Maine CDC has released information that the roommate of Kaci Hickox, while in West Africa has displayed signs of ebola. Pinette says 'The respondents [sic; respondent's] roommate in Africa became infected without knowing how she became infected with Ebola. (Any potential risk to respondent from that incident has passed).' This is one of 35 points Pinette made while filing a verified petition for public health order yesterday with the state. Kaci Hickox was issued [a] temporary court order [allowing her to avoid a complete quarantine]. The document says Hickox must submit to active monitoring, coordinate her travel with public health authorities, not use commercial or public transportation, not go to any public places or workplaces unless to receive necessary health care, and she must maintain a 3-foot distance from other people and not leave Fort Kent without consulting public health authorities." On *Politicking*, Dick Morris, former political advisor to Bill Clinton, tells host Larry King that Hillary Clinton responded to accusations against her womanizing husband by hiring a "fleet of detectives" to research their pasts in attempt to blackmail them into keeping quiet. ConservativeTribune.com writes, "[T]o be called 'Nixonian' by such a formerly close political adviser as Morris is surely not likely to do Hillary Clinton's 2016 presidential aspirations any good. ...Morris' accusation is just one more reason why Hillary Clinton isn't fit to be the president of the United States.
